Greetings Friends!

"The mission of New Castle County Libraries is to inspire innovation and lifelong learning, advance literacy and strengthen connections within the community."

Bear Library Staff members, under the guidance of Manager Eric Kuhn, work tirelessly to put those words into action. Program offerings are designed to appeal to a wide range of ages, interests, ethnicities, cultures, and lifestyles. These offerings have included "Women of the American Anti-Slavery Movement", (Jamaican) "Folk Art and Culture", Chinese New Year Celebration, "Cinco De Mayo Bilingual Story Time and Craft", "Bear Chess Club", "Tech Maven", "Spice of the Month Club", "LENAPE Lifeways", "A Good Yarn", and "Yoga for Health", to name but a few.

Bear Library serves one of the most diverse population areas in the County — possibly in the State. The Library is especially sensitive to meeting the needs of patrons who represent the community's multi-cultural demographics. Led by Adriana Camacho-Church, Bear Library has the distinction of offering the only continuing library-centered English as a Second Language (ESL) program in New Castle County. Among other ESL services, the basic computer classes in Spanish that Adriana helped to establish focus on job search and application, and paying bills online. Her outreach initiatives have included Head Start and elementary school visits to the Library; and partnerships with local Hispanic media, community leaders, and organizations. Plans have been in the works for several months to expand and strengthen Bear Library's current ESL partnerships with Christina School District and Literacy Delaware. Christina has confirmed ESL programming at the Library starting in October. They will provide a Level 2 class during the week. The school district has hired a new teacher to teach the class at the Library. Literacy Delaware has committed to providing a beginner's Level 1 class and perhaps an advanced Level 3 course as well. Literacy Delaware's start date has not been confirmed. According to Eric, the Library's long term goal is to have the 2 partners coordinate services at Bear to offer seamless service delivery to the public, and to get Literacy Delaware or another partner to start a Level 5 ESL class at Bear.

Eric and the Staff are very excited about the proposed ESL classes. They look forward to increasing the library's patronage, especially those visitors who may be entering a library for the first time.

Visit the Bear Library, where everyone is welcome!

From The Library Manager

Hello Friends!

We are always looking for new programs and services to roll out in libraries and starting soon we will have a new service that everyone is going to love: automatic renewals are coming to Bear Library starting in September!

Starting September 1st all physical items that are eligible for renewal will automatically renew without you having to do a thing. How does this work? Three days before an item is due the computer system will attempt to renew your item automatically: if the items renew successfully you will receive a courtesy email notice that lists the items that were successfully renewed along with their new due dates. Items that were not renewed will receive the standard due date notice we currently send out. If you do not have an email address on file you will not receive these notices and will need to check your account online or contact library staff to learn if items were renewed. Text message notices will continue to be sent out the day before an item is due for items that could not be automatically renewed; we cannot send out text message confirmation notices for items that were successfully renewed automatically (the computer system can't do this at this time).

The automatic renewal calculates the new due date from your original due date, so you will not lose any time. The renewal period is the standard check out period for the item; in most cases this will mean three weeks. If you wish to renew your items yourself earlier than three days before they are due you will now need to speak with library staff; as long as your items are eligible for renewal staff can renew the items for you manually. Some items are not eligible for automatic renewal - these include any items with holds on them, items that have already been renewed three times, walk-ins, interlibrary loans, digital items, and museum passes. If your library card is expired, blocked, or you have an excess of overdue items already, the system will not be able to renew your items automatically and you will need to speak with library staff.

Multiple library systems have adopted this service and it has proved to be very popular - I am sure you will like it as well!

Introducing Adriana Camacho-Church

Bear Library Staff member Adriana Camacho-Church finds inspiration in a simple quotation by Robert G. Ingersoll (1833-1899): "We rise by lifting others". The quotation refers to the importance of helping people and the subsequent positive impact it can have on our own lives. The quotation has become Adriana's mantra; she even posted it on her LinkedIn. Adriana enjoys helping others and she never misses an opportunity to further that mission. As a Library Reference Specialist with New Castle County Department of Community Services, Adriana creates, coordinates, and organizes programs and services that help meet the needs of the Hispanic community. She has been a permanent part-time Staff member at Bear Library since January 2023. Some of her Library activities include translating, interpreting, collection development, and basic computer classes taught in Spanish. By partnering with Literacy Delaware and Christina School District, she successfully established English as a Second Language (ESL) classes at the Library. She also conducts Library tours for ESL students and their children. During a recent tour, Adriana encouraged the students to sign up for library cards. Many of them were not aware that they could borrow items from the Library! Adriana would like to see viable bilingual and ESL programs in all New Castle County libraries. She also would like the libraries to offer more diverse programs and materials in order to reflect the multi-cultural aspects of the communities they serve.

Adriana was born in Colombia, South America, but grew up in Chicago and California. She attended the University of California Riverside, where she pursued a political science degree with the intention of matriculating into law. Upon graduating, she abandoned that career choice for journalism. She freelanced online and worked for several newspapers before moving to Delaware in 1999 with her husband Steven and daughters Canela and Elena-- now 31 and 26. While taking her children to Story Time at the former Concord Library, Adriana applied for a library position, thinking it was the perfect job for a mother with school-age children. She worked as a book shelver and in circulation, and was promoted to her current position in 2003. Adriana quit her online writing during this period, but resurrected her journalism career in 2017 at OUT&ABOUT Magazine. She writes a popular column, "Worth Recognizing: Community Members Who Go Above and Beyond". The column, which highlights people helping others in their communities, garnered 2 First Place awards and an Honorable Mention from the Delaware Press Association in 2019. In 2008, Adriana was honored by the County for her contributions to the Hispanic community. That year, she also received a grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation for her Spanish Language Outreach Programs.

Whenever possible, Adriana finds time in her busy life to volunteer. (After all, her mantra is about helping others.) Before COVID, she and Elena painted a room at Rockwood Museum. Last year, she pitched in for their Christmas event and children's craft fair. She listens to bluegrass, folk, and Brazilian music; and she has been known to perform salsa and merengue dances in her kitchen while cooking Colombian fare. Besides dancing, she exercises with yoga, jogging, biking, and by taking long walks. Adriana and Steven plan to travel to Portugal in September 2023. The family has visited Colombia, where the girls were introduced to their maternal Colombian roots. The couple plan to take their grown daughters to Ireland to learn about Steven's heritage. Reading preferences are non-fiction and historical fiction books. Favorite authors include Malcolm Gladwell and Daniel James Brown. She recommends ENTANGLED LIFE by Merlin Sheldrake. She likes Todd Parr's books for kids and admires Yuyi Morales's bilingual storybooks. Adriana introduced a Bilingual Story Time at the Library, focusing on a different theme each month. (August's theme is "The Beach".) Adriana will soon be joining the ranks of children's authors. Her first book, GRANDMA, WHERE WILL YOUR LOVE GO?, is set for release in October 2023-- adding another credential to her already exhaustive list of accomplishments.

All in all, Bear Library is doing well post covid.

Circulation is still down from pre-pandemic levels a bit but it is still growing.

Door count is almost back to pre-pandemic levels.

New users added is at pre-pandemic level. (Appoquinimink did so well because they opened a new, expanded library with expanded services and hours.)

E-Book circulation is pretty much unchanged from pre-pandemic levels, with only a slight increase.
