Note: At the time of writing this guide, the expected Aaron Rodgers trade to the New York Jets hadn't yet happened.

## A PACKERS' PRECIPICE

For the first time in your fandom, you may be looking ahead to the season and wondering what might unfold with no real marker to set your sights on. When Aaron Rodgers was at the helm, the view of the fans, and seemingly of the organisation, was that the Packers were only a player or two, or a play or two, away from the ultimate prize: the Super Bowl. Now with Rodgers' departure all but decided, the stakes have never been higher for front office and coaching staff alike.

Brian Gutekunst knew when accepting the role of General Manager for the Green Bay Packers that ultimately his legacy would boil down to one singular event: can he transition to a new quarterback in a seamless way and still achieve success? The transition, it seems, has been anything but seamless and the jury will be out for some time whether it will be deemed a success.

To be frank, we still do not quite know if Jordan Love is the man to carry this franchise forward and we likely won't know for some years. Whether Gutekunst also sees Love as the long time starter is unknown. It might also be a case that Rodgers under center simply wasn't sustainable or acceptable for the Packers' front office. Nuance aside, when you draft a quarterback in the first round who pundits at the time remarked would have a bigger upside than Justin Herbert, it is a good a chance as any to take a gamble on a young talent who sat behind a first ballot hall of famer for three years. There comes a time when the training wheels

TODD MCSHAY, ESPN, 2020 just have to come off.

Adding to the complexity of the situation is the pressure to also build around the new quarterback in a way that lessons the burden whilst he finds his feet and also prevents him from taking the field to overcome deficits too often. This means investing in an offensive line that can keep him upright, a backfield that can act as a pressure release and a defense that can prevent the opposing offense from racking up a score that would take the running game off the table.

When it comes down to it though, the ultimate responsibility will come down to Aaron Rodgers' successor to develop quickly and execute the game plan effectively. Championships are not won regularly in spite of your quarterback, just like they aren't won solely because of him either. In a world where reactions are required rapidly, the 24 year old Love will be under pressure to perform immediately.

We need to cast our attention back to Aaron Rodgers' first year as a starter when the team racked up a 6-10 record and Rodgers posted 13 interceptions. It would be only the third time in his long Packers' tenure that he would finish the season with double digit interceptions. If you are curious as to when the other two seasons were, it was the Super Bowl winning season of 2010 and last year when he finished the regular season with 12.

The eyes of the media and fandom also fix now on Matt LaFleur. Just as was remarked when the Belichick and Brady partnership concluded, can LaFleur prove that his success wasn't largely attributable to having Rodgers under center? It is extremely difficult to parse the success of a franchise from its quarterback until it actually happens and even then, it is a largely futile exercise. We saw just how difficult it was to diagnose deficiencies last year when the team took somewhat of a nose dive and Gutekunst was sighing in the Lambeau lift.

Was the departure of Davante Adams too much for the Packers to handle? Was Co-Ordinator Nathaniel Hackett, who led a doomed campaign as head coach of the Denver Broncos, irreplaceable to the LaFleur/Rodgers offense? In reality, it is impossible to know. The truth probably lies that it was a culmination of all of these factors plus a plethora of others. There were new wide receivers, new plays, seriously hampering injuries to Rodgers throwing hand and ribs etc.

All things considered, the responsibility now falls to LaFleur to etch out a winning record after Aaron Rodgers or see his record in Green Bay reduced to a trope: LaFleur can only win games when he has a HOF QB on the field - for a coach who has one of the greatest starts to his career in NFL history, winning 13 games a season in his first three seasons, that would be wholeheartedly unfair. After all, this was a team that posted dismal back to back 9 loss seasons under Mike McCarthy before he was

So here we are, standing at a precipice in Packers' history with the reputations of the GM, head coach and president on the cliff edge. Can the franchise navigate through these uncertain times and build a team that can contest the NFC North? It goes without saying that the draft strategy would have always been based on building a team to continue after the Rodgers era came to a close, irrespective of whether he would have been donning the uniform again this year. The question is, if they aren't building around Rodgers, who are they building around? Maybe that player is Jordan Love.

Maybe we are at the beginning of a glorious new chapter in an already storied franchise. Or maybe we aren't. Only time can put ink to paper and all we can do is go along for the ride.

# BEST PLAYER AVAILABLE? 

As the Packers enter the 2023 draft, they are yet again in an interesting position draft position they can pretty much select the best player available (BPA) at any position and it has the potential to immediately improve the football team, with one or two exceptions of course they are not likely to draft a quarterback or running back early.

Selecting the best player available has long been the ideal draft approach (understandably) for many (most) NFL teams - The Packers, going back to Gutekunst's immediate predecessors, Ted Thompson and Ron Wolf, are no different in this regard. And there's no reason to believe that things will change any time soon.

That said, the Best Player Available (BPA) approach is in itself subject to some questions and provisos:

- The BPA may be at a position where the team is already set e.g. quarterback or running back. Rather than reaching for a player, this may be the time to consider a trade.
- There may be "equal bests" - two or more players equally rated when it's a team's time to pick - so determining a secondary criteria (e.g. position of need) may yet be important.
- Who the BPA is always in the eye of the beholder - or in this case, the mind of Gutey and his staff. His Best Player Available may not be the same as yours or mine.
- Is the BPA the player who is best right now (but may have peaked) or the player who might not be quite as effective right now but whose best is yet to come?
- How do you rate a player whose ceiling may be extremely high, but his floor may be extremely low - a real boom or bust type?
- How is the approach impacted by off-the-field questions? Some NFL teams have been known to completely remove potential draftees from their boards when off-the-field concerns have arisen - even though the player may be one of the very best when it comes to his play on the field.
- The BPA may be at a position where there is a lot of depth in the draft. This may indicate a time to slightly move from the pure BPA approach - because the GM "knows" that he can get a similar player later - or maybe a time to consider a trade down.
- There may not be a player available who is considered value at the pick - again, this looks like trade down time.
- The overall BPA philosophy may change as a draft goes on. Teams may be more willing to "risk" a pick on a certain type of player or position further down the draft, where the reward may be high, but the risk is lower.

Yes, it's generally Best Player Available, but don't be completely surprised if/when the Packers diverge a little from the approach in the coming draft.

## "GUTEY THE BOLD"

Not everybody will always like or agree with Gutey's approach to the draft, but it can't be denied that he has been bold in some of his draft day moves. In fact, bolder than many current and past General Managers around the league have been.

And what should be remembered when we wonder if even more boldness in terms of trading up and down may be appropriate - it takes two teams to make a trade, and nobody is going to give players or draft picks away.

History shows that Gutey has made early (round 1 or 2) moves in 4 of his 5 drafts:

## 2018

Gutey's boldness began with his very first draft choice for the Packers.
Sitting with the $14^{\text {th }}$ overall selection in the 2018 draft, Gutey engineered a trade down (with the New Orleans Saints) to the $27^{\text {th }}$ overall selection. For moving down 13 spots in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round Gutey picked up an extra $20185^{\text {th }}$ round pick and most significantly an extra $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick in the 2019 draft.

Very quickly afterwards, Gutey engineered a second trade (with the Seattle Seahawks), moving back up from that $27^{\text {th }}$ spot back to the $18^{\text {th }}$ spot. To move up those 9 spots, the Packers traded away their $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $6^{\text {th }}$ round selections and picked up an additional $7^{\text {th }}$ rounder.

All in all, the Packers had moved down 4 spots ( $14^{\text {th }}$ to $18^{\text {th }}$ ) and traded away their $3^{\text {rd }}$ and $6^{\text {th }}$ round picks. In return, the Packers had picked up an extra $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick in 2019, a $5^{\text {th }}$ round pick and a $7^{\text {th }}$ round pick. And to cap it all, the Packers then selected Jaire Alexander - who may well have been the player that they would have selected had they stayed at their original spot. All in all, it worked out fantastically.

To this day, Jaire Alexander has surely been the best overall player and value pick that Gutey has made in 4 drafts.

## 2019

With their own selection (overall pick no.12) in the 2019 draft, the Packers selected Rashan Gary, however, they also had the $30^{\text {th }}$ pick in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round - that extra selection that they gained when trading with the Saints in the previous year's draft.

This time around, Gutey clearly had his sights set on safety Darnell Savage but obviously had no guarantee that the safety he coveted would drop as far as pick 30 . So rather than potentially lose the player he wanted, Gutey traded away two $4^{\text {th }}$ round selections and moved up 9 spots to select Savage.

Gutey's approach to the $1^{\text {st }}$ round of the 2020 draft will probably be forever shrouded in questions. Many of those questions, of course, are driven by the subsequent outcome rather than the approach or process itself.

Sitting with the $30^{\text {th }}$ overall selection, the Packers moved up 4 spots (by trading away a $4^{\text {th }}$ round pick) and selected Jordan Love - in the process startling many football analysts and Packers fans.

How the selection will turn out only time will tell - heading into the 2023 season it seems we are about to start that "finding out" process. Whatever the thoughts about the selection of Jordan Love are, it would be difficult to deny that it was a bold move, especially in a draft that was full of potential at the wide receiver position.

## 2022

Many people thought that wide receiver would be high on the Packers list of priorities heading into the 2022 draft, especially after the trade of Davante Adams just beforehand. So it was somewhat of a surprise that the Packers didn't select a wideout with either of their $1^{\text {st }}$ round picks (they decided on Quay Walker at 22 and Devonte Wyatt at 28).

But the expectations and hopes of getting a wide receiver prospect were not completely dashed. The Packers also held two $2^{\text {nd }}$ round selections (picks 53 and 59 overall) after the Adams trade, and still looking to get his man, Gutey knew that he needed to get his hands on a selection early in that $2^{\text {nd }}$ round. And that's exactly what he did.

Gutey packaged together the $53^{\text {rd }}$ and $59^{\text {th }}$ picks and sent them to Minnesota in exchange for the $34^{\text {th }}$ overall pick. With that selection the Packers chose North Dakota State's wide receiver Christian Watson.

# PACKERS 1st ROUND DRAFT MOCKERY 

Just for fun, we took a look at 186 recent Packers mock drafts that had been posted on social media, to see what fans, analysts and journalists were predicting/guessing what the Packers may do with pick 15 in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round of the upcoming draft.

Nb . We ignored those mocks which included trades that gave the Packers additional $1^{\text {st }}$ round picks or moved the Packers from pick 15.

The following tries to summarise, as best we can, what we discovered about which players and which positions were mocked:

## Most frequently players and players by position

Perhaps unsurprisingly, the three most represented position groups were wide receiver (25.3\%), tight end (23.7\%) and edge (22.0\%). Perhaps also not surprisingly, Michael Mayer (TE, Notre Dame) was the single most frequently mocked player in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round - appearing in $14.5 \%$ of those mocks. Close behind was Jaxson Smith-Njigba (WR, Ohio State) with 12.4\%.

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# LOOKING BACK TO 2021 

Just for fun we thought we'd take a look back at a recent Packers draft and re-visit what we said, BEFORE the draft, about some of the players that the Packers selected. 2021 was picked at random. Here's what we had to say...

## ERIC STOKES - $1^{\text {st }}$ Round Pick

"Is a player who is developing and has improved in each successive year - that will impress pro scouts. The hope is that the progression will continue, and that Stokes has a big upside. Is versatile and able to play in multiple schemes. Super athlete. Needs some work on making sure he gets a little less grabby with his hands, which is a fault that he won't get away with in the NFL...Stokes should be able to enter the NFL and contribute immediately, even if he's not an opening day starter. Is likely to be a Day 2 selection in this draft - with the outside possibility of being taken late in Round $1^{\prime \prime}$

## AMARI RODGERS - $3^{\text {rd }}$ Round Pick

"Looks like a solid slot receiver in the NFL who will also do a job returning punts. Teams will want to be absolutely certain that there are no residual issues from his 2019 ACL injury...assuming that there are no issues identified with regard to his medical status, we should assume Rodgers to be off the board at some point either late on day 2 or early on day 3 ."

## T.J. SLATON $-5^{\text {th }}$ Round Pick

"Huge guy. Likely 3-4 NT in the NFL but may also be able to play as a 4-3 DT...expect him to be selected by a team that is looking for a an early down, tough, stout, runstuffer. May yet develop as a decent pass rusher with pro coaching, development, and time. Needs to get more consistent, disciplined and play with a motor all of the time. Likely off the board late on day 3."

## JOSH MYERS $-\mathbf{2}^{\text {nd }}$ Round Pick

"Impressive size for an interior lineman. Potentially versatile - having previous experience at guard as well as more recently playing at center helps his pro cause. Will do a job for whichever team selects him probably initially as a back-up but should develop into a solid starter in the NFL. Will be best playing in a system which features a straight ahead, power running game. Probably needs a little time learning to snap with a QB under center (as opposed to in the shotgun formation). Likely a day 3 selection."

## ROYCE NEWMAN - $4^{\text {th }}$ Round Pick

"Newman has a nice combination of speed and size...has quick feet which enable him to retreat and set an anchor in pass protection before linemen can get heavy hands on him. However when defensive linemen have superior athleticism and strength they currently give Newman some serious problems. Likely selected late on day 3."

## ISAIAH McDUFFIE - 6 $^{\text {th }}$ Round Pick

"McDuffie lacks the ideal size to play linebacker in the NFL, and in fact could be best suited to the safety spot - which is where he actually began his college career. Likely late day 3 selection."

## KYLIN HILL - $20217^{\text {th }}$ Round Pick

"Looks like a really solid all-round back who could play in most offensive systems. Brings a lot of excitement and dynamism when he gets in the open field as a receiver in the passing game. Teams will want to be satisfied that there are no ongoing discipline issues (related to his 2020 suspension). Likely day 3 selection."

# PACKERS DRAFT DAY 

## STEALS

High draft picks come with the expectation that they are going to be long time NFL players, AllPros and possibly Hall of Famers. But as you get further down the draft those expectations are tempered - perhaps you'll find a player who will be a part-time starter, or a back-up for a while. But every now again one of these players will buck the trend, surprise and become a star in the NFL - a true draft day steal.

The Packers have made 1,401 selections in the 87 drafts that have taken place since the NFL made the decision in early in 1936 to have, what was then called, The Annual Players Selection Meeting. In amongst those selections, the Packers have chosen a number of players who have turned out to be far more successful than their draft position suggested that they should have been. Here we take a look at some of them.

Note: No players who were taken in the first 75 selections of a draft were considered for inclusion.

## 1. Bart Starr, QB, $17^{\text {th }}$ Round, 1956

The only place to start with a list of Packers draft day steals is with perhaps the greatest draft day steal ever in the NFL - Bart Starr's selection in the $17^{\text {th }}$ round in 1956. Starr was the $200^{\text {th }}$ overall selection in 1956 and would go on to have a Hall of Fame career, winning 5 NFL titles along the way. Starr became one of the greatest of all Green Bay Packers players, but nobody had any idea that would happen as team after team bypassed him and looked elsewhere for their next star player.

Bart threw only 285 passes in his four college years. He had earned the starting quarterback role for the Crimson Tide in 1953, but when he injured his back in the summer of 1954, his last two college years were blighted by ongoing back issues. Those issues were so bad that the military determined that Starr was unfit for service. In retrospect it was perhaps no surprise that he was overlooked for more than 16 rounds.

It is possible that Starr would have gone undrafted altogether had he not received interest from the great Packers scout Jack Vainisi and like many of the great players who would be drafted by the Packers in 1950s, it was thanks to Vainisi that Green Bay selected Starr. Even once he arrived in Wisconsin, it would be a slow burn before Starr would finally secure the Packers starting quarterback position for good in 1960. The rest, as they say, is history.

## 2. Jim Ringo, C, $7^{\text {th }}$ Round, 1953

Having played his college ball at Syracuse, Ringo was the $80^{\text {th }}$ overall selection in the 1953 draft and would go on to be a 6-time AP $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-Pro, a 2-time AP $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team All-Pro and a 7-time Pro Bowler for the Packers. Ringo was a member of the NFL's All-Decade team of the 1960s and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1981.

And yet, Ringo nearly didn't make it to the NFL at all. Firstly, he was undersized - weighing just a reported 211 pounds around the time that he was drafted. Yes, players were much smaller back then, but he was still a few pounds lighter than the average interior lineman in his day. And secondly, he nearly gave up football after spending a little bit of time in the Packers


Ringo was named as the Center. summer camp in 1953.

But Ringo stuck around, becoming an All-Pro prior to Vince Lombardi's arrival in Green Bay and then blossoming in Lombardi's run based scheme - where his speed and quickness made him a perfect fit. Ringo would be a part of the Packers NFL Championship teams in 1961 and 1962, before being traded to the Eagles in 1964 (often reported as being due to Ringo using an agent in contract negotiations, although the details around that story are disputed).

## 3. David Bakhtiari, OT, $4^{\text {th }}$ Round, 2013

From the 1950s, we jump all the forward to the modern era and to a player who is still a Green Bay Packer today. David Bakhtiari was the 109 th player to be selected in the 2013 NFL draft and would go on to develop into one of the finest left tackles in the NFL in recent years. Whether he will end up in the Pro Football Hall of Fame remains to be seen - although he will, at the very least, garner serious consideration when his day comes - Bakhtiari is one of the most honoured tackles of the last few years, earning 2 AP $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-Pro selections, 3 AP $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team All-Pro selections and 3 Pro Bowl selections.

Bakhtiari had opted to enter the draft after his junior season at Colorado where he had an impressive career, but opinion was divided whether he should have remained in school for another year. There were also differing views as to whether he was most likely to play left tackle or right tackle in the NFL, with some even considering that his best position would be inside at guard. Undoubtedly, all of these may have been factors as to why Bakhtiari was still on the board in the $4^{\text {th }}$ round and available for Ted Thompson to make the selection.

Bakhtiari moved to the starting left tackle spot on the Packers depth chart in camp in his rookie season, initially due to injuries - but it was a spot that he solidified quickly, and he never looked back. Barring his own injuries, Bakhtiari has been the Packers starting left tackle ever since starting every game that he has played in.

A modern day draft day steal.

## 4. Donald Driver, WR, $7^{\text {th }}$ Round, 2012

Donald Driver wasn't expected to be an NFL star. He played his college ball at Alcorn State, which was then a Division 1-AA football school and despite a 1,000 yard receiving season in his senior year there, he was way down most boards when it came to draft day. Late in the day, the Packers selected Driver with the $213^{\text {th }}$ overall pick - making him the $25^{\text {th }}$ wide receiver to be chosen in 1999.

Of course, what nobody knew at the time was that Driver would play for the Packers for 14 seasons, becoming the team's all-time leader in receptions (743) and receiving yards $(10,137)$ and earning 5 trips to the Pro Bowl ( 3 original selections). He would be a key member of an outstanding receiving corps that helped the Packers win Super Bowl XLV. Driver was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame in 2017.

All of this for a player whose draft selection position was 13 spots lower even than Bart Starr's was.

## 5. Tony Canadeo, RB, $9^{\text {th }}$ Round, 1941

Tony Canadeo's number is one of just six numbers retired by the Packers. He was the team's first 1,000 yard rusher (in 1949), only the third 1,000 yard rusher in NFL history and was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1974. When he retired in 1952 Canadeo was the franchise's all-time leading rusher ( 4,197 yards). He also was an all-round performer, playing some quarterback, defensive back and returning kicks as well as his primary role at halfback. Canadeo would go on to serve on the Packers Executive Committee for more than 44 years.

So despite only just qualifying for this list (he was the $77^{\text {th }}$ overall selection in 1941), the above brief resume shows that "The Gray Ghost of Gonzaga" is truly one of the Packers top draft day steals.

## 6. Josh Sitton, OG, $4^{\text {H }}$ Round, 2008

Sitton played multiple positions on the offensive line in college (at Central Florida), including right tackle, right guard left guard. Heading into the 2008 draft it wasn't clear what position NFL teams though was his best, but his experience and versatility meant that Sitton was likely to be selected in the middle rounds. And so it proved when Sitton was selected by the Packers in the $4^{\text {th }}$ round with the $135^{\text {th }}$ overall selection.

Sitton would go on to have an outstanding career, earning the starting right guard spot in his second season with the team and later being the starter at left guard. He was a Green Bay Packer for 8 seasons (2008-15), playing in 121 games, starting in 112. Sitton was a starter on the Super Bowl XLV winning team and earned 3 Pro Bowl selections and $32^{\text {nd }}$ Team AP All-Pro selections.

Although his Packers career came to a surprising end when he was cut before the 2016 season, Sitton had already done more than enough to earn a place on this list.

## 7. Larry McCarren, C, $12^{\text {TH }}$ Round, 1973

For the last 2+ decades we have come to know Larry McCarren as an analyst on live game broadcasts on the Packers Radio Network. But years earlier, McCarren was an outstanding center for the Green Bay Packers. He played for the Packers from 1973 to 1984, earning himself the nickname "The Rock" after starting 162 consecutive games during that time. He was also selected to the Pro Bowl twice and was once a $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team AP All-Pro.

McCarren was selected by the Packers in the $12^{\text {th }}$ round of the 1973 draft and it was by no means certain that he would make the roster. But by the following year, he had become the starting center taking over from long-time pivot man Ken Bowman.

In 1992, McCarren was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame - pretty good for the $308^{\text {th }}$ selection in a draft.

## 8. Marco Rivera, OG, $6^{\text {TH }}$ Round, 1996

When he was playing for the Scottish Claymores in 1997 in the World League of American Football, it was probably difficult to envisage Marco Rivera having an outstanding NFL career. But having an outstanding NFL career was exactly what Marco Rivera did.

He was the $6^{\text {th }}$ round selection by the Packers $-208^{\text {th }}$ overall - in the 1996 draft. Clearly seeing Rivera as a developmental player, he was on the inactive list throughout his rookie season and then allocated to the WLAF in 1997. But by 1998, Rivera was the starting left guard, switching in 1999 to be the starting right guard - a role he remained in until the end of his Packers career in 2004.

Rivera was a 1 time $1^{\text {st }}$ Team AP All-Pro, 1 time $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team AP All-Pro and a 3 time Pro Bowler.

## 9. Mike Douglass, LB, $5^{\text {th }}$ Round, 1978

The Packer selected both James Lofton and John Anderson in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round of the 1978 draft. But just a little further down the draft, we find Mike Douglass - the Packers $5^{\text {th }}$ round choice, the $116^{\text {th }}$ player selected overall. His college performance had somehow gone a little under the radar, despite being San Diego State's all-time leading sack leader, perhaps it was his lack of size that put teams off. But Douglass was an outstanding athlete with physicality, toughness and a nose for the football.

Nicknamed "Mad Dog", Douglass had an 8 season (1978-85) career with the Packers and was a star at right outside linebacker, often on teams that struggled. He could rush the passer, stop the run and drop into pass coverage. In his Green Bay career, Douglass notched up an incredible 967 total tackles including 766 solos, 10 interceptions, 30.5 sacks, 16 fumble recoveries and 14 forced fumbles. He also scored 3 defensive touchdowns. If you wanted to know where the football was on the field, just find the Packers number 53 and the football was invariably near him.

Somehow, Douglass missed out on Pro Bowl honours during his career, but he was good enough to be named All-Pro by Sports Illustrated for 3 consecutive years (1981-83).

## 10. Mark Tauscher, OT, $7^{\text {th }}$ Round, 2000

Coming into the 2000 NFL draft, Mark Tauscher had played his entire football career in Wisconsin - high school and college - so perhaps it was inevitable that he would end up as a Green Bay Packer. Tauscher was a solid right tackle in college but wasn't regarded as a top level prospect so the expectations for his NFL career weren't necessarily high. However, Tauscher was determined to prove the doubters wrong.

