


♦ Worship Next Week ♦

The Deuteronomy text is a discourse by Moses telling the people that God will rise up prophets for them to hear and heed. The prophets will be one of their own who knows their history and traditions and who speaks the Word that God puts in their mouths. They will follow and be in the tradition of Moses. It is the Word that validates the prophets and they have the authority to speak on behalf of God. But if the prophets tell the people to follow other gods, then they are not prophets of the one True God and they shall be put to death. The role of the faithful people is to listen, not simply to hear, but to listen thoughtfully and courageously. By learning to recognize and trust God's true word, the people learn to trust God's own self. The psalmist tells us that we are born to wonder, to love and to praise. This Psalm 111 and 112 are written in special literary formats. They are known as an alphabetic acrostic: each line begins with the next letter of the Hebrew alphabet. One only sees it when it is read in Hebrew. It is a comprehensive list from A to Z of God's works. One sentence always is met with confusion - The Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom. Our dictionaries describe fear as an unpleasant emotion that alerts danger and brings pain or threat. Yet the use of the word here is not to say that one should be wary of God; a more able translation is ,those that "revere" God, ie. Admire or respect and allow themselves to be open to something greater, something better that lies deep within even the most ordinary experiences.

Mark's account of Jesus ministry is in the early stages of his rising fame. The people who hear and see his works are "amazed." Jesus entered the synagogue not to be instructed by others but to teach. At the same time, he encounters a cause for exorcism. The people hear the words come from a mute man, a noisy gong of demons, who reinforce what Mark tells us right from the beginning that Jesus is the "Holy One of God." Jesus' words have the power to make the unclean clean. "This boundary-breaking, demon-dashing, law-transcending Son of God has arrived in the person of Jesus, and he expects of his followers far more than amazement."




◆ Annual General Meeting ◆

H.A.A.A. Renewal Plan

Dear Residents.

The City of Hamilton will be hosting a Public Information Centre (PIC) to launch the Hamilton Amateur Athletic Association Grounds (H.A.A.A.) Renewal Plan project.

H.A.A.A. is a 7-acre community park located within the Kirkendall Neighborhood of Ward 1 at 250 Charlton Avenue West, just east of Locke Street. It's home to the Hamilton Tennis Club along its northern edge and abuts Ryerson Recreation Centre and Ryerson Middle School on its east side, with private properties backing onto the park's westerly limits.

The City of Hamilton's Landscape Architectural Services (LAS) is beginning a park Renewal Plan for the HAAA Grounds as the current amenities within the park are nearing the end of their service life. City staff will be looking to replace these amenities in the coming years as part of the park's Renewal Plan. The project goal is to develop an overall concept plan of the
