2. The competition will have two age categories: 5–7 and 8–10. To participate, children must be at least 7 years old and no older than 10 as of August 1, 2026.
3. Each participant must submit a signed RELEASE OF LIABILITY form to the Fair Office by 12:00 PM on August 5, 2026. Forms are available at the Fair Office.
4. While one contestant has hold of a pig, no other contestant will be allowed to touch it. If two contestants catch a pig at the same time, the pig will be turned loose. Pig must be carried and put in the crate.
5. The Petting Zoo Committee will act as referees and judges in all cases under protest and their decision is final.
6. The pig is the property of the scramble contestant who catches it. He/she must remove it from the fairgrounds no later than 10 pm that night, otherwise he/she forfeits the pig.
7. Those entering the pig scramble MUST meet on August 7, at 2:45 pm SHARP to participate and accompanied by an adult.

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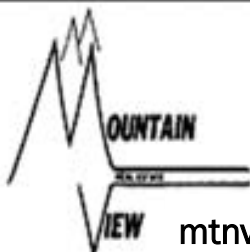

FFA Tractor Pull Classes!

1. Stock Garden Tractor-

- o No added weight- Must be Lawn/Garden type tractor frame and drive train
- o No modifications except hitch.
- o Pulls people weighted sled

2. Diggers-

- o Weighted Garden Tractor- Must be Lawn/Garden type tractor frame and drive train

3. Unlimited-

- o Motorcycle, Snowmobile, etc. engine powered tractors

4. Mini Rod

Automobile Powered Tractor

FFA Tractor Pull General Rules

1. One entry per tractor. Two pulls per entry. Teams may utilize two different drivers for their single entry.
2. Wheelie bars required if hook point is above the axle. Otherwise recommended.
3. Helmets Required for all Youth & 18 years old
4. Each tractor must have operating brakes or clutch (way of stopping suddenly).
5. Tractor drawbar/point of hook should be 13" above ground
6. Tractor must be in neutral while hooking up to sled.
7. The tractor must be within the defined bounds of track area.
8. No throttle starts or jerking sled. First offense results in disqualification.
9. Before each pull, all tractors must be inspected.
10. Driver must remain in control of the tractor at all times.
11. Drivers must stay on the seat at all times. Hands must be on the handbrake, clutch, or throttle at all times.
12. No alcohol or intoxication is allowed.
13. Any screwing around while driving will result in disqualification.
14. All tractors must have sufficient shielding of belts, chains, etc.
15. All children in the pulling area shall be supervised at all times.
16. Any questionable modifications will be reviewed by the committee.
17. Track and safety officials have the authority to enforce all rules.

