<u>Personal Social & Emotional</u> Development

Develop friendships with other children-small group games that require turn taking and peer conversations.

Increasingly follow rules,
understanding why they are
important - we will discuss classroom
rules and make a poster, using
images, as a visual reminder to
support children.

Expressive Art & Design

Listen with increased attention to sounds- listening to the sounds in the natural world and the sounds that instruments make. We will explore how we can change instrumental sounds.

Communication & Language

Use a wider range of vocabulary- we will focus upon vocabulary related to *size* and our new topic *Autumn*.

Physical Development

Start taking part in some group activities which they make up for themselves, or in teams - children will be shown a number of small group games that they can choose to play in the classroom or outdoors. Children may decide to make up their own games based upon these suggestions.

<u>Understanding the World</u>

Begin to understand the need to respect and care for the natural environment- we will continue to develop our nursery garden with the support of the children.

Use all their senses in hands-on exploration of natural materials- children will explore autumnal natural objects such as pinecones, conkers and crunchy autumn leaves.

Mathematics

Take part in finger rhymes with numbers.- daily number rhymes.

Compare sizes, weights etc. using gesture and language such as 'bigger/little/smaller'- comparing and ordering items due to size

Literacy

Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary- children will listen to new topical storis that will introduce new vocabulary that they can apply during their chosen activities surrounding the theme of Autumn.







Characteristics of Effective Teaching and Learning

Children will be learning to...

Make independent choices. Children will support staff in creating a well-organised environment so that children know where materials and tools are and can access them easily.

Bring their own interests and fascinations into early years settings. This helps them to develop their learning. Staff will join in with children's play and investigations, without taking over. Staff will talk with children about what they are doing and what they are noticing.

Keep on trying when things are difficult. Staff will help children to think about what will support them most, taking care not to offer help too soon. Staff will provide a balance of open-ended play opportunities and structured adult-supported activities.

Take part in simple pretend play. Staff will provide open-ended resources that can be used in many ways and will encourage children's creative thinking.
