PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

One: We are surrounded by the grace of God. Let our Scripture call us in to receiving that grace and understanding as we hear God's Holy Word read aloud and may it seep into the very structure of our bones. Amen.

WISDOM OF ISRAEL: Isaiah 40: 1-11

One: Comfort, O comfort my people, says your God. Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins.

A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken." A voice says, "Cry out!" And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever.

Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up your voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of

Judah, "Here is your God!" See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

One: The Word of the Lord. **All: Thanks be to God!**

REFLECTION: The Word of our God Will Stand Forever! -Isaiah 40:1-11

"The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever." When everything else fails, *God's word* endures forever. Having left the judgment behind in the first portion of Isaiah, the writer now moves to the good news of God's comfort and promise for redemption of a people who have lived in exile. Blame and accusatory words are set aside in favour of comfort, hope and joy. This does not mean that we can read one in isolation of the other because judgment precedes forgiveness, mercy and grace. There would be no need of God's actions of mercy if we were without sin. If we were a people who did not turn from God at every opportunity, chronicled, throughout the pages of our Bible, then we would not need the extraordinary intervention of pardon. This text provides us with insight into two very different conflicting ideas of God: God's mighty hand can lift up, make low and level, in an omnipotent display of power, yet this same hand can mend, restore and soothe.

I have seen pictures of a large mama bear with her wayward cub. The cub has gotten itself into a predicament through its own foolishness and the mama bear rises her clawed paw to strike out. It is an action that is not so much rooted in anger and

punishment, as one in which correction and teaching occur. The cub is reminded not to do that again. It is like the small child who reaches out to the hot stove and has its hand smacked away, to prevent the burn. In each of these cases, it is love that draws the response.

Those who find themselves in exile are left with no hope other than in God. Hope does not come from external sources because humans who are mortal, are fickle and break their promises, however, the Word of God prevails. First, they hear words of comfort, then they are told to prepare for the king is coming. Imagine the affect this would have on this abandoned, battered community who believed that God had left them. Next, they are assured that there is a steady, durable, reliable foreverness in God's divine word. Finally, the herald emphasizes three times – "Look" Your God; Look, your God comes with strength; Look, your God's reward is with him!" This God's strength is not in the vision of power, rather in gentleness, and caring.

We spoke last week about God's seeming absence in the call to Come on Down. Isaiah continues to speak of God's hidden presence with a promise of future deliverance. The scene is set in the heavenly realm. God assembles a council of a heavenly host. At issue, is the situation of God's children, the people of Israel. He tells the people, you will come through this, not just yet, there will be more to endure, but you will come out the other side. Isaiah could be speaking to our condition here in the midst of Pandemic. We have no idea how long it will last, we can only trust that we will come out the other side. I am asked by one of those who are weary of the restrictions, "is there ever going to end to this?" Yes, I tell them, because I believe it is, but not for some time. We have evidence from the past that pandemics do

end and no matter what we face, we learn that "this too, shall pass" (a Persian saying, not biblical; however, the Bible does speak of impermanence).

The words of hope in "shall, will and if" are given to those who are bent by life's crushing load, whether it is disease, violence, discrimination or economic hardship. Those who are in want will see it as a word of hope, whereas those who are in power, will see it as a threat. The proud will be scattered; the powerful will be toppled, but those who mourn, the meek of the earth they shall see God. "Here is your God" we shout to those on the threshold of death; "Here is your God" we sign with Handel. This is a God that trumps the worldly powers of consumerism and greed. In the face of apparent derision and indifference, we are to have faith in the God whose word endures. It is a time for us all to find our voice, to speak out words of comfort to anyone who feels abandoned or separated by God. God will come in gentle power. Amen.

THE GOSPEL - Mark: 1:1-8

One: The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God.

As it is written in the prophet Isaiah,

"See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight,"" John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. I have baptized you with water; but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

One: The Gospel of Our Lord Jesus Christ

All: Praise to you, O Christ!