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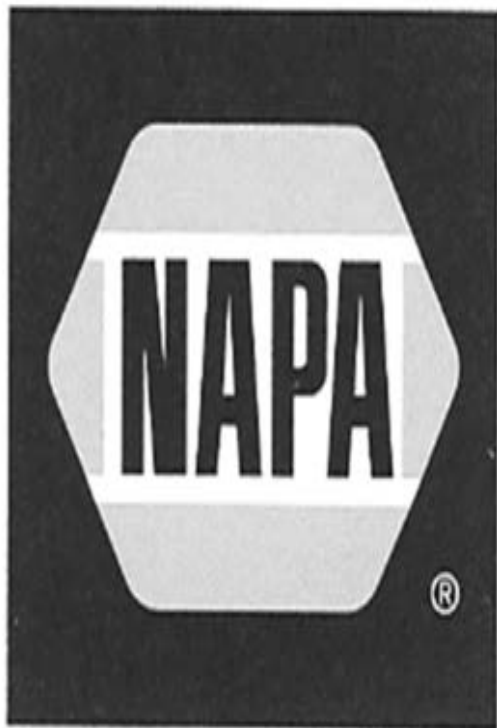
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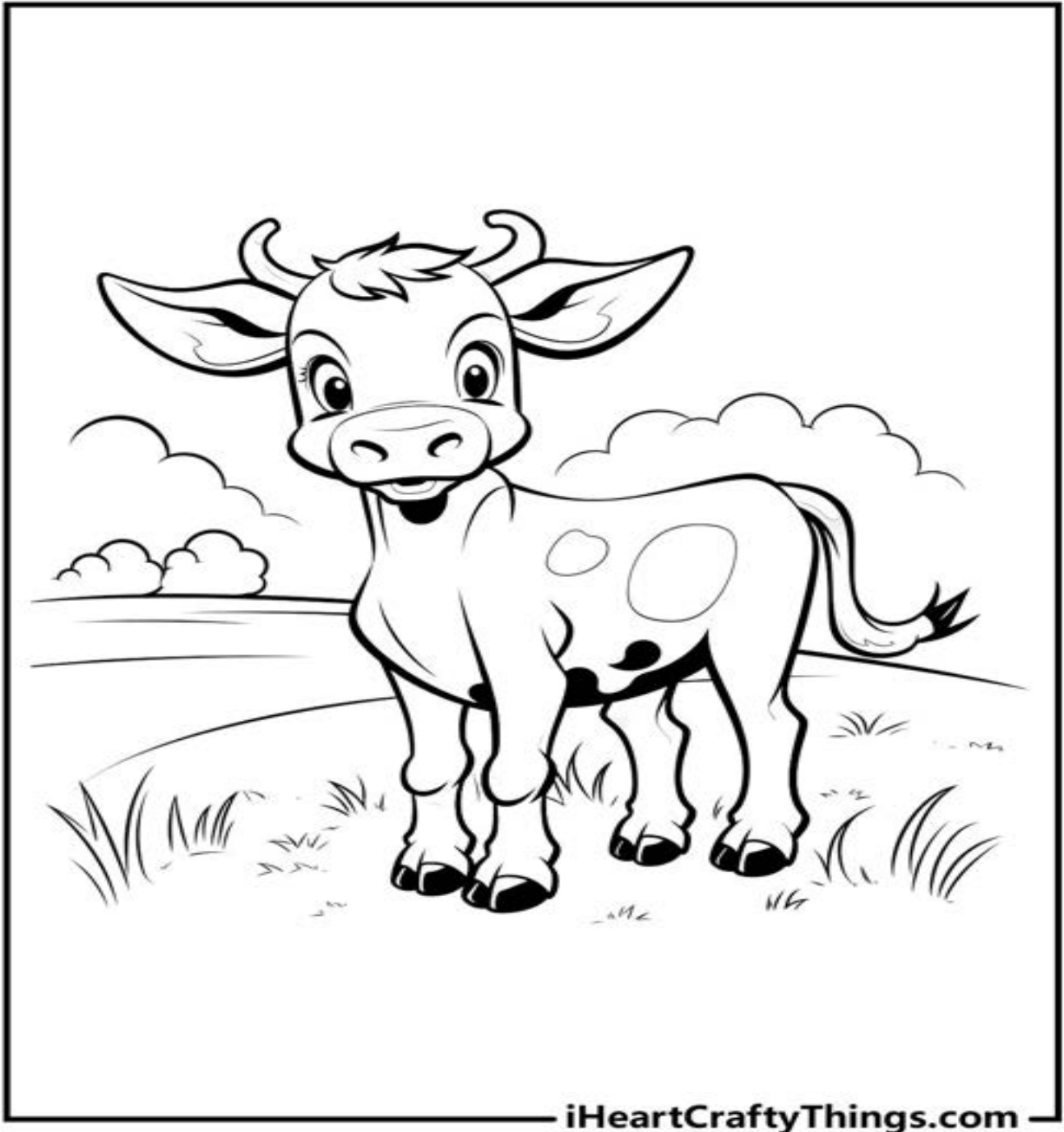

