2023 Year-End Finance Committee Summary

This is your once-a-year summary of the work the Finance Committee has been doing and our one chance to thank you all for your support. Your generous and regular giving to your Church made it possible to pay all our bills for the year including staff salaries, utilities, insurance expenses, office expenses, cleaning services, building maintenance and our pledged tithe to the greater Church, etc. We finished 2023 in the black and were able to add that to our Church equity. So, my Church family (I just love it when Latu says that) we are on solid ground financially and looking forward to 2024.

The 2024 Stewardship campaign was a rousing success. Using the theme of "Keeping God's Church in the Green" church members were encouraged to submit pictures of their favorite trees with the estimate of giving card. All were amazed at how fast the estimates came in. Thank you all for your support.

More good news can be found in a review of those funds which are separate from the General Fund. The most significant improvement can be seen in our Endowment Fund. This fund's investments will eventually provide us with the stability we need to pay for all our grounds and building upkeep once it reaches our goal of \$250K. This year alone we received donations that added more than \$35K to this account. Special thanks goes out to these generous donors.

The birthday bank was active again this past year. Cash is placed in the birthday bank each week during service to celebrate birthdays, anniversaries, special events etc. Over \$4000.00 was raised this year and subsequently given to organizations in Carson Valley designed to help children. Those organizations include: Backpack Buddies, 4H Equestrian Club, Carson Valley Boys & Girls Club, Aurora Pines, the Girl Scouts, Carson Valley Youth Day and the Douglas County Public Library Children's Programs.

It is our intention to hold Sunday morning Services even if it is snowy. If the weather conditions are truly bad, we may cancel Sunday Services. If this were to happen, we would send an email to you by 7:30 am on that day. In all situations, you are the best judge of what is safe for you to do or not to do.

When we do have Snowy Sundays, our focus is to get the sidewalks cleared and the Parking Lot plowed. We have a number of volunteers that operate the Snow Blower and shovels. This is why if you call or text, we may not be available to respond right away. We have a contract for Snow Removal on Sundays, but only if the snow is deep enough for the plows to move it.

We hope that this information helps you in making the right decision for yourself on a Snowy Sunday.

Let me highlight three other programs that are used to help families in need in our Church and in our valley. These funds are also outside our General Fund. These three funds called Community Needs, Parish Outreach and Parish Benevolence are sourced by donations from caring members and organizations in this Church including the UWIF and from monthly Communion offerings. In 2023 nearly \$21,000 dollars were made available to help families in need from being evicted, utilities from being turned off, assistance with necessary auto repairs and a myriad of other necessities. This unique assistance gets little notice, so we are taking this moment to highlight the generosity and the love for one another that it represents.

Priorities for the 2024 budget execution and fund management will continue to focus on the Endowment Fund. As mentioned, it was strengthened significantly in 2023 and remains our long-term strategy for maintenance and upkeep of church property. Another priority for 2024 remains our deferred maintenance accounts. As our building and grounds continue to age, we find ourselves needing to repair and replace failing equipment on a regular basis. This was extremely expensive in 2023 and will most likely continue into 2024.

So, in summary, 2023 was a blessed year for CVUMC finances. I extend my thanks to the members of the finance committee for their service during this time, and my appreciation to our new pastor and our treasurer for their guidance. But most of all, thanks to our loving congregation for your faithful support of this Church.

It presents parts of American history that I was not aware of and also reminded me of more recent events.


I doubt anyone could read this book and not be uncomfortable at some point. If you read this, feel free to contact me to talk about it – it's the kind of book that elicits discussion.

Dear Church Family,

I pray all is well with you and your families during this Lent season in which we are realigning our relationship as a church with God. We will continue with this month's theme of "Depths of Love," in which we are in the front seat of mending our spiritual connection: physically and mentally for self-examination, self-reflection, and self-sustainment. Even though we work together as a church to dispense the Word of God in our ministries, the observation of Lent brings a fulfilling experience for God's people to interpret their life amid Jesus' life to the cross and onto the resurrection.

If there is something important during the liturgical Lent season, it is to propose a question for personal evaluation: *how is my relationship with Christ today?* Church family, ask yourself during this Lent season of personal prayer, devotion, and fellowship, where is your relationship with Jesus Christ in your current life? Lent reminds us even though we have fallen short or have not committed ourselves to God, we are still finding ourselves in His presence. As the author Timothy Keller says: "The central basis of Christian assurance is not how much our hearts are set on God, but how unshakably his heart is set on us." As you continue with your devotion and prayer life during this time of spiritual realignment, remind yourself as a follower of Christ that God is good all the time. Observe the blessings you have received, witness the manifestation of the Holy Spirit as it works within you in your daily life, read your scriptures for spiritual growth, and live with holiness in a world that encapsulates wickedness.

Furthermore, this world needs assurance because of our natural individualism and selfishness. As salt and light, the assurance of God is planted in our church community as the body of Christ. Our Lenten season is a time of spiritual deconstruction for a Christful reconstruction. Let our journey with Christ during the liturgical season experience the depth of love that Jesus Christ did for all on the cross and His resurrection. Let us be the hope for the hopeless, love for the unloving world, and strength for the weak.

This world needs the body of Christ to love God and to love one's neighbor. In a time of hostility, fear, and unpredictability, one thing that is assured is God's presence, for He is a faithful God today, tomorrow, and in the future.




Craft Workshops Begin!
