THE WISDOM OF ISRAEL: Genesis 29:15-28
Then Laban said to Jacob, "Because you are my kinsman, should you therefore serve me for nothing? Tell me, what shall your

wages be?" Now Laban had two daughters; the name of the elder was Leah, and the name of the younger was Rachel. Leah's eyes were lovely, and Rachel was graceful and beautiful. Jacob loved Rachel; so he said, "I will serve you seven years for your younger daughter Rachel." Laban said, "It is better that I give her to you than that I should give her to any other man; stay with me." So Jacob served seven years for Rachel, and they seemed to him but a few days because of the love he had for her. Then Jacob said to Laban, "Give me my wife that I may go in to her, for my time is completed." So Laban gathered together all the people of the place, and made a feast. But in the evening he took his daughter Leah and brought her to Jacob; and he went in to her. (Laban gave his maid Zilpah to his daughter Leah to be her maid.) When morning came, it was Leah! And Jacob said to Laban, "What is this you have done to me? Did I not serve with you for Rachel? Why then have you deceived me?" One: He put before them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches." He told them another parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened."

"The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a merchant in search of fine pearls; on finding one pearl of great value, he went and sold all that he had and bought it. "Again, the kingdom of heaven is like a net that was thrown into the sea and caught fish of every kind; when it was full, they drew it ashore, sat down, and put the good into baskets but threw out the bad. So it will be at the end of the age. The angels will come out and separate the evil from the righteous and throw them into the furnace of fire, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. "Have you understood all this?" They answered, "Yes." And he said to them, "Therefore every scribe who has been trained for the kingdom of heaven is like the master of a household who brings out of his treasure what is new and what is old."

REFLECTION: "Wisdom"

My topic today is Wisdom.

I begin with a short story – "an autobiography in five very short chapters " by Portia Nelson

Chapter One - I walk down the street. There's a hole in the sidewalk. It is a very deep hole. I fall in...I am helpless. It isn't my fault. It takes forever to find a way out.

Chapter Two – I walk down the same street. There's a deep hole in the sidewalk. I *pretend* I don't see it. I fall in... *again*. I can't believe I'm in the same place, but it isn't my fault. It still takes a long time to get out.

Chapter Three – I walk down the same street. There's a deep hole in the sidewalk. I see it there. I still fall in... it's a habit, but my eyes are open. I know where I am. It is my fault. I get out immediately.

Chapter Four – I walk down the same street. There's a deep hole in the sidewalk. I walk around it.

Chapter Five - I walk down another street.

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Five books in the Old Testament are considered to be Wisdom writings: – Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Song of Songs and Ecclesiastes. Each are chock full of examples of wisdom writings. The Bible has three different types of wisdom – the first is village or folk wisdom. These are short, pithy statements – the most of these are found in Proverbs.

The second is Royal wisdom; it instructs on palace politics.

And the third is theological wisdom and deep reflection; it covers controversial topics such as: Is there a God? And if so, why do such awful things happen?

Sages, or wise men, were responsible for the wisdom sayings. They believed that God wove important principles into the fabric of the universe and that careful observation could discern. Prophets, on the other hand believed that God gave specific persons divine knowledge through dreams, visions, ecstasy and divine appearance. Sages were always at odds because the universe often did not make sense, in spite of the fact that they believed that it should.

Wisdom is one of many virtues, a characteristic that is to be desired and an outward sign of good judgment. It is something that one is not born with nor taught. As in the case of the little tale I began with it, must be learned over time through life experience. When we see glimpses of it in the very young, we are surprised and attribute it to an old soul existing in a young body.

Rene Descartes, a famous French Philosopher said that: It is God alone who has perfect wisdom, complete knowledge, and the truth of all things. Human beings become wise as they begin to approach the truths known only by God.

What does wisdom look like? It shows up in honour, non-selfish actions, truth, peace-loving, merciful and good traits.

It is developed through gaining new experiences, stepping outside our comfort zones, being open minded to new cultures, new activities and new people. It is learned through education, wise mentors, reading and realizing that everyone is fallible.

We put wisdom into practice by being humble in situations where we think before acting; we act only out of our values; we learn from our mistakes; and we share our wisdom with others by leading as an example.

The author of the Book of James tells us that wisdom comes from God, is peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy, sincere, impartial and full of good fruits.

The Greeks believed that Sophia, a feminine aspect of the divine, was the breath and the power of God. Stoics understood wisdom as a crucial underpinning for the goal of a moral life.

