And one day — without warning — that truth rises.

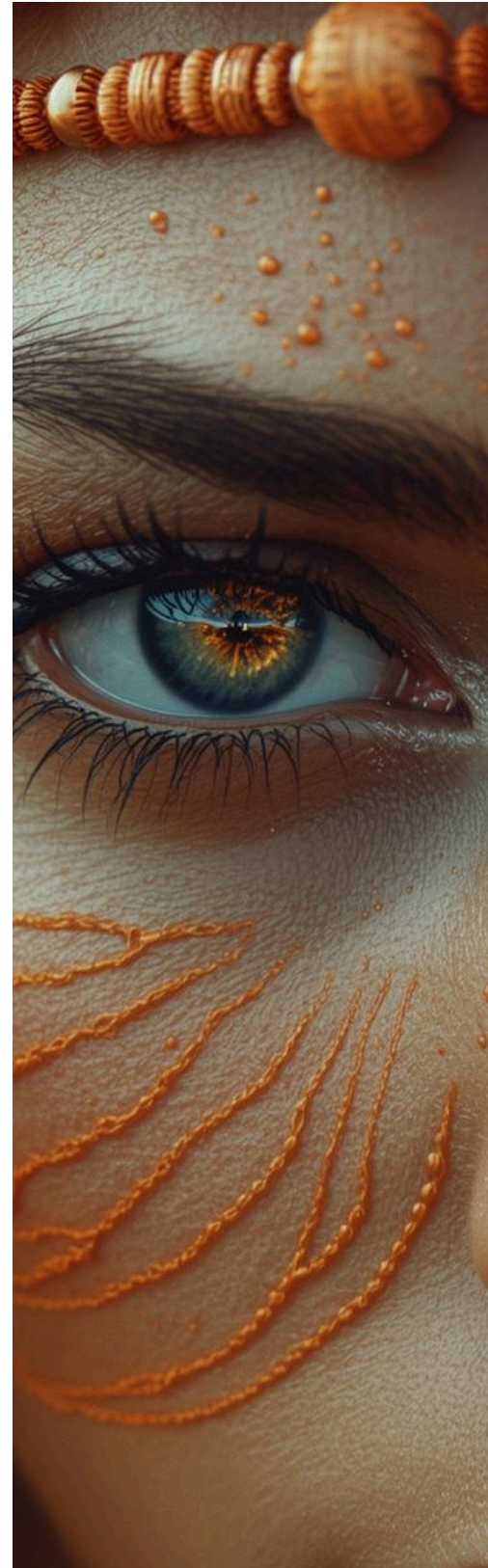
Sometimes as a whisper.

When Women Speak, the World Reshapes Around Them

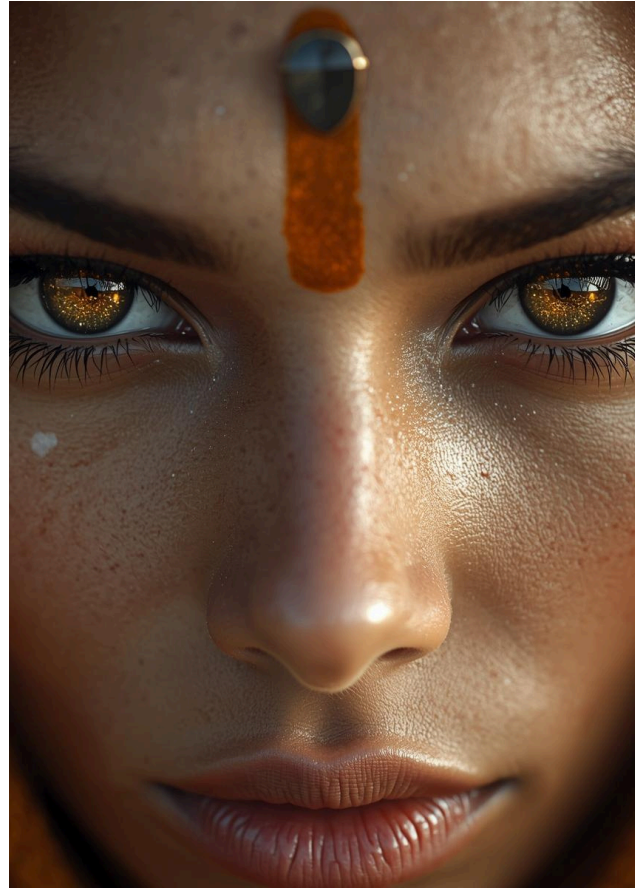
Your voice is not just for you — it's for every woman who never had one.

