Katherine Hanley Family Shelter Donation

Guiding Light – Community Charity.

On **December 23rd**, SL217 made a \$500 holiday donation to the **Katherine Hanley Family Shelter in Fairfax**. The Lodge donated a mix of \$25 and \$50 gift cards (15 total) which will go straight to helping families cover immediate needs. The shelter supports families going through tough times by providing emergency housing, rapid rehousing help, case management, rental assistance, domestic violence emergency services, and prevention programs to help families and Veterans avoid homelessness. They also offer supportive housing and family-focused programs that help build long-term stability and independence.



The donation was presented during a relaxed pizza dinner at the Lodge. Together with three young men (and parents) from our affiliate Woodlawn Chapter of DeMolay, six Brothers including the Worshipful Master Jason Dillon, Kris Bough, Halim Ezzedine, Ryan Cvik, Mario Ulysses-Clanor, and Owen Bliss attended. It was a great night of fellowship and service, bringing together Brothers, DeMolay, and parents for a good cause.

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During the evening, we also had the chance to meet and talk with the shelter's Community Coordinator and Project Manager, who shared insight into the growing challenges faced by families experiencing hardships, homelessness, or escaping domestic violence. Hearing firsthand about the impact of their work drove home how important our support for the community can be. Thank you kindly to all the Brethren for your generosity – these donations helped to make a difference for several local families this holiday season.

THE MASTER'S MESSAGE

Brethren and Friends,

I'm writing this while stuck at home, watching the snow and ice we've experienced here in Springfield this past week. While the weather has kept us physically distanced (and, unfortunately cancelled our Rusty Nail Lodge), it has given me a great chance to reflect on the past month and continue planning for our year ahead.

Walking into the Lodge lately, I've been struck by a sense of community and energy that is truly palpable. We've reignited foundational efforts, including our weekly catechism practices, ensuring that our newer brothers have the mentorship they need to grow. January is often a month of transition, and for us, it was a time to reflect on the legacy of those who came before us while rolling up our sleeves for those beside us today.

I want to thank everyone who stepped up this past month; whether you helped a brother shovel his driveway, assisted in honoring our veterans at the "Wreaths Out" event, or helped with the cooking and set-up for our successful Artificial Intelligence (AI) Pancake Breakfast. Growing Together

Concurrently, we will be holding a **Lodge Cleanup Day**. We're looking to invest some "sweat equity" into our building by sprucing up the Fellowship Hall and tackling the small projects that keep our home shining.

