#### What went on at the January meeting...

- VP, Debbie B'Hymer opened the meeting with these words: "Your life is your garden, Your thoughts are the seeds. If your life isn't awesome, You've been watering the weeds".
- After reciting the Pledge of Allegiance, newest member Gabriella Dodrill was welcomed.
- Thank you cards were received from The Lake Wilderness Arboretum Foundation & The American Horticulture Society.
  - Our scholarship winner, Raegan Chevalier, also sent a card letting us know she will be attending the University of Montana.
- All 200 tickets for the Breakfast 4 the Birds have been sold! Lanette has a waiting list going. If at the last minute you can't attend, please give her a call. Additional information about Breakfast for the birds can be found on pg. 7.
- Raffle winners were Kathy Wetton, Maribeth Vassallo & Ella Eaton.
- At the Horticulture Table Sarococca, or Sweet Boxwood was on display. It is very fragrant & is blooming now. Plant by a spot that you pass frequently so you can brush up against it. There were also some snowdrops. Tory's hint is not to plant in clumps. Take apart, plant & they will soon become a clump. A beautiful bouquet was featured with evergreens of English Laurel, Euyonomous, Mini-Variegated Pierus Japonica & Cedar. Tory invited us to drive by & see her parking strip display. Over the years she has planted hundreds of bulbs that are starting to put on their show.
- Nancy Wittman handed out the club t-shirts & sweatshirts we pre-ordered. It was fun to see all the different colors. She may be making another order if there is interest.

Tory wore two hats today...she also gave a great program on mulch. She provided a very informative handout titled "So Mulch to talk about, and so Mulch more". Here are a few of the highlights:

- Mulch is more than decorative! It keeps the soil cool in the summer & warm in the
  winter. It keeps weeds down & retains moisture. It prevents crusting of soil surface, soil
  compaction & keeps the soil from splashing/erosion & helps with disease spread.
  Mulched plants have more roots & adds beauty to your landscape.
- Fall & Spring are the two times that mulch should be applied. Don't mulch during a freeze. 2-3" is best. More than that can suffocate the plant & should never be used against the bark of your woody plants, such as bushes & trees, as it can cause disease.
- Kinds of good mulch are: Straw/hay for vegetable gardens. Wood chips are not bark & take about 2 years to break down. Leaves need to be chipped/chopped/or shredded & mixed varieties work best. It is very important to use aged manure. Pine needles work well in shrub & tree beds. Lawn clippings (no chemicals) are best a little aged, dried or mixed. Cover crops such as Austrian Pea, Crimson Clover & a Daikon Radish Villana mix can be turned & will enrich your soil as it breaks down. Cardboard will block weeds & is best used under path ways that you will be covering with rock, gravel or heavy bark. Several layers of newspapers under a layer of mulch breaks down better than cardboard. You can try several kinds of mulches together, as the different sizes adds to the soil.
- Non enriching mulch are pea gravel & rocks. Good for pathways, but you must remember they hold the heat & can really heat up the roots of plants.
- Bad mulch is chipped tires, plastic fiber cloth, chemically treated or dark bark. Raw manure burns plants & robs soil of nitrogen. Black walnut leaves are toxic.
- Tea & coffee grounds are amendments, not mulch.
- If it smells bad don't use it!





A couple of tips from Marianne Binetti: "Snowdrops can be dug & split apart as soon as the first year after planting. Just divide the clumps every year & soon you will have hundreds. Columbine will reseed easily & you can move the seedlings to wherever you want a cluster of color. Then there is the hardy Cyclamen that you don't have to move because the ants plant the seeds for you all over your garden. So buy these 3 plants & you'll soon have hundreds!" It's time to prune roses in Western Washington & also clematis that blooms in summer. Cut your David Austin roses down by 1/3 & others down to 2' tall. Some roses I just let stay tall so they can bloom above the plants in front. I call this going natural or just being lazy & watching what happens when you let thing go a bit wild."
