Debora arranged for Alison Johnson, Master Gardener & member of the National Perennial Alliance (NPA), to speak on "Gardening with an English Accent". She gave a slide presentation showing us a 900 year old Infirmary Garden at Westminster Abbey, the Sissinghurst White Garden, & several English Gardens. She talked about creating whole borders with pots, designing with pathways & steps, framing views with gates & hedges, & using statuary & garden art in our gardens. There is a new way of gardening: Mingling different species, Massing the same species & varieties, & Muddling which is planting graduating sizes & avoiding large stripes of plants. Her gardening tip was the "Chelsea Chop" which is cutting your sedum in half the last week in May to keep it from flopping. You can also do this to your aster & phlox. We are the same gardening zone as England so should have success with many of the same plantings. She generously passed out list of her Essential 'English' Perennials. Garden Chores NOVEMBER Don't fear the fall cleanup. A spirited sweep of your garden clears the way for creepy collaborators to feed in your soil. Begin by removing any diseased plants. Applying amendments that are slow to break down in Autumn allows time for natural processes to work. Fallen leaves are a valuable source of no-cost garden riches. Leave leaves lie where they drop, or gather up to spread around garden shrubs & perennials, where they will slowly break down over winter (Rhodys are the exception). Even when things are looking the most bleak & barren, the garden is host to a teeming population of insects & soil microbes—literally, a web of life that sustains growth. Herbaceous plants & fading annuals also provide plenty of natural materials that can be cut back & left in place to cycle nutrients back into the soil. Be sure to leave a few plants & seed heads standing to feed overwintering birds & provide habitat for beneficial insects & soil microbes. Try concentrating your tidying efforts along frequently used pathways & leave everything else a little looser.

Now sit back & relax with those catalogs & beverage I mentioned last month!



THE SMOKEY BEAR & WOODSY OWL POSTER CONTEST! DEADLINE for our chapter is December 15th

ANNOUNCING the 2022 Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl Poster Contest! Children from first through fifth grade are invited to participate in the 2022 National Garden Clubs, Inc. Poster Contest! The

U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service and the National Garden Clubs, Inc. are giving students the opportunity to demonstrate their understanding of wildfire prevention through original drawings of Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl.

SMOKEY BEAR SAYS: ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT WILDFIRES! Smokey Bear is recognized nationally and internationally as the symbol for wildfire prevention. The original Smokey Bear appeared in 1944. Smokey's message, "Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!" encourages personal responsibility for wildfire prevention. Smokey Bear teaches children and adults to be careful with campfires, barbecues, trash fires, and matches.

WOODSY OWL SAYS: LEND A HAND—CARE FOR THE LAND! Woodsy Owl is America's icon for the conservation of the environment. Since 1971, Woodsy has helped parents and teachers inspire children to observe, explore, and care for the environment. He challenges children to "Lend a Hand, Care for the Land!" and to take an active role in caring for the land through recycling, reusing, and reducing waste, planting and caring for trees, using resources wisely, and not littering.

PRIZES • The National Grand Prize Winner of the Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl Poster Contest will be honored with a Recognition Ceremony in Washington, D.C. A round-trip and accommodations for four will be provided for a 4 days/3nights stay. • The National Garden Clubs, Inc. will award a \$50.00 check to each of the first-place national winners.

POSTER RULES

- 1. All poster entrees must be sponsored by a local Garden Club.
- 2. Posters must feature Smokey Bear or Woodsy Owl and must not feature both together.
- 3. Smokey Bear posters must include Smokey's wildfire prevention message: Only you Can Prevent Wildfires
- 4. Woodsy Owl posters must include Woodsy's conservation message: Lend a Hand, Care for the Land!
- 5. Posters should encourage children to take a personal role in preventing wildfires or conserving natural resources.
- 6. Each entry should be 11 x 17 inches in size.
- 7. Materials that can be used include: crayons, markers, poster paints, water colors, etc.
- 8. The choice of paper color and texture is up to the child.
- 9. No three-dimensional posters, computer scanned, or electronically generated images will be accepted.
- 10. The following information should be written on the form available from the club Poster Chairman & affixed in the lower-right corner: A. The artist's name, address, home phone number, grade level, school, teacher's name, city, and state. B. Should school policy preclude giving students' address and phone number, please include the school address and phone number. C. Each poster must also show the name of the sponsoring local Garden Club as well as an address, phone number, and email for the local Garden Club. (Do not use a dark marker for this information as it may show through.)
- 11. Posters are to be completed by individual student artists. Competition may include students from first to fifth grade.
- 12. Since Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl are official icons protected by law, the colors of their clothing need to be accurate. Check the colors on the Web site www.fs.usda.gov/learn/kids.
- 13. Students should be reminded to check spelling. Posters with spelling efforts will be disqualified. Any group of children can participate. Scout troops, after school programs, and the like are perfectly appropriate. The child's grade must be included on the poster so that the participant can compete in the correct grade category.
- 14. Winning posters should be copied as they will not be returned.
- 15. Past winners are permitted and encouraged to participate again, but not national winners.
- 16. Posters may include artwork pasted upon a second piece of paper. However, they must be flat. 3D posters are not allowed.
