Monuments update:

1. We will do a follow-up visit to Palisades Ranch, #14 in the Monuments booklet, to re-locate that monument.
2. On Thurs. Nov. 4, Delvin and Marcy assisted as **Lee Graham** moved three of our 11th Street monuments (#5 John Brown, #4 Bridges of the Mojave, and the newly discovered Names of the Mojave River) to safer locations on C Street.
3. On Wed. Nov. 4 **Brent Gaddis**, President of the Mojave River Valley Museum, and Marcy met with **Megan Murphy** at the Victor Valley Museum, and got approval for the plan to reconstruct / repair the tortoise sculpture.

Honoring one of our own Veterans by Marcy Taylor

She's a Mohave Historical Society board member. She teaches full-time at Apple Valley High School. She's involved in the California Writers Club. She's an active member of the American Legion, and helped construct their 2021 Veterans parade float.

I spotted her walking down the Seventh Street parade route, from Mojave to Forrest, accompanied by Argos, an eleven-year-old formerly abused rescue dog, stopping to greet children anxious to pet her companion. (She calls herself his emotional support human.)

As in past years, this 25th Annual parade ended at the Veteran's Statue, placed by the late Felix Diaz in 1995. This is the site of the yearly ceremony honoring local heroes. As I glanced up at the giant screen, showing a loop of slides highlighting Victorville vets, there was her photo, in uniform and smiling.

Following the Invocation, flag raising, and National Anthem, Victorville Mayor Debra Jones gave the welcome. She directed our attention to the big screen, for a segment called "Veterans Stories." This consisted of interviews with five local veterans, four men, and you guessed it, this same lady. Yes, I am talking about our own MHS Corresponding Secretary,

Therese Moore, Lieutenant, US Navy, 1992-97.



Therese's story began in South Dakota, where she was born and grew up, later relocating with her family to California. After earning her Bachelor's degree at San Diego State University in 1984, she went on to earn two advanced degrees at Cal State University, Los Angeles, in 1988 and 2001. After completing her five-years of service in the Navy in 1997, she moved to

the High Desert two years later, beginning a career in the field of education.

Her journey of recognition began with an email from Kelly Brady, Victorville City Hall, asking Therese to participate in a Veterans Tribute video. A huge bundle of thanks goes out to contractor **Lee Graham** for donating his time, machinery, and expertise to move three large stone monuments, Eagle Scout projects placed in the year 2000, from 11th Street to a better location at the entrance of the Victor Valley Memorial Park.

Past President John Bascom is responsible for sponsoring these young men, who completed their scouting requirements, while at the same time learning about and contributing to the preservation of local history.

The "John Brown" monument, a project of David Rogers,

honors the John Brown of Toll Road fame, as well as his sons who developed the North Verde cattle ranch, now known as Kemper Campbell. Its new location, between two beautiful palm trees just inside the entrance of the cemetery, enhances the appearance of the freshly sealed shiny monument.

Two other monuments, whose lettering has worn away due to age and the weather, will soon be receiving brand new plaques, attached courtesy of the local E Clampus Vitus Chapter. The "Historic Bridges of the Mojave" monument, a project of Jordon Robins, and the "Historic Names of the Mojave River" monument, a project of Korey K. Nelson, have been moved to C Street, just past the "Victor Valley Memorial Park" monument, another Eagle Scout project. These new locations offer a safe place for people to stop and learn a bit about Victorville's colorful past.

Tribute to Marvin Graham by Marcy Taylor

The MHS has lost another long-time member, who has contributed much to our organization. Just pick up a copy of Mohave VI and turn to page 120 to view an adorable photo of a young Marvin Graham, with his childhood sweetheart Dori, who we also lost in 2014. So two teenagers, who got married at age 16 and 17, whose first home was a "cottage trailer" in Hesperia, (with no plumbing or electricity), enjoyed a long and happy marriage. They submitted their heart-



warming and hilarious story for our 2012 publication, also taking part in an entertaining panel discussion with other members whose stories appeared in M6. Those speakers included Marvin's first cousin, active MHS member Lorraine Moffat and her late husband Bill, past president John Bascom, the late Al Bush, MHS member Martha Rader and her late husband Chuck. Other MHS members who contributed to that book are Richard and Kathy Thompson, Larry Reese, Leo Lyman, and the late Beverly Dudley, as well as Fran Elgin, Beverly Huiner, John Marnell, and a host of others who assisted with the

editing, photography, and formatting. Now why am I including all of these other folks in a tribute to Marvin Graham? To let our newer members know that the members of our organization have worked together for many years to accomplish our mission statement: "to record and publish local history."

Now, back to Marvin. According to Cousin Lorraine, he was born in 1935 in Whittier, married in 1953, joined the Air Force the same year, was stationed at George Air Force Base and assigned to the Fire Department. His future deployments took him to France and Oklahoma. Upon separation from the AF, he continued his firefighting duties, first as a civilian at Oxnard, then with the US Navy, with assignments taking him to Australia, Georgia, Bermuda, and Hawaii.

When I opened the Apple Valley Legacy Museum in 2015, Marvin was newly widowed and quickly volunteered. He handled the Thursday afternoon shift for about two years, always coming through the door with his lunchbox and a large smile on his face. He helped at many events, dressed in his best cowboy attire. When Marvin was no longer able to volunteer, cousin Lorraine and husband Bill continued to bring him to many Museum events, and to make sure he got to MHS meetings.

