Hello, loyal MHS members, and welcome to our new members:

Not a month has gone by that we haven't increased our membership, this month adding another 8 to our roles. And it's great to have a new monthly paper, "**The Pulse**," to highlight community events. I will have monthly issues for you to pick up at MHS meetings or at the AV Legacy Museum. The paper is being published by Jim Conkle of Route 66 fame, a true historian, and the first two issues, March and April, are full of both local events and fascinating stories about local history. Their slogan TEAM (Together Everyone Achieves More) sure describes the MHS.

We have over the past few years taken fieldtrips to locations in most of the Victor Valley cities, as well as trips to Barstow and the Mojave River Valley area and Camp Cajon, and have outings planned to Wrightwood, Big Bear, and Boron. We have partnered with the Lone Wolf Colony, Apple Valley Historic Advisory Committee, Apple Valley and Victor Valley Legacy Museums, the Town of Apple Valley, Santa Fe Trading Company, Victor Valley Memorial Park, the Village in Apple Valley, the town of Oro Grande, and other area museums to participate in public events and to provide educational experiences to our membership.

Projects in progress: "Mohahve Historical Society Monuments" second edition is in the works, currently being updated by Julie and Marcy. We still have a very few copies of the first edition available. Apple Valley Historic Advisory Committee has sent the second edition of "Apple Valley Historic Points of Interest" Book 1 to the printer. (As a reminder, the loaner drafts given out on the driving field trip do need to be returned.) "Apple Valley Historic Points of Interest" Book 2 is being formatted by Tom Hoegerman and will be in print soon. "The Apple Valley Airport" booklet, also in the editing stage, is the project of Marcy and Lena Quinonez from the Town. Meanwhile, Rick Piercy is working on the script and narration for a local driving tour, being pro-

duced at the Lewis Center.

The MHS Events schedule has been updated, and a few events have been added to the Community Events Calendar. Be sure to mark your calendars.

I would like to present member Maryann Christy with 2 awards: "The Most Excited Researcher" award, and "The Most Frequent Book Buyer" award. Actually these awards don't exist, but if they did, she would certainly deserve them. She also had kind words to say that I would like to share with you:

#### Delvin Harbour - May Speaker and Field Trip Leader

Our May 26 speaker and May 28 fieldtrip host is none other than our VP **Delvin Harbour**. Here's a little bit about Delvin: He was born and raised in Southern Cal. living in the Ontario and Cucamonga areas. He moved to the Victor Valley in 1985, currently residing in Apple Valley. He's always had an interest in all things historical, including his own family history, local history, and Route 66 history. He serves on the board of the California Route 66 Association, and has been volunteering at the Victorville Route 66 Museum for the past ten years.



Delvin's Thursday evening presentation at the Lone Wolf Colony will cover the history of Amateur Radio in America. Ten years ago he took the test and received his Technician level license for Amateur Radio. Since then he's been active with the Victor Valley Amateur Radio Club, which was established in 1956. His talk will include a brief history of both Amateur Radio in America and the Victor Valley Amateur Radio Club. The local club is active in community events, including the annual June Field Day: Route 66 on the Air, which takes place in September; Jamboree on the Air, a Scouting event held in October; and the January Winter Field Day.

On Saturday we will meet at the Route 66 Museum in Old Town Victorville, on D Street, at 10:00 AM. Parking is in the




rear. The tour will start in the local history room, around the corner in the back, a room some people never get to. Its amazing displays include old photographs, telephone books, artifacts, a video loop, and more, all highlighting the history of Victorville, the hub of the Victor Valley, named after the railroad man Jacob Nash Victor. Afterwards, you will

have plenty of time to explore the rest of the museum, and of course, put on a hippie wig and snap a photo in the VW bus.

#### Captain McConnell Centennial Celebration by Marcy Taylor



The weekend of April 2nd and 3rd, the Town of Apple Valley's Historical Advisory Committee members, Apple Valley Legacy Museum volunteers, and Mohahve Historical Society members partnered to put on two events honoring the Centennial year of Capt. Joseph McConnell, Triple Jet Ace of the Korean War.

In the words of McConnell's daughter Trish McConnell, "During the war Dad made sixteen kills in a short period of time. President Eisenhower sent him back home. Because he was the first Triple Jet Ace and a hero, the town of Apple Valley, then population 1000, built us a house known as Appreciation House in 1953. They were all amazing people. Unfortunately one year later my dad was assigned to Edwards Air Force Base to test the new F-86H, and he lost his life."



During the Sat. evening event MHS VP Delvin narrated the historical hayride, which took riders to both the Appreciation House, built for the family in a record-breaking 45 hours, as well as the Weekender, only a few houses down, where "The McConnell Story" movie was made.

Guests were also treated to music by 'Boni on the

Keys' and 'The High Desert Jammers," fine food served as usual by Roy Rogers nephew and his wife, and for those who stayed until dusk, movie clips from the film starring Alan Ladd as McConnell and June Alyson as his wife Pearl. Many attendees visited the museum, some for the first time, and some lucky souls won raffle prizes.

