## **Greetings Friends!**

A few months ago, I asked a librarian to help me find information on a topic for a presentation I was giving. I have always considered myself to be a good researcher, a testament to all the term papers I had produced from junior high through grad school. But I was having no luck this time. In less than 10 minutes, the librarian, somewhat apologetically, handed me a sheaf of papers. "Here you go!" she said. "I'm sorry it took so long. I was printing them for you." I was amazed and said so. She responded, "I'm a librarian. That's what we do." Librarians are indeed information gurus. Their professional training requires them to develop very specialized fact-finding skills that humble our own self-proclaimed research abilities. They know HOW to look for information and WHERE to find it ---often in the most obscure places in which none of the rest of us would consider looking. Librarians are experts at locating information through computer searches, subject heading inquiries, bibliographies, systematic browsing, key word searches, citation searches, special collections, microform sets, government documents, and unique one-of-a-kind sources such as singular publications on a specific subject, to name a few.

My own Internet search cites several textbook-style publications on basic research methods for librarians. In the book LIBRARIES IN TRANSFORMATION, authors Phayung Meesad and Anirach Mingkhwan discuss how libraries have evolved from repositories of human knowledge to dynamic centers of community and digital innovation. Librarians are constantly learning new inquiry methods in order to keep up with the times. But librarians will also revert to older research methods if the topic being researched has a historical aspect. Former Bear Staff member Angela Rodesky, for example, led a monthly genealogy program on how to investigate one's family history in creative ways, such as through journals, letters and other ephemera, vintage photographs, newspapers and other periodicals, birth and cemetery records, keepsakes and family heirlooms. Author, college professor, and historian Elyse Graham depended on these older research methods for her book BOOK AND DAGGER, "the untold story of the academics who became OSS (Office of Strategic Services, precursor to the CIA) spies, invented modern spycraft, and helped turn the tide of the war (WWII)." I was especially interested in this book because one of the featured academics-cum-spies was a librarian archivist, Adele Kibre. The daring-do and exploits of Kibre and the other unlikely undercover agents, who infiltrated the enemy rank-and-file and cozied up to Nazis in order to thwart and misdirect German intelligence operations, are astounding. These spies preceded the digital age, so they resorted to using such methods as telephone directories, maps, handwritten cryptic and coded messages, and seemingly inconsequential library books as their innocuous appearing tools of the trade. Graham notes: "WWII was fought on the battlefield, but it was won in libraries."