When the Packers selected him in the $7^{\text {th }}$ round of the 2000 draft with the $224^{\text {th }}$ overall pick, it was expected that if he made the roster that it would be as a back-up. But starting right tackle Earl Dotson was injured early and Tauscher took over. He would go on to have a fine 11 season career for the Packers, playing in 134 games, starting in 126.

Tauscher was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame in 2018.

## 11. Don Majkowski, QB, $\mathbf{1 0}^{\text {TH }}$ Round, 1987

Don Majkowski's star shone all too briefly for the Packers in the late 80s and early 90s, but he will always be fondly remembered for his outstanding 1989 season, which for a short time reinvigorated a failing Packers franchise. Perhaps more than anything, the manner in which the Packers won games in 1989 - taking part in may nail-baiters and four 1-point victories - was what was exciting and led to Majkowski becoming a star. That season earned him a Pro Bowl and a $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team AP All-Pro selection, as well as runners-up spot in the voting for NFL MVP.

The "Majik Man" was the Packers $10^{\text {th }}$ round selection out of Virginia - the $225^{\text {th }}$ overall pick in the 1987 draft. His reputation was as a mobile quarterback with a decent arm. But nobody foresaw the level of ability, toughness and swagger that Majkowski would bring to the team that drafted him. He quickly competed for, and won, and lost, and won again, the starting quarterback role, only finally securing the position in 1989.

Sadly, his 1990 and 1991 seasons were badly impacted by injury. But Don was tough and kept coming back. In the end, another injury in 1992 coupled with the emergence of Brett Favre saw him Packers career come to an end. He ended his Green Bay career with 10,870 yards passing (at the time $4^{\text {th }}$ on the Packers all-time list, now $6^{\text {th }}$ ) and 56 touchdown passes - production that more than justifies a spot on this list.

## 12. Aaron Jones, RB, $5^{\text {Th }}$ Round, 2017

When the Packers selected Aaron Jones in the $5^{\text {th }}$ round of the 2017 draft ( $182^{\text {nd }}$ overall), nobody can surely have expected the small running back out of UTEP to develop into the player that he has become. Remember that he wasn't even the first running back that the Packers selected in that draft (Jamaal Williams was chosen a round earlier). But in his 6 year Packers career, Jones has put up numbers which have lifted him close to the top of the franchise's alltime lists - he is the $3^{\text {rd }}$ on the team's rushing list with 5,284 yards and 43 rushing touchdowns. How high Jones will end up climbing remains to be seen, but he already qualifies as one of the Packers greatest draft day steals.

## 13. Mark Chmura, TE, $6^{\text {th }}$ Round, 1992

The Packers 1992 draft was dominated by the trade of a $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick to Atlanta by Brett Favre and by the selection of an undersized corner from Florida State - Terrell Buckley. Hidden down the draft, in the $6^{\text {th }}$ round, was the choice of Mark Chmura with the $157^{\text {th }}$ overall pick. The Packers already had long-time favourite Ed West and speedy Jackie Harris on the roster, so Chmura wasn't expected to come in and make an immediate impact.

But by 1994, Chmura was the starter, and he took Packers play at the tight end spot to a level not seen for at least a decade (when Paul Coffman was the starter). Chmura would earn 3 Pro Bowl appearances and be an integral part of the Super Bowl XXXI winning roster. He finished his Packers career in $3^{\text {rd }}$ place (now $5^{\text {th }}$ ) in receptions by a tight end (188) and in $5^{\text {th }}$ place (now $7^{\text {th }}$ ) for receiving yards by a tight end $(2,253)$.

Chmura was inducted into the Packers Hall of Fame in 2010.

## 14. Phillip Epps, WR, $12^{\text {TH }}$ Round, 1982

Epps appearing on this list may be a surprise to many, but considering he was the $321^{\text {st }}$ selection in the 1982 draft, his level of play and statistics in an uncertain era of Packers history more than justify his appearance.

Epps was a small, speedy and shifty receiver out of TCU, who played 7 seasons for the Packers (1982-88), notching up 192 receptions for 2,884 yards and 14 touchdowns. He was also a return man of some prowess, which included returning a punt 90 yards for touchdown. While Epps was never a Pro Bowl player he was a good football player who heavily outweighed the expectations of a player selected with the $321^{\text {st }}$ pick. Those 192 receptions still place him in $13^{\text {th }}$ place amongst Packers wide receivers all-time and make him a worthy member of this list.

## 15. Scott Wells, C/G, $7^{\text {th }}$ Round, 2004

I'm not certain that Wells should even qualify for this list - he was drafted by the Packers out of Tennessee in the $7^{\text {th }}$ round of the 2004 draft, being the $251^{\text {st }}$ overall pick but he was waived by Green Bay just prior to the 2004 season before being re-signed (originally to the Practice Squad and then the active roster). So, for all intense and purposes, Wells became a street free agent before the Packers re-signed him - nonetheless, this our list, with our rules (!) and he makes it.

Wells lacked some size and especially height for a modern day offensive lineman, and this is one of the reasons that he remained on the draft board until the $7^{\text {th }}$ round. He became an underrated center and guard for the Packers from 2004 through to 2011 - playing in 111 games and starting exactly 100 , the vast majority of which came at the center position. Wells was a solid force in the middle of the Packers line, being a key member of the Super Bowl XLV winning team and was good enough to earn a Pro Bowl selection after the 2011 season.

## INTRODUCING OUR BIG BOARD

This year, our Big Board has increased in size again to incorporate our Top 350 players eligible for the draft.

Here are some things to know about our Top 350:

## It's our Top 350 - not a prediction of the draft order

Our Top 350 isn't necessarily the order in which we think players will be picked - teams will have reasons for (e.g. positional need) to select players in a different order to how we see it but it does reflect our view of the relative strength of the players available in this draft regardless of position.

A great example of the above point is Will Levis (QB, Kentucky) who we have ranked $16^{\text {th }}$ overall, but we actually expect that he'll probably get selected higher than this - perhaps as high as the top 5 overall.

## Creating the Top 350

To create our Top 350 players (and our Position-by-Position Rankings), we ranked players as follows:

- Watching and compiling notes on players during their college career. This is done over a number of years, by watching game film and other film that may be widely available.
- Film that we watched since the conclusion of the college football season, zeroing in on players on our draft watch list.
- The combine / pro days - these tend not to change too much what our view already is but may reinforce what we already know or indeed encourage us to re-visit film.
- Confirmed injury reports and/or off-the-field concerns reports from reputable public domain sources - making our best judgement as to what impact, if any, this may have on a player's draft chances or status.
- We look at players from a general view and a Packers perspective

Note: Rankings by other draft analysts and fans don't in themselves change our rankings or our view of players - we prefer what we see on film. However, they may encourage us to re-visit film where appropriate.


## Player Info Card

For each of the players that we have created a one page profile for there is a Player Info Card which provides some basic information pertaining to that player and their position in this draft. Here is an example, with an explanation.

There will be one of 3 icons here or often no icon at all.
The 3 icons that may be found here are listed below


There may be a position listed here. This is usually to differentiate players in the same group e.g. centers and guards in the interior offensive
line group.

The player's spot on our draft board as it relates to his position group and the overall board is shown here.

The round in which we think the player should $\qquad$ Round 2-3 be selected is here.

## List of Icons



Indicates that a player has been on the rise in the last few weeks usually due to an outstanding combine, pro day, or positive clarification over a previous injury concern.

Indicates that a player has been falling in the last few weeks usually due to a poor combine, pro day, or perhaps or a new injury or negative news over a previous injury concern.

Indicates that a player currently has, or has had, a significant injury
concern such that he appears in our "Injury Watchlist" section which can be found later in this Draft Guide.

## Packers Watchlist

We've included our Packers Watchlist again this year, however this year we've changed it slightly, creating two lists - in essence a primary list and a secondary list. The players in these lists can be seen in our Position-by-Position Player Profiles, as follows:

- On their profile page, players whose name is in a GREEN box, rather than red, are part of the primary watch list
- On their profile page, players whose name is in a GOLD box, rather than red, are part of the secondary watch list.

Players appear on our Packers Watchlist because they may have a special interest for the Packers. These are players who generally meet one or more of the following criteria:

- There's a decent chance they'll be available when the Packers pick.
- They meet some/all of the criteria the Packers are likely to use e.g. outstanding athletic ability
- We like them either because they are just good players or perhaps because they bring something that the Packers don't already have
- It's possibly a position of need for the Packers at that point in the draft

For ease and to help with the Packers Watchlist, we've also included the complete watchlist on the following page.

## Round by Round Board (Rounds 1 to Round 3-4)

Leading up to previous drafts we have posted our Round by Round Draft Boards - Offense and Defense - as pictures on Social Media (Facebook and twitter). This year, for the first time, we have included them in this draft guide.

We hope you enjoy them. We use them all the time on draft day to more easily track the best players still available by position. They may be useful to print off as a guide.

## And finally...

We do our best! We do not have access to all of the information that many larger organisations have. Nor do we have the resources to be able to keep on top of every change in a player's status or every piece of information that may be important. But we do our very best and are proud of generally how accurate we are.

We know that the Top 350 Big Board is one of the most eagerly awaited parts of this guide. We hope that you find it interesting and useful.

## QUARTERBACKS

2023 General Draft Outlook: Four QBs (Bryce Young, C.J. Stroud, Anthony Richardson and Will Levis) are likely to be taken in the first half of the $1^{\text {st }}$ round, with perhaps the first three of them in that list going in the top 5 . Quite which of them goes to which team will depend upon on each of the teams most likely to select them - Carolina, Houston and Indianapolis being three of the most likely teams - and what they specifically like in each one. The fifth QB, Hendon Hooker, will likely be off the board in round 2 , but could yet sneak into round 1.

After the five QBs mentioned above, the next three who may be selected in the middle rounds are Tanner McKee, Jaren Hall and Jake Haener.

The next group of quarterbacks are likely to be selected in the second half of day 3, this group includes Max Duggan, 2 time National Champion Stetson Bennett, Aidan O'Connell and Dorian Thompson-Robinson. Thompson-Robinson divides opinion however, with some believing that he'll be off the board somewhat earlier. Also watch out for Tyson Bagent of Division II Shepherd - a team may take a chance on the talented, record-breaking, passer.


Packers Outlook: Yet again, the QB position has been the main talking point in the Packers offseason, this time of course revolving around Aaron Rodgers' proposed trade to the New York Jets. At the time of writing, the trade still hadn't taken place, but we are assuming that it does. That being the case, Jordan Love, the team's $20201^{\text {st }}$ round draft choice, will finally get his shot to be nail down being the Packers future at the position.

This leaves the Packers currently with just one other QB on the roster - Danny Etling. Whilst it seems likely that the Packers will try and sign a veteran back-up before camp, it also seems highly possible that they will draft a developmental guy in the middle to late rounds - any of the likes of Clayton Tune, Jaren Hall or Jake Haener would not be a surprise choice for Green Bay.

Deals with pass rush pressure really well, and is not afraid to stay in the pocket and go through his progressions in order to make the play. Isnt an oustanding runner, but is mobile enough to avoid the rush and get the pass off on the move. Will use his legs to run when he has to.

Has so much going for him but there is the question of his size - unfortunately, there's no getting away from the fact that he is undersized in comparison to the prototypical pro QB.

Suffered a shoulder injury which constrained him a little bit for a few weeks in 2022 and forced him to miss 1 game. However, there are no reported ongoing issues.

Young is an ultra-productive quarterback who knows how to win the big game. Although he doesn't have a huge arm, it's good enough and his football intelligence makes up for it - he knows when and where to throw the football and when to take off and make yards with his legs. Some teams will undoubtedly have an issue with his lack of size and that is a genuine concern, however in recent years NFL teams have been more prepared to look past that if the player has many of the other traits that they look for in an NFL passer - and Young does. Expect him to be off the board in the top 3 overall, quite possibly no. 1 overall.

Stroud is an outstanding pro prospect with prototypical NFL QB size and a really nice arm and quick release. He is an excellent passer of the football with the capability to make every throw. Is extremely accurate with very good ball placement - and he is careful with the football not throwing many interceptions. Has good athletic ability, a little mobility and nice footwork in the pocket. However, he isn't as effective outside the pocket and throwing on the move.

Stroud isn't a Lamar Jackson type runner but can will pick up yards with his legs if needed. Interestingly he hangs onto the football waiting for plays to develop perhaps too long before taking off with the football - this is unusual in a pro prospect, as one of the normal criticisms would be that a quarterback prospect takes off too quickly.

Had a nagging shoulder injury in early 2021 season which caused him issues and forced him to miss 1 game. No reported ongoing issues.

He should be off the board in the top 3 overall this time round, indeed he will likely vie with Bryce Young to be the first quarterback chosen in this draft- it probably will all depend on exactly what the selecting team is looking for as to whether they pick Stroud or Young.

Richardson has prototypical NFL quarterback size with a huge arm and a smooth, polished, and quick release. His throwing motion really is something to behold. However, he can also be an inconsistent thrower and particularly needs to work on his accuracy and ball placement especially when passing on the move.

Richardson has outstanding physical presence coupled with the mobility to get outside the pocket and take off and run - picking up huge yardage with his legs. He truly is a dual threat to any defense that faces him.

Richardson is an all-round, dynamic, super exciting, big play maker who lacks experience - was only a one-year starter in college and hardly played in the two years previous to that.

An injured shoulder ended his senior season in high school (2019). No subsequent reported injury history.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

The exciting Richardson's decision to enter this draft with eligibility remaining may be surprising but given his skillset and the possible strength of the 2024 draft at the QB position he may have considered this year as the best year. Teams are going to be enamoured with the mixture of his arm, athleticism, size and strength - as he demonstrated at the combine. Having just a single year as a college starter will be of concern to some and will likely ensure that he is selected by a team that is looking for him to sit for a year (or two) before taking over as the starter. Teams are also likely to want to reign back on his propensity to run, which may in time increase his risk of getting injury. Richardson's aforementioned skills and physical ability mean that Richardson has the potential to be an outstanding NFL QB. Whether he can develop into that will be question that potential suitors will have to ask themselves - nonetheless, he's off the board in the first few picks overall.

## WILL LEVIS (Kentucky)

High School: Levis had a productive high school career in Massachusetts, playing football and baseball.

College: Levis opted to attend Penn State to play his college football. After redshirting in 2018, he was a back-up to fellow potential draftee Sean Clifford in 2019 (making 1 start) and again in 2020 (making another start). With his opportunities limited, Levis then opted to transfer from the Nittany Lions to Kentucky between the 2020 and 2021 seasons. Started every game for Kentucky in 2021, having a very nice season. Followed that up with a good, if sometimes inconsistent, 2022 - although that inconsistency is likely to have been caused by multiple injuries that he battled through for much of the season.

Is big and strong and will challenge would be tacklers to bring him down. Couples this strength with good mobility and the ability to avoid the rush but sometimes this gets him into trouble when takes off too early without going through his progressions.

Suffered from foot (turf toe) and shoulder injuries throughout much of the 2022 season although he continued to play before finally sitting out the season ending Motor City Bowl.

First thing to say - Levis will be selected higher than we have him ranked. He has a huge arm, really good size, the strength to shake off defenders and the toughness to play through pain. And yet, question marks remain. In particular, the facts that his resume lacks the statement game against a big school and that his 2022 season wasn't the break-out exceptional year that many expected (although injuries didn't help). If Levis can develop then he has all of the physical traits to be a superstar quarterback in the NFL and because such players come around infrequently, he's likely to be off the board early in round 1.

## HENDON HOOKER (Tennessee)

High School: Hooker was a dual threat QB in high school in North Carolina, passing for over 6,000 yards and rushing for nearly 3,000. Also had 48 passing TDs with a further 48 on the ground.

College: Opted to attend Virginia Tech, where he started 15 games across 2019 and 2020. Transferred to Tennessee for 2021, earning

Hooker has an outstanding arm with the ability to throw deep and with touch. Is also careful with the football, not throwing many interceptions. Does however need some work on his mechanics and his vision to see the whole field.

Unfortunately, Hooker suffered a torn ACL in November 2022, ending his season and possibly will keep him out for 9-12 months. Is also over 25 years old.

Hooker has many of the traits that NFL teams are looking for in an NFL quarterback, although there is a little work to do on certain mechanics. One of the Keys for him will obviously be the recovery schedule from the ACL injury - this injury (which kept him from taking part in the drills at the combine), coupled with his age, will likely see him drop into day 2 of the draft (even further if the ACL isn't recovering well). However if a team is prepared to be patient, then Hooker still has the potential to be a successful NFL starter a couple of years or so down the line.

## TANNER McKEE (Stanford)

High School: McKee overcame melanoma to have a highly successful high school career in California.

College: Opted to stay close to home and play his college ball at Stanford. Following attendance at an LDS mission, he played in just 1 game in 2020 before winning the starting QB job in 2021 performing excellently in the first half of the season before injuries saw him struggle down the stretch. However, he led a come from behind victory against then no. 3 Oregon which brought McKee's name to the forefront of national observers. Came back again as the starter in 2022, again with up and down results. Opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

McKee is strong and tough and has outstanding physical attributes, not least his combination of height and weight which is close to the ideal for an NFL QB. He couples these physical advantages with a super strong arm, a nice release and seemingly the ability to make all the throws from inside the pocket. When in rhythm, McKee can get on a roll during a game completing pass after pass.

He is a pure pocket passer without great mobility though and therefore can struggle if faced with a heavy pass rush or if flushed. And while this is generally true of many quarterbacks it seems exacerbated a little in McKee. Won't beat teams with his legs and this part of his game isn't likely to worry defenses.

Suffered a wrist injury that forced him to miss a couple of games in 2021. Has no reported major injury history.

McKee had the chance to return to school for the 2023 season and may be taking a little bit of a chance by declaring for the draft this time around - could probably have done with another year in college to hone his skills. McKee has lots of traits that the pros love including prototypical size and excellent arm strength - although some might see him as a little static. Despite the lack of consistent top-notch success at the college level coupled with not staying in school another year, we can expect McKee to be off the board probably on day 2 or early on day 3 - picked by a team who has time to develop his skills. Could develop into a long time NFL starter and even Pro Bowl level quarterback.

## JAKE HAENER (Fresno State)

High School: Had a record setting high school career in California.
College: Haener opted to attend the Washington to play his college ball. Redshirted his freshman season for the Huskies (2017), before seeing minimal action as a backup in 2018. With his opportunities limited at Washington, he transferred to Fresno State prior to the 2019 season - although he had to sit out that season due to the NCAA transfer rules in place at the time. Finally became a starting college QB in the Covid-19 impacted 2020 season and had an excellent year. Followed that with another outstanding year as the starter in 2021 - playing through an injured hip. Considered transferring out of Fresno State between the 2021 and 2022 seasons before changing his mind and returning for another very good (2022)

Haener is a productive passer who is consistent and extremely accurate - knowing how to find the open receiver and hit him early, thanks to good mechanics, a quick release and very decisive decision making. Makes the short and underneath throws well and with touch when needed.

He also has poise in the pocket, with footwork that enables him to move just enough to avoid the rush. Is also super tough and will hang in the pocket long enough to make a play. However, Haener doesn't have a huge arm and lacks the prototypical size that NFL scouts like.

He is also not overly mobile and won't beat you with his legs. At over 24 years old, his age probably counts against him also.

2022 Suffered an ankle injury which saw him miss 4 games early in the season. 2021 Had a hip injury in 2021 but played through it (even if perhaps he shouldn't have).

Hall is a super athlete, who has been able to beat teams at the college level with both his arm and legs. While his running ability is so good, that on occasion can work against him as he may take off and run too quickly - rather than hanging in the pocket, going through all of his progressions and letting the play develop.

His mobility helps him in the pockets and as a pure passer, Hall is consistent with a really good arm, a decent release and is an accurate thrower of the ball - doesn't make many mistakes. Is able to make most of the throws.

However, Hall is undersized and has an injury history. Is also one of the oldest quarterbacks in this draft at over 25 years of age. .

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Hall's true dual threat ability and productivity as a passer and runner, coupled with his really nice arm will intrigue NFL teams. On his day he can beat teams with his arm or legs. However, his lack of size coupled with both his injury history and age will work against him. But it will just take one team to believe that he can be productive quickly or be used as a "special play" type QB (a la Taysom Hill) for him to be given a shot - and therefore expect him to be off the board in the first half of day 3.

## MAX DUGGAN (TCU)

High School: Duggan had a very productive high school career in QB \#9

College: Opted to play his college ball at TCU. Won the starting job at early in his freshman season (2019) and role that he kept in another sound season in 2020. Had a good season in 2021 but not enough to keep his job heading into 2022. Duggan was benched prior to the 2022 season but regained the starting QB role when Chandler Morris went down injured in the very first game - Duggan rebounded by having his best season - winning multiple honours along the way and leading TCU to the CFP National Championship Game.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons (2019-22) at TCU, Duggan played in 47 games ( 43 starts), completing $60.3 \%$ of his passes for 9,618 yards and 73 touchdowns with 28 interceptions. Had 7 career 300 -yard passing games. Also rushed 488 times for 1,856 yards ( 3.8 average) and 28 touchdowns. Had 5 career 100-yard rushing games. Also caught 2 passes for 1 yard.

Duggan lacks the prototypical size of an NFL quarterback but that doesn't hold him back in terms of competitiveness and character. Duggan is a tough operator who will hang in the pocket to try and make the play. Also has the athletic ability to take off and make plays with his legs.

He has a strong arm, without a hugely speedy release. Has decent accuracy on short and intermediate throws but needs to work on accuracy on the long ball. Wants to make plays and sometimes tries to force the ball.

2021 Played most of the season with multiple foot injuries - he had surgery after the season was complete. 2020 A heart condition (which he was born with) required surgery prior to the 2020 season.

Duggan's story is one of triumphing over adversity - he overcome illness, injury and being benched to deliver an outstanding 2022 and put himself into contention for this draft. Pro teams will love his toughness, competitiveness and attitude. They will also love his athleticism and ability to pick yardage with his legs as well as through the air. However, as a passer there are a number of areas that will be of concern - including his size, consistency, decision making and ability to throw long. Duggan clearly has some areas that will require development, but he has enough for teams to take a shot on him. Likely to be off the board late on day 3.

## DORIAN THOMPSON-ROBINSON (UCLA)

Misc: Known as "DTR".
High School: Was a dual-threat QB in high school in Nevada, at the same high school as CB Kyu Blu Kelly who is also likely to be selected in this draft.

College: Opted to play his college ball at UCLA. Started the majority of games in his freshman season (2018). In 2019 he became the permanent full-time starter under center - missing only 2 games due to injury in the remainder of his college career. 3 times he earned some all-conference notice (2020, 2021 and 2022), with his performance getting better each successive year.

DTR is an undersized dual threat QB who is a fine athlete. He is very tough and will take off and run and find the end zone with his legs, but he takes way more hits than you'd like to see. Unfortunately, with those hits has come a propensity to fumble - 28 during his UCLA career. His body isn't really built to take huge amounts of punishment.

Has a decent arm and release. He is a solid passer when he makes quick decisions and gets the ball out equally quickly, However, when throwing under pressure he gets much less accurate and can get into trouble. Also, doesn't throw long with consistent accuracy.

He will divide opinion with many having him higher on their boards than we do. Right now, the questions outweigh the answers for us, and we think he'll be a late round draft pick but as we often say, it only takes 1 team to fall in with love his skills and potential, for him to go higher.

## AIDAN O'CONNELL (Purdue)

High School: was a dual-sport athlete in high school in Illinois, playing basketball as well as football.

