Other plants brought for our enjoyment were PJM Rhody, large & small Muscari (Grape Hyacinth), Fritillaria (checkered lily), Daphne Odora, Corydalis, & a red Camelia. She also reminded us of the Design Program "Awash In Memories" at the Cove on April 18th. Tickets available (\$30 donation) from LonaC1929@outlook.com.
- Bryn Tavisky, National Recycle Chairman, gave a very enlightening & entertaining program on 2nd uses for garbage trash. Some of the clever items she used were inverted vases, ceiling light fixtures, paper shipping tubes, salad bowls, a microwave tray, International Coffee cans, styrofoam balls painted & floating as a water feature, a plastic colander, a bunsen burner tray...the list goes on. She brought some beautiful masks, purses, straw flowers & gift bags made out of paper mache. Also some beautiful mosaic balls, a wire blackbird & a bird bath. Some of her favorite tools are E-6000 glue, miracle sealer, Folk Art acrylic paint, & dry grout in different colors. Her recipe for paper mache is to find the cheapest non-coated paper you can (newspaper & voters pamphlets work best), rip into small pieces, & soak in water.

THANK YOU SPECIALTY SOILS!!!

How this donation came about...

I (Nancy Wittman) contacted Specialty Soils in February of 2023 because the soil on our property was crap, but didn't know how of fix it in my life-time. Angelo came to our house to consult and scoop a soil sample. The soil test showed our soil was high in some minerals and quite deficient in other minerals. Organic mater was severely lacking and our super rocky soil was over 75% sand. Angelo custom mixed a mulch to address our missing minerals, organic matter (well composted manure), and I requested he add a weed seed inhibitor. The mulch created (what I call) a garden miracle - by fall 2023 we had worms - and weeds weren't a problem!

March 2024 we bought more of the same Specialty Soils mulch for our garden, because I certainly want to continue to improve our soil and manage weeds. While at our home, Angelo offered to donate bags of potting soil to our garden club to benefit our plant sale. We've arranged with Angelo to pick up the bags as needed and deliver to a location specified by Twyla.

Feel free to contact me if you have any questions about the donated bags of soil. If / when you or someone you know needs garden soil, amendments or mulch, etc... please buy from Angelo and tell him thank you from the Enumciaw Garden Club.


This easy salad relies on flavorful, budgetfriendly staples and is a breeze to toss together for hassle-free lunches

Edamame, Chickpea & Corn Salad

- 1½ cups frozen shelled edamame
- 11/4 cups fresh or frozen corn, cooked
- 1 (15.5-oz) can chickpeas, drained and rinsed
- 2 Tbsp minced red onion
- 3 Tbsp olive oil
- 3 Tbsp lime juice
- 34 tsp cumin
- ½ tsp salt
- 1/8 tsp pepper
- 3 Tbsp chopped cilantro
- 1. Cook edamame according to package directions. Rinse under cool water and drain well.
- 2. In a large bowl combine edamame, corn, chickpeas and
- 3. In another bowl whisk together oil, lime juice, cumin, salt and pepper. Pour over salad. Add cilantro and toss. Serves 6

Val Skagg's Quiche Lorraine

Pastry for 1 piecrust

1 T. butter, softened

12 bacon slices

4 eggs

2 C. heavy cream or whipping cream

(I use half and half)

3/4 t. salt

1/8 t. ground nutmeg (I like more)

1/4 pound natural Swiss cheese shredded

(1 cup) - I like Gruyere or Jarlsberg.

Prepare and roll out pastry. Line one 9-inch pie plate. Spread crust evenly with butter. Chill well.

In 10-inch skillet over medium heat, fry bacon slices until crisp and brown.

Drain bacon on paper towels and crumble. Preheat oven to 425 F. Spread crumbled bacon pieces in prepared piecrust.

With wire whisk, beat eggs, cream, salt and nutmeg. Stir in cheese. Pour egg mixture into crust. Bake 15 minutes; turn oven down to 325 F; bake 35 minutes more.

Quiche is cooked when knife inserted in center comes out clean. Let stand 10 minutes before serving.

Margaret Storbo's Corn Bread Pudding Serves 12

½ C melted butter

1 can cream style corn

1 can whole kernel corn, drained

1 T sugar

2-8 ½ oz boxed Jiffy Corn Muffin Mix

1 C sour cream

Preheat oven to 350

Mix together melte butter, drained kernel corn & creamed corn Add both boxes of muffin mix & stir together

Add sugar & sour cream & mix well.

Pour into greased 9x9 casserole dish & bake 50-55 minutes until top is golden brown & knife comes out clean.

Can also be made in a cast iron skillet.
