

MHS Monuments that need Attention by Marcy Taylor

During the last year the MHS board has identified several projects that need immediate attention, and others that need on-going attention. Those of you that went on the monuments tour or bought the booklet already know that some sites are in need of repair:

1. Historic Names of the Mojave River - newly discovered monument on 11th just south of D. Needs repair as only the title and a few other words here and there are legible. It is an Eagle Scout project from the 1990's. Board discussion of repairing and moving monument to a more accessible location.
2. Bridges of the Mojave River - 11th Street- Plaque is done and needs to be installed. Board discussion of moving monument to a more accessible location.
3. John Brown monument on 11th - Has been repaired. Discussion of moving to a more accessible location.
4. Lane's Crossing - Granite plaque is in the works. Two Turner Rd. property owners contributed to cost.
5. MHS Time Capsule located on old Palisades Ranch- Property is now under the jurisdiction of the Mojave Desert Land Trust. Monument on Rt. 66 (National Trails Hwy) north of Bryman Rd. pointing the way to the time capsule is missing. Board members are looking into this matter.
6. The Desert Tortoise plaque at the Victor Valley Museum is in tact. However, the tortoise sculpture needs repair.
7. When repairs are complete, many of the monuments will be professionally sealed to prevent further damage.
8. Monthly maintenance (weeds, trash, check for damage) needs to be coordinated on all monuments sites that bear the MHS name. (Hesperia Lakes, Victor Valley Museum, and Hesperia Rec and Park District thankfully take care of 5 of them.)



Is there a member that lives near Sterling Inn on Ridgecrest that could periodically check on that site? Repairs have been made. Call Marcy (760-985-1918) if you can help. Thank you.

Camp Cajon Table returns to its Roots by Marcy Taylor

July 4, 2019 marked the 100th Anniversary of the 1919 unveiling and dedication of the original Camp Cajon Monument. A grand ceremony took place in 2019 on Wagon Trail Road in the Cajon Pass to unveil and dedicate the replica monument, placed by local historians of the Wrightwood, San Bernardino, Highland, and Mohahve Historical Societies, in memory of William M. Bristol, the founder of Camp Cajon.

Another exciting event occurred on June 23, 2021, when one of the original 100-year-old concrete picnic tables from the famous Route 66 rest stop was returned to its first home in the pass, after spending eighty years in Lytle Creek Park. So why would anyone want to go to the trouble and expense to move a 1,700 pound concrete table with four solid concrete benches? Because the table and 62 others were



the sole survivors of the Great Flood of 1938, that severely damaged the camp and all of its structures, effectively marking its demise.


Donors of the early 20th century had funded the construction of each picnic table with a \$50 contribution, entitling them to have a cast-iron plaque inscribed with a text of their choosing, inlaid in one of the tables. The relocated table plaque reads:

"30 MILES NORTHEAST TO LUCERNE VALLEY LAND OF ABUNDANT AND SHALLOW WATER."

The volunteers of the Camp Cajon team (John Lenau, Mark Landis, Nick Cataldo, Gary Smith, Roy Applewhite, Garry and Steve Devlin) along with Borden's Heavy Haul, Brown's Backhoe Service of Phelan, and Mountain Hardware of Wrightwood made the carefully planned and articulated move possible.

As a result, an important place and period in history, the site of the crossing of the old Santa Fe and Salt Lake Trails, the original National Old Trails Road, which later became the Route 66 in

1928, and the very important rest stop, Camp Cajon, are now well-marked and preserved for posterity.



Korean War Jet Ace - Capt. Joe McConnell Jr. By Marcy Taylor.



As drivers pass over the river from Victorville into Apple Valley, they are greeted by a new welcome sign on the south side of Highway 18.

Designed by Don Holland and constructed on Lewis Center property, America's number one Korean War jet ace Captain Joseph McConnell has finally gotten his due recognition.

When the decorated pilot based at George Air Force Base returned home to Apple Valley in 1953, he was honored by the townsfolk with a new home, amazingly built in less than 48 hours with all volunteer labor, and donated materials and equipment. Dubbed "The Appreciation House," it still stands on the north side of Highway 18 east of Dale Evans Parkway, and is currently being renovated.

Unfortunately the year after moving his family into their new home, Captain McConnell was killed during a test flight outside of Edwards Air Force Base. He and his wife Pearl, known as "Beauteous Butch," are both laid to rest at Victor Valley Memorial Park Cemetery.

A movie starring Alan Ladd as McConnell and June Allyson as Pearl is a Hollywood version of "The Joe McConnell Story." It was filmed in Newton Bass's rental house "The Weekender," just a few doors west of the Appreciation House.
