Avoiding Online Scams and Fraud

▶▶ How to Spot Potential Scams

- Scammers may urge you to give away personal information, financial information, or pressure you to act quickly.
- Many scammers will impersonate debt collectors; remember that the IRS will never contact you over the phone.
- Tech support scams often happen in the form of pop-ups warning you that your data has been compromised or that your device has a virus.
- Many scammers urge you to send money as cryptocurrency, gift cards, or will tell you to lie to your bank.

▶▶ How to Spot Identity Theft

- Look out for calls or messages requesting your personal and/or financial information.
- Look out for unusual activity in your bank account or unusual bills.

▶▶ How to Avoid Scams and Identity Fraud

- Ignore suspicious texts and emails, hang up on suspicious callers, and do not click on suspicious links or attachments.
- Never give out your personal or financial information over the phone.
- If you suspect you may have sent money to a scammer, contact your bank immediately.

▶▶ How to Avoid Scams and Identity Fraud

- If you are a victim of fraud or have been scammed, call the Senate Aging Committee's Fraud Hotline at 1-855-303-9470 and report it to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC) at ReportFraud.ftc.gov.
- If you are a victim of identity theft, report it to law enforcement and visit IdentityTheft.gov to receive a personalized recovery plan and support in your case.