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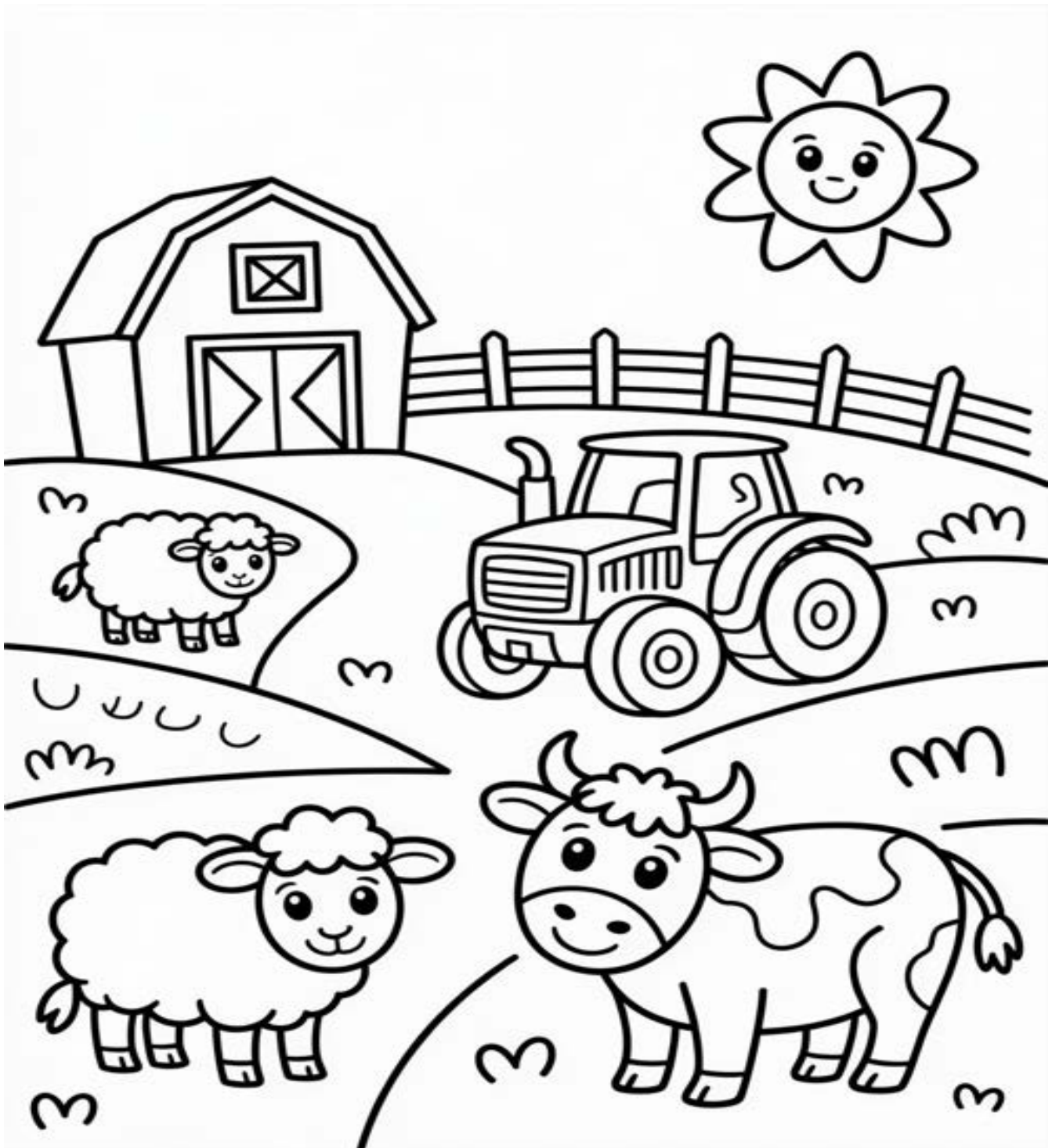

We, the undersigned, hereby request that the minor listed below be granted permission (1) to enter the restricted area; (2) to participate as a contestant, assistant official or official or otherwise in rodeo events; (3) to compete for money, prizes, recognition or reward; (4) to be covered by participant's hospitalization insurance, if applicable, as limited by the master policy (all collectively hereinafter called "permissive entry").

In consideration of "permissive entry" to minor into the restricted area, which is the area from which admission to the general public is restricted, which includes, but not limited to, the rodeo arena, chutes, pens, adjacent walkways, concessions and other appurtenances, we the undersigned, on behalf of the minor and for ourselves, our personal representatives, heirs, next of kin, spouses and assigns, do hereby:

We further understand that the arena surface, access ways or lack thereof, lighting or lack thereof, and weather conditions all change and pose a danger to the minor. We further understand that other contestants and participants pose a danger to the minor, but nevertheless, **WE EACH VOLUNTARILY ELECT TO ACCEPT ALL RISKS** connected with the minor's entry into the restricted area and/or participation in any rodeo events.
3. **AGREE** that this Agreement shall apply to any incident, injury, accident or death occurring at the captioned location on the above date and **FOR A PERIOD OF ONE (1) YEAR THEREAFTER**. All subsequent agreements and release documents signed by any of the undersigned shall amplify, but in no way limit the provisions of this document. The provisions of this document may be canceled by any one of the undersigned by delivering to the above rodeo written cancellation of this Agreement, which shall be effective 24 hours after the date, said cancellation is actually received by the Rodeo.