College: Didn't receive any scholarship offers from FBS schools (had an offer from Division II Davenport University) and flirted with Division III Wheaton College before finally deciding to walk on at Purdue. Didn't see the field in either 2017 (redshirted his true freshman season) or 2018 (back-up but didn't play). Started 3 games with some success in each of 2019 and 2020. Finally became the fulltime starter early in 2021, having a 3,000 yard season and earning all-conference recognition. Had a similar season in 2022, again earning all-conference notice.

He's not going to escape from the pocket and consistently trouble defenses.

However, O'Connell is tough. He will stand in the pocket, go through his progressions and take the hit in order to get the pass off. And while he's not overly mobile, his footwork will help him move and avoid some of the rush. Is an accurate passer on short and intermediate passes with good ball placement.

Missed 1 game in 2022 due to an undisclosed injury.

O'Connell's lack of great mobility nor his age (he'll be 25 by the time the 2023 season) doesn't help his draft case either. On the plus side, he put up a good showing at the East-West Shrine Game, which helps his status. Will probably be a late pick on day 3 and will battle in camp for a no. 3 or practice squad spot.

Expect Bennett to be selected at some point on day 3 , by a team looking for a $3^{\text {rd }}$ string quarterback to potentially develop into a long-term NFL back-up.

High School: Tune had a fine high school career in Plano, Texas as a mobile quarterback who threw for nearly 7,000 yards while rushing for more than 1,000.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Kansas before changing that commitment to play at the University of Houston. As a true freshman for the Cougars (2018), Tune saw a little action early and started the final two games of the season. The following season he started the majority of games playing pretty well. Became the fulltime starter in 2020, having a second straight good season. Starting earning some postseason honours after a fine 2021, which he followed with an outstandingly productive 2022 - both passing and rushing.

Bagent grades out as a likely undrafted free agent, but he may just intrigue NFL scouts enough to sneak into the back end of day 3.

## RUNNING BACKS

2023 General Draft Outlook: As has been the case in recent years, don't expect a plethora of running backs to be selected in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round of this draft - teams no longer like to spend a premium pick at the position, with an average of only 1.2 being selected in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round in each of the last 10 years. However, there is one running back in this draft that we should expect to go on day 1, and that's Bijan Robinson of Texas. Robinson is the best prospect at this position in a few years, at least since Saquon Barkley was drafted by the Giants in 2018.

The only other back with an outside chance of sneaking into round 1 is Alabama's speedster Jahmyr Gibbs, but it seems more likely that he'll get picked early in round 2.

This is a class of running backs that's quite deep in talent as we get into days 2 and 3 . It's possible that we may see another 5-6 running backs taken on day 2, led by the likes of Zach Charbonnet, Devon Achane, Zach Evans and Tyjae Spears. For teams looking for a receiving back, Georgia's Kenny McIntosh may be the pick.

The later rounds will see a mixture of big backs and smaller shifty backs available. Some of the players we can expect to see drafted in round 3 include Roschon Johnson, Chase Brown and Eric Gray.


Packers Outlook: With Aaron Jones' contract having been restructured this off-season and with A.J. Dillon also on the roster there doesn't appear to be an immediate need for the Packers to be drafting at this position early. The current no. 3 running back on the Packers roster is the intriguing Patrick Taylor, with Tyler Goodson also pushing for a spot.

Still, it wouldn't be a surprise to see Green Bay use one of the middle or late round picks at the position just to take a look and see. Somebody like the aforementioned Kenny McIntosh, Roschon Johnson or Israel Abanikanda could be a possibility here.

Is a truly outstanding receiver coming out of the backfield. He gets open and has really good hands. Knows how to be patient and wait for his blockers on screen passes. He is perhaps the best receiving back in this entire draft. Is also a fine kick returner.

High School: Achane was a super dual-sport athlete in high school in Texas, excelling at both track ( 100 m up to 800 m ) and football.

College: Opted to stay in state and play his college ball at Texas A\&M. Contributed as a back-up and return man as a freshman (2020) before getting the opportunity to up his contribution which he did as a sophomore. Went over 1,000 yards rushing as a junior in 2022. Decided to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

His ability to turn any open field play into a huge gain will be so tempting. Add his versatility and you have a potential NFL superstar. Some teams will, of course, be put off by his lack of size, particularly those that want an every down, tough and powerful runner - however, even for those teams a change of pace back with Achane's skills is surely still a must have. If he were bigger, Achane would likely be a $1^{\text {st }}$ round candidate - even in the days of teams shying away from $1^{\text {st }}$ round RBs. At his size, we should expect Achane to be selected on Day 2.

## ZACH CHARBONNET (UCLA)

High School: Rushed for 4,741 yards and scored 62 touchdowns in RB \#4 high school in California.

College: Was highly recruited, opting to attend the University of Michigan. Played well in 2019, albeit having recovered from spring knee surgery which may have slowed him a little. Like many players/teams, his 2020 season was disrupted and reduced by the pandemic. Opted to transfer from Michigan to UCLA between the 2020 and 2021 seasons. Had an excellent 2021 season for the Bruins and followed it up with an even better 2022.

College Stats: In 2 seasons at Michigan, Charbonnet played in 18 games ( 9 starts), rushing for 850 yards ( 5.1 average) and 12 touchdowns. Had 2 100-yard rushing games. Also caught 14 passes for 71 yards ( 5.1 average) and 0 touchdowns.

Some had concerns about this receiving ability, but there's little doubt that he has been developing in this regard as he is utilised more, to the point where he is an asset in this area. Expect Charbonnet to be selected on Day 2.

## TYJAE SPEARS (Tulane)

High School: Spears had a fine high school career in Louisiana as an all-round rushing and receiving threat.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Tulane over other offers. Spears played sparingly in his first two seasons at Tulane - he redshirted in 2019 playing in just 5 games, and then he appeared in just 3 games in 2020 as an injury cut his season short. Appears to be a player who is improving each year as he gets more snaps - this will encourage pro scouts that there is more to come. Will suit a team that utilises a straight ahead, between the tackles, running game. Didn't have much production in the passing game at the college level and this is something that will need to be developed in the pros. Also, Miller's recovery from the sprained MCL he suffered late in the 2022 season will be a factor in his draft status. Likely to be selected in the middle rounds - round 3 or 4.

McBride was a super productive college back, albeit at a "lower" level of FBS football than many backs on this draft list - some may question whether he can repeat his production at the pro level. This, coupled with his virtual non-existence in the passing game will likely see him drop down many draft boards. Missing the opportunity to show what he can do at his pro day (due to a hamstring injury) was unfortunate. Nonetheless, he is going to get a shot to be a back-up initially in the NFL - his long term future is likely to depend upon him developing some pass catching skills. Should be off the board on early on day 3.

High School: Tucker was a dual sport athlete in high school in Maryland, competing in track and field ( $100 \mathrm{~m}, 200 \mathrm{~m}$ ) as well as football.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Syracuse. Had a good freshman season (2020) as a part-time starter before truly breaking out the following year - breaking the school's all-time single season rushing mark (Tucket had 1,496 rushing yards). Returned in 2022 with another 1,000-yard season, although wasn't quite as productive as the previous year. Vaughn is an outstanding receiver both running routes coming out of the backfield and lining up in the slot. Knows how to get open, is patient on screens and has excellent hands. Not great in pass protection, where his lack of size is a problem.

Broke out in his third college season (2021) going over 1,000 yards rushing and earning some all-conference notice. Earned all-conference notice again in 2022, when he rushed for more than 900 yards and had 55 receptions. Underclassman who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

Hull is a hugely prolific and very versatile receiver. Finds the open spaces coming out of the backfield but can also line up as a wideout and in the slot - creating a match-up nightmare for defenses.

Also has a little bit of experience as a kick returner.

Hull is a sound and reliable runner who runs with consistency between the tackles. Can be used to pound the football if required. Is an outstanding receiver both coming out of the backfield and split out (in the slot and wide) - which can create match-up difficulties for defenses. Hull probably needs to be drafted by a team that runs the right style of offense or he could be one of those guys that rapidly falls off the scene. But in that right system being fed the football, Hull could be a good back at the NFL level. Probably will be selected late in the draft - rounds 6 or 7 seem the most likely.

Likely late round draft choice. Small back. Suffered an achilles injury early in the 2021 season. Bounced back with an outstanding 2022 in which he rushed for 1,6594 yards. Across his career with the Gophers, Ibrahim rushed for 4,957 yards (5.4 average) and 52 touchdowns. In contrast, he caught only 22 passes in the whole of his college career. While be around 25 years old when the 2023 NFL season starts.

Age: 24.63. Ht: 5-8. Wt: 203. 40: n/a. Is \#215 overall on our board.

## 19. Keaton Mitchell (East Carolina)

Likely late round draft choice. Very small and speedy back. Named to Bruce Feldman's Freak List in 2022. Underclassman who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school. Had over 1,000 yards rushing in each of 2021 and 2022 and was selected $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-AAC in each of those seasons. Finished his East Carolina career with 3,027 rushing yards ( 6.5 average) and 25 touchdowns. Also had 60 career receptions. Was used occasionally on kick-off returns.

Age: 21.27. Ht: 5-7 $7 / 8$. Wt: 179. 40: 4.38. Is \#216 overall on our board.

## 20. Chris Rodriguez Jr. (Kentucky)

Likely late round draft choice. Excellent between the tackles runner. Has had problems with fumbles, this is something that he needs to clear up at the pro level or he won't last as long as his talent otherwise suggests he should. Rushed for 3,644 yards ( 6.2 average) and 32 touchdowns in his Kentucky career. Can pound the football, averaging nearly 22 carries per game in 2022. Is a little bit one dimensional as he wasn't used much as a receiver - catching only 20 passes while in college.

## 21. Camerun Peoples (Appalachian State)

Likely either a $7^{\text {th }}$ round pick or undrafted free agent. Had a torn ACL in 2019 which forced him to miss the majority of the season. Is a ground and pound type back who can be physically imposing but lacks great speed and acceleration. Finished his career at Appalachian State with 2,830 rushing yards ( 6.2 average) and 33 touchdowns. Wasn't used as a receiver, catching only 11 career passes.

Age: 23.62. Ht: 6-1 $3 / 8$. Wt: 217. 40: 4.61. Is \#266 overall on our board.

## FULLBACKS

The Fullback position which has, in recent years, often seen itself bundled in with tight ends and H -backs when it comes to the draft, makes a welcome return to our guide this year. While there are not that many true fullbacks to discuss, it seemed appropriate to separate the position back out again. It least for this year.

2023 General Draft Outlook: The outstanding performer at the fullback spot in this draft is North Dakota State's Hunter Luepke. Luepke is an all-round fullback who is an excellent runner with the football. At the next level he may become more of a blocking h-back type, but we'll see. He's going to be a day 3 pick as the overall value that teams give to fullbacks generally isn't high, but he could turn out to be a steal for somebody.

The other true fullbacks available in this draft, but likely not to be selected, are Javon Williams Jr., Monte Pottebaum and Jack Colletto.


Packers Outlook: The Packers have a history over the past decade or more of utilising the "blocking" fullback in their offense. Remember the contributions of John Kuhn, Korey Hall and Aaron Ripkowski to the team's success? (some may also point to the outstanding William Henderson in the 90s and early 2000s).

The current Packers regime also seems to like the position, if they can get right the guy to fit the mould - a very recent Packers fullback who comes to mind is Danny Vitale.

So having established that the Packers may be prepared to go down the fullback route, who might it be?

And the answer is simple, the only fullback worth a selection in this draft is Hunter Luepke. He's a more of a ball carrier than some of the names mentioned above, however he's also an allrounder who can catch and block as well. He may just pique the interest of the Packers.

## HUNTER LUEPKE (North Dakota State)

Luepke is a well-built back who performed a range of roles for NDSU. Most notably he was a pulverising inside runner who hit defenders as hard as they hit him. But as well as carrying the football, Luepke also lined up as a tight end, fullback and H -Back spots.

Will catch the ball coming out of the backfield - he has good hands and knows how to get open. Is also a willing blocker in the running game. Has lots of excellent special teams experience.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Luepke was used as a multi-purpose ball carrier at NDSU; however, he is likely to need to develop as a blocker if NFL teams intend to use him as a multi-purpose blocking full-back and H -Back type. The good news is that he already has nice receiving skills and will contribute on special teams immediately. His second shoulder injury (which kept him out of the Senior Bowl and combine drills) will undoubtedly be of concern to NFL medical staff, but assuming all is ok we can expect Luepke to be selected somewhere towards the back-end of day 3.

## WIDE RECEIVERS

2023 General Draft Outlook: We have been spoiled in the last 3 years when it comes to the quality of wide receivers being available in the draft. 17 have been selected in the last three $1^{\text {st }}$ rounds, an average of 5.67 each year. But that's not likely to be the case this year - while the 2023 class is still pretty deep, it isn't as strong at the very top.

There are three wide receivers who seem very likely to be selected in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round this time around - Jaxson Smith Njigba, Jordan Addison and Quentin Johnston - although in which order they get picked is anybody's guess. Certainly, it's not likely that any of them are off the board until about the middle of the round.

The next couple of receivers - Zay Flowers and Jalin Hyatt - should be chosen early in round 2, with a chance that one of them could sneak into the back end of round 1 , if there is a team looking for a wideout at that spot. They are followed by a group that most likely will go on day 2 - including Josh Downs, Rashee Rice, Cedric Tillman and A.T. Perry.


Packers Outlook: The Packers enter this draft with only two spots definitely solidified at the position - Christian Watson and Romeo Doubs - and another spot probably taken, by Samori Toure. But all three of these guys are heading into just their second years in the NFL. The only other receivers on the off-season roster are Bo Melton and Jeff Cotton. Veteran help would be really useful here.

In addition to veteran help, the Packers seem certain to turn to this draft to get more help. That could happen as early as the $1^{\text {st }}$ round - if so, any of the aforementioned Smith-Njigba, Addison or Johnston could be the pick here. If they don't go wideout in round 1 but come to the position in the following couple of rounds then a Rashee Rice or Cedric Tillman could be a nice pick. Later in the draft, Jonathan Mingo, Michael Wilson or Andrei losivas may fit the profile of a Packers' type receiver.

Smith-Njigba played first and foremost in the slot at OSU and demonstrated really good feet, explosion, and an excellent release off the line of scrimmage. He coupled this with the ability to run really good routes in the short and underneath areas - he knows how to get open. Doesn't have blazing speed but is sneaky fast and couples this with those route running skills to get deep more often than you might expect.

Has really good hands and a nice catch radius with the ability to pull in off target passes. Will also fight and make the contested catch. Is excellent with the ball in his hands and will make good yardage after the catch.

Concerns about Smith-Njigba will whether he can be more than a slot guy at the next level, and his lack of experience, mainly caused by his injury history - had a hamstring injury which meant that he played just 3 games in 2022.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

In essence, only had 1 season (2021) in which he had the full opportunity to show what he could do. Played the first 2 years of his college career as part of the OSU receiving corps which also included Garrett Wilson and Chris Olave (both $20221^{\text {st }}$ round picks) - and yet he didn't play second fiddle to those guys. Played much of his time in the slot, but also played some on the outside. Teams will like his skills, athletic ability and especially the way he simply makes plays - providing they can see past the question about playing just 1 full year and also whether they see him only as a slot guy. But make no mistake, Smith-Njigba is a very talented receiver, and we should expect him to be off the board midway through the $1^{\text {st }}$ round.

High School: Johnston was a star high school player in Texas.
College: Opted to play his college ball in-state at TCU having switched his commitment from the University of Texas. Made a big splash in his freshman season (2020) at TCU as a deep threat. Followed that up with another good year, again demonstrating his deep threat capability. Had an outstanding 2022, which included a huge game in the National Championship Playoff Semi-final against Michigan. Opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: Played in 32 games for TCU. Caught 115 passes for 2,190 yards ( 19.0 average) and 14 touchdowns. Had 9 career 100yard receiving games. Also rushed 8 times for 8 yards (1.0 average) and 2 touchdowns.

Johnston is fine physical specimen, with a great combination of speed, acceleration, size, and length - with a nice catch radius. Although utilising his strength and power hasn't been the forte of his game as a receiver to this point. However, he has demonstrated that strength when breaking tackles and adding yards after the catch on crossing routes.

Johnston has been an outstanding, explosive, deep threat, making the most of his speed and his long striding acceleration enabling him to get open and make big plays. For a big man, Johnston has nice feet and some release skills at the line of scrimmage, although he isn't yet the most refined of route runners (small route tree) particularly short and underneath.

Johnston hasn't yet been quite as productive as his undoubted talents suggest that he should be, and his hands are not yet as consistent as need to be.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Johnston brings size and length to the wide receiver class in this draft - a draft that, generally speaking, lacks those attributes amongst wideouts. Whilst he doesn't always appear to fully utilise those physical advantages, this can be developed in Johnston. NFL scouts will love his speed, acceleration and ability to get open - he is a true deep threat who will make huge plays and open up the underneath routes for his fellow receivers by stretching the field. For such a great athlete with his skills, there is the feeling with Johnston that his productivity has only just scratched the surface of what it could be. Expect him to be selected somewhere in the middle of the $1^{\text {st }}$ round, by a team that believes they can develop him. He will challenge Jaxson SmithNjigba and Jordan Addison to be the first receiver off the board.

## JORDAN ADDISON (USC)

Nonetheless, he is really good at making extra yards after the catch - isn't afraid to run crossing routes which will take him over the middle and deliver big plays. Has some experience running jet sweeps and reverses.

Missed 3 games during the 2022 season due to a nagging lower leg/ankle injury. There is no indication of any long-term issue.

Expect him to be selected in the middle of Round 1 and could potentially be the first receiver chosen.

One of the attributes that really stands out with Flowers is his quick first step and release at the line of scrimmage, which he then doubles up on by running excellent routes. He has the knack for being able to get open at all levels. Has really good hands and the ability to catch all of the passes while on the move, not breaking stride even if the pass is not perfect.

Outstanding with the football after the catch, making defenders miss with his quickness and movement skills. Also has good experience running with the football - can be used on jet sweeps and reverses.

Somehow, Flowers had been flying under the radar of some observers, but they may have changed after he had a really nice week at the East-West Shrine Game. Despite the concerns over his lack of size, Flowers should be off the board towards the end of the $1^{\text {st }}$ round, but if he drops far into Day 2 of this draft then a team is going to get a steal. His long-term production may depend on whether a team is comfortable utilising him on the outside or as a slot guy, but he has the potential to be a long-term starter in the NFL.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Downs' lack of size will be an issue for some NFL scouts but with so many teams playing zone and off-man coverages as a staple of their defenses, Downs' challenges being jammed at the line of scrimmage may not be as pronounced as in other eras. On the plus side, he has so much going for him - speed, quickness, hands, route running etc. that he should be off the board at some point early on Day 2 , with an outside chance that he sneaks into round 1 . He is going to be a fine NFL receiver.

Forces defenses into double coverage or deep zone coverages because once he is an explosive deep threat - once he is in the open field with the football, Hyatt is not going to be caught from behind.

Hyatt has very good hands, large catch radius and the ability to adjust his routes midway through in order to find the football in the air.

Will make the spectacular catch if needed.
His route running has some question marks at this time, predominantly because he often ran a limited number of routes in college. Is he a one-dimensional deep threat or a receiver that can deliver at all 3 levels?

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Having just one productive season in college will be of concern to some teams. However, Hyatt is improving and appears to be a player on the rise, which will encourage NFL scouts to believe that there is untapped potential. Whether he should have returned to school for his senior season is a question - however, losing his QB Hendon Hooker may have been what swayed his decision. What Hyatt already brings is outstanding speed and quickness which can blow defenses away - that big play threat is always in vogue in the NFL. Expect Hyatt to be selected round 2 (he could even sneak into round 1 ).

## RASHEE RICE (SMU)

High School: Rice was a 1,000-yard receiver in high school just outside Fort Worth, Texas, earning all-district honours.

College: Opted to stay close to home and play his college ball just down the road near Dallas at SMU - choosing SMU over a number of FBS schools. Played mainly as a back-up in his freshman college season (2019) but contributed well. Started the majority of games in 2020, before becoming the full-time starter in 2021 - having two solid years. Truly broke out in 2022 with an outstanding recordbreaking season (school record receiving yards) earning allconference recognition. When drafted, Rice will be the latest in a line of SMU receivers to become NFL players - a line that goes back to Raymond Berry in the 1950s.

Perhaps could do with some work on refining some of his route running on shorter and underneath routes, although he will use his physicality to create some space.

Rice has good hands but occasionally will have the odd inexplicable drop. Has a large catch radius and will fight for the contested pass.

Suffered from a nagging foot/turf toe injury during the 2022 season which may have slowed him - although he showed toughness playing through it, only missing the end of season Bowl game.

He is a developing player who appears to have some upside.

Tillman is a big receiver with length who plays with physicality and strength. Doesn't have great speed but is very shifty for a man of his size, with the ability to change gears - can be very deceptive to defensive backs in this regard.

Tillman won't often hurt teams on go routes, but that doesn't completely prevent him from being used on deep routes because of his strength and ability to fight for the football - he will fight for the contested pass and can be used as a jump ball receiver.

Tillman runs nice routes underneath and isn't afraid to make plays over the middles in traffic if he has to. He has really nice hands and a huge catch radius. Runs well with the football in his hands, making extra yards after the catch and being difficult to bring down.

Has demonstrated the ability to play big in the big games.
Suffered an ankle injury that required surgery midway through the 2022 season - reducing his season to just 6 games. Demonstrated his toughness by fighting back to return towards the end of the year.

Nonetheless, Tillman's physical attributes already make him look like an NFL receiver with the size to potentially dominate defenses. His 2022 injury will of course be of concern, but Tillman appears to have a lot of untapped potential and upside, making him a really intriguing prospect to NFL scouts. Should be off the board on day 2.

## MARVIN MIMS Jr. (Oklahoma)

High School: Mims had a record-breaking high school career in Texas - notching up over 1,000 yards receiving as a junior and more than 2,000 yards receiving as a senior. Ended his high school career as the all-time Texas high school leader in a number of receiving categories.

College: Not surprisingly, Mims received scholarship offers from a large number of schools before opting to attend Oklahoma. Despite only starting a single game in his freshman season for the Sooners, Mims had a very good year - earning freshman All-American honours. Followed that up with two outstanding seasons as a starter, including a 1000-yard receiving year in 2022, garnering allconference recognition. Opted to declare for this draft while still having college eligibility remaining.

College Stats: In his 3 seasons (2020-22) at Oklahoma Mims played in 37 games ( 24 starts), recording 123 receptions for 2, 398 yards

Plays with a little physicality when running routes and when competing for the football, although you wouldn't call him a master of the contested catch at this stage. Mims is a consistent catcher of the football with really good hands and a decent catch radius considering his size.

In addition to his receiving skills, Mims is also an experienced punt returner, utilising his quickness and agility to make a success of the role.

Is slightly shorter than the ideal height for an NFL receiver, which, when coupled with a lack of some bulk will likely be of concern to NFL scouts. However, Mims' speed, athleticism and big play ability will also excite those same scouts. It will be interesting to see how NFL teams perceive him - as an outside receiver or as a bigger slot guy. His ability to return punts also helps Mims' draft stock. It's not clear that Mims will develop into a no. 1 receiver at the NFL level, but there's little doubt that he could develop into a versatile receiver - and therefore he should be off the board in round 2 or 3.

## KAYSHON BOUTTE (LSU)

High School: Boutte was a fine dual sport athlete in high school in Louisiana.

College: Was highly recruited but eventally opted to stay close to home and attend LSU. Had an oustanding freshman season in 2020, which included an incredible 308 yard receiving game (14 receptions) against Ole Miss. Started well in 2021 before an ankle injury curtailed his season. Returned for a full year in 2022 but wasn't overly productive. Originally announced that he would return to school for the 2023 season before changing his mind and opting to declare for the draft.

