It is a scientific "fact" that the older one becomes, the faster time passes. For instance, it seems like we just celebrated the 20th anniversary of the Bear Library (March 2019), yet the 2020 Annual Meeting is quickly approaching!

The Annual Meeting is scheduled for Saturday, March 14, at 2 p. m. The program will include a brief business meeting, election of officers, and library highlights from the past year. The Friends of the Bear Library have engaged **The Garnet Miners**, who will entertain us with their blue grass musical stylings, including Irish music and familiar favorites. Children are welcome. Light refreshments will be served.

The Bear Library, supported by the Friends, continues to provide the Bear community with valuable information about learning opportunities and skill building. These include the ongoing Adult Education class, computer and technology programs, coding, computer classes for Spanish speakers, genealogy and history offerings, and résumé writing, to name a few. The Library also offers many educational programs for children and teens; and boasts a large collection of books and references in several languages for non-English speaking patrons or those who are interested in improving their foreign language skills.

On March 9, the Friends will host the **SEED** (Student Excellence Equals Degree) program. Presented by Delaware Technical and Community College, and sponsored by the State of Delaware, **SEED** enables students to pursue an Associate of Arts degree, tuition free. We encourage you to join the Friends of the Bear Library, or to renew your membership, so that we can continue to provide the Bear community with quality programs at the Delaware's foremost library.

From the Library Manager

Hello friends!

I hope everyone is enjoying the easy winter we have been having, though I am a bit disconcerted about the crocuses and snow drops blooming in mid-February! Following the lead of the crocuses I would like to tell you about three library initiatives that are in final stages of development or just now falling into place...it may be a bit premature, but just like spring, all three are coming very soon.

The first initiative is a pilot program made possible by the Delaware Secretary of State, the Delaware Division of Libraries, and the Delaware Library Association. Through the pilot, children ages birth to five living in Christina or Colonial School Districts can receive a free book every month delivered to their home through the mail from **Dolly Parton's Imagination Library**. The long term hope is that the pilot program will be expanded to cover every child in every school district across the state. For more information on this wonderful program, or to sign your children up to receive free books, go to delawarelibraries.org/imagination.

The second initiative is the addition of **Hoopla**'s streaming service content to the Delaware Library Catalog. Starting sometime in March library patrons will be able to check out streaming video, music, ebooks, and e-audiobooks from this popular e-media provider. I don't have a start date yet, so for now watch the library's website for an announcement that this service has gone live, but it will be sometime in March, and it is a great addition to our e-media and streaming offerings! The third initiative is a change in how libraries market and advertise their program offerings to you. This initiative is going to be phased in over the next six months or so, but the first steps have already been taken, and we will be rolling out a campaign very soon to get the **DLC** library app on every Bear Library user's smartphone or tablet. Using the app, you can view the complete, up to date Bear program calendar, including detailed descriptions, dates and times, and room locations.

You can also search the app to look for specific programs, either by subject or keyword. You can also access the library catalog, place holds on materials, and manage your library account. The app also allows you to always have your library card with you on your phone, and instead of having to hunt through your purse for your library card, if you have the app you can conveniently pull it up on your phone with two taps when you check out. The app can be downloaded from both the Apple Store and Google Play Store for free.

Introducing Laura Ashley

Laura Ashley is flattered when someone asks her if she is related to the famous fashion designer with the same name. But Bear librarian Laura Ashley is a poet, not a designer. Reading from a young age, she has always loved libraries and poetry. Spending much time in libraries while growing up inspired Laura to hone her writing skills. She fondly remembers creating a poetry book for parent's night when she was in 4th grade. She still loves to write, especially poetry. However, the poems she authors are for her eyes only. She began journaling in poetry form to avoid prying eyes from understanding her meaning. Laura says she uses words as "puzzle pieces"- but she is the only person who can solve the puzzle!

Laura is the oldest of 5 children (2 brothers, 2 sisters). She andher siblings were raised as military brats, courtesy of her Air Force career officer father. Born in Germany, she lived in Crete as small child, where she searched longingly for sea monsters. The family was soon relocated to America. She has lived in Texas, Kansas, Ohio, Alaska, Dover (DE) and Newark- her current home. She spent most of her school years n Alaska, and was "the clumsiest cheerleader" on the junior high squad. She remembers that one time she forgot to wear her bloomers, and another time she landed in the mud while cheering-embarrassing moments that are hilarious in retrospect. Laura transferred from Alaska to Christiana High School in her senior year, not a happy experience for a teenager. Luckily, her close knit family supported her. The family is still close and live nearby.

Laura married young and was a stay-at-home mom while she raised her 5 children, now ages 22-34. Her son is now living overseas, teaching English in various locales in Europe and China. She is proud grandmother to girls, ages 15, 4, and 1 year. As a working mom, Laura became a karaoke hostess at the former Chi-Chi's Restaurant (1992-2008), joining a sister who encouraged her to face her fear of speaking in public. In 2012, while studying on line to be a legal secretary, Laura sought a comfort zone at the Bear Library so she could study. Thoroughly impressed with the library's atmosphere, she returned, saw a "hiring" notice, applied, and was subsequently interviewed by Library manager, Eric Kuhn. (She hopes he was impressed by her assertiveness!) She is impressed that Bear Library opens doors for learning. Depending on the program, Laura helps in the computer lab and with open mic night (karaoke background?); and works with children with LEGOs and Pokémon. She also is training at the children's desk.

Laura's entire family is musical and several members, including her parents, play instruments and sing. An interesting anecdotes is that her grandmother and June Carter Cash were first cousins and best friends! Laura studied piano as a child, but prefers singing. She has eclectic tastes in music, ranging form country to pop, Christian inspirational, and soundscapes. Busy with family and friends, Laura doesn't travel a lot. Here last trip was a cruise to Bahama 5 years ago, where she wrote poetry and mingled with the locals. She attends Holy Family Church, volunteers at Little Sisters of the Poor, donates blood every 2 months and helps with the Food Bank, alongside fellow staff members lan and Heidi. She boasts a collection of angels, 5 of which are cherubs representing each of her children. She also cherishes a painting by her artistic mother, who panned for gold in Alaska, then recycled the gold and the pan as her canvas.

Laura lost her Maine Coon cat "Gabby", a stray that she pet parented from 2003-2019. She plans to read the "cozy" mysteries by Miranda James, which feature a librarian and his stray Maine Coon cat "Diesel". She admires the poetry of Sylvia Plath and Ted Hughes. She recommends author Anita Shreve ("The Pilot's Wife" and "Wedding in December"). She is partial to the latter book because her youngest daughter gave it to her as a Christmas gift when the child was 5.