I have two specific calls to action for you that morning: **we need donors and we need hands**. Whether you are rolling up a sleeve to give blood or grabbing a paintbrush to polish our building, your presence makes a real difference. Even if you are unable to donate blood, I encourage you to come out for the fellowship and the shared labor. 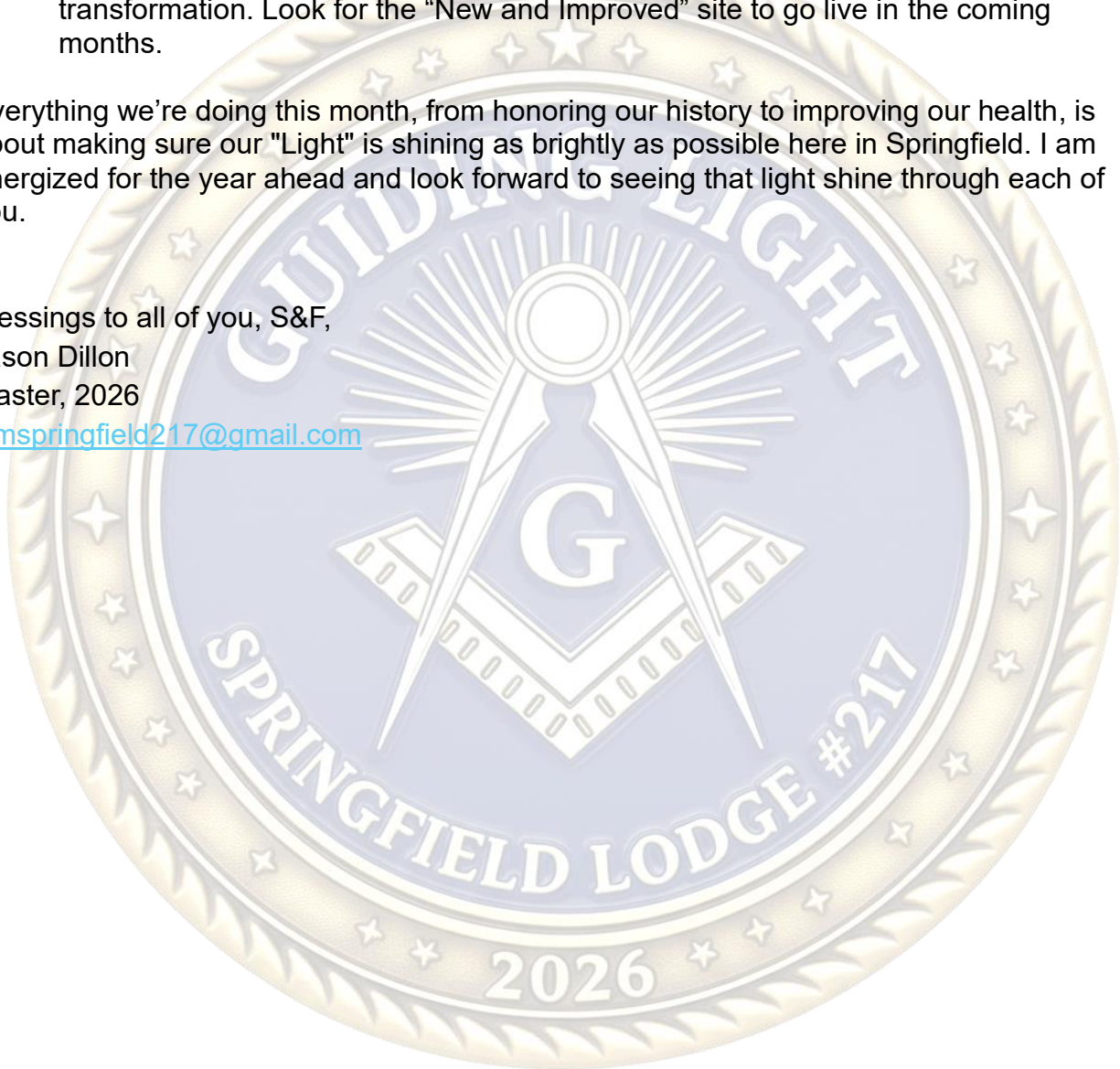
Lodge Updates & Calls to Action

THE WARDEN'S COLUMNS

From the West

ON THE LEVEL

Bro. Mario Clanor, Senior Warden



The Level is the official "jewel" or badge worn by the Senior Warden. He is charged with ensuring all members "meet on the level" and that harmony exists within the Lodge during its labor.

The Level remains one of the most vital symbolic tools in Freemasonry, primarily representing equality and moral equilibrium.

Physical Practice: To emphasize this principle, most Lodges end their meetings with all members standing on the same floor level in a circle or line, demonstrating that no one is exempt from standing "shoulder to shoulder" with their brothers.

Immovable Jewel: Along with the Square and Plumb, the Level is considered one of the

immovable jewels of the Lodge because it represents a fixed moral principle that must always be present when the Lodge is active.