College Stats: Boutte played in 27 games ( 21 starts) for LSU, recording 131 receptions for 1,782 yards ( 13.6 average) and 16 touchdowns. Had 7 career 100-yard receiving games. Also had 1 rushing attempt for 41 yards.

Boutte is fine athlete, with good speed, quickness and acceleration. Coupling these attributes with an exceptional release (he gets off the line really well against press man) and strength, means that he can line up in any receiver spot.

Uses that aforementioned strength and toughess to go over the middle - he is not afraid to take a hit. Boutte has nice hands and this helps in making those difficult catches in traffic. He has the potential to make evey catch - although he has had some problems with drops..

Uses great running ability to make extra yards after the catch. His strength enables him to break tackles whilst his speed and acceleration help him run away from defenders with the ball in his hands.

Isn't yet a consistent route runner and could do with some development in this area. Also hasn't been as productive in the last 2 seasons as he was in his freshman year.

Played in just 6 games in 2021 before missing the remainder of the year due to an ankle injury.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Boutte's decision to enter the draft after previously having announced that he would go back to school for the 2023 season may raise some question marks with NFL teams as to how bought in he is to playing in the pros right now or whether there is an unknown underlying reason for his decision. However, on the field, Boutte has demonstrated some really good skills and ability and despite never matching the production of his freshman season, he will have some teams chomping at the bit to see how he can develop in the coming years. Conversely, there will also unquestionably be some teams that will be scared off by his dropping production - so he is likely to split opinion. However, it only takes one team to really like him for Boutte to be picked relatively early - and therefore he may be off the board on Day 2.

## TYLER SCOTT (Cincinnati)

High School: Scott was an outstanding multi-sport athlete in high school in Ohio - taking part in track and field as well as playing basketball and football. In track and field, Scott was a highly rated runner (distances from 100m up to 800 m ) who competed at the Junior Olympics. He played primarily as a RB in high school, notching consecutive 1,000-yard seasons. Oh, and to add to his versatility he was also an excellent kick returner.

Knows how to get open and get separation on the shorter routes but sometimes has problems with drops. These are probably concentration rather than technique based - an area for development.

Scott is not yet the most physical of receivers especially when competing for the contested ball - this is an area where he can develop further.

He is super versatile with high school experience of playing out of the backfield and returning kicks.

Suffered a minor ankle injury in 2022 missing 1 game.

Has the smarts and ability to break off his routes and come back for the football when his quarterback is in trouble. Uses his body extremely well to shield the football.

Turns into a good runner when he has the ball in his hands.

Isn't yet a refined route runner, but Palmer gets some separation through his velocity and agility. May tip his hand with defensive backs while he is still this raw. Can high point the football and make the spectacular catch but his hands aren't yet consistent.

Palmer is a fine kick and punt returner.
Suffered a hairline fracture late in his high school career., but other than that appears to have no major injury history.

College: Was highly recruited by FBS schools - opted to stay in California and play his college ball at Stanford. ## TIGHT ENDS

2023 General Draft Outlook: The tight end spot has become another of those positions (like running back) where 1st round picks at the position are infrequent - over the last 10 years, an average of slightly less than 1 tight end per draft has been taken in the 1st round. This time around, we can likely expect more ( 2 or 3 ) as we have a very nice group at the position.

The first tight end off the board, around the middle of round 1, is likely to be Notre Dame's Michael Mayer - proficient as a receiver and a blocker. For teams looking for more of a receiving threat, then Dalton Kincaid would be the pick - he'll likely also go in the 1st round.

The rising player, who may also be off the board on day 1, is the huge Georgia tight end Darnell Washington. Washington's combination of size and developing receiving skills is really intriguing. Luke Musgrave is the fourth tight end this year - he's likely to be a $2^{\text {nd }}$ round pick but if there's a run at the position, he could sneak into round 1.

After these top 4, there is another nice group of tight ends for day 2 or early day 3, which include Tucker Kraft, Sam LaPorta and Luke Schoonmaker.


Packers Outlook: Heading into the off-season, the tight end position was an area of need for the Packers. That need has only been exaggerated following the loss in free agency of Robert Tonyan and the probable loss of Marcedes Lewis (also to free agency). Remaining on the depth chart for the Packers are Josiah Deguara, Tyler Davis, Nick Guggemos and Austin Allen.

It wouldn't be a surprise to see the Packers finally dip into the tight end position early in this draft, even in round 1, as unlikely as that may sound. If round 1 is in play for the Packers than any of Mayer, Kincaid or even Washington could be the pick. If any of them were to somehow slip to pick 45, then they are definitely in play along with Luke Musgrave. A late round chance on somebody like the physically imposing Zack Kuntz (Old Dominion) is not out of the question.

Mayer has good hands although he does have the occasional problem with dropped passes. His strength helps him make the contest catch and break free from tacklers to add yards after the catch.

Mayer has quick reactions off the snap which often enables him to get a step on the defender he is blocking and also to release from the line when running pass patterns.

Kincaid is a super dynamic athlete with speed and acceleration which can help him be a dominant tight end as a pass receiver. Has the athletic tools to stretch a defense down the seam but is also a good route runner and has an explosive release. He knows how to get open short and underneath. Is also a red zone threat.

Has really good hands and can make the acrobatic, spectacular catch. Will also fight for the contested ball. Has a large catch radius.

Suffered what is described as a small fracture in his back late in the 2022 season, forcing him to sit out the Rose Bowl. The injury is not expected to cause any long-term issues, but he did not take part in any of the physical activities at the combine.

Having said that, he should still be an early threat in the passing game. With time, Kincaid should become a long-time NFL starter who has Pro Bowl potential. Expect him to be selected in round 1, probably around pick 20 overall - probably as the second tight end off the board.

## DARNELL WASHINGTON (Georgia)

High School: Washington was a successful dual sport athlete in high school in Nevada - excelling at both basketball and football. Some organisations (including ESPN) named him as the nation's no. 1 TE prospect coming out of high school.

College: Opted to play his college football at the University of Georgia. Despite starting the majority of games, he was mostly utilised as a blocker as a freshman (2020) and sophomore (2021). In 2022, he saw more action as a pass catcher - demonstrating some nice skills in this area. Shared time with the outstanding Brock Bowers (a possible $20241^{\text {st }}$ round draft choice). Washington opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

Having been used so much as an in-line blocker, Washington lacks experience as a pass catching threat - in particular, needs work on his route running. However he is improving in this area and of course his size gives him some pass catching advantages as well, including a large catch radius, being able to fight for the football on contested passes and being a big target for his quarterback.

Is a decent athlete for his size with surprisingly quick feet and a long stride that enables him to make yards after the catch.

2022 Suffered an ankle injury which forced him out of the National Championship Play-off semi-final game, but he returned to play in the finale the following week. 2021 Missed the first 4 games of the season due to a foot injury. Came back for game 5 , seemingly with no lasting effects.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

After being highly recruited out of high school and developing in college, Washington may be the most intriguing tight end in this whole class. Undoubtedly, he's the best blocker at the position in this group, but his improving ability as a receiver, at his massive size, is surely going to lead to a number of NFL teams having him high on their list of players that they believe could develop into a star...that doesn't mean he will - but the combination of his size and athletic ability could make him an almost unique weapon. Expect Washington to be off the board late in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round or early in the $2^{\text {nd }}$.

## LUKE MUSGRAVE (Oregon State)

Misc: Nephew of former NFL Player and long-time coach Bill Musgrave (recently named as an offensive assistant for the Browns).

High School: Was a multi-sport athlete in high school in Oregon playing lacrosse, running track and skiing as well as starring in football, where he played multiple positions - TE, WR and DE.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Oregon State over a number of teams, including Oregon where both his father and uncle went to college. Was an occasional starter in his first two seasons at OSU (2019-20) but wasn't utilised much in the passing game. Starting most of the games in 2021, Musgrave had a nice year before his 2022 was curtailed by injury.

He has really nice hands, quick release and he uses his length well in the passing game displaying a large catch radius. Makes yards after the catch. Could do with increasing his route tree.

Needs work as an in-line blocker, where Musgrave doesn't yet fully utilise his size and appears lacking in some strength and power.

Suffered an MCL injury in just second game of the 2022 season and unfortunately, missed the remainder of the season. However, he had recovered sufficiently to put up an impressive physical showing at the Senior Bowl week in early February - so it seems that there will be no lingering issues.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Musgrave had an excellent time at the Senior Bowl - this really helped his draft cause after he missed nearly the whole of the 2022 season. He is a dynamic athlete who will peak a lot of interest with NFL scouts because he looks like a player with a huge amount of upside - he appears to be barely have scratched the surface of his potential. Any team selecting Musgrave will be doing so based as much on that potential as production, and it may take a year or two for him to fully develop, but there's no doubt that he lots of the attributes to be a starting tight end in the NFL. Look for him to be selected on Day 2 of the draft with the outside chance that he could sneak into Round 1.

## SAM LaPORTA (lowa)

High School: LaPorta was a fine WR and DB back in high school in Illinois.

College: Opted to play his college ball at lowa as a tight end. Became the latest in a line of tight ends from the University of lowa that includes the likes of Dallas Clark, George Kittle, Noah Fant and T.J. Hockenson. LaPorta played as a reserve and part-time starter for his first two years at lowa (2019-20), before becoming the full-time time starter and ending his career with consecutive 50+ catch seasons (2021-22). Earned all-conference recognition multiple times.

College Stats: LaPorta played in 46 games (32 starts), catching 153 passes for 1,786 yards (11.7 average) and 5 TDs. Had 2 career 100yard receiving games. Also had 2 rushing attempts for 6 yards.

LaPorta is a very athletic TE who is a really good receiver having been utilised lined up in multiple spots over (in-line, in the slot and out

LaPorta is not small by any means but would be regarded as slightly undersized as compared to the prototypical NFL tight end.

Was lowa's $3^{\text {rd }}$ (emergency) quarterback for their 2022 Bowl game.
2022 Suffered a torn meniscus in his knee towards the end of the regular season, which required surgery. However, he missed just 1 game before coming back to play in Iowa's Bowl game. 2021 Missed 1 game during the 2021 season due to an undisclosed injury.

Redshirted his freshman season (2019), before becoming a part time starter in the 2020 season (played in the spring of 2021 due to the pandemic). Broke out in 2021 with a 65 -catch season. Was good again in 2022 without reaching the heights of the previous year although he was slowed by injury. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

Willing and improving blocker but isn't overpowering - still needs further development on blocking technique and ensuring that he can bring all of his strength and power to bear.

Had just one really good season (2021).
2022 Suffered an ankle injury in game 1 of the season which required surgery and caused him to miss 6 games. 2020 (Spring 2021) Slowed by an undisclosed injury in the 2020 season.

Playing at the FCS level at SDSU and only having one really big season (2021) will raise some questions as to Kraft's production potential, but nonetheless, he is good football player with close to prototypical NFL size and athleticism. Will likely be selected by a team that has a little time to develop him and he should go on to be a good quality pro tight end - either as a starter or no.2, providing there are no long term affects from his 2022 ankle injury (there is no indication of any long-term issue). Should be off the board around round 2 or 3.

## LUKE SCHOONMAKER (Michigan)

High School: Schoonmaker had a sound high school football career in Connecticut, playing multiple positions including QB and TE.

College: Opted to attend Michigan and play tight end over offers from multiple Big 10 (and other) schools. Played predominantly on special teams and as a blocking tight end in his first 3 seasons (201820) for the Wolverines before seeing more action in the passing game in 2021. Schoonmaker saw much more time as a pass receiving tight end in 2022 (due to the back injury to fellow TE Erick All, which required surgery) and came through with easily the most productive season of his college career.

As a receiver, he has the speed to stretch defenses down the seam but needs to work on his physicality on shorter routes. Can be out-muscled for the football and doesn't yet gain much after the catch.

Has lots of special teams experience - having played on those units extensively throughout his college career.

Missed 2 games in 2022 due to an undisclosed injury. Also left the CFP National Championship Semi-final Game with a shoulder injury - which also forced him to miss the all-star East-West Shrine Game. However, he took part in the combine in March and there appear to be no reports of any outstanding ongoing issues.

Has some areas where he could yet develop but has some good fundamentals and really nice physical traits. Likely to be a mid-round draft choice and should earn a spot as a back-up tight end and special teams player in his rookie year. Could become an NFL starter eventually.

## CAMERON LATU (Alabama)

High School: Latu originally played rugby union in high school in Utah before finding football and excelling at the DE position.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Alabama. Redshirted his first season (2018), playing just 2 games at DE. Switched positions to TE for the 2019 season and spent that season and 2020 as a reserve and playing on special teams. Earned the starting role at tight end for the final 2 seasons of his college career becoming a really solid performer at the spot - earning some all-conference notice for 2022.

Given the time to develop, he could be a sound no. 2 NFL tight end, with the chance to become a starter. Will contribute early as a back-up and mainly on special teams while he continues to learn the position. Expect Latu to be selected at some point on the first half of Day 3.

With all of his physical attributes, you would hope that Kuntz would be a dominating blocker, but this isn't yet the case. He seems to sometimes get off balance on contact rather than bringing power to bear. This is an area that requires development.

2022 Season was limited to just 5 games due to a dislocated kneecap (that required surgery) suffered in that fifth game of the season. Returned to perform well at the combine in March.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Kuntz could immediately fall behind some others on this year's tight end list because he played the last two seasons at non-major college football power - however, we shouldn't let that fact overshadow or hide what a nice football player he is. Was able to put in a good athletic performance at the combine, which really helped his draft cause - this was very much needed after his 2022 season as cut short due to injury, meaning that he only had 1 real season (2021) as a full-time starter in college. Kuntz's size and potential is likely to intrigue NFL scouts and he could be one of those guys whose stock starts to rise in the days approaching the draft. We currently project that he'll be selected on day 3 .

## JOSH WHYLE (Cincinnati)

As yet, Whyle's receiving production hasn't yet matched the potential he has in this area.

Isn't a huge threat after the catch, but if he can add some strength, he may be able to develop and break more tackles than he does right now.

Allen isn't a dominant blocker, but he has good technique and generally at least holds his own. Can block well on the move from the h-back spot. Excellent special teams player, playing on multiple units.

Allen has improved in each of his college years, and this will encourage NFL scouts that there may be much more to come - a big upside type guy. Allen should contribute as a special teams guy and back-up tight end early in his NFL career, with the possibility that he could develop into a starter. Will likely be selected on day 3 but he could be a steal there.

Runs nice routes and creates some separation - although he can also be physically re-routed by aggressive defenders. Will make yards after the catch, with some agility to make tacklers miss.

Mallory is a willing positional type of blocker, but he lacks the strength and power to be dominant in this aspect of the game. At this time, this is not the forte of Mallory's game.

Isn't a great blocker and may need to work on this and add some bulk if he wants to be anything more than that specialised back-up. Also teams will be aware that he has a little bit of an injury history. Expect Mallory to be off the board on day 3.

## PAYNE DURHAM (Purdue)

High School: Durham was a dual-sport athlete in high school in Georgia, playing lacrosse and football, although he played only 1 year on the gridiron.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Purdue. Redshirted his true freshman (2018) season with the Boilermakers, playing in just 2 games on special teams. Became a part-time starter in 2019 but saw little action as a pass receiver. Started every game in the pandemic shortened 2020. Had a break-out season in 2021 earning some allconference notice as he caught 45 passes. Was even more productive in 2022, again earning all-conference recognition.

College Stats: In his 5 seasons at Purdue, Durham played in 45

As a pass receiver, Durham has been developing. He isn't a threat to stretch defenses because of his lack of speed, so most of his work is done in the short and underneath areas. Durham doesn't run outstanding routes but will use his physical advantages to shield off defenders over the middle and to make the contested catch when necessary - he has decent hands and a large catch radius. Durham is not a threat to make many yards after the catch.

Durham is a good contributor on special teams.

Without a doubt he is a player who has been rising with regard to draft status - moving from a probable undrafted free agent into likely day 3 pick. A solid Senior Bowl week helped his cause. Durham's lack of speed is likely to prevent him becoming a starter in the NFL, but a career as a no. 2 and on special teams is possible. Should be selected in round 6 or 7.

## BRENTON STRANGE (Penn State)

High School: Attended high school in West Virginia, where he was a dual-sport athlete (basketball as well as football). On the gridiron he played both tight end on offense and linebacker on defense.

College: Highly recruited, Strange opted to play his college ball at Penn State, choosing the Nittany Lions over offers from FBS schools including a number from the Big 10. Redshirted his freshman season (playing in just 2 games) in 2019, before becoming a part-time starter at tight end the following season. Became a full-time starter in 2021, having a solid year and earning some all-conference notice. Had the best year of his college career in 2022, again as the full-time starter and earning some all-conference notice. Underclassman who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school. If he plays in the NFL, Strange would be the latest in a recent line of tight ends from Penn State after Mike Gesicki and Pat Freiermuth.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons at Penn State, Strange played in 37 games ( 31 starts), recording 70 receptions for 755 yards ( 10.8 average) and 11 touchdowns. Also had 1 kick-off return for 8 yards.

Whilst Strange's combination of size and athletic ability aren't off the charts they are decent and suited to him being a versatile tight end. He has lined up in multiple spots during his college career, including as an in-line tight end, out wide and in the backfield (in a fullback spot).

As a receiver, Strange is sound in the short to intermediate areas, demonstrating good hands and the ability to make yards after the catch - he is tough to bring down. He isn't a downfield threat and needs work on his routes. His catch radius doesn't appear to be outstanding.

Is a solid blocker in both the running game and in pass protection - in fact at this stage he is probably a better blocker than pass receiver. Doesn't dominate but usually gets the job done.

Isn't as polished a receiver as the Packers Josiah Deguara was when he came out of college, but Deguara is the player that Strange is reminiscent of. Hasn't yet had an outstandingly productive season - has thus far been more sound than sensational. Was solid at the combine without blowing anybody away. If Strange can continue his improvement and work on his all-round game to add to the potential that he already has, then he could stick around at the next level as a utility tight end and special teams player. Will likely be a late round draft pick.

# INTERIOR OFFENSIVE LINEMEN 

2023 General Draft Outlook: Although four interior offensive linemen were taken in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round of the 2022 draft, this was not the norm and won't be the case this year - expect one or maybe two to be day 1 picks this time around.

One guard is likely to be selected in $1^{\text {st }}$ round - Florida's excellent O'Cyrus Torrence. If there is a second interior lineman taken on day 1 it is likely to be by a team looking specifically for a center - Minnesota's John Michael Schmitz would be the pick.

After Torrence and Schmitz there is a group of guys that could be in play to be day 2 picks. This group includes the super-versatile Steve Avila who could play almost any spot on the line, Badgers center Joe Tippmann and the Buckeyes' Luke Wypler. USC's Andrew Vorhees would also probably be in this group, but he suffered an injury at the combine, so his status is uncertain.


Packers Outlook: The interior of the Packers offensive line looks pretty good, with Elgton Jenkins and Jon Runyan Jr. at the guard spots and Josh Myers at center. The versatile excellent Zach Tom will also likely challenge either Myers or Runyan for a starting spot. Added to this group are back-ups at center Jake Hanson and at guard Royce Newman and Sean Rhyan.

On the basis of such a strong group it seems unlikely that the Packers will pick early on this spot. But they do like to choose developmental linemen late in the draft to see what they have. If they do go down this route perhaps somebody like Juice Scruggs of Penn State or Nick Saldiveri of Old Dominion.

Having redshirted his freshman season and playing as a back-up in 2018, Schmitz earned the starting role at center for the Gophers which he kept for the remainder of his college career. Played the maximum amount of time in college (including the additional "Super Senior" year) rather than enter a draft early.

College Stats: In his 6 seasons (2017-22) at Minnesota, Schmitz played in 57 games, with 35 starts. All of the starts came at center.

Schmitz is an out and out center with a really good combination of size, athletic ability and strength. He had an exceptional level of playing and starting experience.

Schmitz should quickly become a starter in the NFL.

College: After multiple offers he opted to stay in state and play his college ball at TCU. Avila didn't play much in his first two seasons (2018-19) at TCU, redshirting and then playing as a back-up. Avila is really good as a pass blocker. He has a quick first step and anchors extremely well. He gets his hands up quickly, with punch and positions them well. Appears to have really strong hands as when he gets a grip his hands don't get removed.

Is a strong straight ahead drive blocker who will shift defensive linemen ined up in over him. Will then use his athletic ability to get to the linebacker at the second level. Can also move extremely well laterally along the line and lead ball carriers around the end.

Has some areas for development, including the need to improve his body control (perhaps caused by over aggressiveness) and positioning.

No reported major injury history.

High School: Tippmann was an outstanding all-state level performer at the offensive tackle spot in high school in Indiana.

College: Opted to become a Badger, turning down offers from a number of schools from the Midwest. After redshirting his freshman season (2019), Tippmann played minimally as a back-up in 2020 before moving inside and winning the starting center role for the Badgers in 2021. Played well as the starting center again in 2022, earning all-conference notice for the second straight year. Junior, who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In 4 seasons (2019-22) for the Badgers, Tippmann played in 25 games, starting in 22 . All of those starts coming at the center position.

Tippmann has a nice combination of excellent size, strength and power, and athletic ability. In fact as far as size goes, he's taller with more length than we usually see from the center position.

Excels in pass protection. For such a tall pivot man, Tippman has a nice, quick first step which helps him get his hands up quickly on

Wisconsin has the reputation for producing fine offensive linemen and Tippmann is certainly the latest in that line. It seems like he has gone somewhat under the radar, but that needs to stop right now. Tippmann is a good player at the center spot and seemingly has an upside which will surely encourage NFL scouts. We should expect Tippmann to be selected on day 2 of this draft, and he should go on to be a starting center in the NFL.

## LUKE WYPLER (Ohio State)

High School: Wypler played his high school football in New Jersey, where he excelled playing offensive tackle.

College: Opted to attend Ohio State to play his college ball over offers from multiple Power 5 schools. Moved inside from his high school tackle position for the Buckeyes and redshirted his freshman season before becoming the starting center the following year (2021). Wypler continued in that role in 2022, earning some allconference notice. Underclassman who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: Played in 27 games ( 26 starts) in his Ohio State career, all at center.

Wypler is a solid as both a run blocker and in pass protection, without being an out and out dominator. Having said that, he rarely gets beaten or stays beaten, as he plays with all-out effort on every

The decision may have been prompted by his fine performance up against Georgia (and Jalen Carter in particular) in the 2022 National Championship Play-off Semi-final - and that certainly will have helped his draft case with NFL teams. We should expect that Wypler will be a solid performer in the NFL who can certainly earn a back-up role and have a chance of being a starter. Expect him to be selected around rounds 3.

## OLUSEGUN OLUWATIMI (Michigan)

High School: 2-time all-conference performer in high school in Maryland.

College: Enrolled at the Air Force Academy (2017) before transferring to Virginia, where he was initially a walk-on before being granted a scholarship. Had to sit out 2018 due to NCAA transfer rules. Was a 3-year starter for the Cavaliers (2019-21), earning all-conference notice in the third year. Transferred from Virginia to Michigan between the 2021 and 2022 seasons. Had an outstanding 2022 with the Wolverines, winning multiple end of season awards and being named a consensus All-American.

College Stats: Played in 36 games ( 35 starts) at center while at Virginia (2019-21), including 32 consecutive starts.

Regardless, it's probably safe to assume that he'll miss the whole of the 2023 NFL season. One thing that won't be questioned is Vorhees' toughness - even after tearing his ACL, he returned to the combine to complete an impressive 38 reps in the bench press. His skills, size, versatility and experience will likely still see him selected in this draft around the $4^{\text {th }}$ of $5^{\text {th }}$ rounds. He has the potential to be a fine back-up and potentially an NFL starter - that injury permitting.

