- 1. **B** Semicolon is the cleanest fix; A and C are okay but less precise (D is a trap).
- 2. A Closest subject = memes (plural) → "make."
- 3. A Remove "but." Extra subordinating conjunction makes it wrong.
- 4. **A** Fix both noun–verb agreements.
- 5. **C** Semicolon correctly joins two independent clauses; A & B work but create weaker coordination.
- 6. \mathbf{C} "Each" = singular \rightarrow "has" + "his or her."
- 7. **A** Smooth correction; others are fragments or wordy.
- 8. **C** Semicolon is the most precise fix; others are weaker coordination.
- 9. **A** "Students were" + "alarms went off." Correct tense & agreement.
- 10. **B** Semicolon separates clauses cleanly; A & C verge on wordiness; D = run-on.