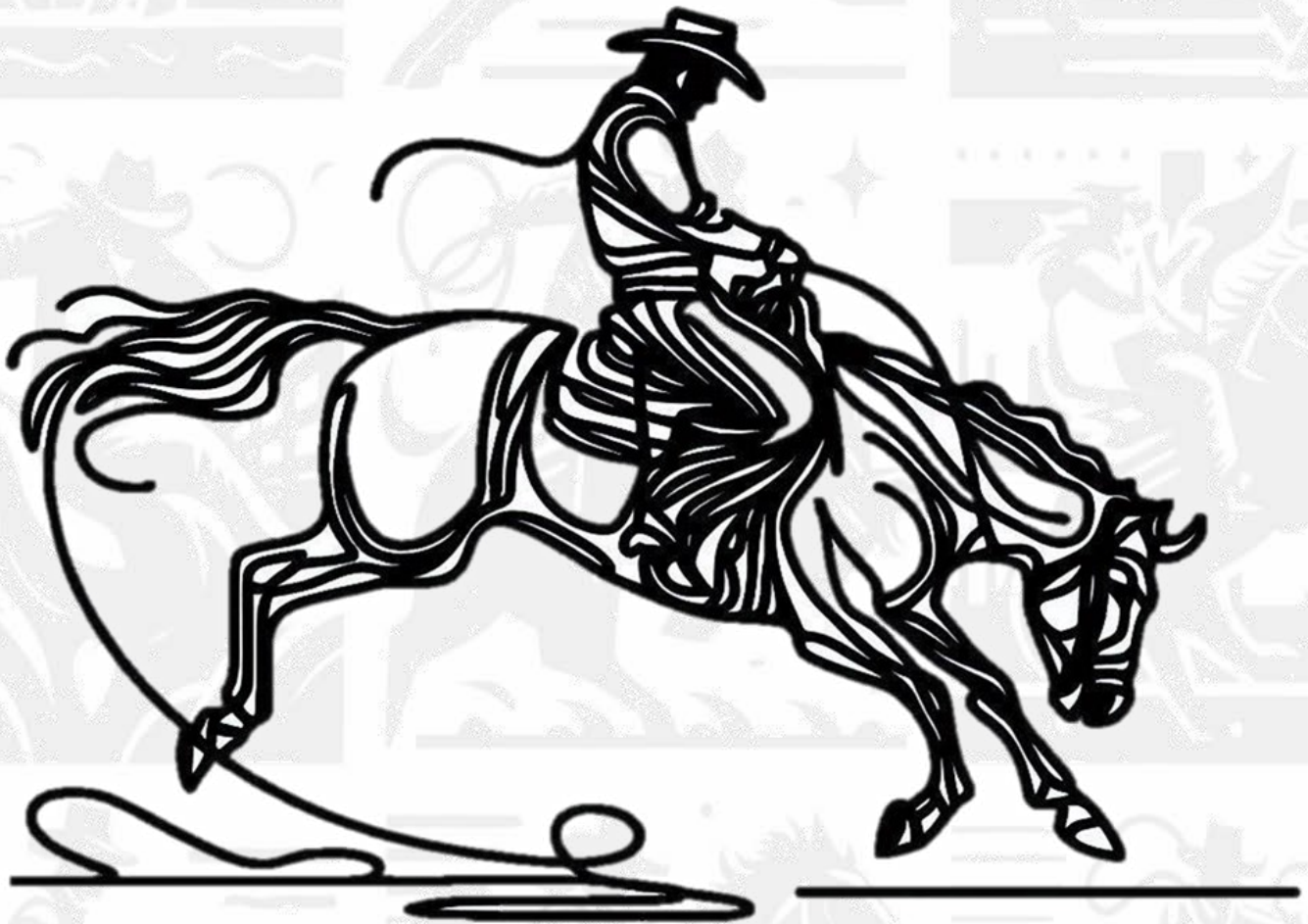

GUIDELINES FOR ALL LIVESTOCK BARNs FOR ALL EXHIBITORS

1. Keep Aisles clean of manure, bedding, feed pans, trimming chutes, chairs, tack boxes, etc. Make the barns accessible to the public. Aisles will need to be raked several times a day.
2. Animals need to be fed weed and seed free hay while on the fairground premises. **Bedding must be wood shavings. NO STRAW SHALL BE USED FOR ANY ANIMAL BEDDING.**
3. Clean bedding between 6 am and 9 am each morning. Replenish with clean bedding. This is also a good time to exercise your animals. Animals and area must be checked several times a day. Make sure your animals and areas are clean and eye appealing to the public.
4. All cattle should be tied in the barn with a rope halter and a neck rope to prevent the animal from getting loose.
5. Grain and hay, if kept in the barns, must be kept out of the aisles and not blocking entrances, garbage cans, electrical outlets, or fire extinguishers. **All feed bags and shavings bags must be taken to the dumpster. Please do not put these bags in the smaller trash cans.**
6. **NO DOGS ALLOWED IN THE BARNs OR AROUND THE SHOW RING**
7. Clean up and check out: Livestock members must be present on Sunday morning to clean pens and livestock barns. All participants are required to check out with the barn superintendent. All pens must be cleaned by noon on Sunday.
8. All open class entries must be submitted to the Open Class supervisor. Open class stall fees must be paid at the Fair office prior to entering (if available).
9. Poultry and Rabbit Exhibitors must clean their pen/cage each day during the fair by 9 am each morning. Pens/cages must be cleaned before the exhibitor checks out to go home.
10. Awards will be given at the Judge's discretion.
11. Neither the Fair Board, nor agents of the Fair Board, nor Livestock Committee members shall be responsible, in any case, for any loss, accident, injury, death, or damage to exhibits or personal property which may occur at the fair or on the fair ground's premises. No claim for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted nor suit instituted or maintained against the Madison County Fair, or their agents, representatives, servants, or employees having license or privilege to exhibit on the grounds by those occupying space.
12. If an animal becomes ill, it may be removed from the fairgrounds.
13. Failure to care for you animals will result in removal from the fairgrounds.

