





Kinny Sandhu (née Majithia)

Is this India's most well-connected woman? A member of high society, she was born at the height of her philanthropic, entrepreneurial and cosmopolitan family's powers, then one of the wealthiest families in India – her family's estate even has its own steam engine. Kinny has wonderful family stories, such as the time when her father and uncle were the first to fly into Kathmandu, landing on the golf course in their plane – and the king of Nepal came out to greet them. Kinny's great-aunt is Amrita Sher-Gill, India's Frida Kahlo, and one of the greatest avant-garde women painters of the early 20th century. Kinny's mother was a code breaker in the Australian Navy and met a dashing Indian Air Force officer in Melbourne during World War II when he was posted there as an attaché. Kinny straddles two worlds, with extensive family in both India and Australia.

Kinny is a designer and maker with a passion for India's hand crafts and the welfare of those in her local community. She has been producing hand-stitched textile ranges for local and international designers for 40 years. She runs a quilting and embroidery production unit on her farm, is an accomplished artist and is an indigo grower and natural dye producer. She and her husband split their time between their homes in Delhi, Nainital (in the foothills of the Himalayas) and their farm (about 4 hours east of Delhi).

MODERNIST ARCHITECTURE OF AHMEDABAD

INDIA IS VIVID, EXCITING, AND OVERWHELMING, with kaleidoscopic beauty in all directions. The very air is electric, multidimensional. Temple bells ring, pilgrims chant, car horns honk, and jasmine and roses and street food scent the air. Women in pink, red, indigo, or orange saris float past. Everything is on the move.

You are invited to join us on the India Design Tour – a "conscious luxury" exploration of the road less travelled in Ahmedabad and Rajasthan. We will show you our India, from a designer's point of view. From the city of Ahmedabad, with its overlays of past empires; to adventures in the princely lands of India's most picturesque state, Rajasthan; this is a trip to enchanted places conjured from childhood stories of exotic lands.

Through our extensive network of friends, family, and interesting contacts, we have organized special walks with local experts, visits to meet designers in their studios, and workshops with Indian craftspeople to bring to life the beating heart of this part of the world.

The pace of the trip allows for plenty of lingering over tea on the terrace, as well as hands-on experiences, so that we can slow down the pace and immerse ourselves in the moment – "doing" as well as "seeing". From block-printing workshops, bird watching, a candlelit dinner in a stepwell under a starry desert sky, and many other surprises, we have allowed plenty of time at each destination so that we can immerse ourselves in the rhythm of each place.

We will tour with typically 8-14 guests – small enough to tailor boutique experiences but large enough to get to know an interesting group of people.

You don't have to be a designer to come with us – if you are interested in gardens, architecture, textiles, craft, all things handmade, good food and beautiful hotels, this is an opportunity to travel with like-minded people who share your interests.

DUNGARPUR

ITINERARY

DAY 1 • Sunday 5th January

Upon arrival at Ahmedabad's Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel International Airport you will be met at the gate by our representative and escorted through passport control and customs and whisked off to the House of MG in a chauffeur-driven car (20 minutes). Check in is from 2 pm onwards.

Accommodation: The House of MG (Modern Heritage Grand Room)

The House of MG

Experience old-world charm at this delightfully rambling hotel, with its canopied beds and antiques. The city's premiere boutique hotel, the House of MG was the family mansion of textile baron, Mangaldas Girdhardas (MG) and is an Ahmedabad destination in its own right. Well-located, it is a short walk to the city's old quarter. The family's collections are displayed throughout the hotel, offering an interesting glimpse of the craft, art and textile heritage of Gujarat and there is an indoor swimming pool with a dreamy ceiling painted with lotus flowers.

AHMEDABAD

The architecture of Ahmedabad ranges from the ancient to the very modern – from the splendid medieval monuments of the city's 15th and 16th century heyday to the work of contemporary Indian architects, as well as the greats of Modern architecture, Le Corbusier and Louis Kahn. It is now one of the centres of cutting-edge contemporary design. It has a prominent university campus (the National Institute of Design – the most prestigious design school in India) as well as Mahatma Gandhi's Sabarmati Ashram on the riverbank (with its Charles Correa-designed museum). In addition, the historic walled city of Ahmedabad was the first city in India to be inscribed in UNESCO's World Heritage City list.

DAY 2 • Monday 6th January

Meet your hosts, Nicky Court and Kinny Sandhu, and fellow guests this morning.

