November 1, 2013

Exactly two years ago, the Michigan Armed Forces Hospitality Center, Inc., stepped into uncharted territory. That was the first day of operation for the new Freedom Center at Detroit Metropolitan Airport's McNamara Terminal. In the airport's 43-year history, there had never been an armed forces hospitality center located inside the passenger terminal.

From the outset, we have focused on one simple goal: **provide a world-class hospitality center to meet the travel needs of military service members.**

Each guest is individually greeted and thanked for their service upon entering our front door. Our staff and volunteers strive to discern and meet the needs of every guest.

Our financial support comes from a variety of sources. On a daily basis, airport passengers make individual contributions in our donation box located at the entrance to our facility near Gate A-43. In addition, we have received financial support from corporations located in southeastern Michigan. Support is also gratefully received in the form of in-kind donations of food, beverages, supplies, furniture and equipment.

During the third quarter of 2013, we put the finishing touches on a satellite facility in Troy, Michigan. This new Freedom Center lounge serves the needs of new recruits and their families during the enlistment process. It is open during normal business hours, Monday through Friday.

During the coming year we have plans to expand our airport operations to include an additional facility inside the North Terminal at DTW. This will allow us to meet the travel needs of an estimated 25% more service members than we currently serve in our present location.

This growth and expanded outreach requires additional resources. We are currently seeking to partner with donors throughout Michigan to help us continue, "serving those who serve us." As you review this report of last year's success, I invite you to consider how you could become a partner in helping us meet next year's goals.

How It All Started

In December 2010, for the second year in a row, a group of Delta Air Lines employees organized a temporary Holiday Military Lounge within the McNamara Terminal at DTW. During a three-week period, volunteers from Delta, military veterans' organizations, the TSA and other groups assisted more than 2,400 members of our Armed Forces and their families. The effort was an overwhelming success and clearly demonstrated the need for a permanent hospitality station.

Michigan Armed Forces Hospitality Center, Inc., a Michigan nonprofit, was created to provide the necessary organization and fundraising for a year-round facility called "Freedom Center." The Center is a permanent military lounge adjacent to Gate A43 in the center of the McNamara Terminal.

On Veterans Day 2011, dedication ceremonies for the Freedom Center marked the grand opening of our permanent military lounge at DTW. Hosted by a dedicated staff of trained volunteers, the special needs of military travelers are being met seven days a week, 365 days a year. Many of our guests are transiting DTW to or from overseas duty stations.

Our Mission Is Simple

Michigan Armed Forces Hospitality Center, Inc., is dedicated to providing a world-class reception and hospitality station that meets the needs of in-transit military service members. Staffed by volunteers and supported by organizations. We also welcome retired members of the military and our veterans, space permitting. The Freedom Center is dedicated to "Serving Those Who Serve Us."

Opening Day

On Veteran's Day, 11/11/11 at 1100 hours, the Freedom Center opened its doors and hearts to military members, families and veterans.





Daily Operations

Freedom Center's normal hours are 6 a.m. until near midnight, seven days a week. However, when military members are stranded overnight due to weather or flight delays, Freedom Center remains open. A dedicated group of volunteers staff Freedom Center, with one full-time employee, who coordinates volunteers and ensures smooth operations.

In addition, we welcome and hosted members of the military of our allied nations. Our guests enjoy coffee, tea, soft drinks, bottled water and juices, as well as snacks and other food items. Free travel amenities include: lip balm, toothbrushes/toothpaste, combs, nail files, ear plugs, hand lotion, etc. Free Wi-Fi service, books and magazines are provided, and laptop computers are available. Freedom Center offers comfortable couches and recliners, a children's play area and even has a set of triple bunk beds with fresh First Class pillows and blankets provided courtesy of Delta Air Lines.



Serving Those Who Serve Us

Since 2011, Freedom Center volunteers have hosted more than 80,000 members of our military, their dependents and veterans at the DTW location. By providing a world-class lounge, we have been able to say, "Thank you for your service" to our troops.

New Freedom Center Lounge in Troy

On Friday, November 8, 2013, a second Freedom Center lounge opened in the Military Entrance Processing Center (MEPS) in Troy, Michigan. This location will serve new recruits and their family members during the enlistment process.

The ribbon cutting ceremony was attended by Freedom Center sponsors and volunteers, government and military officials, and

local veteran service organization representatives. Speakers at the ribbon cutting included: Major Thomas P. Shields, USMC; Kenneth S. Pratt, MAFH President; Jon Rose, General Manager, Meritor Defense; Diane Charles, Director of Corporate Communications, Art Van Furniture; Cheryl L. M. Phillips, Vice President Masco Corporation Foundation; Dane Slater, Mayor, City of Troy; and Senator Patrick Colbeck, 7th State Senate District and MAFH board member.

We expect the new lounge to host more than 5,000 recruits annually as they complete their processing and are sworn in as members of the Armed Forces. The lounge will be open Monday through Friday during normal business hours.


and their families, can be together, in a relaxing environment having a refreshment, or just away from the Recruiters, to share in some conversations privately.

Just before my son deployed, a friend found a Military Moms support group for me to join. After two years of attending and being involved with many Military activities, I became the President of the group called Michigan Military Moms. Many of the parents who accompany their kids (Recruits) are happy to hear about the support group, and how they can be involved with the Military to support their kids who enlisted.

I had one young man yesterday, who had returned from last week for more testing, and awaiting a job assignment to prepare for leave. His father followed him to MEPS, but was upset about his son enlisting, and wasted no time in verbalizing it out loud in the lobby for all to hear. This young man came into the FC, almost in tears with frustration and disappointment. His father left shortly, thereafter he'd made the scene. After a few minutes of being in the room with him, I asked him if he was OK! His eyes were filling up with tears, so I asked him if I could give him a hug, and He nodded his head as he came towards me! I told him everything would work out for him soon, just be patient!

Our presence at the MEPS is so much more than providing refreshments and toiletries, it's being there to provide comfort and some TLC to all who need it. These fresh new future warriors and their families, often don't know what to expect. I am blessed to have the opportunity to be a part of their special day, and help in any way that I can!"