Elaine Pagels is a modern-day theologian who writes many books for theological studies. She says that "you want to know God, but when you really get there, you'll understand that first, you can't know God because God is bigger than you are. And second, you understand that you live in *it* and you're dependent on *it*." (meaning God)

The world longs for wisdom. The Bible says: "it is more precious than rubies. Nothing you desire can compare with her."

King Solomon, son of King David is our earliest illustration of biblical wisdom. He prays to God not for riches or fame, but to be made wise. His deepest desire was to be smart and knowledgeable, but more valuable beyond that, to have the wisdom to apply it appropriately.

The story that illustrates his wisdom involved two prostitutes with babies. A child of the one of the women died, the other mother accuses her of stealing her baby during the night. They come before the wise king to ask him to determine to whom the baby belongs. Solomon, in essence, says it is an impossible task to decide who is telling the truth, and is the rightful mother. He takes out his sword and offers to cut the baby in half so that they each have a portion. One woman speaks up quickly and says, "no! no! Let her have the baby ". He immediately knows that she is the true mother, the only one who really cares about the life of the baby.

There are so many lessons in that story. The wisdom to apply what we know appropriately to get to the truth involves an element that we all need for us to be able to live truth-filled lives.

Each day we hope to grow and improve on the day before. We are always striving, or becoming. Our lives are a life long process of growth, in obtaining wisdom, and insight that point towards a hope-filled future.

Our thirst for happiness within this world is insatiable. If we do not have the wisdom to seek it in God, then we will find whatever poor substitutes we can from the material world.

Happiness is camouflaged through the acts of terrorists who ideologically destroy people for their own beliefs; in executives who ruthlessly climb the corporate ladder at the expense of others; in athletes who, to the exclusion of all else, break world records; in scholars whose only drive is to publish books to make a name for themselves; in gamblers who spend their days in the

casino; in musicians who sell their souls to become top record producers.

All the excesses of drinking, drugs, sex, eating, and suntans that happiness brings, is fleeting. Unsatisfied, incomplete, knowing there must be something more, those addicted choose to live in the glamour of success, apart from God.

Proverbs tells us that the fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom, but it is a misnomer to think that we need to cower in fear of God's justice. The fear is more in not running away from God, in not seeking refuge and joy in God, but in choosing to look for other avenues than God

Wisdom is characterized by humility through a renewing of the mind which is able to examine and approve the will of God - Knowing and doing the commandments of God and hearing and doing God's Word.

When it comes to acquiring spiritual wisdom, the truth is that while many desire it, there are probably few who know what it really is. It is more than knowledge. If you want to be wise the choice is simple.

- Choose wisdom Just act on it.
- Trust your instincts The late Wayne Dyer has said that intuition is more than just a hunch. It is a form of guidance by way of inner insight and it should never be taken lightly or ignored.
- Set boundaries once you choose wisdom, the rules for how you live your life will change (ie. Is it wise to eat junk food at 10 p.m.? Is it wise to move about alone in a bad

- neighbourhood after dark?) Guarding your soul, your heart, your desires, is a path that leads to great spiritual wisdom.
- Surround yourself with wisdom people who are wise, counselors, wise books.
- Learn from your mistakes Having once failed at a particular action, change the pattern.
- Learn from other people's mistakes Watch and observe others.
- Choose wisdom daily Every moment teaches you about yourself and your environment. You add to yesterday's wisdom with new information to keep the spiritual evolution going.

Self analysis is the key to spiritual wisdom. In order to reach beyond yourself, you need to know where you are now and self-correct.

We all need correction and that can be very hard to accept. We listen to advice and accept instruction so that we may gain wisdom in future. One of the key components, is to know when to speak, or when not to speak at all. We only learn when we are listening and when we are not talking. For some this is very difficult because we are prone to preparing our reply even before the person has finished speaking, thus missing the tail end of their conversation.

A closing story –
The Wise Woman's Stone

A wise woman who was traveling in the mountains found a precious stone in a stream. The next day she met another traveler who was hungry and the wise woman opened her bag to share

her food. The hungry traveler saw the precious stone and asked the woman to give it to him. She did so without hesitation. The traveler left, rejoicing in his good fortune. He knew the stone was worth enough to give him security for a lifetime. But a few days later he came back to return the stone to the wise woman.

"I've been thinking," he said, "I know how valuable the stone is, but I give it back in the hope that you can give me something even more precious. Give me what you have within you that enabled you to give me something more precious. Give me what you have within you that enabled you to give me the stone. (Author unknown).

Native wisdom says "Tell me a fact and I'll learn. Tell me a truth and I'll believe. But tell me a story and it will live in my heart forever."