Today's private excursion will take you to unique places in this vibrant city based on our knowledge of architecture, history, gardens and artisans. Numerous examples of medieval architecture survive amid the bustling streets of the old quarter. In the city's 15th and 16th century heyday, the ruling sultans recruited local Hindu craftsmen to decorate the impressive mosques, forts and palaces they erected in the capital, and the result was a hybrid Indo-Muslim style of architecture quite distinct from that of their Mughal rivals. After lunch we will explore the old city, including walking through the most charming 'pols' (traditional neighbourhoods). The earliest of the city's wooden haveli's date from the fifteenth century, and for many years, these were the homes of the city's rich merchants, who created immense wealth. The most profitable of their numerous business activities were based on cotton, textiles and particularly the indigo dye for which the city was famous. The exquisite mansions still stand, hidden in the labyrinth of the old city, their flamboyant displays of fine wood-carving surviving as an outward sign of the status, grandeur and discerning taste of their erstwhile owners.

Stepwells are an Indian water harvesting tradition from deep antiquity, imbued with sacred significance. A critical resource of water, which is collected during the rains for the dry months, these architectural delights also serve as an important leisure time community hub and sacred space for the local community. Richly symbolic, step wells were largely commissioned by the women of royal families to help make water collecting easier – traditionally done by women for their families. Some of the most exquisite examples of step wells are to be found in Rajasthan and Gujarat, such as the 15th century example, Dada Hari Ni Vav, that we will be visiting this afternoon.

UDAIPUR

Day 3 • Tuesday 7th January 2025

This morning is all about Modernist architecture – buildings by Le Corbusier, Louis Kahn, Charles Correa and B. V. Doshi, including a visit to his studio, Sangath (subject to availability). Architecture heaven!

This afternoon we will visit the Calico Museum (subject to availability). It is regarded as the finest museum of Indian textiles in the world. The galleries display an extraordinary collection of textiles spanning trade textiles from the 15th to the 19th centuries, textiles of the Mughal and provincial courts from the 17th to the 19th centuries, regional embroideries from different parts of India, beadwork from Gujarat, a variety of resist-dyed textiles, and Indian costumes. Note: Our visit to the Calico Museum cannot be confirmed until closer to our departure. In the event we are unable to visit, we will arrange alternative touring.

Afterwards, we will visit one of the few remaining families still practising the textile art of Mata Ni Pachedi, translating to 'that which enshrines the Goddess'. These hand-painted or block-printed images on textiles, surrounded by stories from myths, epics and folk traditions, take more than a month to complete, and preserve the tradition of worship through art.

This evening, we will visit the night market that specialises in Gujarati textiles – think sparkling mirrors and eye-popping embroidery. Good natured bargaining is part of the fun here.

RAJASTHAN

A portion of the ancient Silk Routes once wound through here, and the effects of the crosscultural exchange it seeded—in goods, art, craftsmanship, and ideas—ripple across the region to this day. Rajasthan is the ancestral home of the Rajputs – warrior clans who claim to originate from the sun, moon and fire. They have controlled this part of India for more than 1000 years. Rajasthan is India's archetypal land of maharajas and medieval forts, festivals, palaces, leopards and tigers. It is a land of sweeping sand dunes, camel trains and wild leopards, of glittering jewels, architectural wonders, glorious colour and vibrant culture. It is the must-see state of India, brimming with unforgettable people and landscapes.

DAY 4 • Wednesday 8th January

After breakfast, we drive to Dungarpur in Rajasthan (2hrs 50 mins drive). We are staying at Udai Bilas Palace, owned by the Maharaja of Dungarpur.


We will visit Juna Mahal, the family's former palace, which contains some of the finest muralpainted interiors in India. It has excellent frescoes, miniatures, glass and mirror inlay work. Juna Mahal's fortifications and extensive decorations are representative of early Rajput fort-palaces and show the ways in which the artistic design, architectural planning, and construction techniques of this building type evolved from the 13th to the 19th century.

This afternoon you can explore old town, a labyrinth of narrow streets lined with traditional shop-houses displaying fine plasterwork, or relax by the rather grand pool, with its views over the lake.

Accommodation: Udai Vilas Palace (Suite Room) | Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch

Udai Vilas Palace

This whimsical 19th-century palace, owned by the Maharajah of Dungarpur, sits on a lake rich in birdlife in a town rarely visited by tourists. The original Art Deco wallpapers and furnishings have been lovingly conserved and the whole of this heritage property evokes the spirit of a bygone age, as does the Maharaja's collection of vintage cars.



