After more conversation, he indicated how many problems he has had over the past several months just getting an appointment to see his doctor. The next day, I reached out to my contacts at the Dingell Veterans Administration Medical Center and asked if there was something that could be done to help.

Within two hours, the Dingell Center called him to confirm a new appointment within the next seven days.

I feel that there is more to the Freedom Center than just passing out coffee and donuts. We must be able to assist a veteran with any problem they might be facing, either directly or by pointing them in the right direction."

MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



The Michigan Armed Forces Hospitality Center has been in existence for more than three years. During that time, through our two Freedom Center facilities, we have had the opportunity to meet the travel needs of more than 150,000 military personnel and their families.

Each day we welcome hundreds of service members and offer them refreshments, a place to relax and the opportunity to recharge before continuing their journey. Our staff of volunteers is dedicated to providing a world-class hospitality center to meet the needs of our guests.

Sometimes the need is as simple as a request for a snack or beverage. At other times we're able to assist by smoothing out disrupted travel plans, helping with re-bookings, securing overnight lodging or contacting an overseas duty station. On occasion, when severe weather slows down travel, we accommodate stranded travelers overnight. Whatever the need, the Freedom Center staff has the resources and desire to provide the military traveler with a home-like atmosphere.

Of special interest this year is the completion of our first year of Freedom Center activity in Troy, Michigan. This facility serves new recruits and their families as they proceed through the enlistment process. Needless to say, this is a life-altering experience. The resources and talent of our staff help to provide a smooth transition for both the enlistees and their families.

Based on the success of the Freedom Center in Troy, we are currently in the process of establishing a third location in support of the enlistment center in Lansing, Michigan. This facility will begin operation during the first quarter of 2015.

In addition, we are continuing to develop plans to expand our airport operations to include an additional facility inside the North Terminal at Detroit Metropolitan Airport (DTW). This will allow us to meet the travel needs of an estimated 25 percent more service members than we currently serve in our present location.

None of this would be possible without our dedicated volunteers and generous donors. On a daily basis, airport passengers place individual contributions in our donation box located at the entrance to our facility near Gate A-43. In addition, we receive financial contributions from organizations and corporations located throughout Michigan. Support is also gratefully received in the form of in-kind donations of food, beverages, supplies, furniture and equipment.

However, it is important to note that we do not receive any form of government funding.

Our growth and extended outreach requires additional resources. We are currently seeking to partner with donors throughout Michigan to help us continue "serving those who serve us." As you review this report of last year's success, I invite you to consider how you could become a partner in helping us meet next year's goals.

How It All Started

In December 2010, for the second year in a row, a group of Delta Air Lines employees organized a temporary Holiday Military Lounge within the McNamara Terminal at DTW. During a three-week period, volunteers from Delta, military veterans organizations, the TSA and other groups assisted more than 2,400 members of our armed forces and their families. The effort was an overwhelming success and clearly demonstrated the need for a permanent hospitality station.

Michigan Armed Forces Hospitality Center, Inc., a Michigan nonprofit, was created to provide the necessary organization and fundraising for a yearround facility called "Freedom Center." The original Center is a permanent military lounge adjacent to Gate A-43 in the center of the McNamara Terminal at the Detroit Metropolitan Airport (DTW).

On Veterans Day 2011, dedication ceremonies for the Freedom Center marked the grand opening of our permanent military lounge at DTW. Hosted by a dedicated staff of trained volunteers, the special needs of military

travelers are being met seven days a week, 365 days a year. Many of our guests are transiting DTW to or from overseas duty stations.

OPERATIONS UPDATE

Detroit Metro Airport/McNamara Terminal Daily Operations

Our flagship Freedom Center at Detroit Metropolitan Airport, located inside the McNamara Terminal, has served more than 150,000 personnel since its inception. In the past twelve months alone, we've welcomed more than 50,000 guests. This represents a 20 percent increase over last year's utilization and highlights two important points. First, we are constantly reminded that knowledge of our location and mission is still filtering out into the military community. Every day, guests walk in expressing a great sense of relief and joy exclaiming how happy they are to have discovered the Freedom Center military lounge. Second, it underscores how very important our work is.

Freedom Center Lounge in Troy

With the help of 14 volunteers, we were able to serve more than 24,000 guests in our Troy Freedom Center in 2014. The volunteers dedicate their time five days a week working eight-hour shifts.

We are most proud to be able to support the families of those serving our country through our Freedom Center Family Support Group. We arrange for guest speakers to help and better educate our members and ease the stress and sadness of absence. We stay connected within our community to raise an awareness of the needs of our service members and have found local schools, churches, etc. are eagerly wanting to help.

In addition to committing time in the Center, volunteers participate in many



support activities, such as hosting packaging parties to send care packages to our deployed service members, and collaborating with the Marine Corps Reserves to collect donations for Toys 4 Tots. 