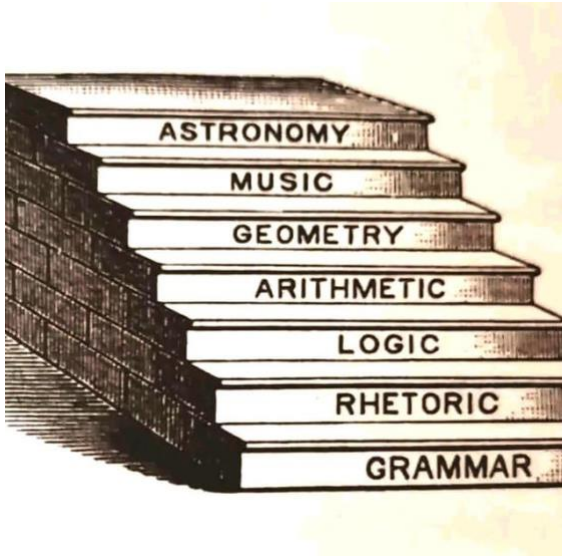
Ancient Duty of the Senior Warden: Historically, his role was to "pay the Craft their wages" and resolve disputes among workers. Today, this is interpreted symbolically as ensuring members are recognized for their service.

From the South

The Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences: A Masonic Introduction

“Wisdom has built herself a house, she hath hewn her out seven pillars” – Proverbs 9:1



Among the many symbols presented to us in Freemasonry, the **Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences** stand as a reminder that our labor includes the cultivation of the mind. Emerging gradually from Greek and Roman educational practices, these arts were considered essential for free individuals seeking to live thoughtfully and responsibly within society.

Freemasonry preserves these disciplines not as academic relics, but as symbolic guides for personal growth. They encourage clear thinking, disciplined speech, and an appreciation for order, harmony, and truth.

In the coming months I will explore each of these arts individually, examining their historical roots and symbolic meaning, with consideration to how they remain relevant to Masons today.

Traditionally the Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences have been divided into two groups: the Trivium and the Quadrivium. This structure is often credited to Martianus Capella whose allegorical work *De Buptiis Philologiae et Mercurii* framed the seven arts as attendants of wisdom.

The Trivium (Grammar, Rhetoric, and Logic) focuses on the arts of the mind. Grammar teaches structure and understanding; Rhetoric refines our ability to express ideas with clarity and integrity; and Logic disciplines our reasoning, helping us distinguish truth from error.

The Quadrivium (Arithmetic, Geometry, Music, and Astronomy) turns our attention to number, proportion, and the natural order. Arithmetic concerns precision and balance; Geometry, held in special esteem within Masonry, reflects structure and design; Music represents harmony and proportion; and Astronomy lifts our gaze to the heavens, reminding us of our place within a greater creation.

Trivia Question:

Which one of the Seven Liberal Arts and Sciences was historically considered the bridge between the Trivium and the Quadrivium—and why?

MASONIC EDUCATION

The Masonic Ballot: A Sacred Trust and Silent Sentinel

In Freemasonry, the act of balloting on a petitioner is one of the most solemn duties a member performs. It is defined by two primary characteristics: it is **sacred** and it is **secret**. No individual has the right to inquire how another voted, and disclosing one's own ballot - whether favorable or unfavorable - is considered an un-Masonic offense. This absolute privacy ensures that the lodge remains a sanctuary of peace and harmony.

The terminology of "spreading a ballot" finds its roots in Ancient Greece and Rome, where voters cast shells or pebbles into jars. Modern Masonry evolved this practice, transitioning from white and black balls to include black cubes. This change allows members to distinguish between a favorable and unfavorable vote by touch alone, thereby preventing accidental errors in the darkness of the lodge room.

Historically, practices differed significantly from modern standards. Early English lodges often required a roll call where each member advanced to the altar to vote. While the renowned Masonic jurist Albert Mackey advocated for these traditional methods, the growth of the fraternity made such practices impractical. Today, the ballot box is the universal standard in the United States, designed to conceal the voter's hand to maintain total ballot secrecy.

In the United States, jurisdictions generally require a **unanimous ballot** for admission. This high bar ensures that every current member is comfortable with the newcomer. Common practice allows for a "re-spread" of the ballot if only one or two negative votes appear, ensuring that no mistake was made before a petitioner is officially rejected.