JODHPUR BLUE

DAY 5 • Thursday 9th January

After breakfast, we drive to Udaipur (1hr 40mins drive). We will visit the beautifully decorated interiors of the City Palace this morning and then cross Lake Pichola to be royally welcomed under a shower of rose petals at the famous Lake Palace.

This afternoon you may choose to relax by the pool or come for a walk through the streets of the old city, which is only a few minutes away in a canopied palace boat. We can also take you to some of our favourite shops for block printed textiles.

We will finish the day with a private cruise on the lake at sunset.

Accommodation: Taj Lake Palace (Palace Room Lake View) | Meals included: Breakfast

Taj Lake Palace

The Taj Lake Palace in Udaipur is like something out of a fairy tale. Built in 1743 by the royal dynasty of Mewar, the Lake Palace had a starring role in the Bond film, Octopussy. The views are dreamy, the palace divine and the swimming pool is Insta-worthy.

DAY 6 • Friday 10th January

After breakfast, we drive north (2hrs 30min drive) to Mountbatten Lodge for lunch, followed by a visit to the medieval Jain temples at Ranakpur, which are located in a remote and beautiful valley in the Aravalli Hills. Considered to be one of the finest examples of temple architecture in Rajasthan, it is the destination for one of the five major pilgrimages of Jainism, an Indian religion whose followers practise non-violence towards all living beings and believe that self-control is the key to liberation. Afterwards, we drive to Rawla Narlai (55 mins drive).

The landscape is rugged around Narlai and leopards can often be seen basking in the sun on the rocks. Later this afternoon, experience the thrill of exploring the countryside in jeeps for a sighting of this beautiful and graceful cat.

Tonight we have organised a rooftop dinner, under the stars, featuring local specialities.

Rawla Narlai

Rawla Narlai is a beautifully restored 17th-century royal retreat owned by the royal family of Jodhpur. There are a series of flower-filled courtyards and a lovely pool hidden in a walled garden. Set in a particularly scenic part of the Aravalli Hills, it is a great base for walking and leopard safaris.

DAY 7 • Saturday 11th January

Rawla Narlai lies in the shadow of Elephant Hill, a massive granite monolith. Join us for an early morning walk – it is worth climbing the 700 steps to the top for a sunrise panorama over lakes, fields and forests that were once a private hunting reserve for the Maharajahs of Jodhpur.


After breakfast, enjoy a guided village walk to experience everyday life in this close-knit traditional community. There is time to enjoy the pool this afternoon, or to have a spa treatment (at an additional cost).

We have organised something very special for this evening – dinner in an ancient stepwell, lit by candlelight.

DAY 8 • Sunday 12th January

We drive to Jodhpur (2 hrs 30 mins drive) today and arrive in time for lunch at Baradari at the fabulous RAAS Jodhpur.



RAAS CHHATRASAGAR

This afternoon, we will explore the narrow lanes of blue buildings in the walled old city below Mehrangarh Fort. Its winding streets are filled with residents going about their business, cows wandering, rickshaws motoring, open kitchens creating delicious smells, markets and shops beckoning to their customers. We will finish at the home of a local family of spice traders for masala chai and snacks at sunset.

Accommodation: RAAS Jodhpur (Luxury Room) | Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch, Afternoon Tea

RAAS Jodhpur

A very cool conversion by Studio Lotus of an 18th-century haveli, located within the 500-yearold walled city. RAAS Jodhpur is the Blue City's most stylish hotel, offering impressive views of Mehrangarh Fort. A wonderful base for exploring the old city on foot, you can even slip through a secret passage from the hotel to reach the restored Toorji Ka Jhalra, a red sandstone stepwell built in the 1740s, and the chi-chi boutiques which have sprung up around it.

DAY 9 • Monday 13th January

After breakfast, we will venture outside the city walls on a nature walk. Spread over 170 acres in the lee of Mehrangarh, Rao Jodha Desert Rock Park was established in 2006 by its restorercreator, Pradip Krishen, under the patronage of the royal family of Jodhpur. It is a microcosm of the indigenous geological, botanical and faunal diversity of the Thar Desert. We will be accompanied by a naturalist from the park who will tell us about the soil, medicinal plants, geology and fauna found here, with the chance to spot local and migratory birds, as well as wild boar, reptiles, butterflies and dragonflies. There is a quality of wilderness and quietness here. It is one of Jodhpur's best kept secrets.

Then we visit the 15th century Mehrangarh Fort, entering through its massive doors, studded with spikes to deter attacking enemy elephants. The views from the top are stunning.

