You may have noticed, or maybe not, there is a new, smaller, container out behind the Church. No, they do not re-produce by fission, the newbie belongs to the California-Nevada Conference of the United Methodist Church (CNUMC), more specifically the Disaster Response Ministry (DRM). It contains various supplies intended for assisting disaster victims clean up after an occurrence. Buckets, masks, sifting frames, hygiene kits, solar powered phone chargers, etc.

Previously it was stored at a location in Lassen County and was not accessible during winter months. They needed a better more accessible location, we have the space, and after establishing a Memorandum of Understanding, we got it. Yes, they fully understand that we do get bad weather conditions too, but our situation is way better than where it was.

So, for our part we are providing a location, keeping a key in case they need one, and we have painted it to match ours for neatness. (See photo on page 6.)

Our Church is not responsible for the contents, we are not doing inventory or issuing materials, and we are not responsible for purchasing, donating or adding to the supplies. Insurance is their responsibility. No cost to us and no rent charges for them. A good deal all around. Hopefully the contents will not be required very often, but the preparedness is a good ministry.

The 2025 Stewardship campaign was a rousing success. Using the theme of “Sowing the Seeds for the Harvest of God’s Church” members were encouraged to submit pictures of their favorite flowers with the estimate of giving card. All were amazed at how fast the estimates came in. Thank you all for your support.

More good news can be found in a review of those funds which are separate from the General Fund. A significant improvement can be seen in our Endowment Fund. This fund’s investments will eventually provide us with the stability we need to pay for all our grounds and building upkeep. Thanks to this year’s donations, we have nearly \$100K in the endowment fund, still a way to go to reach our goal of \$250K, but we are on our way.

The birthday bank was active again this past year. Cash is placed in the birthday bank each week during service to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, special events, etc. More than \$3500.00 was raised this year and subsequently given to organizations in Carson Valley designed to help children. Those organizations include: Douglas High School Hardship Fund, Carson Valley Youth Day, The Food Closet, Kids & Horses, Douglas County Library Children’s Programs, Kids’ Fishing Derby and the Arts Council.

Let me highlight two other programs that are used to help families in need in our Church and in our valley. These funds are also outside the General Fund and called Community Needs and Parish Outreach. These funds are sourced by donations from caring members and organizations in this Church including the UWF and from monthly Communion offerings. In 2025 nearly \$40,000 dollars were made available to help families in need from being evicted, utilities from being turned off, assistance with necessary auto repairs and a myriad of other necessities. This unique assistance gets little notice, so we are taking this moment to highlight the generosity and the love for one another that it represents.

Priorities for the 2026 budget execution and fund management will continue to focus on the Endowment Fund. As mentioned, it was strengthened significantly in 2025 and remains our long-term strategy for maintenance and upkeep of church property. Another priority for 2026 remains our general maintenance accounts. Significant improvements were made in 2025. The parking lot was repaved at the tune of \$22K. Outside and inside painting projects

were accomplished. Grounds maintenance was performed. All woodwork within the Church has been refurbished. As our building and grounds continue to age, we find ourselves needing to repair and replace failing equipment on a regular basis. This was extremely expensive in 2025 and will likely continue into 2026. The Trustees and this Finance Committee will keep our eyes on it.

So, in summary, 2025 was a blessed year for CVUMC finances. My thanks to the members of the finance committee for their service during this time. My appreciation to our pastor and our treasurer for their guidance. But most of all, thanks to our loving congregation for your faithful support of this Church.

Safe in the presence of the Lord

Psalm 32:7

One of the things that I look forward to in my week is spending time with my family after my hours in the office. I love having conversations with my wife on our daily endeavors and playing with my son as he tries to speak to me in his own toddler language. Spending time with family is one of the priorities that I am not willing to sacrifice because I know it is a stronghold that keeps me grounded as a father and husband. My family is my safe haven. I feel safe around my loved ones because I know they will provide, support, and comfort me in times of need or when I am at my most vulnerable.

I reflect on Psalm 32:7, which says You are a hiding place for me; you preserve me from trouble; you surround me with glad cries of deliverance. The psalm is authored by David, who recalls a time when the Lord's mercy was his hiding place. David faced many challenges in his life that tested his faithfulness to the Lord. What stood out in this psalm was the testimony of David that the Lord has forgiven his transgressions and restored him to prosperity. I would say David felt secure, safe, and confident in the new phases in his life, knowing how much God has shown him compassion and love.

In many Psalms, David runs to the Lord for shelter, calling the divine a refuge, a stronghold, or a shepherd. This also reminds us, as Christians, of the safe places that help us grow, thrive, and contribute the gifts and talents the Lord has blessed us with. I believe that in our nation, we are in the midst of hostility and fear, feeling that there is no safe place for immigrants or communities that are deemed to be excluded. Our call in the Lent season is to be a safe space for prayer, worship, and fellowship, free from the challenges of politics and propaganda.

I encourage all of you, brothers and sisters, to continue to lead with the mercy and compassion of Christ shown on the cross, and to remain a safe haven for all people who come to witness Christ in you.

Please Be Careful



Greetings in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ. I pray that the journey of Epiphany has held you faithfully as you continue your walk of faith as a light of Christ in the world. This month, we are finishing up our “Glory Revealed” worship series on February 15, 2026, as we transition into the liturgical season of Lent.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 18. Indeed, we will have an evening service on this very day at 6:00 p.m. in the chapel to begin our observance of the Lenten season, as we witness the last days of Jesus before he was unjustly captured, beaten, and crucified.

Moreover, during the Lenten season, we will have a six-week Bible study on the scriptures related to the events leading to Jesus’ crucifixion, while we are applying the theological lens of the gospels to our current context and social location. The Bible study will begin on February 18 at 10:00 am in the chapel and end on March 25, 2026. We will study the Bible and a chapter book titled “Why Did Jesus Have to Die?” By Adam Hamilton. The objective of the Bible study is to dive deeper in understanding the death of Christ and its impact on Christianity. I am praying for grace to gather us in this Bible study, inviting the Holy Spirit to deepen our understanding and to open our hearts and minds as we discuss the Word of God.

Lastly, the Lenten worship theme will be “Renewed in Mercy.” This worship series will entail climbing deeper and further into scripture to discover the loving essence of God’s provision in Jesus Christ. Lent is a time of introspection, but also a call to action as we seek to be the pilgrim people of God, seeking God’s kingdom and shaping God’s kin-dom in worship and in service. I invite you to experience the renewal that comes from God’s never-ending mercy and then to walk with our Lord on a journey to new life.

Everyone is welcome! All levels of skill and talent! Craft supplies are provided so just bring yourself and any ideas you might have for new crafts.