While some argue that an unfavorable committee report should automatically disqualify a candidate, the ritual of the ballot remains the definitive act of the lodge. It serves as a "valve"

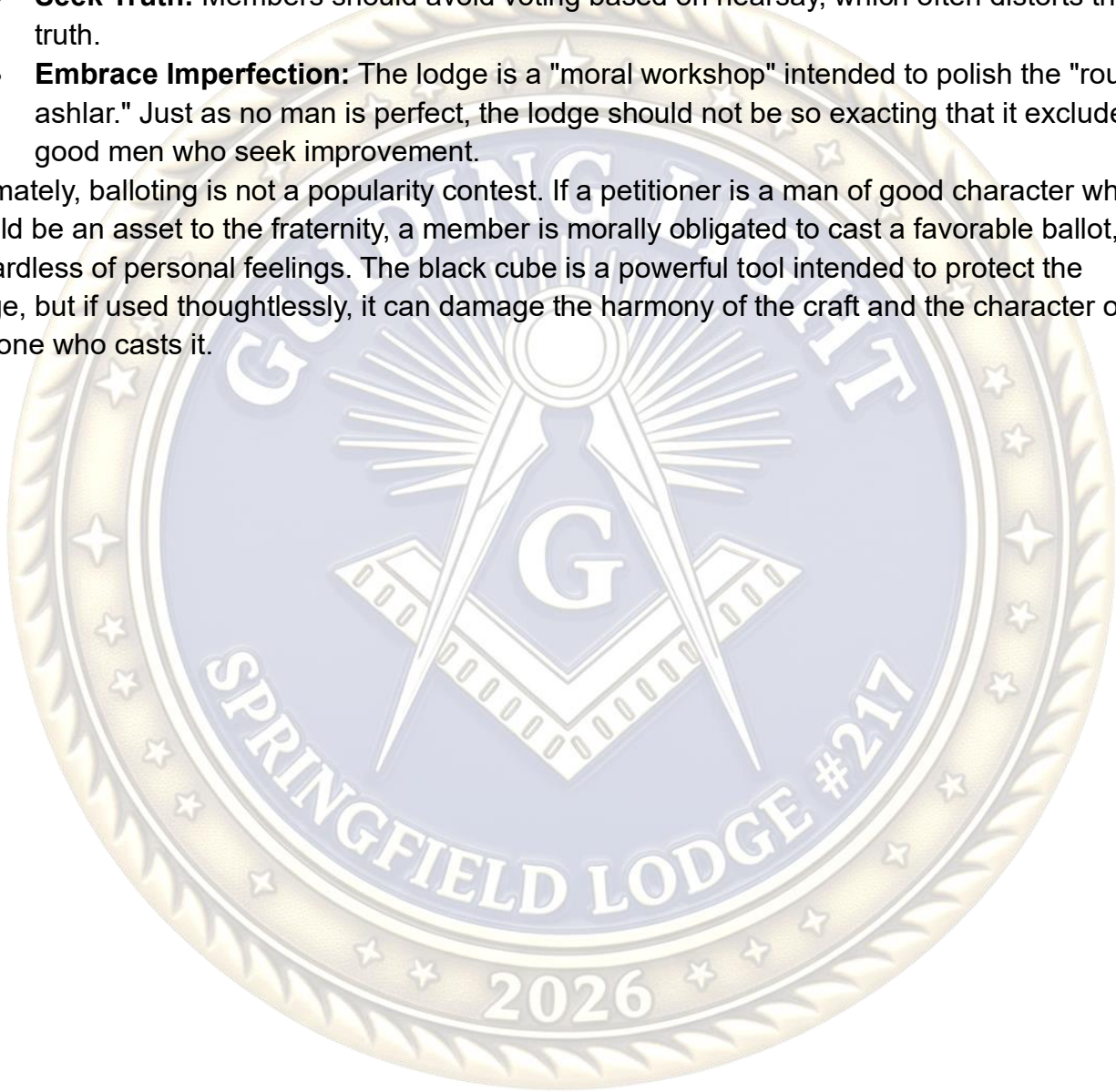


that controls the lifeblood of the fraternity, determining who will carry the craft's precepts into the future.

