<u>Make sure the rallymasters know you will be attending.</u> The Montrose area has so much to offer with spectacular scenery, historic towns, hiking, fishing, biking, hot springs, and more. We will not be able see and do everything in the five days of our rally. However, if you are not familiar with area or have not visited in quite some time this may whet your appetite for future trips.

<u>Wednesday 6/12</u> Arrival Day **Happy Hour at 5:30 PM**. Meet at Jim and Joan site #1 or at the pavilion. Bring an hors d'oeuvres and your favorite drink. After introductions we'll review the itinerary.

<u>Thursday 6/13</u> Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We'll explore the south rim of the Black Canyon National Park. Our first stop will be the visitor center, from there we continue stopping at various overlooks. After the last overlook we double back and drive to the East Portal for lunch. After lunch we take a short drive to explore the Crystal Dam and Reservoir. At 5:00 we meet for dinner at the Mi-Mexico Restaurant.

<u>Friday 6/14</u> Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We'll take Owl Creek Pass to Silver Jack Reservoir. This drive was recommended by the locals (and some Cuatro Estados members who love it!) Scenes from *How the West Was Won* and *True Grit* were filmed along the route. There is a picnic area at Silver Jack where we can have lunch. After lunch we can explore one of the trailheads or continue the drive to Beaver Lake.

Saturday 6/15 Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We'll take a drive to Blue Mesa Visitor Center and continue past Gunnison to Almont. Almont is home to the headwaters of the Gunnison River. Almont was a railroad junction for transporting ore. After the mines closed Almont returned to its fishing heritage. From Almont we continue to Crested Butte (CB). CB is now famous as a ski destination and offers art galleries, historical sites, walking tours, and of course shopping. At the city park we may find a vacant table for lunch or dine in one of the local restaurants. Afterward we continue over Kebler Pass or turn around and go back to Montrose the way we came.

Sunday 6/16 Day on your own. Here are suggestions:

Morrow Point Boat Tour – This boat tour takes you down the Gunnison River where you can look up at the Black Canyon walls and maybe spot a bald eagle or two and a waterfall. There are 232 steps and ¼ mile walk along the Gunnison River to reach the boat dock. This is operated by the NP Service and due to popularity advance reservations required. The boat tour lasts approximately 1 and ½ hours. Call 970-641-2337 x 205 or visit the Elk Creek Visitor Center for reservations.

Explore the sights and attractions of Ouray. This is a popular and busy town offering famous hot springs pool (giant size), plenty of shops, and restaurants. Waterfall Hikes – Chipeta, Box Canyon, Cascade, Middle Fork, Escalante, Bridal Veil

Museums – Montrose County Museum and the Ute Indian Museum

San Juan Skyway Scenic tour

But thanks SO much to the rallymasters – who went way beyond requirements of rallymaster – for providing such an adventurous, fun-loving rally!

In addition to rallymasters and assistants, attending were: Ackerman/Miller, Buckingham, Coulter, Lehman, McVey/Skaug, Parr, Pickthorn, and guests Bob & Sharee Scott (who became members at this rally – welcome!) New members, Paula & Jim Brown had planned to attend but had RV repair issues happen so at last minute didn't make it. June and Gary handed out packets of information to attendees as they arrived, including a sign to put in your RV window to let other attendees know who was parked where (we were scattered around the park). At Happy Hour they had a LOT more literature, maps, points of interest, brochures, etc. available for everyone to have plenty to peruse about the region.

Thursday, everyone braved the I-o-n-g line of traffic getting into Zion National Park. But were still smiling when we got there! We parked at the museum, and took the shuttle from there. They run every few minutes up and back through Zion Canyon (which is the only way you can access it other than on foot), with stops at every point of interest along the route. High waters of the Virgin River prevented a few of the better-known hikes, but there was still plenty to do and see in the valley.



Plus you could drive your car east on Hwy 9 (just recently opened) through the tunnels to see the rest of the sights, like Checkerboard Mesa, to the east end of park. That evening we all met for dinner at the Bit & Spur Restaurant in Springdale and shared stories of our day.



Friday a fun and interesting drive through some beautiful red rock country, saw Coral Pink Sand Dunes State Park, lots of wild flowers around too, then to Hidden Lake, and on to Best Friends Animal Sanctuary for a talk about the important rescue work being done by this organization based in Angel Canyon. After lunch in the cute little town of Kanab at Houston's Restaurant, the winds and cold had us aborting rest of day's drive and returning to camp.

Saturday we had the morning to sleep in, then went to Silver Reef Ghost Town for a fun, nearby adventure.

Celebrating the 150th anniversary of the area, there was a parade in historic town of Leeds, a "shoot out," and much history of Silver Reef. Then a visit to Red Cliffs National Conservation Area for great red rocks with interesting formations, and a hike through them lead by Coulters.

Sunday was on your own, for people to pick from dozens of suggestions of what to do ... or just hang out in camp and do laundry or something ... ⁽²⁾ Finished a busy day with another happy hour in the very nice clubhouse.

Monday we headed towards St. George, first visiting the fascinating Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farms and looked for Dinosaur tracks (don't miss it if ever in the area). After lunch in town at Cracker Barrel, we headed to Red Hills

Desert Garden on top of red cliffs towering above St. George. Nice trails, a wonderful grotto, desert gardens, and amazing views. After more great red rock scenery and sand dunes in Snow Canyon, we returned to camp. That evening we were entertained by Gary and June's son, Michael, with storytelling, magic tricks and snake oil (and interesting things to purchase too).





After a very nice continental breakfast (June makes a great Frittata!) Tuesday morning, it was time to say goodbye and "see you down the road!" Even though many of us arrived as strangers to each other, after sharing all these

<u>Tour the town as you wish - in groups or solo</u>. There are lots of quaint little shops and restaurants for lunch. Check out the museums, fishing on two rivers, or take a scenic drive around the area. Lots of "camera" country. You may want to go as far as Pagosa Springs. It's a 55-minute scenic drive OR just stay in the park to visit and relax.

Happy Hour at 5:00 with munchies which can be our dinner. Most of us prefer a heavier meal at noon and not evening.

This is TRAIN DAY! You must make your own reservations by calling 1-888-286-2737. Prices are not reduced for groups, so you can pick the level of ticket(s) you prefer. Here's the info:

Depart 10 a.m. from the depot (5 minutes from the park).

Chama to Antonio by train. It will stop at Osier where we will get off to have lunch at a restaurant. When we arrive at Antonio, we will return by motor coach, arriving back in Chama at 6 p.m. followed by <u>Happy Hour</u> (dinner type munchies which you can have ready BEFORE the train ride because you'll be gone all day!)
