
#### Union Turnpike

Along the toll road - the Union Tumpike (Georgia Avenue) stones were partially furnished by farmers after planning. Stones in piles along the road paid rates of 400 to 600 a peoch (16.5 long. 1.5'thick and I'hight. The road required continual maintenance due to wish out. Road maintenance equipment peered by the county in 1899 included 15 road scrappers, 1 stone crushes, and a 3-1/2 ton horse roller. Stone was also taken from nearby quarries. The horse voter and \$300 leveluding horses.





#### Jousting








## Concept


- ADA compliant entrance.


## Slope

- Invasives