The act of voting takes place at the altar, the most sacred spot in the lodge. Positioned between the cardinal points of Wisdom, Strength, and Beauty, the altar reminds the Mason that he acts as both judge and jury. The summary of this responsibility is found in the motive behind the vote:

- **Avoid Malice:** It is a Masonic offense to use the ballot out of spite or personal dislike.
- **Seek Truth:** Members should avoid voting based on hearsay, which often distorts the truth.
- **Embrace Imperfection:** The lodge is a "moral workshop" intended to polish the "rough ashlar." Just as no man is perfect, the lodge should not be so exacting that it excludes good men who seek improvement.

Ultimately, balloting is not a popularity contest. If a petitioner is a man of good character who would be an asset to the fraternity, a member is morally obligated to cast a favorable ballot, regardless of personal feelings. The black cube is a powerful tool intended to protect the lodge, but if used thoughtlessly, it can damage the harmony of the craft and the character of the one who casts it.

My Start in Masonry

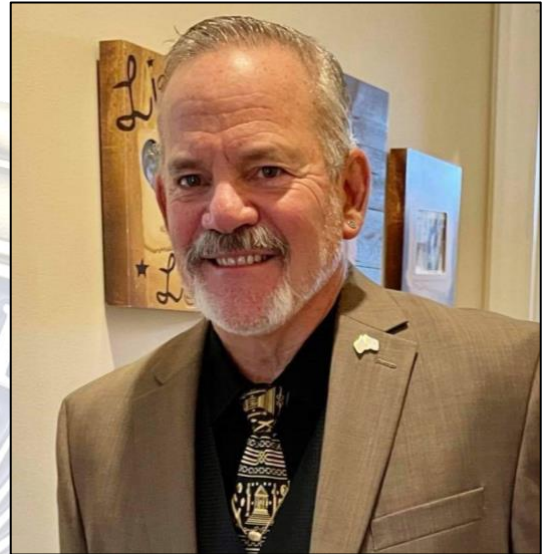
I was initiated in Springfield Lodge No. 217 on April 15, 1980, passed to the Degree of Fellowcraft on June 17, and raised to the Sublime Degree of Master Mason on August 16 of that year. I spent most of my formative years literally inundated by Freemasonry. My late father, Harry Mensch, whom I affectionately called my “Brother-Father,” was a Charter Member of Springfield Lodge and the first Captain of Kena Temple Shrine’s Scooter Corps. I spent much of my young life at parades, oyster roasts, and the like.

I finally “knocked at the West Gate” after bugging my dad and his best friend and Brother, Joe Dillon, another Springfield Charter Member, incessantly for years. I would ask, “what do you guys actually DO in your meetings?” While driving to a fishing outing in Wachapreague, I finally asked “THE QUESTION,” whereupon I was handed a Petition. My Masonic Path

I try hard to inculcate those values to this day. I have served as a Lodge Instructor of Work for many years and was the District Educational Officer for District 1B as well. I am profoundly honored to be the current District Instructor of Work for District 1B.

I hold a Ritualistic Silver Card and love both our Masonic Ritual and the esoteric aspects of Masonic Education, finding them inseparable and interdependent. I have conducted twice-weekly Ritual Schools and Educational Workshops for many years. One of my favorite programs to present is the “Missing Link in Masonry,” or Cleopatra’s Needle, which I have shared up and down the East Coast. Nothing pleases me more than to share our Ritual, Education, and “Fellowshipping” with Brethren from other Lodges. I even host “Garodge-Lodges” at my home, where you are always welcome to join us to work on Ritual and Education in a social atmosphere.