High School: Emil Jr. was highly ranked at both center and guard coming out of high school in Indianapolis.

But that ability to be a swing interior offensive lineman in the NFL really helps his draft case and the likelihood that he will stick around on an NFL roster for a long time. Will likely be selected at some point in round 4 or 5 .

## NICK SALDIVERI (Old Dominion)

High School: Played his high school ball in North Carolina.
College: Opted to play his college ball at Old Dominion in Norfolk, Virginia. Redshirted his true freshman season (2018), playing in just 3 games. Won the starting job at right tackle in 2019. The 2020 FCS season was wiped out due to the pandemic, but after a year out Saldiveri raised his performance, starting every game at right tackle and having a fine 2021 season earning all-conference notice. Was the starter again in 2022 (10 at tackle, 1 at guard) whilst earning allconference recognition.

College Stats: Played in 38 games ( 35 starts) in his four seasons at Old Dominion. 34 of his starts came at right tackle, with the other at right guard. Also scored a touchdown (in 2021) on a fumble recovery in the end zone.

Saldiveri is very experienced and has the outstanding size and length to play almost any position on the offensive line. He has decent speed, quickness and athletic ability for a man of his size. Saldiveri has demonstrated that level of versatility having played both tackle and guard and worked out at center.

In pass protection Saldiveri sets a solid anchor and has light feet which enable him to mirror pass rushers. His length allows him to keep defenders hands off him and to prevent them getting leverage. Is rarely knocked off balance. On the occasions, very few and far between, that he gets beaten, Saldiveri can recover and will not give up on the play.

In the running game, Saldiveri won't blow defenders away as a straight ahead drive blocker but is excellent on the move - will climb to the second level and make a pancake block. Saldiveri will also pull to the outside with fluidity and find a linebacker to hit.

Overall, Saldiveri is reliable and consistent rather than dominant. He quietly gets on with job at hand.

Missed 1 game in 2019 due to an undisclosed injury but has no reported major injury history.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Playing at one of the "smaller" football schools, Saldiveri needed a good week at the Senior Bowl to raise his draft profile - and he got it, playing and working mainly on the interior of the line (at both guard and center). And it seems likely that Saldiveri will kick inside permanently from tackle to guard or center, at the next level. Regardless of which spot ends up being his no.1, the versatility he brings will be sought after by NFL teams. Saldiveri has areas of his game that need to be developed but it seems that he has a good shot of making an NFL roster in 2023. Should be off the board on day 3.

## McCLENDON CURTIS (Chattanooga)

High School: Dual-sport athlete in high school in Chattanooga, Tennessee, playing basketball as well as football - winning all-Region honours for his play on the gridiron.

College: Had a number of college offers but in the end opted to stay in his home city and play his college ball at Tennessee-Chattanooga. Redshirted in 2017, before playing as a back-up throughout 2018. Became the starter at guard in 2019. Started again at guard in the pandemic shortened 2020 season. Was all-conference for the first time in 2021 and then repeated that achievement in an even better 2022 - started at both guard and tackle.

If selected, Curtis would follow in the footsteps of fellow

Curtis is a big man for the guard position, and he has some length which is unusual for the spot. He has decent athleticism without great speed, but he is extremely strong and powerful.

Will climb out to the second level to make a block. Is a block finisher who plays until the whistle on every down. However, he doesn't appear to have the speed and quickness to be a devastating lateral blocker.

Began his college career at Division II Fairmont State before transferring to North Carolina State. Is a 3time $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-Conference selection (twice in the MEAC and once in the ACC). Started for 2 seasons at left guard for North Carolina State, although he missed 7 games in 2021 due to a back injury that required surgery.

## OFFENSIVE TACKLES

2023 General Draft Outlook: Over the last 10 drafts an average of 4.3 offensive tackles have been selected in each $1^{\text {st }}$ round. It seems likely that 4 or 5 players at the position will again be off the board on day 1 this time around. There isn't an offensive tackle that will go within the first 5 or so picks, but Northwestern's Peter Skoronski and Ohio State's Paris Johnson Jr. should be both be taken within the first 10-15 overall picks. Interestingly either or both of these players may be regarded as better guards than tackles by some teams (and those teams are not likely to take them as high). The third tackle who seems certain to be selected in round 1, somewhere around the middle of the round, is Georgia's Broderick Jones.

Darnell Wright, Anton Harrison and Dawand Jones are in the next group of tackles, one or more of whom may sneak into the bottom end of the $1^{\text {st }}$ round.

Cody Mauch of North Dakota State heads up the next group of players who will likely be day 2 selections. Mauch is also another player who may well end up playing guard at the next level.


Packers Outlook: There are questions for the Packers at offensive tackle. David Bakhtiari and Yosh Nijman are an excellent pair of starters, but D-Bak's long injury recovery period and Nijman being a restricted free agent provide some uncertainty. The Packers fortunately have both Elgton Jenkins and Zach Tom, from the interior linemen group, who can play tackle if required - but that's probably not preferable over a long period. The other back-ups currently on the roster are all untried guys at the NFL level.

It seems highly likely that the Packers will select an offensive tackle early, possibly as early as their $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick - in which case it would probably be Broderick Jones. If they were to go for a guy on day 2, the aforementioned Cody Mauch or Anton Harrison could be in play, as could BYU's huge Blake Freeland.

Skoronski is the grandson of Packers great offensive tackle Bob Skoronski, who was a star during the Lombardi years.

Skoronski doesn't dominate physically in pass protection due to his lack of length and initial power but he is a really good technican and will also battle hard and long to ensure he doesn't get beaten does this by using his hands superbly well, getting an initial punch quickly on the defender and following this with good hand placement. Has quick enough feet to be able to mirror movement.

Nonetheless, make no mistake, he is a fine football player who will find a long-time starting spot in the NFL. If he's off the board in the first 10-15 picks, which is what we should expect, then that will be to a team that sees him as a tackle first and as a guard second.

## PARIS JOHNSON Jr. (Ohio State)

High School: One of the very best high school players in the nation, Johnson earned multiple honours in Ohio for his play on the offensive line.

College: Was a highly sought after recruit but opted to stay in state to play his college football, becoming an Ohio State Buckeye. Played as a back-up in 2020, before moving from tackle to guard and becoming the starter at RG for the 2021 season (earning some allconference notice). Moved back to tackle for the 2022 season as the starter at LT and playing so well that he earned consensus AllAmerican recognition. Opted to declare for this draft even though he had college eligibility remaining.

College Stats: In his 3 seasons (2020-22) at Ohio State, Johnson played in 30 games, with 25 starts. 13 of those starts came at right guard, with 12 starts coming at left tackle.

Jones has good size, length and a frame that could handle adding a few extra pounds. He is strong and powerful with the demenour that you really like to see from an offensive lineman. Jones has super athleticism, with quick feet and speed. Moves really well.

Jones is really good in pass protection and can get better still. He is strong at the point of attack, getting his hands up quickly with a strong punch and he grabs with strength. Uses his quick feet and agility to mirror well. Will also keep battling and has recovery ability. Super savvy with the ability to quickly recognise and deal with blitzes and defensive line games.

As a run blocker, Jones fires off the snap quickly and with power and can move in either direction to lead the running back. Will also get out to the second level to block linebackers and safeties in the box.

Jones lacks great experience, having started for just 1 and a bit seasons at the college level.
2022 Suffered a lower leg injury in an off-season motorcycle accident but was able to return in time for the season with no apparent ill-effects.

Jones is young - still under 22 years of age at the time of the draft - and has a huge upside thanks to his physical traits and athletic ability. But for a team that is prepared to develop him, Jones has all of the look of a player who will become a starter (probably in his second year) with the potential to be a perennial Pro Bowler at left tackle. Should be selected in the middle of round 1.

## DARNELL WRIGHT (Tennessee)

High School: Wright had an outstanding high school career in West Virginia and was one of the highest rated players at any position at the high school level.

College: Opted to attend Tennessee over a number of other top notch college programmes, including staying at home in West Virginia. Started the majority of games as a true freshman (2019) before becoming a full-time starter for each of next three seasons (2020-22), whilst playing in multiple spots. Earned all-conference honours in the last of those years playing at right tackle.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons (2019-22) for the Volunteers, Wright played in 47 games with 42 starts. His starts came at 3 positions - 27

Wright is a decent technician and solid blocker in pass protection but doesn't, as yet, dominate. There are certain aspects that look like they may require some development - for example, he doesn't always get his punch away quickly or get his hands placed correctly and speed round the edge could also cause him some problems. Nonetheless, he typically sets a good anchor and won't get beaten by power rushers, utilising his physical attributes well.

Is an intelligent football player who does a good job picking up stunts and blitzes.

Wright has excellent positional versatility but his combination of size and skill profile point to him playing right tackle in the NFL (although he could also play guard). Expect him to be selected late in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round and to solidify the right side of an NFL team's line as a longtime starter.

## ANTON HARRISON (Oklahoma)

High School: After a fine high school career in Washington D.C., Harrison fielded a number of offers from Power 5 football schools.

College: Decided to play his college ball at Oklahoma. Harrison played as a back-up as a freshman in 2020, before becoming the starting left tackle for the final two seasons of his college career (2021-22), with a single start on the right side. Earned all-conference honours for his fine 2022 season. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In 3 years (2020-22) at Oklahoma, Harrison played in 34 games, with 24 starts. 23 of those starts came at left tackle, with the other 1 coming at right tackle.

Harrison is a decent run blocker without being a dominant force - as in his pass protection he doesn't always demonstrate the power and strength that ideally, you'd like to see, in the running game. However, this is an area which already looks like it's improving. Moves well enough to get out to the second level and to lead runners to the outside.

Had demonstrated some positional versatility, which is always in vogue.
No reported major injury history.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Harrison opted to enter this draft with eligibility remaining. It's certainly quite possible that he could have raised his draft stock by staying in school for another year and perhaps moving into the top half of the $1^{\text {st }}$ Round of the 2024 draft. But ultimately, only time will tell if he made the right decision. Nonetheless, Harrison has a great upside and is developing and improving already. Yes, he has some continuing development to undertake in order to become a run blocking force, but he has a great foundation of good pass protection skills. He's going to be a long-time starter in the NFL, perhaps after a year or so. Looks like that should be at left tackle. Expect Harrison to be taken late in Round 1 or early in Round 2.

## DAWAND JONES (Ohio State)

High School: Jones was an excellent dual sport athlete in high school in Indianapolis, excelling at both basketball and football. He was so good at both sports that he received scholarship offers for both from notable colleges.

College: Opted to utilise his enormous talent and size on the football field and play his college ball at Ohio State. Played as a back-up for the Buckeyes in 2019 and 2020, before being the starter at right tackle in 2021 and 2022 - earning some All-American and Allconference recognition.

College Stats: In 4 seasons (2019-22) at Ohio State, Jones played in 40 games, with 24 starts - all of those starts coming at right tackle.

When looking at Dawand Jones there's only one place to start - his size. Jones is a behemoth of a man lined up on the offensive line. He has a huge frame, height and extra long arms along with a massive

However, he's not yet as effective as a pass blocker as he is in the running game, and this is mainly because if he can't win with power, he may have some challenges. Speed rushers round the edge and rushers with multiple moves can give him problems. This is an area of development need, however, on the positive front, he has already started improvement in this area - he was much better in pass protection in 2022 than he was in 2021.

2023 Suffered a possible undisclosed injury at the Senior Bowl in February which limited his participation. However, he took part in the combine, so seemingly has no ongoing injury concerns.

College: Became a part-time starter at offensive tackle in his true freshman season for the Orangemen, earning some freshman AllAmerican notice. Became the full-time starter in his sophomore year (2020) and never looked back. Was outstanding in each subsequent year, garnering multiple all-conference recognition. Could have returned to Syracuse for a Super Senior season but instead opted to enter this draft.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons (2019-22) at Syracuse, Bergeron played in 46 games, starting in 39 . Those starts all came at offensive

In pass protection, he can be inconsistent. Duncan is light on his feet and sets a nice, quick anchor but he can still get overpowered by the more physical linemen and linebackers who use their strength against him. Earned a starting job at right tackle early in his true freshman season (2019) and was even better in the role in the pandemic truncated 2020. Moved to become the starting left tackle for 2021 and 2022 - earning some All-American recognition in his final year.

However, his atheleticism for such a big man comes to the fore when he's blocking on the move - moves well laterally leading runs and will climb out to the second level on straight ahead runs.

Redshirted his freshman season for the Bulldogs after playing in 4 games. Became the starting right tackle early in the 2020 season, earning some freshman AllAmerican honours. Started again at right tackle for the whole of 2021 and 2022, earning all-conference honours in the latter year. McClendon opted to declare for this draft while still having college eligibility remaining.

# INTERIOR DEFENSIVE LINEMEN 

2023 General Draft Outlook: An average, we can normally expect 2-3 interior defensive linemen to be selected in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round and that should be the case again this year. Right near the top of the $1^{\text {st }}$ round Georgia's Jalen Carter is one of the very best players in this draft, regardless of position. However, recent off-the-field issues have seen his stock fall a little, but Carter should still be selected in the top 10 overall picks.

Also going in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round is Bryan Bresee of Clemson, realistically anywhere from the middle of the round onwards. The third defensive linemen with a $1^{\text {st }}$ round chance is Pittsburgh's Calijah Kancey. Kancey is undersized which will deter a number of teams, but he should be off the board by about the $40^{\text {th }}$ pick - it just could be a number of picks before that.

After these three players there is large bunch of players (8 or 9) who have a chance of being selected on day 2 . They probably won't all be off the board that early, but individually they each have a chance. In total, we can expect about 20 interior defensive linemen to be selected in the seven rounds of this year's draft.


Packers Outlook: The Packers defensive line is set at two spots, with the outstanding Kenny Clark and last year's $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick Devonte Wyatt holding down starting positions. The third starting spit is up for grabs - currently the roster has T.J. Slaton, Jonathan Ford and Chris Slayton competing. The Packers lost Jarran Reed in free agency to the Seahawks.

An early defensive lineman is not out of the question for the Packers and if Bryan Bresee is on the board when the Packers pick that choice wouldn't be a surprise. If the wait until day 2, the Florida's Gervon Dexter seems to fit the profile of a Packers type player.

High School: Carter was an excellent multi-sport athlete in high school in Florida, playing football (DT and TE), basketball and weightlifting. Had 12 sacks in is senior season.

College: Highly recruited by a number of major colleges before opting for Georgia. He was a big contributor for the Bulldogs in 2020 and 2021 - earning all SEC notice in the latter year. Was outstanding in 2022, being selected to every major All-American team. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: Carter played in 38 games for Georgia, recording 6 sacks, 71 quarterback pressures, 83 tackles ( 44 solo), 18.5 tackles for a loss, 2 forced fumbles and 4 pass break-ups. Also had 3 blocked kicks (1 field goal and 2 PATs). Caught 1 pass for a 1-yard touchdown.

Carter is an explosive and athletic game changing force from the interior of the defensive line. He simply can disrupt an offense's passing and running games. He's not a player that you want to single

Weaknesses may relate to occasional question marks about his work ethic being inconsistent and his production not yet matching his talent. There is also now a question mark following recent misdemeanour charges.

How good is Carter? Well, he may have been the best player on the Georgia 2021 defensive line - a line that included $320221^{\text {st }}$ Round draft picks - Travon Walker, Jordan Davis, and Devonte Wyatt. Would almost certainly have been top 5 pick in last year's draft and should be off the board in the top 5 this year - probably ranks in the top 2 players overall. Should become a very fine player in the NFL and assuming he develops as expected, he ought to be a multi-time AllPro. However, just as the combine started, Carter was charged with 2 misdemeanours in connection with a serious road accident - to which he has pleaded no contest. He later didn't blow scouts away with his performance at his pro day. Obviously, these both raise some question marks with regard to Carter's draft status and it's possible he slips a little bit on day 1.

High School: Bresee had a highly productive high school career in Maryland, leading to him being one of the most sought-after recruits in the country.

College: It wasn't surprising that nearly every major college was trying to get Bresee, before he opted to play his college ball at Clemson. Bresee had an outstanding freshman season for the Tigers in 2020. Followed that up with a 2021 that was cut short by a knee injury and 2022 where he was solid without being spectacular. Earned all-conference notice in each of his years at Clemson. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In his 3 seasons at Clemson (2020-22), Bresee played

Uses his power and strength to rush the passer, with some success - has pocket collapsing ability at times. However, he needs to develop more pass rush moves as he can be neutralised at times by strong offensive linemen.

Bresee stands up extremely well against the run utilising his big body to make it very difficult to pick up positive yardage running in his direction. He isn't often moved off the line of scrimmage unless he's double team blocked. Will use his hands well to knock down the hands of offensive linemen.

Suffered a torn ACL early in the 2021 season, limiting his season to just 4 games. Also underwent off-season shoulder surgery in early 2022. Came back from these injuries to play in 2022, although he missed 2 games during 2022 with a non-football injury/illness (reported as being a kidney infection).

Bresee will split analysts as to where he should be picked but will probably be selected in the middle to late $1^{\text {st }}$ round by a team that has time to develop him.

## CALIJAH KANCEY (Pittsburgh)

High School: Had a fine high school career in Florida.
College: Kancey opted to play his college ball at Pittsburgh. Redshirted his true freshman year with the Panthers (2019). Followed that up with good seasons in 2020 and 2021. Was outstanding in 2022, earning All-American recognition. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In his 4 years at Pittsburgh (2019-22), Kancey played in 37 games ( 29 starts). Recorded 16 sacks, 16 quarterback hurries, 34.5 tackles for a loss, 92 tackles ( 51 solo), 3 pass break-ups and 1 forced fumble.

Against the run, Kancey has some success shooting the gap due to his aforementioned speed and explosion (enabling him to make tackles for a loss) and he can run plays down from behind if unblocked. But when offensive linemen get their bodies and hands on him, he can be physically outmanned. Because of his lack of bulk, he's never going to be a dominant player in the running game.

But make no mistake, Kancey is a spectacular athlete as an interior defensive lineman and is an outstanding pass rusher. Really helped his draft case with an outstanding combine. It's probable that a team that doesn't require him to play every down but rather has the luxury to utilise him on passing downs will select Kancey and allow him to simply pin his ears back and rush. Will probably be selected late on day 1.

## MAZI SMITH (Michigan)

High School: Smith had an outstanding high school career in Michigan, being rated as one of the top recruits at the defensive tackle spot.

College: He was of course highly recruited but, in the end, Smith decided to stay in his home state and attend the University of Michigan. He played sparingly in his first two seasons as a Wolverine (2019-20), before finally earning a starting role on the defensive line in 2021, earning some all-conference notice. Had a fine 2022 season, starting in every game and earning all-conference recognition. Opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school (for a Super Senior season).

College Stats: In his 4 seasons at Michigan, Smith played in 35 games ( 28 starts). Recorded 88 tackles ( 39 solo), including 6 tackles for a loss. Also had 0.5 sack, 4 passes broken up, 1 forced fumble and 1 fumble recovery.

Smith is a big man who brings lots of bulk to the defensive line. Along with that size, he brings excellent strength and power and surprisingly decent speed for such a big man. Also appears to have good stamina and an engine which is perhaps unusual for a man of his size. By all reports, he brings confidence and a team leader type attitude to his team.

Smith is outstanding against the run, using his bulk combined with his strength to make his area a no-go zone for running backs. Won't be easily single blocked in the running game, requiring offenses to account for him if they want their inside ground game to be effective.

In stark contrast to his ability against the run, Smith hasn't yet developed greatly as a pass rusher. Although in fairness, he probably got more pocket pressure in 2022 than in previous years. Doesn't have explosion off the snap and pass protectors will often get their hands up and gripped on him quickly. Keeps battling however and will get his hands up high to bat passes down at the line of scrimmage.

Is more of a neutralising player in the running game than he is a dominator. Isn't as powerful at the point of attack as you'd like to see and can be challenged by a straight-ahead running system. However, Adebawore does have the capability to use his quick first step and acceleration to shoot a gap and make a tackle in the backfield or to chase ball carriers down from behind.

No reported major injury history.

While finding his best spot in the pros may take time, he also brings flexibility and versatility which may enable him to be used in multiple ways. Expect Adebawore to be selected at some point on day 2.

Is solid against the run without being dominant. Uses some strength at the point of attack to hold up offensive linemen and make a play. Isn't going to destroy running plays with his quickness but will keep going in order to try and make the play.

Of course, it would be good if he could turn some of that pressure into sacks. When his pass rush is held up, lka will get his hands up and knock passes down at the line of scrimmage.

Is extremely strong in the middle of the line and won't be moved by single blocks in the running game. His area is a no-go zone for a team's offense unless he's double teamed - which happened a lot in 2022, reducing his statistical output a little.

May need to work on his stamina as he can appear to wear down in games.

Ika is a big man with some upside, but being a pure nose tackle will limit the number of teams that are likely to have a sustained interest in him at the draft. The pure 3-4 nose tackle is one of the positions in modern drafts that doesn't often garner $1^{\text {st }}$ round notice, and it seems like Ika won't buck that trend - he didn't appear to raise his chances with his performance at the combine. Still, it's likely that he'll be selected on day 2 by a team that's looking for that middle of the line plugger.

## KEEANU BENTON (Wisconsin)

High School: Benton was a successful dual-sport athlete in high school in Wisconsin - wrestling as well as playing football (receiving all-state and all-region recognition on the gridiron).

College: Opted to stay close to home and accept an offer from the University of Wisconsin to play his college ball there. Started his time at the Badgers with two nice seasons (2019-20) as a part-time starter, before winning the starting nose tackle spot outright in 2021. 2021 and 2022 were really good years in which he earned some allconference notice.

College Stats: In his 4 years (2019-22) playing for the Badgers, Benton played in 45 games ( 36 starts), recording 9 sacks, 9 quarterback hurries, 19 tackles for a loss, 80 tackles ( 43 solo), 4 pass break-ups, 1 forced fumble and 2 fumble recoveries.

Benton has much of the frame of an NFL interior defensive lineman, although he could add a little more bulk (provided he doesn't lose any of his quickness). He already has a good mix of strength, power and first step quickness. Very experienced as a 3-4 nose tackle with some experience playing as part of a 2 defensive lineman special package.

Benton's big value to the defensive line is as a run stuffer. He plays with strength, power and leverage that enables him to, at times, control the middle of the line and neutralise some running plays headed in his direction - undoubtedly bringing his wrestling prowess to bear. Isn't always as consistent as he could be, however. Can't knock his work ethic though - he plays hard and keeps going on every down.

That non-stop motor really helps him as a pass rusher, where he doesn't often beat linemen straight up and doesn't dominate but he does keep pressure on offensive linemen and gains the odd sack through stickability. Needs to develop some moves in this area.

Missed part of a game in 2022 due to a minor knee injury, but he returned the following week. Appears to have no major injury history.

Nose tackles are generally not as in demand as 4-3 defensive tackles however, so that probably puts a ceiling on where he is likely to picked as somewhere around the top of round 3.

## GERVON DEXTER (Florida)

High School: Dexter was an outstanding multi-sport athlete in high school in Florida, excelling at basketball and track and field (discus) as well as football.

College: Was very highly regarded as a defensive lineman coming out of high school, being offered scholarships by a number of Power 5 schools. Ultimately opted to stay close to home however and play his college ball for the Florida Gators. Played extensively, primarily as a back-up, in his freshman season (2019), before becoming a full-time starter in 2021. Was again a starter in 2022, having his best college season. Opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

Will use his length both to gain leverage and to pull ball carriers down from behind, although he won't move far laterally to make the play.