The rest of the afternoon is at leisure – you may like to enjoy the hotel's pool with its magnificent view to Mehrangarh Fort, have a massage or spa treatment (at an additional cost), visit the stepwell next door, or return to the lanes of the old city right outside the hotel for some shopping in the bazaar or one of the upmarket boutiques nearby.

Dinner is on the roof tonight – think cushioned banquettes and candle-lit tables at the in-house restaurant, Darikhana, with its magnificent fort views.

Accommodation: RAAS Jodhpur (Luxury Room) | Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner


DAY 10 • Tuesday 14th January

After breakfast, we drive to RAAS Chhatrasagar (2 hrs 15 mins drive). An utterly peaceful retreat midway between the princely cities of Jodhpur and Jaipur, the camp sits on a dam with views over a nature reserve and farmland to the Aravalli Hills. It's a place of big skies and vast panoramas. We will explore the lake by boat this afternoon. There will also be time to laze by the pool or have an afternoon snooze. Going down to the lake at sunset, where the hotel sets up a temporary bar, is always fun. There are lots of opportunities to spot birds (binoculars are always on hand at RAAS Chhatrasagar) – last time we saw flamingos!

Accommodation: RAAS Chattrasagar (Luxury Tent) | Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch

RAAS Chhatrasagar

Created by the descendants of the area's former rulers, this was the sort of tented camp once set up here for visiting dignitaries on safari. Then RAAS commissioned Studio Lotus to design something very special here which has taken it to a whole new level. It is rated by *The Telegraph* (UK) as one of the top five places to stay in India.



JAIPUR

The luxury tents have wood block printed interiors (embroidered with local birds); the beds are oh-so-comfortable, and the spotless bathrooms have walk-in showers, a bath with lake views, fluffy towels and homemade soaps. The shaded porches with wooden deckchairs with views over the lake are perfect for an afternoon snooze.

DAY 11 • Wednesday 15th January

We start the day with a guided nature walk, focusing on birdlife (over 250 species have been recorded here).

Later we will have a cooking demonstration by our wonderful in-house chefs and also visit the nearby village to see the potter, who still hand throws on a manual wheel in the traditional way. Finish the day by relaxing around a blazing fire under a canopy of stars, before settling into a culinary feast for dinner.

Accommodation: RAAS Chattrasagar (Luxury Tent) | Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner

DAY 12 • Thursday 16th January

After breakfast, we drive to Jaipur (4 hrs 30 mins drive). This afternoon, we will go up into the hills above Jaipur to visit Nahargarh Fort. Highlights include the inspired colour palette of its interiors and its spectacular views over Jaipur, especially at sunset.

Eighteenth century engineering genius and a clever rainwater harvesting system managed to convert the quarry, from which the fort's stone was excavated, into one of India's most unusual stepwells. Afterwards, we can walk down the hill to the City Palace (25 minutes walk) or you can travel down in our mini coach to join those who chose to walk (35 mins drive).

Accommodation: Samode Haveli (Haveli Suite) | Meals included: Breakfast

Samode Haveli


An urban oasis in the old city, Samode Haveli is a royal mansion, set in a lovely garden with apartments arranged around a series of intimate courtyards. Built over 200 years ago as the ancestral home of the aristocratic Samode family, it is still occupied by their descendants, who have converted their home into a charming luxury hotel. Ascend the elephant ramp and enter a leafy courtyard, with interconnecting waterways. It has original 18th-century hand-painted murals, and Jaipur's most inviting pool.

JAIPUR, THE PINK CITY

Founded in 1727 by Maharaja Sawai Jai Singh II as India's first planned city. Jaipur was always intended as a place for commerce to flourish, where leathermakers, weavers, furniture builders, and jewellers created custom pieces for wealthy merchants who passed through town on their way to other outposts in the Mughal empire. Today, the city remains a site of pilgrimage for anyone even vaguely interested in shopping – artisanry is a fact of daily life here. At the city's heart, the City Palace continues to house the former royal family; and, in the arid hill country surrounding the city, is the fairy-tale grandeur of Amber Fort.

DAY 13 • Thursday 17th January

Water percolates through every aspect of Rajasthani life, including its mythology, science, architecture, art, and culture. This morning, we have organised a special curated experience at our favourite fortress palace, Amber Fort. We will listen to the beautiful stories hidden in the fort – stories of people, stories of water and stories of life as it evolved in the desert – and learn about the history, unique architecture, traditions and the life of the people living inside the palace, as well as in Amber, the town below. Eight doors will be unlocked, providing access to the hidden parts of this UNESCO World Heritage-listed site, revealing the ancient yet sophisticated water systems of the fort. They are still functioning, and include underground

tanks, a Persian wheel and water lifting structures. We will then return to the more renowned palace areas, illuminated by a new understanding.