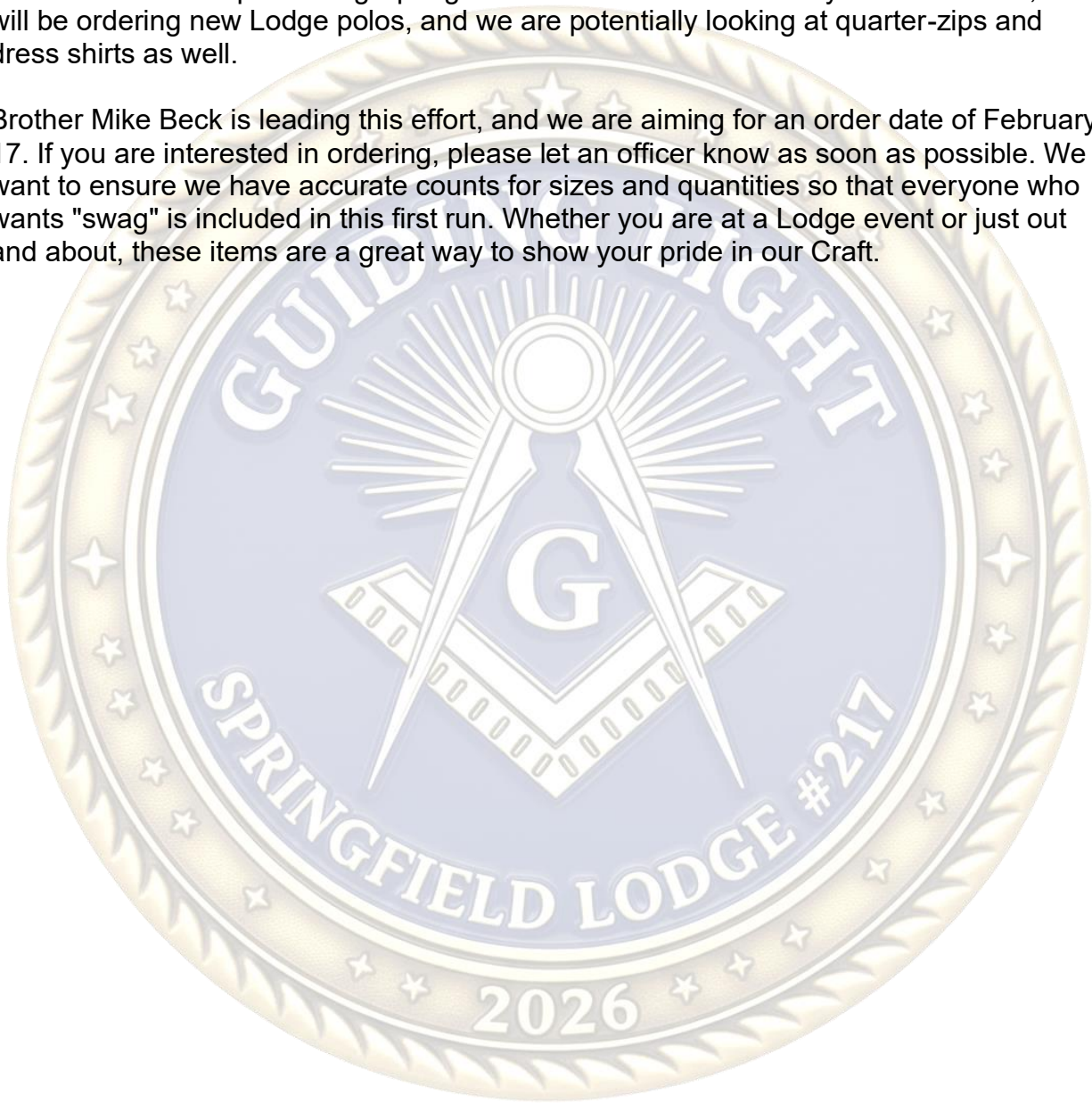
