January Devotional “The Guiding Light”

Scripture - John 1:1-9

During my studies at the Pacific School of Religion in Berkeley, California, we had a citywide power outage that affected our dormitory living areas. It was reading week, which was utilized to study for finals at the end of the semester. The power outage lasted for a certain number of hours late in the evening, and students were trying to find ways to study for final examinations.

In our dormitory, we found a solution. We had gathered in the main lobby living room, with a surplus of candles used for personal prayer or student worship services to assist in our studies. We set up the candles in the main lobby and living room, and each person who came to study brought snacks to share with everyone in this incredible space. I would estimate there were at least 25 students in the main lobby living room sharing a candlelight, snacks, and conversation during our in-dark study session.

As the power came back on in the late hours, we were kind of disappointed. We had been gathered together in a time of temporary darkness, and we felt supported and safe. As I reflect on this experience, I am reminded that in times of grief, fear, sadness, or disappointment, Christ is our guiding light in the journey of faith. In times of darkness, we are called to support one another through the challenges life presents. We all have our “little candles” that we gather around, but when Christ turns the lights back on, we acknowledge in grace that we need one another as God’s creation.

The guiding light in Christ encourages us to carry one another in the darkest times in our communities, nation, and throughout the world. The apostle John describes Christ as a person who testifies to the light in John 1:8, meaning this light calls on us to be the “light of Christ” in the world. We testify that God’s forgiveness, love, mercy, and justice are portrayed in Jesus Christ. We are reminded every year that our task is to remain Christlike in our actions, words, and presence.

Furthermore, the church is called to be the light of the world. My question today is: How do you see yourself as a Christian who testifies to the light of God in Christ this year? How can you be a light to someone in the community? What are our plans as a church this year to bring Christ, the light of God, into the world?

All UWF books are located on the UWF bookshelf in the conference room at church. Books from 2022, 2023, 2024, and 2025 suggested reading list are available and will count for credit in 2026.

We are currently in the process of selecting books to purchase from the 2026 reading list. The 2026 books will be available by February for checkout. To earn a reading certificate for 2026, one book from each of the following categories must be read:

Education for Mission, Leadership Development, Nurturing for Community, Social Action, and Spiritual Growth.

Ratified Amendments in the United Methodist Book of Discipline

My dear siblings in Christ, I come to you bearing great news from the executive body of the United Methodist Church, the Council of Bishops. In 2024, the General Conference (the legislative body of the United Methodist Church) passed several proposed amendments to the United Methodist Constitution. This year, these proposed amendments were brought before the members of the annual conference for a vote. The Book of Discipline requires a two-thirds affirmative vote from the aggregate members of the annual conferences for the amendments to be ratified into our United Methodist Church constitution.

Church family, I wanted to remind you that our church is part of an annual conference, which is an embodiment of churches within a state or region in the United States. Each local church in the annual conference has a representative who speaks for their church. We are part of the California-Nevada Annual Conference, which has over 280 local churches, along with other churches in the process of being planted in their respective areas. Moreover, our annual conference voted to adopt the amendments proposed for inclusion in our church's constitution.

The following are the amendments passed:

1 Regionalization

These amendments will allow each newly

created regional conference to make decisions best suited to their area's unique needs by adapting certain parts of the Book of Discipline within their region, giving regions more flexibility and authority.

2. Inclusiveness of the Church

This amendment changes our church membership policy by ensuring that no one can be excluded from membership in The United Methodist Church on the basis of gender or ability, in addition to existing protections.

3. Racial Justice

This amendment expands Article V to emphasize our church's explicit commitment to fighting racism, racial inequity, colonialism, white privilege, and white supremacy, shaping our ministries and advocacy.

4. Educational Requirements for Clergy

This amendment updates the eligibility requirements for clergy members to vote for delegates to General Conference, potentially affecting who within the clergy can participate in decisions at that level.

In conclusion, our Bishop, Sandy Olewine and her fellow bishopric council members have announced this fruitful step towards our mission as United Methodists: making disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. May God's grace continue to work within our church conference in the United States and across the world.





Glory Revealed

Happy New Year! We have arrived in the year 2026. I pray that the Lord has great plans for you this month and throughout the year. We join in the words of Psalm 147:1, Extol the LORD, O Jerusalem! Praise your God, O Zion! Our hope this month is to walk with God affirmingly while opening our hearts and minds to a fruitful year. As we have witnessed holiday season celebrations last year, we might be exhausted by the time of preparation and time with family due to travel or attending certain events throughout the last month.

This month, I invite you, as a sibling in Christ, to emphasize the importance of beginning the new year with the light of God in Jesus. When we enter a new year or period, we are unfamiliar with how it will turn out as we continue our journey together with the Lord. A source that can guide us throughout the new year is the light of Christ. January is not only the first month of the new year, but also a liturgical season of Epiphany. Epiphany occurs on January 6 of this year, which is the 13th day within the Christmas liturgical season.

Epiphany is the Christian celebration of the journey of the three Magi who visit Jesus, bringing their gifts of frankincense, gold, and myrrh. The Greek word for Epiphany is epiphania, meaning manifestation or bright appearance. As the Magi visit Jesus, they are witnessing a birth recognized in the heavens to the whole world that God the Incarnate will be the guiding light to bring us closer to the Divine prophesied in Isaiah 43:5 *Do not be afraid, for I am with you; I will bring your children from the east, and gather you from the west.*

Furthermore, our worship series for this month is to celebrate that Christ is God's glorified light revealed to the world.
