Greetings Friends!

I have been noticing sure signs that summer is leaving and fall is fast approaching. Later sunrises and earlier sunsets, resulting in shorter days. Busier than usual squirrels scavenging for food to store. Migrating birds. The occasional need for a sweater to ward off cooler temperatures. A sudden desire for hot chocolate and apple cider. Heavier than usual beach-bound traffic, as people try to create that one last summer memory. Soon the beach traffic will be replaced by yellow school buses and frustrated commuters who wish they had left 10 minutes sooner to avoid them. For weeks, store shelves have been teeming with the latest "must have" back-to-school items to remind parents to purchase those supplies before the stock is depleted. New school supplies always got me excited about school, and I'm sure that hasn't changed since I attended during the Stone Age. A positive start to school is important, as it can set the tone for the rest of the school year. Another harbinger of fall is Library Each year during the month of September, the American Library Card Sign-Up. Association (ALA) and libraries across the country collaborate in an effort to encourage everyone to sign up for a library card, stressing that it's FREE. The only requirement is an ID. The program was initiated in 1987 in response to a challenge by former Secretary of Education William Bennett, who said: "Every child should obtain a library card and use it!" Bennett saw this as an opportunity to increase national educational standards and to fight illiteracy. ALA agreed, although the program has expanded to include adults as well as children. After all, if you want kids to read and learn to LOVE READING, you have to model the behavior. The Staff and Friends of the Bear Library will be collaborating in September to urge all patrons to sign up for library cards. The Friends will be hosting a table at ShopRite in Governor's Square on September 28th from 10:00 – 2:00, but you can request a card anytime during the year at the Check-Out Desk in any library.

But why do you need a library card? A search on the Internet produced anywhere from 5-100 reasons. Some reasons applied to me, most didn't. I think it depends on your own circumstances and what the libraries in your geographical region offer as benefits of having a card. I use my card to check out items such as books, magazines, games, and audiobooks. I don't need my card to reserve a Study or Meeting room or to attend a class or presentation. I only have to register for those, no card required in New Castle County. My reason for having a library card is that libraries can use their statistics to prove their value to local policymakers and to advocate for funding to continue to keep libraries open to the public. Bear Library Manager Eric Kuhn keeps and reports Bear Library use statistics to the Powers-That-Be. Those statistics include "Circulation" and "New Patrons" I am convinced that our local and State representatives gauge library use and subsequent funding based on library card statistics.

Possessing a library card is a badge of honor for me. I would wear it if I could! Author Rita Mae Brown said it best: "When I got [my] library card, that was when my life began."

Introducing Scott Hobson

Part-time Circulation Staff member Scott Hobson is a self-proclaimed "people person". He enjoys working at the Circulation Desk, where he can engage in friendly conversations with patrons during check-out. He also handles In Transit items to and from other libraries; and he has run an Author Meet-Up program featuring local children's book authors. He aspires to become a full-time employee at the library. Scott has been at the Bear Library for 10 years. He was hired along with several other Staff members after the library was remodeled. He fondly remembers his job interview as "a fun experience". He had no relevant library experience other than being a loyal Bear Library patron. However, his employment resumé includes customer service and/or management level positions at ToysRUs, Pizza Hut, Delaware Park, and Borders Books and Music. In all, Scott has over 30 years' experience in meeting with the public.

Scott was born in Wilmington and attended Newark High School. His younger brother Todd works in nuclear medicine; his mom Cyndi, a former first and second grade teacher, was Teacher of the Year. Scott wanted to pursue a career in computer science, but no computer programs were offered at his high school. Still intent on working with computers, he enrolled in computer courses at Delaware Technical and Community College but left after a year. A disconnect between student and school led him to seek a different career path. Any computer skills he now possesses are self-taught through reading and trial and error. (A library is indeed a great resource!) Scott has been married to Danielle, a Specialist at a Private Trust Office, for 19 years. The couple met online. Soon after, Scott traveled to Manhattan to meet Danielle and her rat terrier "Piccolo". Although Piccolo was a family-centered dog, she immediately took to Scott. Danielle and Scott also immediately took to each other. They became engaged after that first date! They were a family of 3 for many years. Scott enjoys quiet time at home with Danielle and traveling to Brooklyn to visit her family. He likes video games, classic rock music from the '70s and '80s, and has a penchant for the entire "Doctor Who" TV series. His preferred movie and reading genre is fantasy. He cites the "Star Wars", "Dune", and "Lord of the Rings" series as particular favorites. He recommends the picture book "Cloudy With A Chance Of Meatballs" for kids and adults alike because it encourages readers to stretch their imaginations, albeit in a humorous way. He is a big fan of manga comics, especially "Sailor Moon" and the "One Piece" series. He would like to see new manga novels added to the library's graphic novel collection. Scott reiterates why he enjoys working at the Bear Library: "There are great people here. I have wonderful conversations with everyone."

Concetta "Connie" Georgov

The Friends of the Bear Library mourn the passing of Concetta "Connie" Georgov, on May 27, 2024, one of the original members of The Friends. She is remembered for her leadership qualities of determination, passion, and perseverance.

Connie Georgov's first job was in the Newark, NJ Public Library, a job that shaped her outlook on the word "library" and the treasures they hold within. One of Connie's favorite sayings was "a library card is the best gift to give a child." Connie moved to Delaware with her husband Bill in 1958, and then moved to Bear in 1967. At that time there was no local library; the Newark Library was the closest. Recognized for her community activism within the New Castle County Civic League, Connie was approached in the 1990's to advocate for a library to be built in Bear. Connie called a meeting at her home in Caravel Farms in Bear on November 5, 1990 to discuss organizing a group called the Friends of the Bear Library. Of the many people she invited, six showed up for that first meeting. Gathering a group of like-minded Bear residents, and empowered by her aforementioned leadership skills, Connie held a second meeting at her home on December 2, 1990, which drew additional people who had also been looking into what it would take to get a library for Bear. These additional people included Bev Wright, our current 2nd Vice-President – Membership, who had been in contact with the Division of County Libraries and found that there was a master plan for libraries in New Castle County. The newly formed group was given a copy of the master plan at the December 2nd meeting. A public meeting was held on January 16, 1991 at Leasure School and forty people attended, which gave the group the confidence that they could move forward with officially organizing the Friends of the Bear Library, incorporate and get tax exempt status, elect officers (Bev Wright was elected as the first President), and write by-laws. Connie continued to hold meetings in her home. The first "Annual Meeting" of the Friends of the Bear Library was held on March 11, 1991, again at Leasure School. Then came the membership drives, the bake sales and small fundraisers, and raising awareness that there would be a Bear Library someday. Then came the grant writing, which Carol Harrington, currently our Treasurer, was heavily involved in, as the Friends of the Bear Library, mounted a grassroots capital campaign, raising \$1,000,000 towards the construction of the proposed library. Land was donated by Ernest Delle Donne & Associates. The Bear Library opened in 1998.

Connie will always be remembered as a key person in the formation of the Friends of the Bear Library, the hosting of those early meetings in her home, and the monumental effort that was required to get our Bear Library built. In fact, if you look through the tiles on the walls of the Bear Library, you will find one commemorating that first meeting in Connie's home on November 5, 1990!
