Dane Still is a powerful voice for the voiceless—bringing raw, honest insight into what it means to grow up inside the walls of domestic violence. As a child, Dane was forced to witness and videotape the abuse of his mother, Susan Still, in a story that would later make national headlines and lead to one of the longest domestic violence sentences in New York State history.

Today, Dane uses his lived experience to advocate for trauma-informed systems and protective responses—particularly for children trapped in cycles of violence. His story is not only heartbreaking but deeply human and ultimately hopeful.

Speaking to court officials, educators, military leaders, responders, and youth audiences, Dane bridges the gap between what adults think children understand—and what they actually carry with them for a lifetime. His goal is simple: to be the voice he once needed.