Doesn't yet have great production (at least in terms of statistics) against the pass, but he is an improving pass rusher from the inside. He has better than advertised speed and quickness off the edge, but as yet doesn't bring that to the fore when rushing the passer, but he will battle and use second effort to work his way towards the quarterback. When his pass rush is held up, Dexter will block passing lanes with his hands and on occasion will knock passes down at the line of scrimmage.

Pickens isn't as productive as a pass rusher as you'd like to see. Has a decent first step, will on occasion demonstrate good hand speed and can create leverage - but this doesn't as yet, translate into statistical production. Could do with developing more moves. Will get his hands up to bat passes down when his pass rush is halted.

If the potential can be unleashed, Pickens could develop into a starter. Will probably be off the board in around round 3.

## BYRON YOUNG (Alabama)

High School: Had an outstanding high school career in Mississippi, where he notched up more than 40 sacks total in his final three years.

College: Highly sought after, Young eventually opted to attend the University of Alabama over the likes of Clemson and his home state schools Ole Miss and Mississippi State. Was a part time starter in each of his first two year (2019-20) with the Crimson Tide playing solidly mainly as a back-up. Progressed to start about half of Alabama's games in 2021 before becoming the fulltime starter in 2022. Earned all-conference honours in his final year.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons at Alabama, Young played in 54 games ( 26 starts), recording 7.5 sacks, 9 QB hurries, 22.5 tackles for a loss, 139 total tackles ( 56 solo), 3 pass break-ups, 1 forced fumble and 1 fumble recovery.

Young is slightly undersized for the defensive line, although he may be able to add a little bit of bulk to his frame. Doesn't have great speed or acceleration.

Despite all of his sacks in high school, Young has proven to be a better player in college against the run. Doesn't have the physicality to consistently beat offensive linemen with strength and power but will use his hands and create enough space to shoot the gap and make the play. Also doesn't give up on the play, using his hands to maul and battle.

As a pass rusher, Young appears to lack some of the physical traits to consistently challenge offensive linemen - in particular, explosion, speed and acceleration. Uses his hands well and is persistent, sometimes finishing off the play where coverage has forced the QB to hold the ball. Young will get his hands up to disrupt passing lanes when his pass rush is stopped.

Not to be confused with Tennessee's Byron Young who is also likely to be selected in this draft.

It's also unclear exactly what Wooden's best spot will be at the next level. He looks like a developmental project who will be selected around round 4 or 5 .

## KARL BROOKS (Bowling Green)

High School: Brooks attended high school in Michigan, playing both outside linebacker and wide receiver and earning all-conference honours.

College: Opted to attend Bowling Green to play his college ball. Started the majority of games as a true freshman in 2018 and then started every game in 2019. His 2020 season was severely truncated (3 games) due to the pandemic. Again started every game in 2021, having his best season to date and earning some all-conference notice. Was even better in 2022, having double figure sacks and earning All-American recognition.

College Stats: In his 5 seasons (2018-22) at Bowling Green, Brooks played in 52 games ( 48 starts), recording 27.5 sacks, 15 quarterback hurries, 46 tackles for a loss, 167 total tackles ( 77 solo), 1 interception, 5 pass break-ups, 6 forced fumbles and 1 fumble recovery.

Brooks has good size for a player who could play in almost any spot on the defensive line. Has excellent experience to add to his versatility. He has some agility and decent speed along with power and strength. He has a quick first step.

Brooks is an improving pass rusher. Uses his strength and power to bull-rush linemen in front of him in order to collapse the pocket. But also has some pass rush moves and speed when used around the edge. Brooks uses his hands well to try to stop linemen getting a grip on him. Against the run, Brooks doesn't dominate but he is tough to move off the line of scrimmage and he plays non-stop and won't stay permanently blocked. Has some burst to chase ballcarriers downs from behind.

Is tough against the run but doesn't make many plays rushing the passer, which means that he's likely to play only on early downs in the NFL (at least initially). Should be a day 3 selection.

Became the starter in 2019, having a solid year. Then opted out in 2020 due to the pandemic. Came back with a fine season in 2021, although he missed 5 games due to injury. Was the starter for the majority of games in 2022.

Redmond can be overpowered in the running game, especially by powerful straight ahead drive blocking linemen. Is much better when he can move and make a play laterally, pursuing the ballcarrier from behind.

Has had problems with injury and illness, which include suffering a torn meniscus in his knee in 2019 which kept him out of 5 games. Back in 2018, Redmond suffered from blood clots which forced him to miss all but 3 games of the season.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Redmond had a solid college career without, perhaps, hitting the heights that may have been expected of him. The interruptions caused by injury, illness and the pandemic surely didn't help. Lack of size will be a concern to NFL scouts and perhaps mean that he will predominantly be seen as a rotational passing downs type of guy - probably inside as a 4-3 defensive tackle. Expect Redmond to be selected on day 3.

## EDGE RUSHERS

2023 General Draft Outlook: Players who can get to the quarterback are always in fashion in the NFL, and recent drafts have just re-iterated this with an average of $5.21^{\text {st }}$ round picks per year being used on edge rushers over the last 10 drafts. 2023 will be no different, with another deep group of players at this spot being available.

Right at the top of the board will be Alabama's Will Anderson Jr. who may be the best player in this draft regardless of position. But not that far behind Anderson is Texas Tech's Tyree Wilson who will surely be off the board in the first 5-7 picks overall (depending on how a run of quarterbacks may occur early). The $1^{\text {st }}$ round list of edge players will continue with Myles Murphy and Lukas Van Ness, both of whom should be off the board in the top 15-20 picks. Georgia's Nolan Smith should also be a $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick.

There follows another fine group of players who are likely to be day 2 picks - but one or two could sneak into the end of round 1 if there is a run on edge rushers. This group includes, but isn't limited to, the likes of Drew Sanders, Isaiah Foskey, B.J. Ojulari and Will McDonald IV.

The list goes on and on as we get deeper into the draft - it's easily possible to envisage around 30 edge rushers being selected in 2023.


Packers Outlook: The Packers edge position is a real mix: The experienced veteran (Preston Smith), the exciting developing talent (Rashan Gary), the second year guy looking to take a leap (Kingsley Enagbare), the underrated (Justin Hollins) and the guys competing to make the roster (Jonathan Garvin and Ladarius Hamilton).

The Packers could do with another high skilled player to complete this group, especially with the ACL injury to Gary, from which he is recovering. If they go this way in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round, look for the pick to be Lukas Van Ness or Myles Murphy. Around round 3, Andre Carter of Army fits the profile and later in the draft perhaps somebody like Ali Gaye (LSU) or Dylan Horton (TCU) could be an interesting pick.

However, he isn't yet as productive in terms of sacks as all of his skills suggest he should be. Perhaps could do with adding some more pass rush moves.

Stands up well against the run, using his strength and power to hold up linemen firing out. Will pull running backs down from behind.

Van Ness can also deliver on special teams having displayed a skill for blocking punts which he did in college and high school.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Having entered this draft with a substantial amount of college eligibility remaining will raise questions of to whether Van Ness should have added more experience (by returning to school) before entering the NFL. Of course, only time will tell. Nonetheless, he really helped his cause with a fine showing at the combine. It will be interesting to see what position pro teams project him to play - it's certainly possible that he could be a either 4-3 defensive end or big 3-4 outside linebacker, with potential also to play inside. Perhaps the most exciting thing about Van Ness is that he appears to be just scratching the surface of what his production may become i.e. has upside is huge. Expect him to be off the board somewhere around the middle of round 1.

High School: Born in Marietta, Georgia, Murphy was an outstanding defensive end in high school in Powder Springs - being rated as one of the very best players in both the state and the nation.

College: As you would expect, Murphy received multiple offers from Power 5 schools, before opting to play his college ball at Clemson. Became a part-time starter and huge contibutor in his freshman season (2020), before becoming a full-time starter on the defensive line in 2021. Followed that up with another good year as a starter in 2022. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In his 3 years at Clemson, Murphy played in 36 games (27 starts). He recorded 17.5 sacks, 37 tackles for a loss and 119 tackles ( 61 solo). Also had 5 pass break-ups, 6 forced fumbles and he blocked 1 PAT.

Murphy has good size, bulk and is tall with really good length. Has positional versatility having lined up both as a down lineman and as a stand-up outside linebacker on the edge. Murphy has a non-stop motor and plays to the whistle on every down.

As a pass rusher Murphy has a really quick first step and good hands which he can get on offensive linemen at speed. Will beat those lineman with leverage, forcing them off balance and forcing his way through the gaps. Could still do with adding some more pass rushing moves.

Very good against the run, where he uses his strength and power at the point. Isn't going to get moved off the line. Will also run plays down from behind. Needs to improve his tackling.

Is a playmaker who has a knack for jarring the football loose from ball carriers, forcing turnovers.

Murphy has no reported major injury history; however he did suffer a minor hamstring injury at the combine in early March 2023, which forced him to sit out workouts.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Different teams likely see Murphy in different roles in the NFL. It seems most likely that he plays as a 4-3 defensive end, although some may see him as oversized 3-4 outside linebacker (a la Rashan Gary) or even as a 4-3 defensive tackle. Wherever he ends up positionally, there's no doubt that Murphy has the traits and upside to be very successful at the pro level and perhaps even a day 1 starter in 2023. Will likely be the third edge player off the board (after Anderson and Wilson) at some point around the middle of round 1.

## NOLAN SMITH (Georgia)

High School: Off the back of a fine high school career in Florida, Smith was one of the most highly rated players in the nation.

College: He was highly recruited by a number of FBS schools before opting to attend the University of Georgia. Smith won a starting job in 2021 after 2 seasons as a reserve - having an excellent season. Smith was having another outstanding season when he was injured midway through 2022.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons at Georgia (2019-22), Smith played in 46 games ( 23 starts). He recorded 11.5 sacks, 79 QB hurries, 21 tackles for a loss and 114 total tackles ( 66 solo). Also had 1 interception, 3 pass break-ups, 3 forced fumbles and 1 fumble recovery. Blocked 1 punt for a safety.

Smith is a dynamic athlete, with agility, speed and acceleration. He

Smith is an exposive pass rusher - real threat from the outside, with a quick first step. Has that bend round the edge that most elite edge rushers have and the closing speed to pursue and chase down the quarterback. Needs to convert more of his many quarterback hurries into sacks.

Smith plays well against the run considering his size. He often will use his smarts and agility to avoid blocks to make the play. Can get tied up with blockers, but he plays stronger than his size and works hard to shed those blocks.

Used occasionally dropping into coverage but will need to develop more in this area.
Smith has some special teams ability in addition to his defensive skills. Speed off the edge helped him block a punt for Georgia, something that he also did on multiple occasions in high school.

2022 Suffered a torn pectoral muscle in October which required surgery and kept him out of the remainder of the season. Seemingly fully recovered by the time of the combine (early March), where has put on a show. 2021 Missed 1 game due to an elbow injury.

Honours \& Awards: 2019 University of Georgia Co-Defensive Player of the Year Award winner.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

After an excellent 2021, Smith was reported as considering entering the 2022 draft, but finally opted instead to return to Georgia for another year. Coming back from midseason injury, Smith had an outstanding combine (40, vertical), in the process securing his position in the top 5 edge players in this draft and as a probable $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick. Any team looking for an edge pass rusher from the 3-4 outside linebacker spot will be a possibility to draft him - likely in the top 20 or so picks overall.

## DREW SANDERS (Arkansas)

High School: Played both quarterback and linebacker in HS in Texas.
College: Was highly ranked at the linebacker spot and had a lot of interest from major colleges before committing to play at Oklahoma. However, Sanders later switched his verbal commitment to then play at Alabama. Played mainly as a back-up in his two seasons for the Crimson Tide (2020-21), making just 3 starts. Decided to transfer to Arkansas between the 2021 and 2022 seasons. Had an excellent single season for the Razorbacks, earning All-American recognition. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In his 2 seasons at Alabama (2020-21), Sanders played in 24 games ( 3 starts). He recorded 33 tackles ( 16 solo), 1 sack, 2.5 tackles for a loss, 5 quarterback hurries and 2 pass break-ups.

In his single season at Arkansas (2022), Sanders played in 12 games (12 starts). He recorded 103 tackles ( 40 solo), 9.5 sacks, 13.6 tackles for a loss, 3 forced fumbles, 1 interception and 5 pass break-ups.

Sanders is a dynamic and exciting linebacker who has a great combination of size, strength and athletic ability. He played mainly on the inside at Arkansas, although he was also utilised as a pass rusher off the edge. Lacks some experience, having only been a starter for 1 full year.

Sanders has outstanding pass rush skills utilising his speed and acceleration - both from the outside (round the edge) and from the inside where he times up shooting the gap extremely well. Also has been decent when asked to drop into coverage.

Against the run, Sanders has demonstrated that he is able to use his strength to shed blocks from offensive linemen and make the play. Will also utilise his speed to get to the sideline. He has great range. However, Sanders misses or falls off a few too many tackles at this stage in his career - it's a development need.

2021 Suffered a hand injury that required midseason surgery, forced him to miss 3 games. Returned with no apparent ongoing problems.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Sanders is an interesting player with versatility and the potential to play either on the edge as an outside linebacker in the 3-4 or as an inside linebacker. Was just a one-year starter in college, which will be of some concern to NFL teams, but Sanders has huge potential - an upside that will intrigue and excite scouts. Expect him to be selected near the top of round 2 he may even sneak into the bottom part of round 1.

## B.J. OJULARI (LSU)

Misc: Full name is Jamiu Bolaji Ojulari - BJ is a nickname. His brother Azeez is an OLB for the Giants (having been drafted in 2021).

High School: BJ was born in Marietta, Georgia and played his highly successful high school football career there (operating on both the offensive and defensive lines).

College: Was strongly recruited by multiple Power 5 schools before he opted to play his college ball at LSU. Had a fine season as a true freshman in 2020, playing mainly as a rotational player at defensive end. Became a starter in 2021 - having another good year - before having an all-conference season in 2022. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In his 3 seasons (2020-22) at LSU, Ojulari played in 34 games ( 24 starts), recording 16.5 sacks, 25 tackles for a loss, 129 tackles ( 79 solo), 2 pass break-ups and 2 forced fumbles.

Ojulari is a fine athlete with agility and speed, although he lacks the prototypical height for a 34 pro outside linebacker. Ojulari brings outstanding pass rushing skills, with an explosive first step, acceleration and the desired bend around the edge. Also has developed a number of pass rushing moves which, combined with the aforementioned speed, enable him to offensive tackles under immense pressure.

Against the run, he will his closing speed to track ball carriers down but will struggle when blockers get their hands gripped on him. The ability to fight off offensive linemen is an area of development need. Whilst it wasn't a primary part of his role, Ojulari does have a little experience dropping into coverage.

Missed 2 games due to a knee injury early in the 2022 season but has no reported major injury history.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Ojulari opted to declare for this draft rather than return to LSU for the 2023 season - on the face of it this decision may be somewhat surprising, as a big 2023 may have helped his draft case. However, his lack of a little height and length, which may concern NFL scouts, is not going to change and therefore wouldn't be helped by another year in college. Ojulari will have to learn all of the nuances of playing outside linebacker in the pros so will have some developing to do, but he has outstanding athletic ability and traits with an upside that could be huge. A team that has a little time to help that development would get a standout pass rusher early in his career, who can become an all-round outside linebacker in time. Should be off the board o day 2 , with a chance that he could be selected towards the end of round 1.

## WILL McDONALD IV (Iowa State)

High School: Waukesha, Wisconsin native. McDonald started his high school career primarily playing basketball and then taking part in track and field before becoming a star football player at Waukesha North HS - earning all-state honours as a senior.

College: Chose to attend lowa State early in the recruitment process. McDonald redshirted the 2018 season (playing just 4 games), before having a nice 2019. Broke out in 2020 ( 10.5 sacks) and continued that outstanding form in 2021 - earning some All-American notice. Was good in 2022, while not being quite as productive as in the previous 2 years. Earned $1^{\text {st }}$ team all-conference recognition in each of 2020-22.

College Stats: In his 5 seasons at lowa State, McDonald played in 54 games, recording 34 sacks, 19 quarterback hurries, 42 tackles for a loss, 123 tackles ( 79 solo), 4 pass break-ups, 10 forced fumbles, 1 fumble recovery.

McDonald is slightly undersized as compared to the prototypical outside linebacker. Despite this lack of size however, he had a highly productive college career rushing the passer from a defensive end/outside linebacker spot. He is a fine athlete with speed and agility.

As a pass rusher off the edge, McDonald has a really quick first step, speed and bend around the edge and the acceleration to close on the QB. While $h$ he isn't going to overpower linemen, McDonald has a number of moves to add to the aforementioned traits which allow him to challenge even the most athletic of tackles. Also has a penchant for forcing fumbles.

Struggles some in the running game as offensive linemen that get their hands and body on him will overpower him. Needs work in this area.

Whilst he played some DE and OLB in college, McDonald's size dictates that he'll be a 3-4 OLB in the NFL He is probably a little one-dimensional for some NFL scouts right now, but when that one-dimension is as an excellent pass rusher there will be a number of teams who will still be very excited about his skills and upside. And while he is likely to play initially as an all-out rusher off the edge, McDonald can heavily contribute in his first season while learning the nuances of the pro outside linebacker position. Pass rushing skills are so good that he should be selected in round 2 or possibly sneak into the end of round 1.

Good size and athletic ability. Relentless football player, who plays with a non-stop motor and appears to get stronger as games progress. Is a really good pass rusher, utilising his quick first step and speed to challenge blockers. He also has a nice bend, which is unusual in a man of his size. Uses his hands well to create leverage and has strength and drive to bull-rush. Accelerates to close on QBs. Needs to turn his impressive skills into more production.

Can be knocked off balance in a straight-ahead running game. However on plays run away from him, he has the acceleration to run ball carriers down. Has Surprisingly been used on occasion dropping into coverage - and is pretty good at it - which for a man of his size is a special ability.

2023 Suffered a hamstring injury at his pro day in the middle of March. 2021 Missed much of the season due to a broken ankle suffered in the summer. Played in just the last 4 games of the season.

The hamstring injury that he suffered at his pro day may raise a small question mark over White's draft status, especially when his 2021 ankle injury is also taken into account. Nonetheless, White is a multi-skilled player who could play multiple positions in the pros - and his size/frame mans that it's possible that he lines up at any spot on the line in the 4-3. With his height and length coupled with his pass rushing ability, it seems likely that teams will begin by utilising him on the edge ( $4-3 \mathrm{DE}$ ) of the line first. Expect him to be off the board in round 2 .

## ISAIAH FOSKEY (Notre Dame)

High School: Played multiple positions on the football field, including defensive end and tight end in a successful high school career in California.

College: Opted to attend Notre Dame over multiple other offers. After playing two seasons as a back-up (2019-20), Foskey won a starting role in 2021. In both 2021 and 2022, Foskey excelled, particularly as a pass rusher. Won All-American honours in 2022.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons for the Fighting Irish (2019-22), Foskey played in 41 games ( 25 starts). He recorded 26.5 sacks, 31.5 tackles for a loss and 122 total tackles ( 74 solo). Also 7 forced fumbles, 3 fumble recoveries, 2 pass break-ups and blocked 4 punts.

Foskey has good combination of size, length and athletic ability. He plays with urgency and tenacity and keeps going all day. Is a team leader type, reportedly with a great attitude. Also has some

Foskey is an outstanding speed pass rusher, where he uses his quickness and acceleration to make plays around the edge. Will also utilise his long arms to create leverage. However, he can, on occasion, be overpowered by big and physical offensive tackles - may need to develop moves to be able to shed these blocks.

Needs work playing the run. Like in the pass rush, Foskey can struggle with linemen who get their bodies on him. However once in space, he has the athletic ability to pursue and chase running plays down from behind.

Has a penchant for forcing fumbles. Is also an outstanding special teams player, with a knack for blocking punts - which he did in high school and college.

Had a shoulder injury that hampered him a little in 2022 - although he didn't miss any games because of it. Has no reported major injury history.

Foskey has improved year on year, and he built on that by performing well at the Senior Bowl. Players with pass rushing ability like Foskey's are always in fashion with NFL scouts and because of his ability to seal the deal in that crucial phase of the game, and while he has some development to undertake, we should expect to see him selected early in round 2 - with a chance that he sneaks into the bottom end of round 1 . Could end up playing either as a 4-3 defensive end or 3-4 outside linebacker in the NFL.

## FELIX ANUDIKE-UZOMAH (Kansas St)

High School: Anudike-Uzomah had a highly productive HS career in Missouri, earning all-state honours as a senior and multiple alldistrict honours. However, this didn't translate into a multitude of scholarship offers.

College: Eventually decided to attend Kansas State. Played mainly as a back-up in his true freshman season (2020) before becoming a starter in what was an excellent sophomore season. Followed that up with another outstanding season in 2022, earning a number of post-season honours. Junior who opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school.

College Stats: In his 3 seasons (2020-22) at Kansas State, AnudikeUzomah played in 32 games ( 27 starts), recording 20.5 sacks, 7 quarterback hurries, 26.5 tackles for a loss, 100 total tackles ( 70 solo), 1 pass break-up and 8 forced fumbles. Also scored 1 safety.

Has good size for an OLB at the pro level. Plays with a non-stop motor and keeps going on every down, fighting and mauling, never giving up. Is the prototypical "plays with his hair on fire" type guy.

Excellent pass rusher who uses a mixture of explosion, power, moves and a little speed to challenge offensive linemen on the edge. Has terrific closing acceleration. Is prolific at stripping the football from quarterbacks. Sometimes may need to control his natural instincts however, as his aggressiveness can sometimes carry him beyond the QB and out of the play.

Against the run, he is better when playing in space rather than having to work through traffic. Has difficulties shrugging off blockers in the running game once they have their hands on him. Has minimal experience dropping into coverage.

Had minor surgery on a knee injury at the end of the 2021 season, but rehabbed during the offseason and came back in 2022 seemingly with no ongoing issues.

Expect him to come into the pros initially as a $3^{\text {rd }}$ down rusher but as he develops he'll become an every down player. His pass rush skills should see him selected in round 2.

## DERICK HALL (Auburn)

High School: Had a very successful high school career in Mississippi, earning all-state honours.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Auburn, over offers from a number of other schools. Played as a back-up in his freshman season (2019) for the Tigers. Earned a part-time starting role in 2020 before really breaking out in an excellent 2021 season in which he earned some All-Conference honours. Was even better in 2022, becoming $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-Conference.

Also has a little bend around that edge. Utilises his strength and leverage well and has been developing pass rush moves, expanding the ways in which he can beat offensive linemen.

Hall has been improving against the run but is still far from dominant in this area. He tends to struggle to work through traffic and to shed blocks. However, he has the speed and acceleration to chase runners down from behind.

Has some experience in pass coverage, although can be inconsistent here. Needs to develop further in this area.

Has the size and strength to hold up blockers at the point of attack in the running game - needs to do this more consistently. Developing his hand work will help here. Wil pursue ball carriers and has the acceleration to run them down from behind.

Has a knack for forcing fumbles.

Unfortunately, he wasn't able to help his draft status at the combine, as he had to sit out the drills due to a hamstring tweak. But make no mistake, Harrison has the potential to be an outstanding NFL player - he has a huge upside and ceiling. On that basis, expect him to be selected as some point on day 2.

High School: Carter had a nice high school football career in Texas, playing multiple positions, before he missed much of his senior year through injury. Followed this by a playing a year at a prep school in Connecticut.

College: Opted to attend Army. Sat out most of his freshman season at Army (2019) before playing the majority of 2020 as a back-up. Had a huge breakout season in 2021 earning some All-American notice, before having a solid year in 2022.

