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Carson Valley United Methodist Church Endowment Fund

Our Missing Hearts by Celeste Ng is reviewed by Ann Robar.


This is a very timely fiction book about a 12 year old boy called Bird who is living a quiet existence with his loving but broken father, Ethan. His father has taught him to not ask too many questions, stand out too much, or stray too far from home. For a decade, their lives have been governed by laws written to preserve "American culture" in the wake of years of economic instability and violence. To keep the peace and restore prosperity, the authorities are now allowed to relocate children of dissidents, especially those of Asian origin, and libraries have been forced to remove books seen as unpatriotic—including the work of Bird's mother, Margaret, a Chinese American poet who left the family when he was nine years old.

Bird has grown up disavowing his mother and her poems; he doesn't know her work or what happened to her, and he knows he shouldn't wonder. But when he receives a mysterious letter containing only a drawing, he is pulled into a quest to find her. His journey will take him back to the many folktales she poured into his head as a child, through the ranks of an underground network of librarians, into the lives of the children who have been taken, and finally to New York City, where a new act of defiance may be the beginning of much-needed change.

This is a quick read and a very timely tale of the dangers of xenophobia and fear and its impact on people, families, and government. It is a heart wrenching story of a mother and son.

Happy New Year everyone! I am very excited to present this month's worship series in two parts titled: Re-membering the Body and Embracing the Familiar. Our two-part worship series is focused on putting our congregation back together in reflection on the scriptures in our lectionary for this month.

When we are focusing on "Re-membering the Body" we are reorienting, reorganizing, and putting our church community together in worship and praise for the new year. The first two weeks will also encounter the importance of gathering as a church to seek Jesus at the beginning of the year, alongside remembering the importance of baptism as our sacrament in connection with Jesus Christ. When we regather as the body of Christ, we are reminded that we see the light of God within one another, and we are also the light to the communities we live in throughout the world.

During the last two weeks of January, we will shift gears to a worship series titled Embracing the Familiar. This Ordinary Time, I invite you to look at where you are as individuals and as a community. We want to do that in two parts. We begin with what is familiar, what we see every day, and what we do week by week— the familiar, and maybe the over-familiar. We need to look at what we've seen so much that we don't see it anymore. But we need to look; we need to see because this is where we are.

As your pastor, I am honored to lead you with our wonderful staff during this new year and month full of grace and compassion. May the spirit of God be your guiding light as we regather our thoughts for this new church year to follow Christ, thrive in Community, and heal the World.


