God made plants full of flavor, like basil and thyme, and trees that grow citrus, like grapefruit and lime. We drove to New Boston, the town where the test was administered, and Ellie drove the test route. She did OK, but I had my doubts. Then we headed back home, ten miles away on—you guessed it—a two-lane road with no shoulder. That day I learned something funny about my friend, Ellie. As she grew tired, she drove slower...and slower...and slower. In ten miles, we easily had a mile-long line of cars behind us. That's not the funny part though. No, it was not the fun I had when I was a kid. In fact, I was getting worried because drivers these days tend to get angry.

The thing about Ellie's driver training that makes me smile, even today, is the memory of what happened just before we reached our destination, where the road was finally graced with a shoulder. A red-faced man driving a pickup truck had been boiling on our bumper and was about to explode. He pulled onto that gravel shoulder as if he were driving a sprint car on a Saturday night flat track. He blew by my passenger window—exhaust roaring, gravel flying, and a middle finger righteously presented to us as far as he could stretch out his arm. “Well,” Ellie said indignantly in a voice that had become a bit shaky by now, “I wonder what got into him!”

Good times.... Friends are the people we experience life with—for better or worse. For the most part, we remember those better times and let the worse times go. I've been thinking about the spiritual significance of friendship. How is it that those people came into our lives, and for what purpose—if any? Would I be the person I am today without their influence?

We all need friends. Henri Nowen, a monk in the mid-late 20th century, wrote about friends and how rare and precious they are to him. He made the point that a priest necessarily needed to be guarded about his life, therefore friends are few. I thought of my own life, and then I thought of all of us. Henri is not so unusual—we all hide our true selves. In prayer, I began to ponder the necessity of being unrevealing. I thought, “Who would ever want to be my friend if they really knew me—my angry outbursts, my tendency to addictions, my vanity and insecurity, my need for approval.... I was still listing my “friendship baggage” when very clearly the words “*I do*,” spoke softly into my mind. Peace filled me.... Indeed, Christ wants to be our friend—baggage and all.

Pause for a moment. Appreciate and celebrate our friendships—they are precious, and they are making us who we are, and even changing us to who we will be. The greatest and most life-changing of these friendships is our relationship with Jesus. If we are intentional about this relationship, we will less and less feel the need to hide who we really are. We will find that our true self is changing. Nurture this friendship with Christ and we will know a friend that will never leave us, nor forsake us.

What a Friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear!

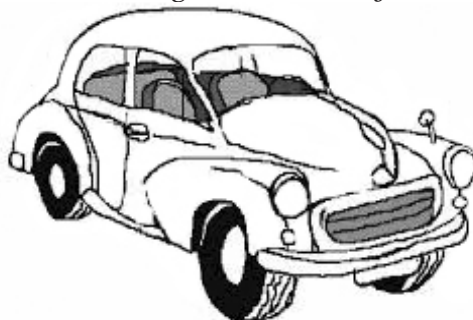
What a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer!
