The first day included a tour of the south rim of the Black Canyon National Park. One of our first stops was Tomichi Point where this group photo was taken. After a few more picture-taking stops we descended to the East Portal Road (in 1st gear) where we had a picnic lunch under a pavilion next to the Gunnison River. Bob and Becky Coulter met us there (and later that day for dinner). After exploring the canyon all of us walked to the Mi Mexico Restaurant and enjoyed Margaritas and fine food.

The second day began with a 2 hour tour of the American West Museum which was a favorite. The owner just celebrated his 79th birthday and is an archaeologist

who began collecting since the age of 8. You cannot see everything in one tour because of all he collected. There was a room filled with all sorts of early firearms, within the same building were reproductions of early dry goods stores, dentist office, Drs. Office, and a General Store. There were more out buildings that included a schoolhouse, church, hotel with a saloon, and the original Telluride County jail.

After prying everyone from the museum we had a scenic drive to Silver Jack Reservoir where everyone enjoyed lunch while taking in the magnificent views. Later in the evening most us walked to Ted's Steakhouse and dined in the patio area.

Day 3 we headed north to our first stop in Delta and stopped at Confluence Park. An unexpected surprise was we were able to take a self-guided tour of the Fort Uncompany which was on the Old Spanish Trail. From Delta we proceeded along highway 65 to the Appleshed in Cedaredge. The Appleshed was very unique in that it offered fine art, gourmet food, furniture, décor, wines, and had a



lunch counter where you could order a sandwich. After leaving the Appleshed we found a city park where we all had lunch. After lunch all headed back to the RV Park in Montrose except the rallymasters who had to make a stop at the local Subaru Dealer to get a car repair. Fortunately, the dealer provided a brand new loaner car so our rally

could continue.

Day 4 was a free day and rally attendees explored downtown Montrose, Ouray, Ridgeway, went on waterfall hikes and other nearby attractions. Later that evening a "Father's Day Miniature Golf Tournament" was held at the campground. Prizes were awarded (courtesy of Bill Eckel) for those who managed

Further back on the same road is a picnic area with a hiking trail which has a beautiful bridge spanning the river. From there we proceeded through the town of Almont and arrived in the scenic town of Crested Butte. Some of us had lunch in small park downtown while others dined at local restaurants. The park had a small river running nearby and a totem pole. After lunch all explored many of the shops and nearby attractions that Crested Butte had to offer.

Let's discover the northeast part of New Mexico. Yes, you know this going to be a weird rally when Becky hosts it!

<u>The first day</u> we will stop for coffee and to poke around in the local country store then off to see the largest intact volcano cone in North America. Those that are game can hike down into the cone. It's an easy hike. Then we will gather for a picnic.

The name Capulin is Spanish for choke cherry which makes sense to me, this breathtakingly awesome intact volcano crater is a cherry on my list.

Capulin Volcano National Monument is an example of an extinct cinder cone volcano crater it is part of the Raton-Clayton Volcanic Field. It was established in 1916 and has five miles of hiking trails but you can see it all from your car This is a great natural landmark to visit. Historical and amazing to see all the Lava Rock formations from thousands of years ago. The eruptions were massive and the scenery is beautiful.

A paved road spirals around the volcano and visitors can drive up to a parking lot at the rim. There is a steep drop off that increases, of course as you make your way up the winding road to the top and no railing throughout the 20 mph route. Hiking trails circle the rim as well as down into the mouth of the volcano. From the highest point of the volcano you can see New Mexico, Oklahoma, Kansas, Texas and Colorado. Pictures do this majestic area no justice. You have to stop and see to understand the overall magnitude of this volcano! Bring your National Parks pass.

<u>The next day</u> we will visit the elevated fossil trackway of dinosaur foot prints at Clayton Lake State Park. Have lunch in the historic and haunted restaurant and bar of the Hotel Eklund Hotel in Clayton. Then we will stop at the Herzstein Memorial Museum (on state register of historic places) which is touted as the best museum in the 5 state area. It houses Santa Fe Trail memorabilia, dinosaur relics and other interesting themes and things from around the world. Bring your favorite knife for "Knife Day" and tell a story round the campfire with knife prizes for the best stories.

<u>The third day</u> we will visit the Folsom Museum in Folsom, NM. Bison bones and Folsom arrow tips confirmed the theory that man had occupied the New World at least 10,000 years. We will take a scenic drive the back way over the mesa through Raton, which is longer but a beautiful drive. Those that want to can hike the Climax Canyon in Raton. This is an excellent hike for novices, families and even more advanced hikers. It is a 2 trail system with multiple entry points, easy to find and well-marked trails, lots of parking, and wonderful views that you hardly notice you are climbing a mountain to see the view. There is an East Loop and West Loop Trail, both are under 2 miles so they could be combined for a longer hike.

When we get back to camp we will combine whiskey Sours with tongue twisters. The hosts will provide the main entrée you provide a dish.

<u>The last day</u> will be one day for rest and relaxation. We look forward to seeing you!
