

# Brown Easily Conquers Dengis In Port Chester Marathon Run

## Narragansett Indian Youth Triumphs by Half Minute in Twelfth Annual Race Over Hilly Westchester and Greenwich Course—Porter Takes Third Place.

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PORT CHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 11.  
 —Ellison (Tarzan) Brown, 22-year-old, full-blooded Narragansett Indian of Alton, R. I., who competed for the United States in the Olympic Games, gave a sterling exhibition of stamina and courage today to win the twelfth annual Port Chester National Marathon.

Brown, national twenty and twenty-five kilometer champion and who won the Boston marathon last April, negotiated the twenty-six-mile grind in 2:36:56.7, more than a half minute faster than Pat Dengis of Baltimore, who was second. Mel Porter of Newark, N. J., romped in third, five minutes later, and August Johnson of Port Chester placed fourth.

### Course Hilly in Spots

The course along the eastern section of Westchester County and part of Greenwich, Conn., was exceptionally hilly in spots and proved trying to the majority of the fifty-two who started. But Brown took it all in stride. He was among the leaders with the bark of Mayor William B. Banister's starting gun and set the pace the majority of the distance.

Dengis, former national marathon champion, offered the only real opposition. For a time many among the thousands who lined the latter part of the course thought that the Maryland star's bid might be successful.

### Dengis Passes Indian

Well back of the pace setting Indian for half the race, Dengis overhauled and passed his young rival at the twenty-two-mile mark. He continued to draw away and at one time led by 200 yards but with barely a quar-

ter mile to go, Brown called on his reserve and triumphed easily.

Besides Brown and Dengis, only Leo O. Giard of Brockton, Mass., headed the field. He went ahead at the five-mile mark and relinquished the lead to Brown two miles later. Giard finished seventh.

### Seven Toronto Runners

The athletes came from as far north as Toronto and as far south as Washington. The Toronto delegation included seven runners from the Monarch A. C.

A great deal of comment was created by the absence of Leslie Pawson of Pawtucket, R. I., last year's winner. It was learned that Pawson intends to compete in only two marathons a year and that his second will be in Yonkers next month.

Brown is a stone mason by trade and Dengis an airplane mechanic. Tarzan will try for his second victory in two days at Concord, N. H., tomorrow.