Women don't follow perfection — they follow authenticity.

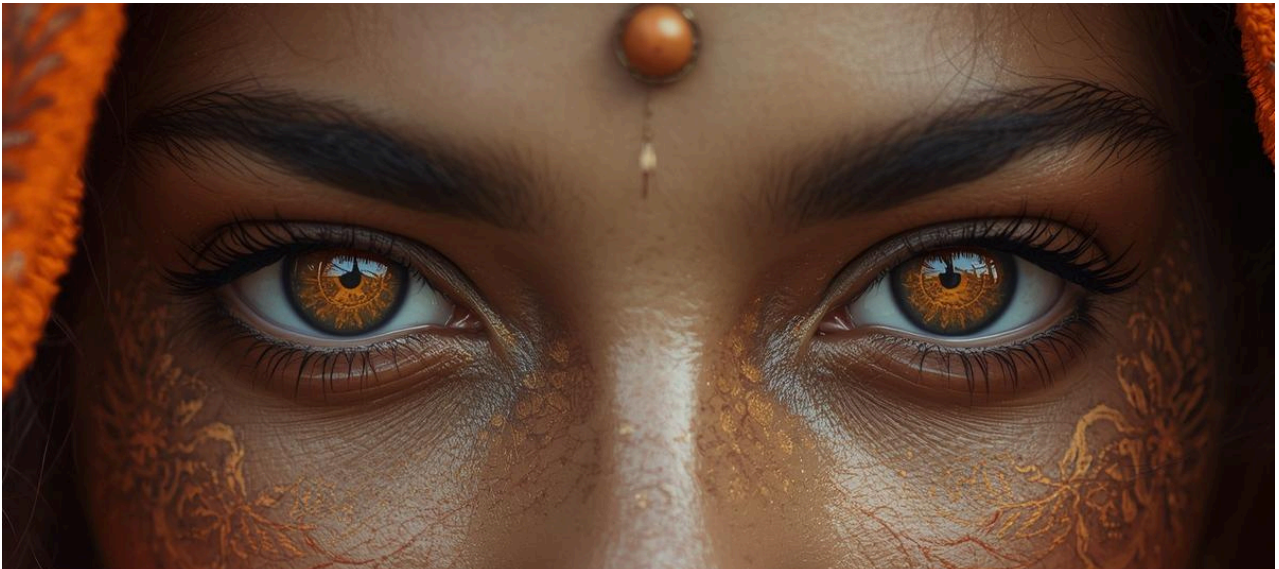
And authenticity begins with voice.

Let it be true.

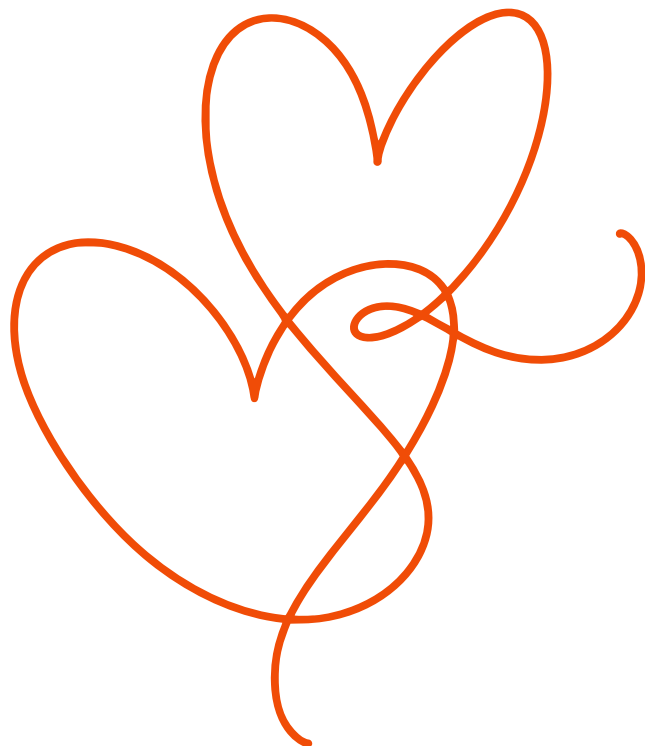
Speak — even if your voice shakes.
