

POSITION 4: POLICY RESEARCH INTERN

Position Overview

The Policy Research Intern conducts in-depth analysis of criminal justice policies, housing regulations, and civic engagement barriers to inform TXFPF's advocacy strategy and program development. This role supports evidence-based policy recommendations to elected officials, builds the intellectual foundation for the Bridge Forward Initiative, and contributes to grant proposals and white papers.

Primary Responsibilities

Legislative & Policy Analysis (40%)

- **Track Texas legislative session bills related to criminal justice reform, voting rights, and tenant protections**
- **Analyze Harris County policies on eviction procedures and court processes**
- **Research eligibility criteria and application processes for federal reentry grants**
- **Study New Markets Tax Credits and community development financing mechanisms**
- **Compare Texas reentry policies to national models and best practices**
- **Examine record sealing laws and barriers to expungement for non-violent offenses**

Program Research & Development (30%)

- **Research successful reentry programs nationwide (CrossWalk Center, AMMA, Fortune Society, etc.)**
- **Identify service gaps in Harris County reentry ecosystem**
- **Investigate co-located service models and wraparound support structures**
- **Research Benefits Identification Bureau frameworks and SSI/SSDI advocacy programs**
- **Study vocational training programs effective for justice-impacted populations**
- **Examine housing-first models for formerly incarcerated individuals**

Writing & Documentation (20%)

- **Draft policy briefs on criminal justice and housing issues**

- **Prepare legislative fact sheets for advocacy campaigns**
- **Contribute to grant proposals with research and citations**
- **Write white papers on systemic inequities in Harris County justice system**
- **Create literature reviews on evidence-based reentry interventions**
- **Document findings in accessible formats for community education**

- **Identify potential funding sources (foundations, federal grants, corporate partners)**
- **Research TDCJ partnerships and state agency collaboration opportunities**
- **Map existing service providers and potential Bridge Forward partners**