College Stats: In his 4 seasons (2019-22) at Army, Carter played in 36 games (25 starts), recording 20 sacks, 6 quarterback hurries, 25.5 tackles for a loss, 99 total tackles ( 62 solo), 2 interceptions, 5 pass break-ups, 5 forced fumbles and 1 fumble recovery. Also blocked 2

Carter is a big man with a large wingspan, who is super athletic. He is an every down, all-out, player who has a non-stop motor.

Carter is an outstanding pass rusher with great speed and agility. Really demonstrates his athleticism and body fluidity with an excellent bend around the edge. Has the acceleration to close on the quarterback. And he keeps going - if his initial pass rush is stopped, Carter will continue to hustle and make plays with his second effort.

In the running game, Carter isn't as effective as he is rushing the passer. He'll use his long arms to get leverage but also is perhaps not as strong as he could be, and he can get caught up in traffic. Doesn't shrug off those blockers as well as he might. Will use his speed to pursue ball carriers from behind.

Has some experience in pass coverage, which will help his case to play outside linebacker in the NFL. Also has a penchant for both ripping the football from ball carriers and for blocking kicks.

Missed much of his senior year in high school (2017) due to a back injury. As he has played a number of subsequent years, there are no reported issues from that injury.

Let's start here - no player from Army has ever been drafted higher than the $7^{\text {th }}$ round (twice, one of the being the Packers drafting QB Ronnie McAda in 1997), but that will change this year with Carter, especially now that a recent change will allow him to play pro football before completing his military commitment. Carter looks like he projects to 3-4 outside linebacker or $4-3$ defensive end in the NFL, although given what he is good at and the areas where he needs to develop, it looks like the outside linebacker spot where he can operate in some space would be ideal. Expect him to be off the board at some point on day 2.

## BYRON YOUNG (Tennessee)

Misc: Nicknamed "B.Y.".
High School: Played his high school football in South Carolina but didn't receive any major scholarship offers.

College: Didn't play any football for over a year before walking on at Georgia Military College - playing there for a single outstanding season (2019). When the 2020 season at the junior college level was cancelled (due to the pandemic), Young received multiple offers from FBS schools and opted to transfer to the University of Tennessee. Against the run, Young is a solid player although he can struggle to slip blocks when faced with big, physical offensive linemen. Much better in space where he can pursue and run ball carriers down from behind. Has little experience dropping into pass coverage.

We've projected Herbig to stay at 3-4 OLB at the next level - but because of his size and all-round playing versatility don't rule out a move to weakside LB in the 4-3. Initially likely to find a role as a back-up and special teams player in the NFL, with a chance to become a starter as he develops. Could also be used as situational player on passing downs. Should be off the board in round 3 or 4.

## MIKE MORRIS (Michigan)

High School: Good high school career in Florida, playing DE.
College: Morris accepted an offer from his home state Florida State Seminoles - before switching that verbal commitment to play his college ball at Michigan. Morris was pretty much non-existent (just 1 game) in his first 2 seasons for the Wolverines. In his third year (2021) he played in every game but started in just 4 - his playing time over those first 3 years being limited due to the likes of Aidan Hutchinson, Kwity Paye and David Ojabo being on the roster. Opted to declare for this draft with eligibility remaining.

Is improving as a pass rusher where he uses that aforementioned arm length to help with his pass rush moves and leverage. He has the footspeed and explosion to get through the B gap or around the outside, although he doesn't really have great bend around edge and can be driven beyond the quarterback but when he gets the quarterback in his sights he is quick to close the gap and make the hit.

Has gradually developed and improved throughout his college career and therefore has the indications of a player who still has more to come - he has some upside. Playing at Missouri in amongst some really talented players in the SEC means that McGuire could possibly have gone under the radar and be somewhat underrated. Expect him to be selected early on day 3.

## K.J. HENRY (Clemson)

High School: Dual-sport athlete in high school in South Carolina playing basketball as well as football.

College: Highly recruited, Henry opted to stay in his home state and play his college ball at Clemson, turning down offers from the likes of Alabama and Georgia. Redshirted his true freshman season with the Tigers (2018), playing in just 4 games. Played mainly as a back-up in 2019, providing rotational support to Clemson's fine defense. Was a part-time starter in both 2020 and 2021. Finally became the full-time starter in 2022, putting in a really nice performance and earning some All-American recognition.

Either way, he's likely to be utilised predominantly as a third down pass rusher in his early days in the NFL - he can contribute in that role immediately. But, and it's a big but, Cox's reported off the field issues will certainly be of concern to NFL teams. Taking everything into account, it's likely that Cox will be selected on day 3 , probably in round 4 or 5 .

## YAYA DIABY (Louisville)

High School: Attended high school just south of Atlanta, Georgia.
College: Didn't get scholarship offers so Diaby enrolled at the junior college level at Georgia Military College, playing there for two seasons. Became a starter in his first year at Louisville (2020), having a solid year, although he missed time due to an ankle injury. Followed that up with another sound season in 2021. Really broke out with a very good 2022 ( 9 sacks), earned all-conference notice.

At this stage of his career, Diaby is much more of a pass rusher than he is of a run stopper and therefore it looks like his early days in the NFL will be spent as a specialist in that role. Diaby is a player on the rise, improving greatly over the last season or so. How high his upside will be remains to be seen but expect NFL teams to be intrigued by him. Should be selected at some point on day 3 .

Played in 41 career games with 23 starts, recording 99 tackles, 22.5 tackles for a loss, 15 sacks, 2 pass break-ups, 1 forced fumble, 2 fumble recoveries and 1 blocked kick.

Across his college career Gaye played in 27 games, recording 87 tackles, 18 tackles for a loss, 7 sacks, 1 interception, 8 pass break-ups, 3 forced fumble and 1 fumble recovery.

## LINEBACKERS

2023 General Draft Outlook: The number of "off-the-ball" linebackers selected in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round in any given year usually averages around 2 , but this year it seems highly likely that only one will be off the board on day 1 - and it's not beyond the realms of possibility that none are taken on the first day. This isn't perhaps the strongest or deepest group of linebackers that we've seen in recent years.

The most likely player to go in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round at this spot this year is Clemson's Trenton Simpson, who, while being perhaps slightly undersized, is a fantastic athlete who plays great speed and dynamism.

For a team looking for help at this position, the real strength may be on day 2, starting with Iowa's Jack Campbell. Campbell is followed by the likes of Daiyan Henley, Noah Sewell, Henry To'oto'o and DeMarvion Overshown.

On day 3 of the draft, the speedy but undersized Dorian Williams of Tulane may intrigue a number of teams.


Packers Outlook: The Packers appear to be well set at the linebacker position, at least at the starting spots, with last year's $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick Quay Walker and 2021 All-Pro De’Vondre Campbell manning the reigns. Behind them on the depth chart are Isaiah McDuffie and Eric Wilson both guys who can fill in for short periods of time, but mainly will see special teams duty.

So perhaps a middle to late round pick on a guy that can play special teams and be developed as a defensive player may be the way to go here. The aforementioned Dorian Williams, or perhaps somebody like Pittsburgh's SirVocea Dennis could be a worthwhile choice for the Packers.

## CORNERBACKS

2023 General Draft Outlook: Passing the football and stopping the pass are key to success in today's NFL. One of the keys to stopping the pass is skill at the cornerback position, hence the number of corners that are selected each year - between 4 and 5 in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round on average and around 32 on average across the whole draft. This year doesn't look any different.

Two corners should go early in this year's draft, most likely in the top 10 overall - they are Christian Gonzalez of Oregon and Illinois' Devon Witherspoon. Penn State's Joey Porter should be next off the board somewhere between picks 11 and 20 and then Deonte Banks of Maryland should be the fourth corner selected in round 1.

Georgia's Kelee Ringo may be the fifth corner selected in round 1, although he fall into round 2. The same can be said about Cam Smith and Emmanuel Forbes. Even after these 3, there could be yet another 8 or 9 corners that are in contention to be picked on day 2 - this is a deep group. One of the players in this group who will garner a lot of attention is Michigan's D.J. Turner, thanks to the outstanding 4.26 he ran at the 40 in the combine.


Packers Outlook: The Packers are secure at one cornerback spot (Jaire Alexander) and at a second if Rasul Douglas isn't moved to safety. Eric Stokes is still recovering from last year's injury so remains a question mark, as is the depth at this position. The other corners on the roster are Keisean Nixon, Shemar Jean-Charles, Kiondre Thomas, Tyrell Ford, Corey Ballentine and Benjie Franklin. All of this means that corner is again a position that the Packers may turn to this time around.

If they pick at the position in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round, again, then Joey Porter could be that guy who will be available. The aforementioned D.J. Turner could be of interest on day 2 . If they give the position attention later in the draft, then somebody like Darius Rush of South Carolina could be of interest.

Ricks' big play potential will always be in fashion, so (injuries permitting) he is likely to be a contributor quickly in NFL as eventually could become a starter. ## SAFETIES

2023 General Draft Outlook: The 2023 group of safeties is not the strongest or deepest group that we have seen. It includes a number of players whose forte has been as a nickel (slot) corner as much as it is playing the pure safety position. Top of this list is Alabama's Brian Branch. Branch is likely to be selected in the 1st round by a team that is looking for his specific set of skills - he may well be the only safety that comes off the board on day 1.

The second safety likely to be selected is Antonio Johnson, who is of a similar ilk to Branch. Johnson should be chosen in round 2 . He will be followed by a number of players in the $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $3^{\text {rd }}$ rounds - these are likely to include Christopher Smith II, Jordan Battle, Jammie Robinson and JL Skinner (Skinner is currently injured which may impact his draft position).

As the draft goes on, we can expect about 20 safeties will be selected in total - this is about the average for recent years. The later safeties to be picked will include the third safety from Alabama, DeMarcco Hellams, and Brandon Joseph of Notre Dame.


Packers Outlook: This is a huge area of need for the Packers, having seemingly lost their best player at the position Adrian Amos (unrestricted free agent) from a group that wasn't deep to begin with. Barring further additions, Darnell Savage and Rudy Ford look like the starters going into 2023, being backed up the likes of Dallin Leavitt, Innes Gaines and Tariq Carpenter. The Packers have also signed Tarvarius Moore in free agency, although he's more of a special teams guy.

Expect the Packers to draft at least one safety this time around. If it's in round 1, then it will surely be Brian Branch, even though his skills don't fit the need of a deep safety. If it's round 2 or 3, then Antonio Johnson and Jordan Battle probably come closest to the athletic and physical fit for Green Bay. If they wait until later in the draft then any number of players could be a possibility on day 3.

Branch predominantly played the STAR position at Alabama - a position that requires the skills of a strongside linebacker, safety, and a little nickel (slot) corner. He is also accomplished in underneath short zone coverage and some man coverage short, with help behind.

Branch's play against the run showed up in the big plays he made behind the line of scrimmage, and he coupled this with excellent timing when used to blitz the passer off the edge.

The "downside" to Branch is that he wasn't used that much as a deep safety in deep zone coverage (cover 1 or cover 2) and so perhaps lacks some experience in that area.

Missed part of a single game in 2022 with an undisclosed minor injury but other than that, Branch has no reported injury history.

At this stage in his career, Branch is much better playing close to the line of scrimmage rather than deep in coverage and would suit a team looking for a box safety type or nickel (slot) corner. Branch didn't exactly light things up at the combine, but nonetheless, Branch is still likely to be the first safety off the board in this draft - probably in the top 15 or so picks.

High School: Johnson had a fine high school career in Illinois, playing both defensive back and wide receiver.

College: He eventually opted to play his college ball at College

Johnson played exceptionally well as the starter again in 2022 earning all-conference honours - prompting him to declare for this draft as an underclassman rather than return to school for another year.

When playing close to the line of scrimmage, Johnson will provide teams with excellent versatility - covering well (slot receivers, tight ends and backs coming out of the backfield) and stepping up to play the run. He is a physical and feisty player who likes to put the big hit on ball carriers, and he makes a lot of tackles - although he needs to become a little bit more consistent wrapping up.

Perhaps lacks the out and out long speed to cover receivers long or play as a permanent deep safety (e.g. free safety in cover 1).

Could do with making more splash (turnover worthy) plays.
Missed 3 games in 2022 due to an undisclosed injury, however, has no reported major injury history.

Won the full-time starting spot in 2020, having a really nice season. Followed that with an excellent 2021, when he was one of the very best safeties in the country. Opted to return to the Crimson Tide for his senior season in 2022 earning some All-American notice and All-SEC honours for the second straight year.

Can play deep in zones (in cover 1 and cover 2 ) and has had some success in this role, but at the next level he will likely be better closer to the line of scrimmage. He has gradually moved up draft boards on the back of a very nice 2022 season, to the point that he is easily within the top 10 at his position available to the NFL this time around. Further helped his cause when he was voted one of the Practice Players of the Week at the Senior Bowl (although he missed the game itself due to a family bereavement). However, he suffered a pectoral injury, when preparing for the draft, just prior to the combine, which does cloud his draft status a little. Skinner should be off the board on day 2, assuming that teams are comfortable with his injury recovery schedule, and he should become an NFL starter sooner rather than later.

## CHRISTOPHER SMITH II (Georgia)

High School: Smith had a highly successful dual sport high school career in Georgia, excelling at track and field ( 100 m ) as well as on the football field.

College: Opted to stay close to home and play his college ball at the University of Georgia. Played as a back-up DB and special teams guy in his true freshman and sophomore seasons before stepping into the starting job midway through his junior (2020) season. Took a big leap in 2021 as a fulltime starter and followed this up with another outstanding year as a Super Senior in 2022 - earning All-American honours as one of the nation's premier safeties.

College Stats: Played in 58 games for the Bulldogs, recording 6 interceptions, 10 pass break-ups, 133 tackles ( 87 solo), 5 tackles for a loss, 1 sack, 6 quarterback pressures, 1 fumble recovery and 1 forced fumble. Also scored a touchdown on a 96-yard return of a blocked field goal in the 2022 SEC Championship Game.

Smith is an extremely versatile player, who plays solidly with few mistakes in most areas asked of him at the safety position - i.e. diagnosing plays in front of him, coverage, playing the run.

He is slightly undersized, and isn't regarded as a big hitting safety, but Smith wraps up nicely as a tackler and generally gets the job done in this respect. Is also one of those guys who always appears to be around the football.

Thanks to his instincts and athleticism, Smith is good in pass coverage (improving in 2021 and 2022) being able to anticipate routes and make plays on the football or receiver. He also has good hands, being able to turn pass break-ups into interceptions.

Smith has good experience playing on multiple special teams coverage units.
Suffered a minor shoulder separation in 2021, missing playing time in a couple of games. Also had a minor shoulder injury early in the 2022 season but didn't miss any games. Has no other reported injury history.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Smith is a super experienced player, who has played in lots of big games, and has improved over the last two seasons. He is capable of making the big play but would better be described as an all-round solid, rather than spectacular, player who will contribute on defense and special teams. Assuming that there are no problems caused by the minor shoulder injuries (and there currently are no indications of any ongoing issues), Smith should be one of the top 5 safeties selected in this draft and be off the board on Day 2 and will likely develop into a long time NFL starter.

It's quite possible that he ends up as a starting free safety or even a swing safety or nickel/dime back. Where teams see him, will determine how high he is selected. Around the $3^{\text {rd }}$ round seems likely.

## JI'AYIR BROWN (Penn State)

Misc: Nicknamed "Tig".
High School: Played both basketball and football in high school in New Jersey.

College: Lacking offers from FBS colleges, Brown enrolled in junior college at Lackawanna Community College (Pennsylvania) where he spent 2 outstanding years (2018-19). Transferred to Penn State prior to the 2020 season. Played primarily as a back-up and on special teams in his first Nittany Lions' season before becoming a starter in 2021 - having a very good year. Followed that up with a similar season in 2022.

College Stats: In his 2 seasons (2018-19) at Lackawanna Community College, Brown recorded 8 interceptions, 8 pass break-ups, 75 tackles and 1 fumble recovery.

In his 3 seasons (2020-22) at Penn State, Brown played in 35 games ( 25 starts), recording 10 interceptions (returning 1 for a touchdown), 9 pass break-ups, 153 tackles ( 122 solo), 9 tackles for a loss, 4.5 sacks, 5 quarterback hurries, 3 forced fumbles and 3 fumble recoveries (including 1 returned for a touchdown).

Brown lacks the ideal height for an NFL safety, but he brings good instincts, experience and versatility to the position - can play free safety, closer to the line of scrimmage or as a nickel corner covering the slot receiver. Plays with a non-stop motor.

Brown tracks the football in the air extremely well both from the deep safety spot and when in man coverage, and couples this with excellent hands. Makes big turnover plays.

Is a decent but not outstanding athlete, who will get up and play the run well.

Like a number of other safeties in this draft, Brown lacks the prototypical safety size. He does come with excellent versatility being able to play about safety role, including as a nickel corner - however the danger is that he could be seen by NFL scouts as a kind of "jack of all trades, master of none" type player. It remains to be seen if he can carve a niche position. Working in Brown's favour are the big plays that he makes - he has been a turnover machine, and that is always in vogue amongst NFL teams. Has the look of a long time NFL player because of his versatility, with the potential to become a starter. Should be selected around round 3.

## BRANDON JOSEPH (Notre Dame)

High School: Won all-state honours in high school career in Texas.

But if he can build on 2020, then he has the capability to be a long-time starter.

College: Opted to stay close to home and play his college ball at California. Redshirted his true freshman season (2017) before spending 2 seasons on special teams and as a back-up safety. Became the starter in 2020 in the severely truncated season (due to the pandemic). Started again at safety in 2021 and earned allconference recognition. Perhaps wasn't as good in 2022 as he had been the previous year, while again being the full-time starter.

Scott's versatility will help him as he challenges for an NFL roster spot but being nearly 25 years old when the 2023 NFL season starts probably works against him in terms of the possibility to develop - at least in the eyes of scouts. Having a good Senior Bowl would have helped Scott, but unfortunately he didn't have the greatest of weeks. He did show up well at the combine. It seems likely that Scott's NFL career will be as a back-up to both safety spots and as a special teams coverage guy. Should be off the board on day 3.

High School: Ward was a fine high school defensive back in Georgia with a penchant for making big plays, including 10 interceptions across his final two high school seasons.

College: Opted to play his college ball at LSU. Played mainly on special teams and as a back-up in his true freshman season (2019). The first part of 2020 was similar to the previous season before he became a starting corner towards the end of the year. Ward became a full-time starter (mainly at safety) in a fine 2021, which then followed up with another good year in 2022, playing some free safety and then nickel corner.

2022 Missed 2 games due to an undisclosed minor injury. 2020 Suffered a torn meniscus in his knee which required surgery just prior to the season but showed his extreme toughness by playing through it.

In shortened 2020 season, Hickman played mainly on special teams before finally becoming the starting strong safety at OSU in 2021 - making an impact, winning some allconference honours. Started every game again in 2022, garnering allconference notice for the second straight year. Opted to declare for this draft with eligibility remaining.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

When it comes to Ronnie Hickman, one of the first things NFL teams are going to have to ask themselves is exactly what is he at the next level - is he really a true safety or is he one of those hybrid linebacker-safeties that have come to the fore in the last few years? Hickman doesn't make many huge, game changing plays, but what he does do well is get up in the box, close to the line of scrimmage, and play tough against the run. In fairness, Hickman may have looked better in the passing game in 2022 than he had previously, but then had some struggles at the Senior Bowl, which re-raised questions. Expect Hickman to be selected on day 3.

## TREY DEAN III (Florida)

Misc: Dean's cousin Ahmad Black played safety in the NFL for 3 seasons (2011-13) with the Buccaneers.

High School: Highly rated safety in high school just south of Atlanta, Georgia.

College: Opted to play his college ball at Florida after previously committing to Tennessee. Became a starter during his true freshman season (2018) and followed that up with a season where he started about half of the games. Spent most of 2020 as a back-up and on special teams. Bounced back to start all but 1 game in 2021, before being the full-time starter at safety in 2022 and probably having his best year.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

The early favourite would likely be as a strong safety, where he can use his size and physicality in the box. Has a decent chance of sticking on an NFL roster as a back-up for multiple secondary spots and to play on special teams units. Expect him to be off the board around round 6 or 7.

## DeMARCCO HELLAMS (Alabama)

High School: Nicknamed "Hitman Hellams" or simply "Hitman". Hellams had a highly successful high school career in Maryland playing both wide receiver ( 1,469 yards as a senior) and defensive back (12 interceptions as a senior).

College: Was highly recruited by a number of the "biggest" football colleges in the country, some to play wide receiver and some to play safety. Finally opted to play his college ball at Alabama - playing at the safety spot. As a true freshman in 2019, Hellams played extensively on special teams while playing little as a back-up on defense. In 2020, Hellams was again extensively used on special teams units while also making his first 3 starts at safety.

When playing in deep zones, he doesn't make as many plays as he should, sometimes appearing to be too patient allowing plays to develop in front of him. Also doesn't have the outstanding speed required to play deep on a consistent basis. Generally needs to make more big (turnover worthy) plays.

Has extensive high level special teams experience.
2023 Suffered an undisclosed injury which prevented him from playing in the Senior Bowl, however he did take part in some of the combine drills. 2021 Suffered a sprained ankle just prior to the start of the season. Forced him to miss starting the opening game of the season (although he did play during the game).

Honours \& Awards: 2022 Pat Trammel Award co-winner (Character and contribution to Alabama Football Team). Alabama Team Outstanding Defensive Performer Award co-winner.

## DRAFT OUTLOOK

Hellams is a sound football player who contributes well when used in the role(s) that suit his attributes. At his best as a disruptor in amongst traffic close to the line of scrimmage - it is in this role where he can best challenge for an NFL roster spot coupled with his ability as an outstanding special teams performer. He has lots of experience on special teams coverage units. With these skills, Hellams has a decent chance of making a roster or practice squad as a rookie. Expect him to be off the board late on day 3.

Likely a late round draft choice. Had an outstanding 2022 season, notching up 6 interceptions. Across his college career Taylor played in 38 games, recording 8 interceptions (including 1 returned for a touchdown), 11 pass break-ups, 159 tackles (126 solo), 10 tackles for a loss, 2.5 sacks, 1 forced fumble, 1 fumble recovery and 1 kick blocked.

## 18. Marte Mapu (Sacramento State), S/LB

Likely a late round draft choice, however Mapu is a player on the rise following fine performances at the NFLPA Collegiate Bowl and the Senior Bowl, and it's possible that he could end up in the middle rounds. However, despite that Senior Bowl performance, wasn't invited to the combine. Had really good size and plays especially well when close to the line of scrimmage. Could be a hybrid safety-linebacker at the next level. Had a fine 2022 season being named AP $1^{\text {st }}$ Team FCS All-American and was a Buck Buchanan Award finalist. Across his college career Mapu played in 41 games, recording 7 interceptions, 15 pass break-ups, 165 tackles ( 94 solo), 13 tackles for a loss, 1 sack, 1 forced fumble and 1 kick block.

## SPECIAL TEAMS SPECIALISTS

2023 General Draft Outlook: The average number of special teams specialists (kickers, punters and long-snappers) that are selected in each draft is 4.5 . It goes without saying that none get taken in the first round, well not since the Raiders took kicker Sebastian Janikowski in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round in 2000 - and it was the Raiders once took a punter in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round also (Ray Guy, 1973).

The top special teams players this time around are kicker Jake Moody, punter Bryce Baringer and long-snapper Alex Ward, although trying to predict where in the draft they will be taken is extremely difficult - since these will be selections of need for specific teams.