Failure to adhere to these rules will result in exhibitors being asked to take animals home during the fair and/or loss of awards

MADISON COUNTY FAIR 2026

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Rule 1 — General

Section 1. The MADISON COUNTY FAIR BOARD/FAIR MANAGEMENT of the Madison County Fair reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these Rules and Regulations, to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, connected with or incidental to the Fair.

Section 2. Rights are reserved by the MADISON COUNTY FAIR BOARD/FAIR MANAGEMENT to formulate and announce new rules to meet emergencies that may arise during the Fair and to determine all matters arising from the Fair. In the event of conflict between General and Special Rules, the latter will govern.

Section 3. The MADISON COUNTY FAIR BOARD/FAIR MANAGEMENT reserves the right to exclude from the Fairgrounds any person or persons. Persons who violate any of the Madison County Fair Rules, laws, or who shall engage in offensive conduct may be removed from the Fair.

Section 4. Every animal and article upon the grounds shall be subject to Fair Rules, but while every precaution will be taken for the safekeeping of the same, neither the Fair Board, nor its officers or agents will be responsible in any case for any loss or accident which may occur.

Section 5. The MADISON COUNTY FAIR BOARD/FAIR MANAGEMENT reserves the right to prescribe dimension and regulate the position of signs, and generally to direct the arrangement of articles on exhibition as far as the same may be necessary to secure harmony and attractive appearance.

Section 6. Digging or driving posts or stakes into the ground is strictly PROHIBITED unless permission is granted by the MADISON COUNTY FAIR BOARD/ FAIR MANAGEMENT.

Section 7. The MADISON COUNTY FAIR BOARD/FAIR MANAGEMENT reserve the right to direct and regulate the parking .

Wheeled toys (e.g., skateboards, scooters, hoverboards) are only allowed in designated areas. Misuse will result in confiscation until the fair ends.

Bicycles, ATVs, UTVs, and motorcycles are not allowed during the fair.

Dogs must be leashed and cleaned up after. Only registered service animals are allowed in buildings and are not permitted in bleachers or the Sales Ring.

Smoking is prohibited in all buildings, restrooms, grandstands, and bleachers.

No balloons, stickers, or personal signs allowed in the Pavilion/Jeffers Building or elsewhere on the grounds.

