#### PICKIN' AND CHOOSIN' AT TORREY, UTAH IN MAY 12-18

Spanning a route of more than 120 miles, Utah's Scenic Highway 12 travels through some of the most diverse and ruggedly beautiful landscapes in the country. The surrounding red rock formations, slickrock canyons, pine and aspen forests, alpine mountains, national and state parks, and quaint rural towns all contribute in making Highway 12 a unique route well worth traveling. Highlights of Scenic Highway 12 include: Bryce Canyon Walk, Anasazi Ancestral Pueblos, Capital Reef and the Mormon fruit trees, Pink Ledges Trail (just a few miles from Highway 89, our fave), Bryce Canyon 2 hrs away from camp.

Our suggested itinerary still only cracks the surface, thanks to its proximity to multiple state parks (Kodachrome Basin, Escalante Petrified Forest, Anasazi State Park Museum), national parks (Bryce Canyon and Capitol Reef), scenic backways for well-prepared travelers (Cottonwood Canyon, Hole-in-the-Rock, Burr Trail, Hell's Backbone) and virtually endless outdoor recreation options on the expansive Dixie National Forest.

There are so many things to do and places to go in the area that we just couldn't decide. Instead, we'll meet each evening for Happy Hour and/or dinner (yes, that we WILL plan in advance) and give a couple of options for the next day's adventure. If you've been to the area and have a "must see", we'll consider that, too. So come with an open mind, a spirit of adventure, and a sense of fun. We promise that we won't let you down.

## RALLY REPORT to Death Valley Furnace Creek Campground JANUARY 21-27

Attendees were Bob & Becky Coulter, MJ Brenner & Michael Rozdilsky, Bob & Jim Catalana (brothers), Diana McVey & Bob Skaug, Carol & John Herr, Steve & Sandy Varley, Bill & Bev Eckel, Doreen McDonald & Doug Motz, and new members Susan & Richard Houston mostly full timers from Carlsbad, NM. It has been 9 years since the Cuatros Estados have been to Death Valley and a lot of things had changed. The campground is now paved and greatly improved. The restaurants and store were upgraded and quite expensive (\$103 for a tomahawk steak) but we solved that by having lots of heavy snacks and potluck nights. In fact we got together every evening for a fire and fun filled evening, courtesy of John Herr. The weather was just perfect along with the star filled night sky.

The first night (Tue) was happy hour and heavy snacks. The next morning (Wed) we went to the Inn at Death Valley for a delicious breakfast and walked the beautifully landscaped grounds surrounding it. We checked out the visitor center watched the movie (some saw it twice), went to the Borax Museum and the Harmony Borax works just down the road. After the drive through Mustard Canyon we had a very nice soup and salad dinner. We sure have some good cooks in the group.

The next day (Thur) we were to drive 5,000 ft plus to Dante's View, but it was

closed due to ice and snow. It would open later in the week and we had time to visit on our own, which most did. The Houstons had been at the opera house in Amargosa and suggested we all go so we did. The opera house was rented by a famous ballet dancer named Marta Becket, it is a historic treasure. She wrote a book called Dance in the Sands and was featured in Life Magazine. We all went for Indian Tacos at the Timbisha Shoshone reservation in Furnace Creek. That afternoon we drove the twenty- Mule Team Canyon, stopped at Zabriskie Point and did a rough 4 WD to the Hole in the wall, which was led by Diana and Becky as the two Bobs were home sick. At 4 pm we broke out the wine, yummy cheeses, salami, salmon dip, olives etc. and had a great evening watching the sun set sitting by the fire.

On Friday we moved up the schedule (no sleeping in for us). We headed north to see Devils Cornfield, Stove Pipe Wells, the Dunes and Mosaic Canyon. After hiking the canyon narrows as far as we could we all went to the Badwater Saloon in Stove Pipe Wells for a frosty brew and a very good lunch at a reasonable price. We went home let the dogs out and drove to Badwater salt flats the lowest point in DV (282 ft below sea level). On the way home we drove through the dramatic Artist Drive and stopped at Artist Palette for pictures. Every time we drove past Golden Canyon the parking lot was packed. Several of our group went later. That evening we had our expansive and I must say delicious Taco Bar. Saturday brought a LONG trip (38 miles of dirt) for 3 couples to Tea Kettle Junction and the Racetrack Playa were rocks moved across the ground. Some went on a ranger tour of the damage to Scotty's Castle, some high in the mountains to the kilns, others just relaxed or went back to places they missed. We did get together once again for food and drinks around the campfire. Sunday was a day on your own, some drove to Titus Canyon others to Dante's View. The farewell dinner was delicious with grilled meat and wonderful sides and salads. Thanks to the Herr's for hosting the get togethers at their place! # REPORT on Optional Excursion after Death Valley JANUARY 27-30

The Monday after the rally we departed Death Valley and headed for the mining town of Beatty Nevada. Everyone except McVey /Skaug and Catalana's followed to this location either by tow vehicle or RV. We met at the parking lot across from the Stagecoach Hotel and Casino where we parked the RV's and unhooked some tow cars. We headed back to Rhyolite to see a funky open-air museum by Belgian artists which featured ghostly figures doing various things from riding a bike to posing for the last supper. The group enjoyed clowning around in and among the sculptures. Then we made a stop at an interesting bottle house which was built by Tom T Kelly in 1906 and comprised of 50,000 bottles. We proceeded to the Ghost Town of Rhyolite (1904-1916) which boasted the remains of a \$90k bank, a large school with a basement and a huge train station that hosted 3 railroads, to ship the rhyolite which was silica rich volcanic rock used for crushing stone and sharpening tools. We returned to the casino and ate a good lunch at the Denny's inside. After lunch we walked across the parking lot to the Death Valley Nut and Candy Store where you could buy about any candy you could imagine,

even chocolate rocks and centipede gummies.

We bid adieu to many in the group and proceeded on to Tonopah, NV with the Eckels and the Houstons where we skipped the International car forest due to the biting cold winds and lack of access. We found it quite cold at 6,000 feet, no water hookups allowed. We did however find a brewery and BBQ which warmed us up quite nicely. We slept in and departed for Rachell, NV to see if we could spot any low flying aircraft or aliens. The trip was worth it for the drive alone; no cars, no fences, snow covered mountains, moonscape terrain and miles of beauty dotted with cattle. We stopped at the A' le' Inn restaurant and bar for lunch and some shopping. It was the Houston's 50th Wedding Anniversary. What a place to celebrate! We were told there had been quite a few weddings there. They had everything from alien tequila and quilts. That evening we found ourselves in the Casablanca Casino and RV Campground in Mesquite NV. Mesquite is a quiet little town situated in the banana belt of NV with weather similar to St George UT. The Eckels departed the next morning and the Coulters and Houstons departed the next day.
