Timely Gardening Tips

- · Harvest and stake Dahlias for more blooms.
- Fertilize your lawn or plan a meadow.
- Buy and plant spring bulbs.
 - 1. Crocuses: 2-3 inches deep
 - 2. Tulips and daffodils: 6-8 inches deep
 - 3. Irises: 3-4 inches deep
 - 4. Why not seek out a new spring bulb?
- Add mulch and / or top dressing while planting and weeding so the rains can soak into your garden.

½ c rice vinegar


2 T sesame oil
