





Java fern – a hardy aquarium plant

If you are looking for a plant that can survive herbivorous fish, low light, brackish water, and absence of substrate in the form of gravel or sand, Java fern (Microsorium pteropus) will be your choice. Due to its attractiveness and ability to tolerate a wide range of conditions, Java fern has become one of the most popular plants in the aquarium hobby.





Originating from Southeast Asia, Java fern is a Rhizome plant that grows by attaching itself to woods and rocks along banks of rivers and streams. It can reach up to 30 cm in height, and has several varieties that differ in leaf size and shape. Typically, Java fern features long leaves and the green rhizome with dark-brown rootlets. According to Hiscock (2001, p.173), Java fern contains chemicals that deter most herbivorous fish from eating its leaves. This plant grows slowly and tolerates low levels of nutrients. Java fern obtains nutrients directly from water and stores them in the rhizomes.

In the aquarium, the rhizome should not be buried in the substrate, otherwise it will

rot. Usually *aquarists* attach this plant to a driftwood or a rock with a thread, an elastic, or an aquarium safe glue. I prefer, however, just to squeeze the rhizome and/or its rootlets through cracks in a driftwood. Over time the plant will cover the entire driftwood.

It is easy to propagate Java Fern by cutting the rhizomes. In addition, adventurous plants form near the pointed edge of dead-looking leaves.

Java fern can be very prolific. For example, a photo below shows a 33 gallon tank with multiple Java fern plants that all came from the same parent plant. They grow well under the LED light, which would be insufficient for the majority of other plants.



Taken together, Java fern is a hardy and beautiful plant suitable for different types of aquariums. If you do not have it in your tanks yet, I advise you to give it a try. You will not be disappointed.

Interesting Fish Facts

- 1. Most fish reproduce by laying eggs, though some fish, such as great white sharks, give birth to live babies called pups.[4]
- 2. Lungfish can live out of water for several years. It secretes a mucus cocoon and burrows itself under the unbaked earth. It takes in air with its lung through a built-in breathing tube that leads to the surface. A lungfish has both gills and a lung.[4]
- 3. Some fish, such as the great white shark, can raise their body temperature. This helps them hunt for prey in cold water.[5]
- 4. The oldest known age for a fish was an Australian lungfish. In 2003, it was still alive and well at 65 years old.[5]
- 5. Fish use a variety of low-pitched sounds to convey messages to each other. They moan, grunt, croak, boom, hiss, whistle, creak, shriek, and wail. They rattle their bones and gnash their teeth. However, fish do not have vocal chords. They use other parts of their bodies to make noises, such as vibrating muscles against their swim bladder. [1]
- 6. Fish can form schools containing millions of fish. They use their eyes and something called a lateral line to hold their places in the school. The lateral line is a row of pores running along the fish's sides from head to tail. Special hairs in the pores sense changes in water pressure from the movements of other fish or predators.[5]
- 7. Interesting Starfish Fact
- 8. Starfish don't have a brain or blood
- 9. Starfish are not fish. Neither are jellyfish.[1]
- 10. Since a fish's jaw is not attached to its skull, many fishes can shoot their mouths forward like a spring to catch startled prey. [1]
- 11. Electric eels and electric rays have enough electricity to kill a horse. [3]
- 12. Sharks are the only fish that have eyelids.
