PRAYER FOR ILLUMINATION

One: Holy God, there are many good inspirational books that inform us and help us to find our way, but none has stood the test of time in giving us our grounding like the Bible. We ask that you guide us in our understanding as we hear the familiar words read, and that you give to us new vision and hope for its use in our lives. Amen.

WISDOM OF ISRAEL: Joshua 24: 1-3a, 14-25

One: Then Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel to Shechem, and summoned the elders, the heads, the judges, and the officers of Israel; and they presented themselves before God. And Joshua said to all the people, "Thus says the Lord, the God of Israel: Long ago your ancestors – Terah and his sons Abraham and Nahor – lived beyond the Euphrates and served other gods. Then I took your father Abraham from beyond the River and led him through all the land of Canaan and made his offspring many. I gave him Isaac; "Now therefore revere the Lord, and serve him in sincerity and in faithfulness; put away the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River and in Egypt, and serve the Lord.

Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." Then the people answered, "Far be it from us that we should forsake the Lord to serve other gods; for it is the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors up from the land of Egypt, out of the house of slavery, and who did those great signs in our sight. He protected us along all the way that we went, and among all the peoples through whom we passed; and the Lord drove out before us all the peoples, the Amorites who lived in the land. Therefore we also will serve the Lord, for he is our God." But Joshua said to the people, "You cannot serve the Lord, for he is a holy God. He is a jealous God; he will not forgive your transgressions or your sins. If you forsake the Lord and serve foreign gods, then he will turn and do you harm, and consume you, after having done you good." And the people said to Joshua, "No, we will serve the Lord!" Then Joshua said to the people, "You are witnesses against yourselves that you have chosen the Lord, to serve him." And they said, "We are witnesses." He said, "Then put away the foreign gods that are among you, and incline your hearts to the Lord, the God of Israel." The people said to Joshua, "The Lord our God we will serve, and him we will obey." So Joshua made a covenant with the people that day, and made statutes and ordinances for them at Shechem.

One: The Word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God!

PSALM – Psalm 78:1-7

One: Give ear, O my people, to my teaching; incline your ears to the words of my mouth.

I will open my mouth in a parable; I will utter dark sayings from of old,

things that we have heard and known, that our ancestors have told us.

We will not hide them from their children; we will tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and his might, and the wonders that he has done.

He established a decree in Jacob, and appointed a law in Israel, which he commanded our ancestors to teach to their children;

that the next generation might know them, the children yet unborn, and rise up and tell them to their children,

so that they should set their hope in God, and not forget the works of God, but keep his commandments.

REFLECTION: Lessons Passed On! Psalm 78:1-7

The Psalmist, Asaph was a musician of David's era. He wrote this psalm, the longest of the 150 psalms recorded in the Old Testament. His intention was to pass on the lesson that history must not repeat itself. It is in reference to unbelief in God. Its choice here today also allows us to think about lessons learned from the past, to remember and contemplate the horrors of war. The psalmist admonishes us to learn from the past and teach those in the present and still to come in the future, so that they will not forget.

This is a wisdom psalm that has as its central theme the goodness and kindness of God.

Incline your ears – give me your attention. I have something important to say to you, he begins. What you are about to hear is nothing new, it has been passed down through the generations. In fact, it is not just a friendly story, it is everyone's responsibility to pass it on to the next generation.

God is worthy of our adoration and gratitude; God's strength and power surpasses all; God uses that strength and power in active assistance to His people.

The message is still applicable today as it was in the time Asaph wrote it. The emphasis is upon the importance of seeing and understanding the hand of God in our lives as God moves towards bringing about the fulfillment of the kingdom of heaven, and sharing that knowledge so that others may benefit. The hope and memory that are recounted are intended to instill obedience to God. If we have learned our lessons well, we want to pass them on so that mistakes will not be repeated.

I'd like to close with a song that tells us about the foolishness of war. It was written in the 1960s as an anti-war song by Denis Lambert and Brian Potter and sung by Original Caste. Maybe some of you will remember it – It's called One Tin Soldier Listen, children, to a story that was written long ago 'Bout a kingdom on a mountain and the valley-folk below. On the mountain was a treasure buried deep beneath the stone And the valley-people swore they'd have it for their very own.

Chorus – Go ahead and hate your neighbour Go ahead and cheat a friend

Do it in the name of heaven, you can justify it in the end.

There won't be any trumpets blowing come the judgment day

On the bloody morning after one tin soldier rides away.

So the people of the valley sent a message up the hill

Asking for the buried treasure tons of gold for which they'd kill.

It came an answer from the mountain with our brothers we will share

All the secrets of our mountain all the riches buried there. Chorus

Now the valley cried with anger "Mount your horses! Draw your sword!

And they killed the mountain-people so they won their just reward.

Now they stood beside the treasure on the mountain, dark and red

Turned the stone and looked beneath it "Peace on Earth" was all it said.

We hear, we remember, but we have not learned our lessons well with the recounting of the memories of the two Great World Wars and the other battles that have been fought since then. It is our responsibility as parents and elders to teach our young – Love and obedience of God first, followed by country pride and loyalty, and family values. Only then, will succeeding generations make the right choices based on what they have learned from what has gone before. Amen.

When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. As the bridegroom was delayed, all of them became drowsy and slept. But at midnight there was a shout, 'Look! Here is the bridegroom! Come out to meet him.' Then all those bridesmaids got up and trimmed their lamps. The foolish said to the wise, 'Give us some of your oil, for our lamps are going out.' But the wise replied, 'No! there will not be enough for you and for us; you had better go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves.' And while they went to buy it, the bridegroom came, and those who were ready went with him into the wedding banquet; and the door was shut. Later the other bridesmaids came also, saying, 'Lord, lord, open to us.' But he replied, 'Truly I tell you, I do not know you.' Keep awake therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour.
