#### Garden To Do Calendar..... OCTOBER HARVEST & PREP TIME

Gather the last tomatoes, as well as greens, broccoli, beets, carrots, radishes & late peas & beans. Use a clean, sharp knife or loppers to harvest pumpkins, gourds, & winter squash. Regularly remove garden waste to prevent disease, & start adding amendment to improve your soil for next spring. Plant trees, shrubs & ground cover as long as you can still work the soil. Plant crocus, daffodils & tulips late in the month. Re-seed the lawn. Prepare for colder months by getting frost blankets for more vulnerable plants & winterizing your irrigation system. Add mulch over the roots of roses, azaleas, rhododendrons & berries to fortify them against the cold. Lay down newspaper or mulch-covered cardboard to prevent winter & spring weeds. Another good mulch for your dahlia stems is fern/fronds. Cut back late-flowering perennials to a few inches. Peonies can be cut back all the way to the ground. Check out the nurseries...now is the time to plant for spring & summer +great sales. Then...

sit back with your favorite beverage, a garden catalog or three & enjoy!

## THE SMOKEY BEAR & WOODSY OWL POSTER CONTEST! DEADLINE for our chapter is December 15th

ANNOUNCING the 2022 Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl Poster Contest! Children from first through fifth grade are invited to participate in the 2022 National Garden Clubs, Inc. Poster Contest! The U.S. Department of Agriculture Forest Service and the National Garden Clubs, Inc. are giving students the opportunity to demonstrate their understanding of wildfire prevention through original drawings of Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl.

SMOKEY BEAR SAYS: ONLY YOU CAN PREVENT WILDFIRES! Smokey Bear is recognized nationally and internationally as the symbol for wildfire prevention. The original Smokey Bear appeared in 1944. Smokey's message, "Only You Can Prevent Wildfires!" encourages personal responsibility for wildfire prevention. Smokey Bear teaches children and adults to be careful with campfires, barbecues, trash fires, and matches.

WOODSY OWL SAYS: LEND A HAND—CARE FOR THE LAND! Woodsy Owl is America's icon for the conservation of the environment. Since 1971, Woodsy has helped parents and teachers inspire children to observe, explore, and care for the environment. He challenges children to "Lend a Hand, Care for the Land!" and to take an active role in caring for the land through recycling, reusing, and reducing waste, planting and caring for trees, using resources wisely, and not littering.

PRIZES • The National Grand Prize Winner of the Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl Poster Contest will be honored with a Recognition Ceremony in Washington, D.C. A round-trip and accommodations for four will be provided for a 4 days/3nights stay. • The National Garden Clubs, Inc. will award a \$50.00 check to each of the first-place national winners.

#### **POSTER RULES**

- 1. All poster entrees must be sponsored by a local Garden Club.
- 2. Posters must feature Smokey Bear or Woodsy Owl and must not feature both together.
- 3. Smokey Bear posters must include Smokey's wildfire prevention message: Only you Can Prevent Wildfires
- 4. Woodsy Owl posters must include Woodsy's conservation message: Lend a Hand, Care for the Land!
- 5. Posters should encourage children to take a personal role in preventing wildfires or conserving natural resources.
- 6. Each entry should be 11 x 17 inches in size.
- 7. Materials that can be used include: crayons, markers, poster paints, water colors, etc.
- 8. The choice of paper color and texture is up to the child.
- 9. No three-dimensional posters, computer scanned, or electronically generated images will be accepted.
- 10. The following information should be written on the form available from the club Poster Chairman & affixed in the lower-right corner: a. The artist's name, address, home phone number, grade level, school, teacher's name, city, and state. b. Should school policy preclude giving students' address and phone number, please include the school address and phone number. c. Each poster must also show the name of the sponsoring local Garden Club as well as an address, phone number, and email for the local Garden Club. (Do not use a dark marker for this information as it may show through.)
- 11. Posters are to be completed by individual student artists. Competition may include students from first to fifth grade.
- 12. Since Smokey Bear and Woodsy Owl are official icons protected by law, the colors of their clothing need to be accurate. Check the colors on the Web site <a href="www.fs.usda.gov/learn/kids.">www.fs.usda.gov/learn/kids.</a>
- 13. Students should be reminded to check spelling. Posters with spelling efforts will be disqualified. "Lend a Hand Care for the Land" Smokey Bear & Woodsy Owl Poster Rules
- 14. Any group of children can participate. Scout troops, after school programs, and the like are perfectly appropriate. The child's grade must be included on the poster so that the participant can compete in the correct grade category.
- 15. Winning posters should be copied as they will not be returned.
- 16. Past winners are permitted and encouraged to participate again, but not national winners.
- 17. Posters may include artwork pasted upon a second piece of paper. However, they must be flat. 3D posters are not allowed.
