La Hacienda de los Martinez is one of the few remaining northern New Mexico late Spanish Colonial period "Great Houses" (casas mayor) in the American Southwest. Built in 1804 by don Severino Martinez and family, this fortress-like building with its massive adobe walls, located along the Rio Pueblo, 2 miles s.w. of the Taos Plaza, became not only the Martinez family home, but also an important trade center. During the late Spanish Colonial period, it was the last stop above the terminus of El Camino Real de Tierra Adentro, or "Royal Road of the Interior Land." Martinez Hacienda was restored in the late 1970s and is now a landmark attraction of Taos. A must stop for history buffs or anyone wanting to gain a sense of the history in the immediate Taos and surrounding area. Drive up HWY 150 to the Taos Ski Valley

NOTE: The state of Utah is in the process of returning to the "new normal". Hopefully, all planned activities will be available by the time of our rally. The exact order of the days/events will be determined when the Rally draws closer.

Day 1, Monday, Sep 21: Arrive/check-in

Day 2, Tuesday, Sep 22: Exploring Park City We will visit the Utah Olympic Park in the morning. No charge to visit two museums, watch athletes train or explore the venue. We will then go into Park City where we will eat lunch and

explore on our own. The Park City Museum is very interesting and covers the mining industry and skiing history of Park City. You may want to take a scenic gondola ride or chairlift ride. There is a hop on, hop off trolley that runs through Park City and, of course, there is plenty of shopping. It is also a great leisurely stroll, if the weather cooperates.

Day 3, Wednesday, Sep 23: The Great Salt Lake and Antelope Island State Park We will drive across the Great Salt Lake on the 7-mile causeway. First, we will spend time in the Visitor Center. Then we will drive south on the island to the historic Fielding Garr Ranch, hoping to see the herds of buffalo and other wildlife along the way. We can tour the ranch house and out buildings. We will take a sack lunch.

Day 4, Thursday, Sep 24: Downtown Salt Lake City We will visit Temple Square, the No. 1 tourist attraction in Utah. We will enjoy the beautiful gardens. Three buildings on the square were built by the pioneers: the six-spired granite Salt Lake Temple; the acoustically perfect domed Tabernacle, original home of the Tabernacle Choir and the famed organ; and the Assembly Hall with its white spires and stained-glass windows. There are museums and a Visitor's Center on the square. At 12:00 we will make our way to the Tabernacle to hear a free organ concert. We will eat lunch near the square (restaurant to be determined). In the afternoon, we will visit the Family Search Center where you can explore your own family history and records.

Day 5, Friday, Sep 25: Union Station and Notorious 25th Street in OgdenWe will visit the historic Union Station and learn about its history as we follow along with a 30-minute podcast. We can spend additional time in Union Station viewing the Railroad Museum, the John M Browning Firearms Museum, or the Classic Car Museum, depending on your interests. We will eat lunch on historic 25th Street and after lunch we will walk 2 blocks up and back 25th Street as we listen to another podcast and learn the history of why it is called "Notorious 25th Street". We will return to our RV Park by driving east through Ogden Canyon (a scenic byway), over Trapper's Loop and Snow Basin Ski area (amazing views and vistas) and west through Weber Canyon back to our RV Park.

Day 6, Saturday, Sep 26 Free day On your own to explore what interests you. So many possibilities and we will have a list for you. Perhaps, some may want to take the drive to the Golden Spike National Historical Park, or visit This is the Place Heritage Park, or visit Trolley Square or more museums in SLC.

Day 7, Sunday, Sep 27: Departure Day If you paid for 6 nights, you got a 7th night free and will then have the option to spend this day in the area as well, leaving on the morning of Sep 28

But if you're into art or history museums, you'll find some of the best in the country.

This popular KOA fills up quickly for the summer months, so you need to make reservations NOW! The well-known Glenwood Springs Pool is the big draw to this area, but it's not the only attraction. The drive east of town through Glenwood Canyon is an engineering marvel, with a hike/bike trail that goes the whole distance practically on top of the raging Colorado River. The Redstone's

interesting history and coal company town, along with its Castle, is 20 miles south, and continuing south is Marble CO, where the marble for the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier & Lincoln Memorial came from. You can also reach famous Aspen ski village an hour out of Glenwood Springs, and adventure further to hike to the Maroon Bells (one of the most picturesque views in the Rockies). Perhaps one of the most iconic hikes in this region is to Hanging Lake, a steep and challenging route. Reservations are required WAY in advance, and a shuttle takes you there from Glenwood Springs.
