World Friendship Fund

Through the World Friendship Fund, voluntary contributions of Scouts and leaders are transformed into projects that help Scouting associations in other countries to strengthen and extend their Scouting programs. The World Friendship Fund gives members of the Boy Scouts of America a good turn opportunity to help fellow Scouts who are in need of their support. It teaches Scouts that Scouting is global. Since the inception of the World Friendship Fund, American Scouts and leaders have voluntarily donated more than \$11 million to the fund.

The World Friendship Fund was developed during the closing days of World War II. At that time, there was a great need to rebuild Scouting in those nations that had been wrecked by war and were just emerging from the shadows of totalitarianism.

Over the years, this fund has provided Scouts from around the world the opportunity to expand the Scouting Movement. Collected contributions are used to assist developing National Scout Organizations (NSO). Any NSO that is recognized by the World Organization of the Scout Movement (WSOM) can submit a grant request for projects to enhance their growing organization.

Hosting a World Friendship Fund Collection can be organized during camporees, roundtable meetings, den and pack meetings, summer camping programs, blue and gold banquets, or any other Scout activity.



Campsite Cooking Recipes

Concho Valley Chicken

Ingredients:

- 1 tbsp Vegetable oil
- 4 skinless, bone-less chicken breast halves
- 2 green bell peppers, diced
- 1 medium onion, diced
- paprika, salt, ground black pepper and Creole seasoning to taste
- 1 (14 oz) can diced tomatoes
- 1 (10 oz) can diced tomatoes with green chilies
- 1 (32 oz) chicken broth
- 14 oz minute rice
- 2 cup shredded Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 package flour tortillas (12-count)

Directions:

Grease Dutch Oven with oil and preheat over 20 briquettes.

Chop chicken breasts into small pieces

Sauté meat along with bell pepper and onions in a hot Dutch oven

Sprinkle chicken with paprika, salt, ground black pepper, and Creole-Cajun seasoning to taste

Drain the cans of diced tomatoes and diced tomatoes with green chilies. Save the liquid Add drained tomatoes to Dutch oven and mix with the chicken.

Once the chicken and tomatoes are thoroughly heated, add chicken broth and liquid from the drained cans of diced tomatoes and diced tomatoes with green chilies. Bring to a boil if using propane, or heat for 10 minutes if using charcoal.

Add rice, mix well, cover, and let simmer until the rice has absorbed the liquid and becomes tender.

Sprinkle shredded cheese over top of rice and chicken. Replace the lid on the Dutch oven until the cheese has melted.

Wrap 4 tortilla's is damp paper towels and then wrap in aluminum foil. Heat foil wrapped tortillas on charcoal or propane for 1 minute only each side. Repeat until all tortillas are warm.

Serve Concho Valley Chicken with warm tortillas and optional toppings.