Rule 2 — Entry of Exhibits

Section 1. Competition in all open exhibits is open to Beaverhead, Jefferson and Madison Counties only. Application for entry must be made on an official entry form. 4-H and FFA exhibits are limited to Madison and Jefferson Counties only. YOUTH is 18 years of age and under and use yellow entry tags

Section 2. All livestock entries will close per the individual department times. Please see department for details. Entries in all other Departments must be made by Thursday at 8:00 pm. Judging of open class indoor exhibits will take place on Friday beginning at 8:30 am.

Section 3. Exhibits, except livestock, shall be the property of the exhibitor and shall be of his/her own production. The Fair Management reserves the right to require a sworn affidavit as to the ownership, producer, and place raised of any exhibit.

Section 4. Exhibits erroneously entered may be transferred, in the discretion of the Superintendent of the Department in which they properly belong, if done prior to the awarding of premiums in the class in which they are eligible.

Section 5. No exhibits shall be removed before 11:00 am Sunday, the final day of the Fair. This shall include 4-H and FFA, as well as general exhibitors. Removal of exhibits prior to 11:00 am will result in premium forfeiture. All sale livestock may be released for shipping after 7:00 am on Sunday.

Section 6. The Madison County Fair will not assume or pay transportation charges on articles sent for exhibition or assume or pay any expenses in their delivery to the fairgrounds.

Section 7. No premium shall be awarded, nor will any premium be guaranteed to be paid on any animal or article not mentioned or classified in the premium list published in this Fair Book.

Section 1. All Premium checks will be mailed out within 90 days after the fair. All premium checks must be cashed within 90 days or the check will be void.

Section 1. The Fair Board will resolve all protests. The protest must be made in writing, accompanied by an affidavit, setting forth the reason for protesting, and a deposit of \$25.00, which will be forfeited if the protest is not sustained. The written protest will be given to the Fair Management.

Section 2. Protests against an award must be filed with the Fair Management before 8:00 pm on the day the award was given.

Section 8. Exhibitors should take notice of the time and date on which the entries in the various Departments close. Exhibitors will furnish Superintendents their entry forms at the time the exhibits are entered. DO NOT MAIL THE ENTRY FORMS TO THE FAIR MANAGEMENT.

Section 9. Open class livestock for beef, sheep, swine and dairy will not be listed in this Fair Book. However, should sufficient interest be shown by commercial livestock producers to compete in open class and if there are sufficient entries to cover 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place, lot numbers will be provided to create an open class exhibit. Commercial livestock producers who wish to exhibit and not compete are welcome, space will be provided if available. Those who wish to compete should contact the Fair Manager prior to bringing livestock to the Fair to be assured of enough competition to warrant creating an open class exhibit. 4-H members will not be allowed to enter the same animal in open class that was exhibited in the youth class.

Section 11. It is not required, but is requested, that any and all hay on the Fairgrounds be noxious weed-seed free. Shavings must be used for bedding.

Section 12. All rules pertaining to feed, water, and cleaning of pens/cages per "Guidelines for all Livestock Barns for all Exhibitors," must be adhered to in order to exhibit at the Madison County Fair.

Rule 3 — Superintendents

Section 1. Each Superintendent shall have charge of the Department assigned to him/her, subject to the direction of the Fair Manager or his/her assistant.

Section 2. At least one Superintendent per building shall be on duty at 10:00 a.m. on Thursday, 8:00 a.m. on Friday, 10:00 am on Saturday, and 11:00 am on Sunday. This remains unless otherwise directed. All Superintendents shall be present during the judging.

Section 3. Each Superintendent is in charge of caring for and receiving the Judge's Book of his/her Department. Awards shall be duly and properly entered in the Judge's Book. Premiums shall be paid according to this record only. The Superintendent and Judge must sign each page immediately after completion of judging each class.

Section 4. All Superintendents at the close of the Fair shall file with the Fair Management a full and detailed statement of their work with recommendations.

Rule 7 — Trailers and Parking

Section 1. The Madison County Sheriff's Department shall enforce parking in special designated areas for horse trailers and house trailers.

NO PARKING IN DESIGNATED FIRE LANES—VEHICLES WILL BE TOWED AT OWNERS EXPENSE.

Section 2. All trailers and campers must be parked in assigned areas and in order. Horse trailers must be in order in the arena infield. Violations may result in towing at the owner's expense and/or removal from the fairgrounds.

