

LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

12 Years of Transformation

The first 6 years as the Financial Manager, helping to ensure NOS became financially stable and sustainable, securing and managing as many as 30 different funding sources each year; and the last 6 years as Executive Director, helping to transform NOS into the premier provider of outdoor education in Nevada with two locations to serve from.



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YOUTH PROGRAMS



We take the "outdoor" in our name seriously! We love teaching outside and using nature as our classroom. In the 2020 - 2021 school year, we taught 124 lessons in grades K - 4 and our rural schools. For the 2021 - 2022 school year we completely transformed our schoolbased program. Our new Nature in My World program is designed to expand worlds in an age-appropriate fashion while integrating components of literacy (reading), mathematics, and social studies to support learning in traditional classrooms. Nature and responsible outdoor recreation topics provides us plenty of learning opportunities.





Generous donations from Nevada Gold Mines, Elko County School District, Small Mine Development, SSR Mining-Marigold, Humboldt County Commission, Elko County Commission, and City of Elko provided funding for our school-based programs throughout Humboldt, Lander, Elko, and Pershing counties.

NATURE AFTER SCHOOL

In response to the pandemic, we began our after school program that continues to grow! Nature After School lessons are banded for grades K-2 and grades 3-5. Each month there is a field trip component that is offered to grades K-5. We are thankful for our local Parks and Recreation **Departments** who provide us space for this program.

Nature After School topics are vast and include:

- Animal Skins and Skulls (pictured)
- Compass Skills
- Archeology
- Growth and Survival
- Water











Continued longtime partnerships with Nevada Muleys, Nevada Chukar Foundation, Nevada Bighorn Unlimited-Midas, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, and the Wild Sheep Foundation allowed us to once again host amazing summer camps! We returned to our traditional overnight camps, but with smaller group sizes that we found to be an improvement for connecting with kids.

Due the overall increase of people being outside since the pandemic started, we are grateful for private parties who provided us space this summer!

Adventure Camps (ages 8 - 10) include 3 days of day camp and a one-night overnight experience. For many of our campers this is the first time camping without their family. We are deeply appreciative of **The Neff Family** in Ruby Valley and **The Hunt's** in Paradise Valley for graciously allowing our campers to use their land for their campout.

After a year hiatus, it was wonderful for the Pathfinder Camps (ages 11 - 13) to return to **Judge Montero's Ranch** in Winnemucca and be able to utilize the "NOS Annex", space donated by **Brett Worsham** in Spring Creek for the two-night campouts.

Our "big kids", ages 14 - 17, enjoyed Backroad Adventures at Sheldon National Wildlife Refuge and Backpacking '21 in the Ruby Mountains.

Every NOS Camp incorporates the seven Leave No Trace Principles to influence youth behaviors and teach them to "share the care" of the natural world.

We also were able to train with Sierra Nevada Journeys, a "sister" organization that serves in the Sierra Nevada (western Nevada) region. Learning from their staff provided us fresh ideas and made us better outdoor educators. Experiencing their rope courses really helped us stretch and grow as a staff!




In his own words...

At the end of my service, and during my second and third hitches, I was able to use my education stipend to cover the cost of some of my tuition, textbooks, and technology."
