A message from Rallymasters Gary and June. Due to the close proximity of our home to the RV Park, we have opted to not stay in the park, but rather use the park as our rally base. Bob and Becky Coulter have graciously agreed to use their space as our meeting place for our get togethers in the evenings and for our continental breakfast on departure day.

May 15, Wednesday – Arrival Day, Welcome to the 'Greatest Earth on Show.' Get parked and settled in. 6:00 p.m. meet at Bob and Becky's RV for "happy hour", bring your own drinks and a snack to share. We will go over the schedule and discuss any modifications needed.

May 16, Thursday - Zion National Monument. Today will be a full day at the park. We will head out at 9:00 a.m. and caravan to the town of Springdale, UT to catch the shuttle to the park's Visitor Center, then ride shuttle through the canyon. Be sure to bring your Golden Age or Senior Pass if you have one. Also, no dogs are allowed in the park. June will stay at the RV Park and take care of dogs if necessary. There are shuttles along the park canyon every 7-10 minutes so those who want to hike a trail will always have transportation. Everyone will be on their own to choose their destinations in the park. There is a nice restaurant at Zion Lodge (for lunch), plus a very nice area to picnic on the lodge grounds. Everyone will meet back at the visitor's center at 5:00 p.m. to shuttle back to Springdale. We will have dinner at the Bit and Spur Restaurant (our very favorite in Springdale).

May 17, Friday – Leave at 9:00 a.m., drive by Colorado City (the polygamist city that was ruled by Warren Jeffs) and travel through beautiful red rock country to the amazing Coral Pink Sand Dunes. From there on to Peek-a-boo Canyon (4-wheel drive needed – we will double up). Next we'll drive to the Best Friends Animal Sanctuary and into the cute little town of Kanab for lunch at Houston's Restaurant. Leaving Kanab, we will go to the Pipe Springs National Monument located on the Paiute Reservation in Arizona. Then back to Hurricane. Happy hour whenever we get back.

May 18, Saturday – Gather and leave at 9:00 a.m. for the Red Cliffs National Conservation Area. You will be able to see Dinosaur tracks and other interesting attractions. Then on to Silver Reef Ghost Town. This will be a fun, close-by adventure. They are celebrating the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Red Cliffs National Conservation Area. There will be much information and a "shoot out" along with

the history of the town. Time and weather permitting, we will also go to nearby Babylon, an interesting area near the Virgin River with amazing rock formations. Happy hour at 5:00 p.m.

**May 19, Sunday – Day on your own.** We have many brochures available for points of interest right within the St. George area. Depending on everyone's choice, we can caravan together, or go on your own. Whatever you decide it will be a busy day. Happy hour and snacks at <u>5:00</u>.

May 20, Monday -- Gather and leave at 9:00 a.m. Proceed to Red Hills Desert Garden on top of the red cliffs towering above St. George. This is a beautiful area with very nice trails and views overlooking the town. We will continue to Snow Canyon with its spectacular views. Afterward we will lunch at Cracker Barrel. Then off to the Dinosaur Discovery Site at Johnson Farms. This is not really a farm, but a museum on the actual site of the discovery. Price is \$8 per adult and \$7 per senior. From there we will head back toward Hurricane and drive by Sand Hollow State Park. Happy hour and snacks at 5:00 p.m.

May 21, Tuesday-Departure Day -- 8:00 -9:00 a.m. Farewell continental breakfast, bring an item to share. Safe travels

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#### **Zion National Park Information**

**2019 Shuttle Schedule** (After downloading pdf file scroll down to see entire schedule). When the shuttle is running no private vehicles are allowed on the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive. The only access is by free shuttle bus. Free shuttles will leave frequently from the Zion Canyon Visitor Center. There will be shuttle buses arriving at every stop every 7-10 minutes.

#### When the Shuttle is in Operation

Parking is limited inside Zion, and all parking lots commonly fill early in the day. To avoid parking hassles it is easiest to park in the town of Springdale and ride the free Springdale Shuttle to the park's Pedestrian Entrance.

#### How to Use the Shuttle System

There are two shuttle loops. The Zion Canyon Shuttle connects the Zion Canyon Visitor Center to stops at nine locations on the Zion Canyon Scenic Drive. The Springdale Shuttle has nine stops in the town of Springdale. The Springdale Shuttle will take you to the park's Pedestrian Entrance near the Zion Canyon Visitor Center. You may get on and off as often as you like. Riding the shuttle is free.

#### Buses are wheelchair accessible.

During the busy season the free buses run from early morning to late evening, as often as every seven minutes. Times and intervals change with the seasons. Current schedules are posted at each shuttle stop, at park visitor centers, and in the **Map and Guide**.

#### **Take Your Time**

Buses run frequently throughout the day, as often as every seven minutes. You do not need to rush to catch one. Take your time to plan your visit. Use the exhibits outdoors and the

information inside at the **Zion Canyon Visitor Center** to make the most of your time. **Ranger presentations** at the **Zion Human History Museum** are a great way to learn more about the park before you ride the shuttle up canyon. The bookstore has maps and publications that can augment your visit.