REFLECTION: Recognition for the One Who Came Before! - Mark 1:1-8

Foretold in Isaiah and Malachi and a reference in Exodus (23:20), a messenger will be sent before the arrival of the Messiah to prepare the way. John the Baptist was a larger than life, memorable, weird character who spoke eloquently not on his

own behalf, but in preparation for another. He made sure that his listeners understood that he was only a transitional figure. John, in his demeanour, is associated with Elijah, from earlier Old Testament days. This connection recalls the past saving activity of God, a time after which all prophecy ceased until the coming of the Messiah. While John must have had a strong charismatic flavour, the people who came to hear him, also had a deep yearning for connection to God. He was very successful in persuading many who came to him from the surrounding countryside, to repent, turn around, ask forgiveness for their sins and be cleansed by the waters of baptism. Repentance and confession may not sit well with us. It is difficult to face the truth about ourselves and to intentionally change direction in our lives. Repentance and confession require a searching and honest look back to how well we have conducted our lives. "I have baptized you with water", he said, "but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit."

John is spoken of as the one whose voice cries out in the wilderness. His role was to be a herald, a servant character and his presence fades into the background upon the arrival of Jesus. The River Jordan was his place of ministry, not the holy temples of Jerusalem. People flocked to his side to hear of the One who was to come. John's message was always to point to Jesus, the Messiah, whose power and Might were so much beyond that of John's. Our scripture proclaims hope for troubled souls and judgment for the self-assured. John taught that if we are looking for God to deliver us, we must first examine ourselves to determine if we are fit to stand before God. We must learn to be self-critical allowing scripture to correct us and we need to be honest about our self-justifying ways. John calls *us* to account as

surely as he did the crowds who followed him into the wilderness.

We are to look to Jesus in order to see God. As we stand in that crowd listening to our hopes and directions for the future, we see the man, John pointing to the saviour of the world, who came and is still to come. John was the forerunner who bore no desires for grandeur or acclaim on his own, yet he was instrumental in setting the stage for the expectation and acceptance of Jesus' arrival. He did the prep work and for that he deserves recognition. I am reminded of the really good warm up bands that make a name for themselves opening for the mega stars. They are worthy of recognition in their own right and they get the people hyped up and prepared for the main attraction.

All leaders owe a debt to those who have come before. Here, in Melrose, you went through a period of turmoil and you had the benefit of a well-trained intentional interim minister. Philip helped to get you stabilized and ready for your next step, which was to bring me in. My ministry here can be more successful and smoother because of his and your work together. Jesus sets the example for us in ministry. He acknowledges and pays tribute to John for his adept handling of the message to the people prior to Jesus' arrival.

John had a loyal following. His people could have clung to him and made him into the star attraction. But he gently disentangled them and encouraged them to go and see Jesus for themselves. Many of John's followers became disciples of Jesus. John did the job God sent him to do. He prepared the way with passion and style. As we look to this Advent time of waiting, I wonder if we are all preparers. We might ask ourselves; how might we prepare

for the coming of the Chosen One? Our work as Christians is to prepare the way for the symbolic annual coming of the Christ child, but it is also to live in the time of waiting for the appointed time of second coming. We prepare ourselves through prayer, study, and committed lives of social justice as we try our best to walk in the Way of Jesus while we are here on earth.

"I have baptized you with water," John says, "but he will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." John's words prepare us for the eventuality that the road does not even end with Jesus. It points beyond to the Holy Spirit, a very prominent proclamation at the end of Jesus' life. We get to live in a time of preparation, but then we can relax because it is Jesus that does the rest. Amen.

So, this little girl signed the Christmas music so that they could be part of the celebration. Her kind gesture thrilled the audience, and it showed a maturity beyond her years. Christmas is a special time that reminds us that kindness is always in fashion, 365 days a year. One deed of kindness can start a ripple affect that brings joy to many.

Try it, you will find that the joy it brings to you far surpasses that which you are able to give out.

One: The promised one has a message for each one of us: That we stand in a long tradition of Christian saints; that we have gifts to give and use in God's service; that we know and can promote the values of God's realm – justice, peace and sharing; that nothing can separate us from the love of God.

All: This is Good News! We stand with John, and wait for the coming of Jesus.

One: We pray for our community of Melrose, for Loretta, for Vic, for Jim Roberts in the death of his wife, Dawn, and all our shut ins, for those who are still grieving loss of their loved ones, for those whose incomes have been reduced through the pandemic, for those who are afraid or unable to go out, for those who are feeling the isolation of separation from family and friends.

We pray for those in our circle who are recovering from illnesses, who are struggling with imperfect relationships, who are filled with anxiety and despair.

We pray for those that we are not even aware that there is a concern, and for all those that we hold in our hearts we raise up to you for their safekeeping.
