HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE EGC GENERAL MEETING ON APRIL 28th 16 members joined on ZOOM

• Karen welcomed everyone & after the pledge of allegiance she opened the meeting with these inspirational words from Laura Ingalls Wilder : "It is the simple things of life that make living worthwhile: The sweet fundamental things such as love & duty, work & rest, & living close to nature." I think we can all agree she was describing a gardener! We were very excited to talk about our May 26th General meeting at the VFW Hall! We will be following the safety guidelines so that will mean bringing your own lunch & bev-erage & we will not use the name tags until September. We will have the raffle table. Tory gave us a video walk through her yard. We saw a green viburnum, persian lily • spring trillium, an alpine & montana clematis, tulips & more tulips. One of the tulips she remembers planting in the fall of 1999 for her daughter's graduation party. Of course it is maroon & gold for the Enumclaw Hornets! Her advise for us is to Mulch! Mulch! Mulch! Great super-doo mulch can be found at Hygrass farm on 384th, Scarecrow Pride from Kranic Farm is sold @ GE&B Nursery on 400th, & Power Poo is free at the Power Plant on 208th off the Auburn/Enumclaw Hwy. This one is super hot so be careful! Amending your soil is great for healthy plants & soil. Patrick Spence owner of Cascadia Iris Gardens in Lake Stevens gave an informative talk along a slideshow of the many beautiful iris in the PNW. He walked us through the many choices available in order to achieve year around bloom. The season really gets underway in April Some are even rebloomers & give you an encore performance for up to 3 months starting in July. There Bearded, Beardless, Japanese & Siberian. dwarf, short, medium, & tall iris. Iris that attract hummingbirds, that are very fragrant & some not so fragrant but still eye-catchers. Some have variegated foliage perfect for winter gardens (along with seed pods that add interest in the winter garden) & some are perfect for rock gardens. Cut iris will last indoors about 2 weeks & cutting them encourages them to rebloom. One thing to keep in mind is buy local in order to guarantee the right growing conditions for your area. Bearded iris need to be planted with the rhizome above soil level while the Beardless need to be planted 2-3" below the soil level. If you plant the Japanese Iris too deep, don't worry, it will self-level. No chemical fertilizer added at the time of planting but do fertilize in the spring. No amendment is needed with compost. If you have powdery foliage cut it down & it will grow back beautifully. Same with top-heavy foliage that is floppy. As for cleaning up your garden & cutting off the old foliage "the best time is when you have time." Ifyou no-tice thatching ants on your plants not to worry because they eat aphids & slugs. Just don't step on their nest & they won't bother you. Unfortunately there isn't enough space to de-scribe all of them so go on their FaceBook page for pictures or email him at Cascadia Gar-dens.com with questions & orders. On-line classes are available & Open Garden times are 10am-4pm each week-end May-June & the 1st & 2nd week-ends in July (most iris' in bloom!). Private & Group Tours by appointment. Patrick told us that the pandemic has turned non-gardeners into gardeners & we all know you can't have too many gardeners!

Bloedel Reserve – One of North America's 10 Best Botanical Gardens *"Nature can do without man, but man cannot do without nature"*, Prentice Bloedel

In need of peace and serenity and to be surrounded by nature, then visit Bloedel Reserve on Bainbridge Island. Walking the grounds of the Reserve is truly therapeutic and restorative.

History - A Gift to All (from the website)

In 1951, Virginia and Prentice Bloedel purchased the property that would become Bloedel Reserve. It was their private residence for more than 30 years, many devoted to exploring the relationship between people and nature.

Yale-educated, Mr. Bloedel began a teaching career but soon became the reluctant heir to his father's timber business. An environmentalist at heart, he innovated several of today's conservation concepts such as "reuse." He advocated reusing hog fuel, a log byproduct, to help generate sawmill power and worked with pulp mills to reduce waste. His most enduring "green" idea was to plant seedlings to reforest clear-cut land.

Sculpting the landscape became the focus of Mr. Bloedel's retirement. Almost daily, he could be found walking the grounds, thinking of how to shape his masterpiece. With the help of noted landscape architects and designers, including Thomas Church, Richard Haag, Fujitaro Kubota, and Iain Robertson, he "wove" several unique landscape experiences throughout the native Pacific Northwest forest. Mr. Bloedel's commitment to ecological principles prevailed; for example, he placed water features only proximal to natural groundwater.

Later in life, the Bloedels gave the Reserve to the community and established a nonprofit to support its operations. In 1988, the Reserve opened to the public as a 150-acre public garden and forest preserve.

Some believe Mr. Bloedel's love of nature was ingrained from his time as a student and teacher at California's Thacher School, which had an ambitious outdoor component in its curriculum. Others speculate that walking the land and creating the gardens helped Mr. Bloedel deal with the side effects of polio, which he contracted as a young adult.

Mr. Bloedel was deeply interested in the relationship between people and the natural world, and the power of landscape to evoke emotions — from tranquility to exhilaration. He was ahead of his time in understanding the therapeutic power of nature and funded early research into the psychological effect of time spent outdoors.

Visiting

Bloedel Reserve is an experiential public garden and forest reserve – a mixed tapestry of woodlands, meadows, and landscaped gardens. The Reserve has 150 acres and 23 distinct landscapes, a loop of wellmaintained bark and gravel trails winds through the Reserve. Plan to spend at least 2 hours to walk the entire loop.

Hours – Tuesday – Sunday, 10am to 5pm, Timed Tickets must be booked in advance <u>https://bloedelreserve.org/tickets/</u>, no picnicking is allowed, service dogs only, most of Bloedel Reserve is wheel-chair/stroller accessible; discover more at <u>https://bloedelreserve.org/</u>

MORE IDEAS FOR YOUR SUMMER FUN!

BE SAFE! Know your trail & take the 10 essentials: navigation, light, food, severe weather protection, sun protection, tools, firestarters, communication, first aid kit, shelter.

• I want to share my favorite outing: O'Grady County Park trail. It is a good workout and lovely, especially if walkers resist ceaseless chatter and look at the trees and listen to the birds. It is downhill on a gravel road and then trails cut off for more interesting nature. The trees are so tall growing from far below. The bottom is an old farm meadow with a bench to rest and eat a snack. The river has changed course so no longer visible from the meadow. There is a long trail winding through the woods that does reach the river but I am too old to go that far now. The walk back up can be a puffer but just take it slowly. It is near Wabash Church. Head north on 244th Ave SE & turn left at SE 400th St. Turn right onto 212th Ave SE & follow road when it bends to the left & becomes 384th Travel to 188th Ave SE & n turn right. The road deadends in less than a mile at your destination.....Louise Poppleton