What to Bring-- For a day trip on the shuttle, you should take: Water/Snacks, Walking Shoes/Map, Sunscreen/Hat/Sunglasses, Camera/Binoculars, Flashlight or headlamp. Dress for the weather and bring everything you need for a day in the park. Be sure to bring your Interagency Pass or park entry receipt for re-entry into the park.

**Please** -- No eating or smoking on the bus. Beverages other than water are not allowed. <u>Pets</u> are not allowed on the shuttle buses.


In between we: (1) toured the Bio

Make your own reservations, specifying you are with Region 1 Rally, in order to get the better rate. Nightly rates (full hookups) are \$34 for 30-amp & \$36 for 60-amp, plus tax. Rally fee is \$35 per person and must be paid in advance with check made payable to Connie Jones and sent to her at 4510 Debonair Circle, Colorado Springs, CO 80917. Please let our chapter coordinators John & Sanna know you plan to attend as well.

Region 1 covers Colorado, New Mexico, & Wyoming; however members & guests from Arizona, Utah, and other western states attend as well. So it is a great opportunity for us to meet/greet potential new members! We anticipate 30-50 rigs in attendance (up to 100 people; keep this in mind when you prepare anything for the evening gatherings).

This very nice resort is in a park-like setting near Creede, surrounded by the San Juan Mountains of southern Colorado and along the banks of the Rio Grande. We will have use of a very nice "Lodge" complete with kitchen for our meals. Creede offers the charm of an old western mining town with eclectic stores & eateries and even a famous repertory theatre. There's a great scenic backroad drive out of Creede that takes you through the original mining districts, some still operating, and several with buildings intact. Much of the route follows a tumbling creek that will be showing lots of white water this time of year. One of the most scenic drives in all of Colorado takes you from Creede, up and over Slumgullion Pass and, down into the lovely village of Lake City. The Obermillers will probably lead you on this route one of the days you are there. Also plan on a couple of happy hours for our members before some of the evening meals.

You should've booked your reservations way before now, but if not, might check if space still available.

Also <u>make sure the rallymasters know you will be attending.</u> The Montrose area has so much to offer with spectacular scenery, historic towns, hiking, fishing, biking, hot springs, and more. We will not be able see and do everything in the five days of our

rally. However, if you are not familiar with area or have not visited in quite some time this may whet your appetite for future trips.

<u>Wednesday 6/12</u> Arrival Day Happy Hour at 5:30 PM. Meet at Jim and Joan site #1 or at the pavilion. Bring a hors d'oeuvres and your favorite drink. After introductions we'll review the itinerary.

<u>Thursday 6/13</u> Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We'll explore the south rim of the Black Canyon National Park. Our first stop will be the visitor center, from there we continue stopping at various overlooks. After the last overlook we double back and drive to the East Portal for lunch. After lunch we take a short drive to explore the Crystal Dam and Reservoir. At 5:00 we meet for dinner at the Mi-Mexico Restaurant.

<u>Friday 6/14</u> Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We'll take Owl Creek Pass to Silver Jack Reservoir. This drive was recommended by the locals (and some Cuatro Estados members who love it!) Scenes from *How the West Was Won* and *True Grit* were filmed along the route. There is a picnic area at Silver Jack where we can have lunch. After lunch we can explore one of the trailheads or continue the drive to Beaver Lake.

Saturday 6/15 Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We'll take a drive to Blue Mesa Visitor Center and continue past Gunnison to Almont. Almont is home to the headwaters of the Gunnison River. Almont was a railroad junction for transporting ore. After the mines closed Almont returned to its fishing heritage. From Almont we continue to Crested Butte (CB). CB is now famous as a ski destination and offers art galleries, historical sites, walking tours, and of course shopping. At the city park we may find a vacant table for lunch or dine in one of the local restaurants. Afterward we continue over Kebler Pass or turn around and go back to Montrose the way we came.

<u>Sunday 6/16</u> Day on your own. Here are suggestions:

- Morrow Point Boat Tour This boat tour takes you down the Gunnison River where you can look up at the Black Canyon walls and maybe spot a bald eagle or two and a waterfall. There are 232 steps and ¼ mile walk along the Gunnison River to reach the boat dock. This is operated by the NP Service and due to popularity advance reservations required. The boat tour lasts approximately 1 and ½ hours. Call 970-641-2337 x 205 or visit the Elk Creek Visitor Center for reservations.
- Explore the sights and attractions of Ouray. This is a popular and busy town offering famous hot springs pool (giant size), plenty of shops, and restaurants.
- Waterfall Hikes Chipeta, Box Canyon, Cascade, Middle Fork, Escalante, Bridal Veil
- Museums Montrose County Museum and the Ute Indian Museum
- Antique Shops in Montrose
- San Juan Skyway Scenic tour

Monday 6/17 Pack a lunch. 9 AM departure. We start with a visit to the American West Museum. After the museum we'll take the Grand Mesa National Forest drive. We'll head north to Delta, Cedaredge and to Grand Mesa. 75% of Colorado's apples are from Cedaredge. The Grand Mesa Forest has lakes, reservoirs, and trails.

• 6:30 PM. Ice Cream for desert. Rallymasters will furnish ice cream and toppings. We'll meet in the pavilion.

<u>Tuesday 6/18</u> Departure day; some indicated they may stay an extra day or two. Wishing everyone safe travels to your next destination.