Marvin spent his last year close to his son in Garnerville, Nevada. Even though he was not here in person, his memory seems to keep popping up, as he is in many photos in our scrapbooks starting with our museum Ribbon Cutting. RIP Marvin, and thanks for all you have done to preserve our local history.

After some announcements and routine business were taken care of, the main event of the evening was the talk by San Bernardino Historical and Pioneer Society President, **Nick Cataldo**, on "The Earp Clan: The Southern California Years," also the title of his 2006 book. His PowerPoint presentation introduced us to several generations of the Earps, both male and female, making sure we knew that the Gunfight at the OK Corral in Tombstone, Az. was not the family's only claim to fame. In fact, the entire family spent most of their lives in San Bernardino County, where descendants still reside. Nicholas Earp, the father of Wyatt and his famous brothers, was actually a founding member of the San Bernardino Society of California Pioneers.

A prolific author, Nick offered for sale several of his books, of course, "The Earp Clan: the Southern California Years," as well as "Images of America: San Bernardino." An additional bonus was the Apple Valley Inn postcard pack, showcasing the Lea McCarty paintings that once hung on the walls of the main Inn, depicting many of the characters in the Earp book, such as Wyatt Earp, Doc Holliday, Bat Masterson, and the Clampers.

Daggett Road Trip by Marcy Taylor

On Sat. October 30, 2021, members and guests of the Mohave Historical Society enjoyed an awesome educational and entertaining trip to the old mining and railroad town of Daggett, just east of Barstow on the historic Route 66. Our host **Darryl Schendel**, President of the Daggett Historic Society, and member of the Mojave River Valley Museum, shared a wealth of information as he led us on a four-stop trip through town.

The excursion started at the Daggett Museum on 2nd Street, open every Saturday. Attendees were fascinated by the numerous indoor and outdoor displays, many vowing to return when they had more time to study the floor to ceiling display cases, each sponsored by an individual or organization.

The next stop was the historic Alf's Blacksmith Shop and yard, filled to the brim with the original tools and wagons, as well as some unusual and little-known hand-made objects, common to the 18th century world of mule trains and ore wagons.

The group then moved on to the old Stone Hotel, a structure miraculously saved from demolition, that hosted the likes of old west characters such as Death Valley Scotty. From there, people were able to walk about a half block down to the old Daggett Garage, now privately owned, and again saved from the chopping block.

The final stop was the site of one of the oldest and most unusually shaped houses around, a structure resembling a Swiss chalet. Despite the building being in need of lots of repair, there are high hopes of returning it to its original glory, for use as a welcome center, complete with brochures and maps of the area.

Our thanks to Darrell and his group of volunteers for saving the history of this once important water stop for trains, rest stop for miners and their mules, and later a stop for weary Route 66 travelers to refresh themselves, get a bite to eat, and maybe a bed for the night.

But the fieldtrip didn't end there. Those who desired to continue headed east on the Route 66 to Newberry Springs' famous Bagdad Cafe, where they learned a bit about the history of the area, the movie after which the cafe was named, and its importance to Route 66 travelers.

Well, we came this far, so why not explore some more? A group of seven headed off to Huell Howser's famous volcano house, a Jetson-like futuristic structure sitting atop, what else, a now inactive volcano. The surrounding view is magnificent, and the piles and piles of now cooled off black lava rock create a spectacular sight!

Since it was past lunch-time, a hungry group headed off to Peggy Sue's famous Fifty's Diner in near-by Yermo, a real "blast to the past."

Other sites in the area include the Yermo mural, depicting the mining history of the town and neighboring Calico, which is now a tourist attraction. And don't forget the Sculpture Park right next to Eddie's World.

Who says there's nothing to do or see in the desolate desert?

Mojave River Crossing Monument Repaired

Saturday Nov. 21, 2021, was the long-anticipated day when the damaged Mojave River Crossing monument on Turner Road in Victorville got a facelift in the form of a beautiful

new black and granite plaque. Graffiti vandalism on New Years Eve made for a bad start to 2020, when the spray paint removal process took with it most of the lettering of one of Mohave Historical Society's first monuments, placed in October of 1988. Only the top few lines of the lettering marking the Lane's Crossing site remained.

So what to do? Call on the E Clampus Vitus local chapter for help. And it was the Clampers to the rescue!

Dennis Parker of Hesperia and his crew from "down the hill," **Wade Grand** of Highland, **Michael Stafford** of Rancho Cucamonga, and **Eric Nielsen** of Glendora, arrived in their bright red shirts with a trailer full of equipment and seemingly endless energy, volunteering five hours of their Saturday to attach the beautiful plaque created by **J. L. Endicott Enterprises** of Yucca Valley.

Starting with a deep perimeter cut, then a series of horizontal cuts, and taking turns carefully chipping away at the hard granite, they created a recessed rectangle just slightly larger than the granite plaque to be inserted. After grinding it smooth, fitting it, more grinding, more fitting, the men were finally satisfied that it was time to



apply epoxy glue and clamp it in place. After allowing one hour to dry they carefully grouted the edges, and the masterpiece was finished!

Yes, there are some generous people in the world who share our mission of preserving local history.

Thank you, Clampers!