Packers Outlook: For the first time in many, many, years the Packers head into the draft without Mason Crosby on the roster. We shouldn't completely rule out his return (the contract would need to be right) but right now he's not there. The only kicker currently on the Packers roster is Parker White. It's therefore a distinct possibility that the Packers could look to draft a kicker and if that happens, the best one out there is Michigan's Jake Moody.

At punter, the Packers appear to be secure moving forward with Pat O'Donnell, so a draft pick at this spot would be unexpected.

At long-snapper, the Packers recently signed unrestricted free agent Matt Orzech and already have incumbent Jack Coco on the roster. There would appear to be no reason for the Packers to look to this position in this draft.

The Packers re-signed Keisean Nixon to return kick-offs, punts and play cornerback, so there is no expectation that they will draft a kick return specialist this time around.

## BRYCE BARINGER (Michigan State)

Baringer is coming off the best year of his career in 2022 when he earned numerous honours including Consensus All-American, All-Big 10 and winning the Eddleman-Fields Big 10 Punter of the Year Award. Led the nation in both gross (49.0) and net punting average. Finished his career owning a number of school and conference records.

Baringer has an absolutely booming leg. He will fire off 60+ yard punts seemingly with ease. But with that huge leg has come some problems, particularly earlier in his career, when he had a habit of outkicking his coverage. However, he has been improving in this regard. Baringer graded out as an undrafted free agent, but as probably the best player at this position in this draft, we should expect a team looking for a punter to draft him somewhere in the later rounds.

## ALEX WARD (UCF)

Ward is a highly experienced long snapper who has been doing the job going back to his high school days. He played in 50 consecutive games for UCF (201922). Earned some All-American and all-conference recognition in each of the last two seasons, as well as being a finalist for the Pat Mannelly Award (given to the nation's top long snapper).

Like Baringer (above), Ward graded out as an undrafted free agent, but again as he is probably the best player at his position in this draft, we should expect a team looking for a long snapper to select him somewhere in the later rounds.

## JAKE MOODY (Michigan)

Over the last couple of seasons, Jake Moody has been one of the very best kickers in the whole of college football. He earned All-American recognition in

## Kicker

 both 2021 (consensus) and 2022 ( $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team) as well being All-Big 10 both years.Also earned the Lou Groza Award in 2021 and the Bakken-Andersen Award in 2021 and 2022.
Moody is a career $82.1 \%$ field goal kicker with real expertise from inside the 40 yard line hitting $91.2 \%$ of those field goals. However, the drop off on kicks over 40 yards is pronounced Moody has a career 76.5\% mark from 40-49 yards and a 40.\% mark from 50+ yards. However he did kick the longest field goal in school history this past year ( 59 yards against TCU).

Moody also took care of kick-off duty while at Michigan, with 393 kick-offs at a 56.4\% touchback rate.

The concern about Moody's leg strength is the reason that we have him graded as undrafted free agent, even though he may be the best kicker in this draft. That being said, it's quite possible that a team will use a late round draft choice to select him.

## CHRISTOPHER DUNN (North Carolina St.)

Dunn played a full five seasons as the placekicker at North Carolina State, ending his career owning numerous records. In 2022, he made an outstanding 28 of 29 field goal attempts and earned the Lou Groza Award as the nation's top placekicker. Was also a consensus All-American this past season.

Over his NC State career, Dunn made $84.3 \%$ of his field goal attempts, which included a slightly disappointing $67.6 \%$ when the attempt was 40 yards or more. His longest successful field goal was 53 yards. Dunn made $100 \%$ of his 200 extra points. He wasn't utilised as a kick-off man during his college career (just 1 kick-off).

Dunn is a fine placekicker from inside the 40 yard line but hasn't demonstrated the leg strength and distance consistency that is required in the NFL. Expect him to go undrafted and wind up competing for a job in camp. Perhaps will be a practice squad guy.

## JACK PODLESNY (Georgia)

Podlesny had the tough task of following in the footsteps of outstanding kicker and folk hero Rodrigo Blankenship for the Bulldogs. But Podlesny did a good job of it, making $82.4 \%$ of his field goal attempts (including 4 of 6 on 50+ yard attempts) and $98.9 \%$ of his extra points while at Georgia. Podlesny was twice a semi-finalist for the Lou Groza Award and would be named the 2022 SEC Special Teams Player of the Year as well as being named $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-SEC - made 26 of 31 field goals (83.9\%) in 2022.

As a kick-off guy he had a $63.4 \%$ touchback rate.
Podlesny was a highly consistent kicker throughout his college career. He has a decent leg and while he likely won't be drafted, Podlesny has a chance to compete for a job as an unrestricted free agent.

## NOAH RUGGLES (Ohio State)

Ruggles had a Six year college career (including a redshirt year). He spent the first for years at North Carolina before transferring to Ohio State for the last two seasons. Earned $3^{\text {rd }}$ Team All-Big 10 honours for his 2022 season (17 of 20 on field goal attempts), which followed his 2021 season in which he earned $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team All-Big 10 honours and was a finalist for the Lou Groza Award. He went 20 for 21 on field goals in 2021.

Over his college career, Ruggles made $82.4 \%$ of his field goal attempts. However he has never been successful on a field goal attempt of 50 yards or more (his career long is 49 yards), going 0 for 5 on kicks of that distance. He made $99.5 \%$ of his extra points. Was only used as kick-off man in one of his seasons and had just a $21.2 \%$ touchback rate.

Ruggles is a consistent kicker but doesn't have a booming leg and unfortunately that won't work in today's NFL. He won't get drafted. He may compete for a practice squad spot.

## MICHAEL TURK (Oklahoma)

Turk declared for the 2020 draft, but then the COVID-19 pandemic hit, and many pre-draft activities such as pro days were cancelled (although the combine went ahead). Turk went undrafted, but because of the unique circumstances, he was granted a special waiver to return to school (Arizona State). Oh, and if the last name is familiar, Michael is the nephew of former NFL Players Dan Turk and Matt Turk - Matt punted in the NFL for 17 seasons (and also spent a little time in camp with the Packers in 1993).

Michael had a fine college career, twice being named $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-Pac 12 (2019-20 when with Arizona State) and twice being named $1^{\text {st }}$ Team All-Big 12 (2021-22 with Oklahoma). He finished his 4 year FBS career with a 47.2 punting average (gross). Was twice a Ray Guy Award semifinalist.

Just like in 2020, we should expect him to go undrafted again. Turk will likely be signed as an undrafted free agent and compete for a roster spot (or practice squad role) in training camp.

## CHAD RYLAND (Maryland)

Ryland played at the FBS level in college for 5 seasons, having 4 seasons at Eastern Michigan (2018-21) - twice being named $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team All-MAC - before transferring to Maryland for his senior season (2022) where he was named $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team All-Big 10.

Ryland made $77.3 \%$ of his career field goals - including making $73.0 \%$ of his attempts of 40 yards and over. Kicked 9 field goals of 50 yards and over in his career, with a 55 yard long. Ryland was also the primary kick-off man for 4 of his 5 college seasons, ending with a $52.5 \%$ touchback rate.

Ryland currently lacks the consistency on field goals to really compete at the NFL level and therefore will go undrafted. Will likely be in camp somewhere during the summer.

## TY ZENTNER (Kansas State)

Zentner is (correctly) listed as a punter, but he has some skill versatility - as well as his punting duties, Zentner also kicked off and in his final college season

 (2022), kicked field goals and extra points. In his primary role as a punter, Zentner earned $2^{\text {nd }}$ Team All-Big 12 honours in 2022 and was also a semi-finalist for the Ray Guy Award. He finished his college career with a 43.4 yard average (gross), including a longest of 72 yards.On his single season as a placekicker (he took on the role midway through 2022), Zentner made all 11 of his field goal attempts, including a long of 53, while also being successful on every one of his 31 extra points. For his career, Zentner kick-offs came with a $59.5 \%$ touchback rate.

Zentner is likely to be an undrafted free agent who competes for a roster spot in the summer. His versatility likely gives him a decent chance of sticking around at least on a practice squad.

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Each year there are a number of players who head into the NFL draft with injury questions. Often, they fit into one of the following three categories:

- Players whose injury occurs so late in the draft "process" that it is difficult to truly know how their draft stock will be impacted.
- Players who may not have a current injury but have a history of multiple injuries over a number of seasons, which may impact their prospects of having a long NFL career.
- Players who have made a recovery from an extremely serious injury

Here we take a quick look at some of the players in this year's draft who fall into one of the categories above.

## Jaxson Smith-Nuigba, WR, Ohio State

Jaxson Smith-Njigba is a highly talented wide receiver who plays predominantly from the slot who unfortunately missed all but 3 games in 2022 due to a hamstring injury.

How good is Smith-Njigba? Remember last year's draft when two of the highest rated receivers were the Ohio State pairing of Garrett Wilson and Chris Olave - both of whom would be taken in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round. The third wideout on that 2021 Ohio State team was Jaxson SmithNjigba...except....he wasn't the third wide receiver. A quick look at the stats for that 2021 Buckeyes team will show Wilson ( 70 catches for 1,058 yards) and Olave ( 65 catches for 936 yards) in second and third places respectively in the receiving list. Top of that list was SmithNjigba with 95 catches for 1,606 yards.

Smith-Njigba's talent was never better demonstrated than in the January 2022 Rose Bowl game, where he put up incredible numbers - 15 receptions for 347 yards and 3 touchdowns.

Like every player there are some question marks with regard to Smith-Njigba - some question his lack of blazing speed, others his speed, but he's been outstanding where it matters most on the field. But his 2022 hamstring injury limited that ability to actually get on the field.

That injury originally occurred during the season opener against Notre Dame, forcing him off the field for a while in that game before returning. He missed the following game before playing the week after that. But his return was brief, and it would then be another 4 weeks before Smith-Njigba played again. Again, his return was just for a single game. At that point, his season was done - 3 games, 5 catches.

Heading into this draft, Smith-Njigba didn't run the 40 at the combine, but reports appear to indicate that he is fit and raring to get into camp with the team that selects him. NFL teams will have done their medical due diligence on him - assuming all is ok going forwards, one team is going to get a fine football player.

## Hendon Hooker, QB, Tennessee

Hendon Hooker was having an outstanding 2022 when he suffered a torn ACL in his left knee, immediately ending his season and putting his 2023 draft status into some jeopardy. As we have seen with other players the recovery time for an ACL tear can be 8-12 months and can be even longer.

Hooker had probably moved himself into contention to be a $1^{\text {st }}$ round pick in this draft and was certainly a Heisman Trophy candidate at the time of the injury - he still finished in fifth place in the trophy voting. About a month prior, Hooker had played an amazing game against big-time opposition, Alabama, as he passed for 385 yards and 5 touchdowns.

Hooker spent his first 4 years (including a redshirt year) in college at Virginia Tech, before transferring to the SEC to play for the Tennessee Volunteers. He passed for 2,945 yards and 31 touchdowns in his first year (2021) at Tennessee before passing for 3,135 yards and 27 touchdowns in his second year (2022). What is equally impressive was the fact that he threw a total of just 5 interceptions across those two seasons. And that low interception total shows how careful and accurate Hooker is with the football. His completion rate over 69\% in his two years with Tennessee also points to that.

Hooker is excellent on the move, using his mobility to make plays outside the pocket and to take off and run with the football, picking up key yardage with his legs. Of course, having a knee injury will raise question marks as to whether that mobility remains after his recovery. Only time will tell.

It's worth noting here that Hooker will be closer to 26 than 25 years old when the 2023 season commences, so any time that may be lost due to injury / injury recovery is on top of him already being around 2-3 years older than many QBs when they start their NFL career.

At this stage, all indications appear to be that Hooker's recovery from the ACL tear is progressing without issue and that we should expect to see him on the field later this year. On the assumptions that Hooker's recovery continues on schedule, without issue, and NFL teams' medical staffs are comfortable, then Hooker's position as a probable $2^{\text {nd }}$ round pick in the forthcoming draft is secure and he may yet sneak into the bottom end of round 1 - if there's a team looking for a quarterback at that stage.

## Richard Gouraige, OT, Florida

Gouraige is a solid offensive tackle who is likely to be a late round selection in this forthcoming draft. But at the combine in early March, he suffered one of the strangest of injuries. Apparently all fit and well heading into the Indianapolis event, Gouraige, like all players underwent medical testing and physical testing at the combine but he then woke up the very next day with a swollen ankle - severe enough to keep him out of the combine drills.

Reports were somewhat sketchy as to how exactly the injury may have come about, but it surely is a somewhat of a first. Missing the combine drills clearly won't have helped Gouraige's draft chances, but he was able to take part, and perform well, in Florida's Pro Day, so the injury appears to be behind him.

## JL Skinner, S, Boise State

Skinner is high amongst the safeties available in this draft and likely to be a day 2 selection. Unfortunately, just before the combine in early March, Skinner suffered a torn pectoral muscle which required surgery. The injury and subsequent surgery obviously kept him out of drills at the combine and also out of the Boise State Pro Day at the end of March.

Skinner's recovery appears to be on schedule and the expectation is that he'll be able to begin physical activity towards the end of June, which should allow him to be ready for the start of the NFL season. Whilst it will be a disappointment to Skinner and to NFL teams that he couldn't take part in any of the pre-draft physical activities it seems unlikely that Skinner's draft stock will be unduly affected.

## Kendre Miller, RB, TCU

Kendre Miller is in the top 10 of running backs available in this draft and will be chosen either in round 3 or round 4. He was one of the driving forces behind TCU's meteoric path to the 2022 CFP National Championship Game - rushing for more than 1,300 yards along the way.

Sadly though, Miller was unable to part in that huge game due to a sprained MCL injury that he suffered in the semi-final game against Michigan on $31^{\text {st }}$ December 2022. That injury took him out of that Michigan game and while at first there were some hopes that he may be able to return for the Championship Game that wasn't to be as it became clear that the recovery time would be longer.

Due to the injury, Miller was unable to take part in the combine in early March nor in the TCU Pro Day later in the month. This means that chances for him to improve his draft stock or for teams to get some questions answered were taken away. One area teams may have wanted to look at were Miller's pass catching skills - he wasn't used much as a receiver at TCU.

The good news is that Miller's recovery appears to be going well and that should allay some fears that teams may have had with that regard. NFL Network's lan Rapoport recently reported that Miller was "ahead of schedule".

## Wanya Morris, OT, Oklahoma

Whenever players get injured, it's always unfortunate and disappointing. Somehow it seems worse when they get injured in non-game situations - like when running the 40 at the combine. Such is the case with tackle Wanya Morris of Oklahoma who suffered a hamstring injury about three-quarters of the way through running his second 40 in Indianapolis. It meant that he'd take no further part in the event.

Fortunately, the injury doesn't appear to be to be too bad and Morris is reportedly going to carry out a private Pro Day for NFL teams in April. He still looks like a $3^{\text {rd }}$ or $4^{\text {th }}$ round pick.

## Andrew Vorhees, OG/OT, USC

Having discussed how unfortunate and disappointing combine injuries can be - see Wanya Morris on the previous page - here we look at another player who had such an injury, only this time the early injury prognosis is not as positive as it seems to be for Morris.

Heading into the combine in March, Andrew Vorhees looked like he would probably be a $3^{\text {rd }}$ round pick in the upcoming draft. He started 48 games at USC, spending time at both tackle and guard, and has many of the physical tools required to have a NFL good career.

Disappointingly though, it looks like Vorhees' active NFL career won't begin until the 2024 season. He suffered a torn ACL at the combine, which probably has a recovery time of around 8-12 months (perhaps longer) which means that the end of 2023 would be the earliest possible date for him to be ready and realistically, it's probably not until 2024.

Vorhees is a talented football player and will still be selected in this draft. The injury will probably mean that he drops a round or two lower than he otherwise would have done. But assuming that his recovery and rehab goes without glitches then an NFL team could end up with a nice bargain down the line.

## Parker Washington, WR, Penn State

Parker Washington is a tough, hard running wide receiver who makes life difficult for defenders once he gets the ball in his hands. In another draft stocked full of receivers, particularly from day 2 onwards, Washington will probably be selected early on day 3.

However, that draft position will likely depend on how teams view Washington's recovery from the ankle injury that he suffered in 2022, which forced him to miss the last 3 games of the season. Unfortunately for Washington, not only did the injury keep him off the field but it also meant that he was unable to take part in the combine or at Penn State's Pro Day.

Interestingly, despite the injury, Washington opted to declare for this draft rather than return to school, which may well indicate that he is very confident that the injury wasn't overly serious and wouldn't affect his draft case adversely. Indeed, reports appear to indicate that his recovery may be complete in April, or possibly May, so it seems possible that he could take part in NFL mini-camp in May.

## Garrett Williams, CB, Syracuse

Another player who unfortunately suffered an ACL tear was Garrett Williams, a really good cornerback out of Syracuse. Williams' injury came towards the end of October 2022, which means that, assuming there are no issues with his rehab, that there is the potential for him to perhaps play some part - even a large part - in the 2023 NFL Season.

On that basis, Williams' draft stock hasn't fallen that due to the injury and he'll likely still be selected on day 2 , probably in the $3^{\text {rd }}$ round.

## BADGER WATCH

This article, which appeared in our draft guide for the first time last year, proved popular and so thanks to your feedback is back again this year: Many readers of this draft guide will also be fans of the Wisconsin Badgers, so we thought it may be a good idea to take a very quick look at all of the Badgers who could gain some notice in the upcoming draft.

## Players likely to be drafted in round 1 (day 1)

Our expectation is that there are no Badgers who will get selected in the $1^{\text {st }}$ round in 2023, although for completeness it is worth mentioning that the odd mock draft here and there has seen Joe Tippmann (see below) sneak into round 1.

## Players likely to be drafted in rounds 2-3 (day 2)

Center Joe Tippmann (round 2-3) is a player on the rise and is likely to be the first Badger selected in this draft. He is a two-year starter at the pivot spot and is the no. 4 interior offensive lineman on our draft board (and no. 2 pure center, behind John Michael Schmitz). Tippmann is tall for a center but expect him to develop into an NFL starter sooner rather than later. He's the no. 63 player overall on our board.

Former high school wrestler Keeanu Benton (round 2-3) is in the top 10 of defensive linemen available in this draft (no. 8 on our board). Benton is a Wisconsinite through and through coming from Janesville, WI. He is a tough run stuffer on the inside of the defensive line who works hard. Benton should be the second Badgers player taken in this draft - he is the no. 64 player on our board (just a single spot below Joe Tippmann).

## Players likely to be drafted in rounds 3-4 (day 2 or day 3)

Nick Herbig (round 3-4) is part of an extremely deep class at the edge position and he will probably be around the middle of the pack (he's the no. 16 edge guy on our board) when it comes to the number of edge players who will be drafted in 2023 . He ran a solid 4.65 in the 40 at the combine. Is a little bit under the ideal size for an NFL 3-4 OLB. Herbig should be the third (and possibly last) Badger drafted this time around, perhaps in the $3^{\text {rd }}$ or $4^{\text {th }}$ round. Is the $113^{\text {th }}$ player overall on our board.

## Players likely to be drafted in rounds 4-7 (day 3)

Other than Nick Herbig (see above), if he were to slip out of round 3 and into round 4, it is our expectation that there will be no Badgers selected between rounds 5 and 7 of this draft. There is a remote possibility that John Torchio (see next page) has a chance to sneak into round 7 but we think that would be quite a big reach.

## Players likely to go undrafted who are probable free agent signings

Sitting only just outside of our top 350 players on our big board (at no. 363 overall) is safety John Torchio. Torchio has risen from well down the draft board to much closer to the draft slots thanks to a 2022 season in which he had 5 interceptions and what was the best season of his career. However, Torchio lacks the ideal speed to play the safety spot at the pro level, having run a reported 4.83 in the 40 at the Badgers Pro Day. Look for Torchio to be in camp with an NFL team this summer - it would be a surprise if he made a final roster, but not so much of a surprise if he ended up on a practice squad.

## Players likely to go undrafted who are possible free agent signings

Tyler Beach is a little way down our list of offensive lineman in this draft. Beach has versatility having played both tackle spots and left guard for the Badgers, but we think he's most likely to get his shot at the next level at the guard position. We expect that Beach will wind up as an undrafted free agent who gets signed to an off-season roster and has a chance of winding up on a practice squad. Beach is a Wisconsinite through and through, hailing from Grafton and attending Port Washington High School. Ran a reported 5.33 in the 40 at the Badgers Pro Day.

Usually no more than a couple of punters get drafted every year and Andy Vujnovich likely won't be in that group this time around. He is yet another native Wisconsinite coming from Columbus, WI. Spent 2 seasons at Dubuque University before playing 3 years for the Badgers, where he averaged a very sound 44.3 yards per punt. We can expect to see Vujnovich in training camp with a team somewhere and has an outside chance of making a practice squad.

## Players likely to go undrafted who are less likely free agent signings

It seems unlikely that any of the three Badgers at cornerback will get drafted and it also seems quite possible that one or more of them won't get signed as an undrafted free agent.

First up is Justin Clark who will be nearly 25 years old on draft day. Clark spent 6 years at Toledo (including 2 redshirt years) before transferring to Wisconsin for the 2022 season. Had 4 career interceptions, 12 pass break-ups, 1 forced fumble, 2 fumble recoveries and 125 tackles. Clark lacks the speed to play cornerback in the NFL - he ran 4.72 in the 40 at the Badgers Pro Day. Also measured in at 5-10 $1 / 2$ and 181 pounds at that Pro Day.

Next up is Cedrick Dort Jr. who played a single year for the Badgers after being at Kentucky for 5 seasons (including a redshirt year). Despite starting 32 games across his entire college career, Dort took part in only 2 turnover plays -1 interception and 1 forced fumble. Also had 63 tackles and 10 pass break-ups. Doesn't have the speed to play defensive back in the NFL. Measured in at 5-10 $1 / 2$ and 189 pounds and ran 4.90 in the 40 at the Wisconsin Pro Day.

Jay Shaw played 1 year for the Badgers after being at UCLA for 4 seasons. He had 7 career interceptions, 9 pass break-ups, 2 forced fumbles, 1 fumble recovery and 120 tackles. Measured in at 5-11 and 186 pounds at the Badgers Pro Day and ran a disappointing 4.73 in the 40 , putting him well outside the ideal speed range for an NFL corner.

## 2024 DRAFT WATCHLIST

There's nothing like looking ahead and trying to work out - did somebody say guess - just who is going to be high in the draft a year from now. To paraphrase a famous saying "A week is a long time in the draft process".

Nonetheless, as always, we've got the crystal ball out and had a look at which players are in contention for the top of the draft come April 2024.

It looks like the 2024 draft will yet again feature a quarterback at the very top, with the 2022 Heisman Trophy winner Caleb Williams looking like the odds-on favourite to be the 2024 number 1 overall pick when he becomes draft eligible after the 2023 season. Indeed, barring injury or something strange happening, it's difficult to foresee a circumstance where Williams doesn't go first.

The first round may also feature 4 or 5 more quarterbacks, including the likes of Drake Maye (North Carolina), who may push himself up to number 2 on the board when all is said and done. Also amongst the group may also be Michael Penix Jr. (Washington), Bo Nix (Oregon) and Quinn Ewers (Texas).

Players from other positions who may be in next year's top 5 include WR Marvin Harrison Jr. (Ohio State) (son of Hall of Fame WR Marvin Harrison) and edge guys Dallas Turner (Alabama) and Jared Verse (Florida State).

## DRAFT VALUE CHART

Around 30 years ago, Cowboy's coach Jimmy Johnson developed a chart that assigned numerical values (points) to each slot in the draft. Those numerical values allowed the team to assess the value of trades which involved draft choices.

The Draft Value Chart below is not Johnson's but is based on the same principle - with the values updated to reflect many years of subsequent trades. A number of people have developed their own chart. This one is ours.