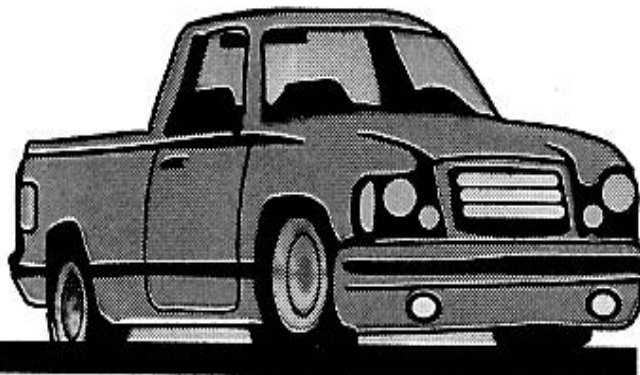

Hints to Exhibitors

1. Purity and quality of a sample are the two points to remember when preparing samples of threshed grain for show. Purity is valued at 35% and quality at 65%.
2. Wheat - all samples should be free of dirt, weed seeds, chaff, and other grains. There should be no evidence of smut in the sample. The sample should be pure as to variety and class of grain. The grain in the sample ought to be large, plump and of hard flinty texture. A deep, yet clear dark red color is best for milling wheats. It should give a high test weight. The sample should be free from all kinds of damage such as bin pruning.
3. Oats and Barley - Practically the same points for wheat will hold for oats and barley. In oats and barley, fresh clean color is very important. Another important point is the plumpness of the grain, best indicated by a high point per bushel.
4. Sheaf Grain - In sheaf grains, the evidence of high yield and quality are of equal importance. A sheaf of grain should be pure as to variety. The grain must be well matured and of sound vitality.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

1. Exhibits must contain the specified number of vegetables.
2. All exhibits must be grown by exhibitor and must not have been a purchased product. Also, the product must be entered for the first time in Madison County Fair.
3. All exhibits must be shown on a white paper plate, without any decorations, in a Ziploc or plastic bag fastened with a wire tie, except for garlic, onions, zucchini, and any exhibit too large for a plastic bag. The exhibitor must provide his/her own paper plates and plastic bags.
4. ALL TAGS USED MUST BE FOR MADISON CO. FAIR.
5. Vegetables too large for a plastic bag should have the tag fastened with string, scotch tape, etc. Exhibits not claimed by 4:00 pm Sunday night will be disposed of at the discretion of the Fair management.
6. Place tag on outside of bag. Please attach to the end opposite of tie. All entries must conform to number requirements. Read all instructions for your entry.
7. Exhibits will be judged on uniformity, maturity, varietal characteristics and freedom from disease and injury.
8. Judging is based on market preference. Most markets prefer a small or medium sized specimen. This is especially true of summer squash.
9. Root Crops: Please see individual listings for carrots, onions, Jerusalem artichokes. Cut off tops leaving approximately 1 inch at top. The roots should be cut off leaving approximately 1 inch except beets, do not cut root. Wash thoroughly but do not use a brush.
10. Beans and Peas: Leave $\frac{1}{4}$ to $\frac{1}{2}$ inch stems and select uniform pods. Avoid over-mature pods.
11. Carrots: Select uniform length and thickness, avoid green shoulders.
12. Cured (dried) Onions: Approximately two weeks before Fair, twist tops and remove outer layer of dirty skin, just one layer. Spread out to dry until Fair time. Remove tops leaving about 1 inch and clip roots to approximately 1 inch. **DO NOT PEEL ONIONS TO MAKE THEM SHINY.**
13. Fresh Onions: Lift just prior to exhibiting, avoiding damage to root node, trim roots leaving $\frac{1}{2}$ inch uniformly. Leave 6 inch top. Remove outer layer to get dirt off and wash. Choose plants that are well blanched or white. Please see Bunching Onions for scallions (green onions).
14. Cucumbers: Variety is important in Lot selection. Do not enter over large picking cucumbers as slicers. Small seed cavity is important.
15. Kohlrabi: Remove roots just below ball. Trim upper leaves to approximately $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above ball. Should not be hard, woody or pithy.
16. Potatoes: After digging, allow them to dry to set skins; clean gently with a cloth and avoid rough handling.
17. Garden Herbs: Annual and perennial herbs should be cut at ground level. A bunch is defined as a commercial quantity, or approximate amounts sold in stores. Quality, not quantity will win awards. Fresh Herbs should be displayed in water.
18. Rhubarb: Choose clean, straight stems, remove all but 1 inch of the leaf; do not remove root ends.
19. Groom all materials you display.
20. Lettuce, spinach and garden greens, displayed in water.