Afterwards, we will learn the basics of block printing at the lovely Anokhi Museum of Handprinting – a small textile museum, housed in a restored 400 year old building nearby. During this beginner-friendly class, we will block print a design onto a cloth square.

Then we are off for lunch at Villa Palladio (at an additional cost). Designed by Barbara Miolini and Marie-Anne Oudejans, this boutique hotel opened in late 2022 and took the design world by storm, making it onto *Conde Nast Traveler's* 'Best New Hotel's in the World' Hotlist for 2023, and the cover of *World of Interiors*, as well as features in *Architectural Digest*, *Frankie*, *House & Garden UK* and *Elle Decoration*.

Hand-painted surfaces are the star here, and walls, pillars and niches all sport intricate murals, and a sea of red-and-white stripes – channelling both Mughal, Moorish and Italian aesthetics, as well as the block prints that Rajasthan is known for. The grounds have been landscaped in the style of a Mughal garden with strict geometries and central, rose petal water fountains.

On our way back into town we have a few options – we can tailor our choice to the group's interests. We can visit a Mughal garden, call in to a pottery studio specialising in hand painted plates that is giving ancient illustrations a modern Indian spin, take in Charles Correa's Jawahar Kala Kendra, or we can continue on to Bar Palladio, the blue and white predecessor of Villa Palladio, for cocktails (at an additional cost). If it is all too much, we will retire to our beautiful hotel – it has a rooftop bar with beautiful views over the city.

Accommodation: Samode Haveli (Haveli Suite) | Meals included: Breakfast

DAY 14 • Saturday 18th January

We start with an early morning walk to visit the flower market and see the milk auction in full swing. We will be back at the hotel in time for breakfast, visiting the Hawa Mahal (Palace of the Winds) on the way back, in the calm of early morning.

After breakfast, we will visit the Jaipur royal family's Princess Diya Kumari Foundation in the Badal Mahal (Cloud Palace) within the City Palace complex where underprivileged women and girls are taught to sew – preserving traditional Rajasthani techniques as well as learning an income-generating skill. Lunch is at the Studio Lotus-designed Baradari at the City Palace (at an additional cost).

Then this afternoon we will take you to our favourite shops in Jaipur – think jewels, block prints, fashion and pashminas.

Enjoy a farewell dinner under the banyan tree at our hotel to celebrate and reflect on our travels before we say goodbye.

Accommodation: Samode Haveli (Haveli Suite) | Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner

DAY 15 • Sunday 19th January

Enjoy a leisurely morning before we check out of the hotel by 12 noon, which concludes our tour.

You will be transferred to the airport in an air-conditioned car for your departure flight to connect with your international flight home.

POST-TOUR EXTENSION: OPTION 1 THE TAJ MAHAL

AT A GLANCE:



DAY 15 • Tuesday 21st January

Delhi is one of the oldest continuously inhabited cities in the world, with a history dating back to 1000BC. Today's private excursion will take you to unique places in this vibrant city based on our knowledge of architecture, history and gardens.

You will spend the morning exploring Old Delhi, hopping on and off a convoy of red bicycle rickshaws. Built as a walled city named Shahjahanabad, it remained the capital of Mughal India until its fall in 1857, when the British Empire took over as paramount power in the Indian subcontinent. There are still glimpses of the mansions of nobles and members of the royal court, along with elegant mosques and temples, if you know where to look.


Highlights include the 17th century Jama Masjid (Friday Mosque) and a 250 year old Jain temple with an original interior like a Faberge egg (which is probably one of the best preserved Mughal interior in the world). And to round out these experiences of some of the many religions that coexist in India, the morning will begin with a visit to a Sikh temple– its volunteers prepare and serve tens of thousands of meals each day to anyone who wants or needs one. It is so inspiring to see this communal effort in action. This will be followed by a traditional Mughlai lunch in a lovingly restored haveli, which was awarded a UNESCO award for cultural and heritage restoration. Its rooftop has wonderful views over Old Delhi.

After lunch, you will visit Humayun's Tomb, the architectural predecessor of the Taj Mahal. This World Heritage site has the first Persian garden that was built in India.

Afterwards you will be transferred to the airport for your departure flight home (this option will work for those of you with flights departing after 9.30 pm).
