



The Cost of Caregiving

Caregiving is something we do as a friend, family member, or community member. With so many Baby Boomers coming of age it is common that they are often afflicted with a life-limiting disease and in need of care. Some will go into long-term care, some will be hospitalized, but most prefer to die at home. And this is where the unpaid caregiver comes in. Sometimes it is a grown child looking after a parent, often a husband or wife looking after their spouse or even a friend caring for a friend when they have no family close by.

According to the BC Hospice Palliative Care end of life caregivers face a financial strain because home care costs in the last 6 months of life are roughly double what is required for all other home care recipients. In 2009, replacement costs for unpaid caregiving in Canada was estimated at \$25 to 26 billion dollars (yes, that is billion with a B) showing the huge contribution that caregivers provide to our healthcare system.

When you are looking after someone you care deeply for, it can be a heartbreaking experience because you get to see their struggles up close and personal in a way that others don't. This can be quite an emotional upheaval to bear. And that is why Terrace Hospice started the Family and Friend Caregivers of the Northwest.