2. Do not add more stems than the Fair Book calls for.
3. All foliage should be clean, wash gently before entering.
4. Flowers must be grown by the exhibitor.
5. Exhibitor may enter only 1 item per Lot #.
6. The Madison County Fair is not responsible for flower containers.
7. A BLOOM means one (1) flower, foliage as required; a STEM means a single (1) flower on one (1) stem, with foliage; a SPIKE means a single stem possessing many individual florets, foliage as indicated; a SPRAY means three (3) or more flowers per stem, with foliage. A HEAD means the apical bud of a plant, as for flowering cabbage or flowering kale
8. All foliage below the water line must be removed.
9. Cultivar's names for all Fresh Flowers must be supplied.
10. All Fresh Flowers must be conditioned by hardening the cut
11. Plant materials in tepid water over night. Use of floral preservatives is helpful. A SPECIMEN means a typical representative of a genus, species, type or cultivar. Called for when there is a possibility of more than one bloom form per Lot, as in Dianthus and Cosmos, or for a foliage plant.
12. YOUTH is 18 years and younger. Use yellow tag for all youth entries.
13. Decorated Hat. Do not use hat for a container for the flowers.

CACTI AND SUCCULENTS

Cacti and succulents are very similar types of plants which have adapted to drought in whole or in part of their life cycle. It is useful to know that all cacti are succulents but not all succulents are cacti. They are differentiated by the presence or absence of areoles, which are foreshortened branches. Little tufts of hairs, bristles or spines grow from these joints, which give rise to the flowers. All cacti have areoles; no succulents have them.

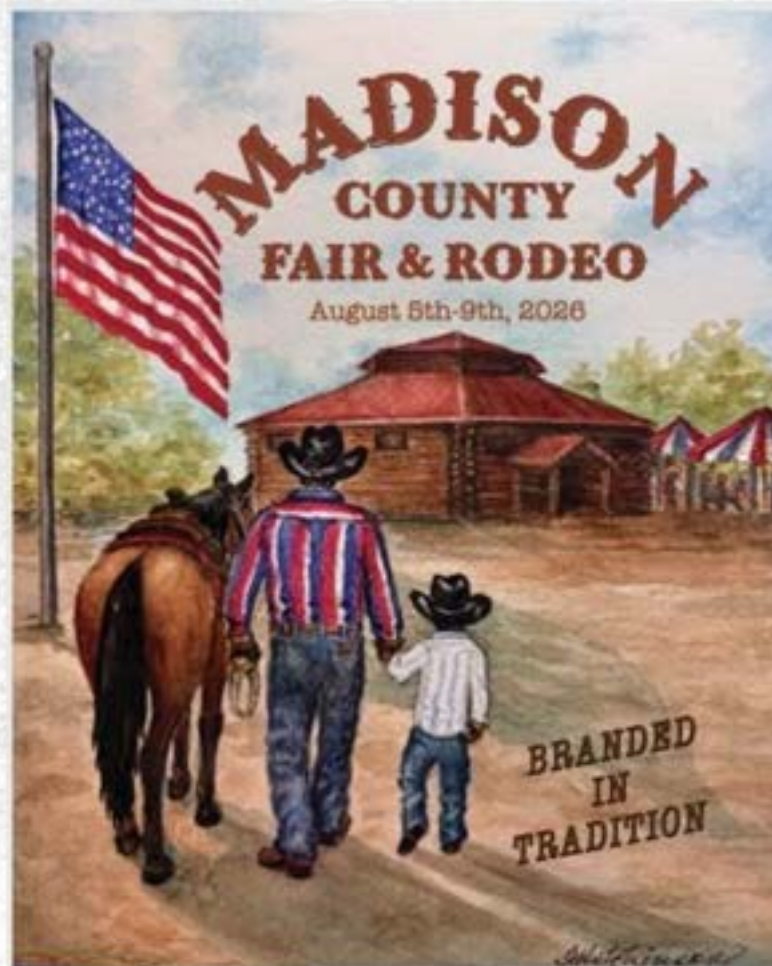