The following afternoon, the tribute continued at the gravesite at Victor Valley Memorial Park. Three members of the AV Historic







Advisory Committee shared the Town part of the story, while

three military veterans, including our own Mike Phillips, shared the details of Capt. McConnell's military career. The ceremony included the presentation of the colors by the Sultana Air Force Jr. ROTC, and a touching tribute by Trish McConnell. An interesting coincidence was shared by Mike: All of McConnell's sixteen kills were made during the exact time period that he was in boot camp.

We will again honor Capt. McConnell in October, with a presentation at Lone Wolf Colony on Thursday night the 27th, and a driving tour to seven important McConnell sites to follow on Saturday the 29th.



#### Two New Place Names in Unincorporated Apple Valley By Marcy Taylor

Let me introduce Apple Valley Legacy Museum Wednesday morning volunteer Jason Schmidt. He and his family operate Oak Springs Ranch east of Bowen Ranch Rd. on the road to Big Bear. A true country boy, he was born in the Rock Springs Bee Keepers Cabin, and is raising his six boys in the Oak Springs Ranch House in the area of Coxey and Oak Springs Rd. Jason has great knowledge of the desert and trails, and a love of history, which is why he approached me and volunteered to do a weekly shift at the museum about two years ago. He is also Captain of the Rattlesnake Mountain Volunteer Fire Department, helping

to protect the remote area prone to wildfires.

Besides finding and preserving all kinds of artifacts, Jason has an interest in geographic sites. Within the last few years he has succeeded in adding two names onto the map. In June of 2015 he received a letter addressed to Capt. Schmidt that stated:

"We are pleased to inform you that the U.S. Board on Geographic Names approved your proposal to make official the name **Butt Rock** for a pillar in San Bernardino County. The name has been entered into the Geographic

Names Information System, the nation's official geographic names repository, which is available and searchable online at

#### http://geonames.usgs.gov."

Now there's a place everyone should want to visit! Location: 5,550 feet elevation; San Bernardino National Forest 0.8 miles NW of Rattlesnake Mountain, 1.9 miles NE of Luna Mountain. The correspondence then notes: "The name is descriptive."

More recently Jason received another letter dated Feb. 15, 2022, informing him that the name **Oak Springs**, population 37, has been approved for an unincorporated community in San Bernardino County. Its description is "a populated place located 1.3 mi. WNW of Rattlesnake Mountain, 10 miles SSE of Apple Valley, named for the live oaks and natural water springs in the area." Check it out at:

So after living there for all of his 44 years, Jason finally has a real place to call home.

#### Desert Springs Ranch Field Trip by Marcy Taylor.



### One Happy Tortoise by Marcy Taylor

Quite a few years ago the local Women's Club and some talented area artists placed a giant tortoise sculpture in front of the Victor Valley Museum with an accompanying plaque. Unfortunately the desert heat and wind, and people sitting or standing on the poor fellow for a photo op, started to take its toll. His paint was chipping off. His legs were detached, with the front ones facing in the wrong direction. His head and long neck were lying on the concrete. Several sections of shell were missing entirely. So you can see why he was a sad, sad creature.



The Mohahve Historical Society, in the process of repairing all of their own damaged or faded monuments, thought it was time to come to the rescue. Member Brett Gaddis, local sculptor and mason, dedicated a few days of hard work, fighting with the wind, to put the tortoise back together. He reattached the legs and head in their correct positions, and recreated the decorative parts that were damaged or missing. What a difference already!



Next member Marcy Taylor, wielding her paintbrushes and several cans of earth-tone colors, got to work. Slowly but surely, one shade and one pattern at a time, the shell, like a giant mosaic, started to come back to life. Curious onlookers began to stop by to check the progress, one stating he had never even noticed the larger-than-life creature before!

The tortoise, as well as the Joshua tree, are probably the most iconic symbols of the Mojave Desert. Both species are well-worth preservation and respect, whether they be the live versions, or the Art Deco style concrete replica that sits in front of the Victor Valley Museum.

Stop by and take a look when you are in the neighborhood. And thanks to Brent and Marcy for your contribution to saving a piece of our desert heritage.

Note from Marcy: Working out in the community (especially on a busy street with a huge tortoise) gets you noticed. Besides the people honking and waving or circling the parking lot to take a look, my first real visitor was the President of the California Writers Club, Dwight Norris, who happened to come at the right time to snap some photos of me and Brent and our work in progress. He was actually kind enough to bring me a taco the very next day. And then a few days later I had a visitor who is involved in relocating and protecting the tortoise population in the area



of the Marine Base in 29 Palms. He thanked me for my volunteer work, took an MHS ap, and said he would send a contribution check from his organization to ours. Just when I was thinking that it's not as easy as it used to be to battle the sun and the wind, and that my knees aren't what they used to be either, a pick-me-up like that makes it all worthwhile.

Persons interested in researching local history can obtain valuable information from two outstanding facilities in the Victor Valley area. The Victor Valley College Local History Room was established in 1992 with an agreement to house and maintain MHS historical records, documents and other items and to share in the preservation of the Mojave Desert history. MHS life member and now retired VVC librarian Fran Elgin, is almost solely responsible for organizing the Local History room. Historical items have been stored there since 1998. Additionally, MHS directors Rick Schmidt and Julia Jackson volunteer their time weekly to catalog and preserve the historical items.

The second facility is the Heritage Room located at the Apple Valley Town Hall which also contains many historical items and documents. The requirements to use these facilities for research are listed below:


