MAMALLAPURAM – UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE-LISTED MONUMENTS

'India is vivid, exciting, and overwhelming, with kaleidoscopic beauty in all directions. The very air is electric, multidimensional. Women in pink, red, indigo, or orange saris float past. Temple bells ring, pilgrims chant, car horns honk, and jasmine and roses and street food scent the air. Everything is on the move.'

You are invited to join us on the India Design Tour in January 2026 for a "conscious luxury" journey through South India.

South India is renowned for its lush landscapes, rich cultural heritage, and tropical climate. Sacred rituals and ceremonies, deeply rooted in tradition, continue to play a vital role in daily life. Women, clad in colourful saris, adorn their hair with fragrant flowers, embodying the region's beauty and grace. Indian textiles, once one of the world's most valuable trading commodities, were central to the cultural exchange between East and West, and the bustling ports of South India, which flourished when trade winds and maritime routes connected distant lands, boast fascinating histories of foreign interactions – from the Roman Empire to the East India Company.

This tour is an opportunity to experience a unique perspective of India, through the eyes of a designer. Through my network of friends, family, and interesting contacts, I have curated architecture and history-focused tours and organised special visits to meet Indian craftspeople. We will see artisans practising the centuries-old arts of kalamkari and tile making, observe handloom weavers at work, and learn the secrets of how to cook authentic South Indian dishes.

There will also be visits to bustling flower markets, learning about perfume making and essential oils, hunting for vintage treasures that once graced the grand mansions of Chettinad, shopping for beautiful textiles, and tasting South Indian coffee (delicious!) – all whilst allowing plenty of time at each destination so that we experience the rhythm of each place.

Our tours are intimate, with 8-16 guests – small enough to offer personalised boutique experiences, yet large enough to connect with a group of like-minded travellers who have shared interests in art, architecture, design and textiles, and who love good food and beautiful hotels.





ITINERARY

DAY 1 • Sunday 4th January

Chennai: Upon arrival at Chennai International Airport, our friendly representative will greet you with a warm smile and a placard displaying your name. You will then be comfortably transferred in an air-conditioned car to the hotel (1hr 10 mins drive). Check-in is from 2 pm onwards.

Accommodation: Taj Fisherman's Cove Resort & Spa, Chennai (Deluxe Room Sea View)

Taj Fisherman's Cove Resort

Nestled within the historic walls of a centuries-old Dutch fort, Taj Fisherman's Cove Resort & Spa is a tropical 5-star retreat with a private beach and lovely views of the Bay of Bengal.

TAMIL NADU

Tamil Nadu is the homeland of one of humanity's living classical civilisations, stretching back uninterrupted for two millennia. This vibrant culture is very much alive in the Tamils' language, dance, poetry and forms of Hinduism. The region is home to some of India's most remarkable temples, from the intricate stone carvings at Thanjavur to the grand halls at Madurai.

The landscape is dotted with towering, pastel-hued temples. Its long coastline, the Coromandel Coast, bears the remnants of forgotten European trading posts and has a fascinating history of foreign interactions, from the Roman Empire to the British East India Company.

The long history of Dravidian civilisation in Tamil Nadu is one that predates the dominant Aryans of the North, and because of this, Tamils feel they are more deeply rooted in the Indian subcontinent. There is a distinct "otherness" to Tamil Nadu – its language and culture are unlike anywhere else in India. Tamil Nadu has a reputation for being conservative and devoutly religious. While this may still largely hold true, a gradual transformation is taking place as the state increasingly deals with the outside world. Amidst ancient temple gates, glass-and-steel offices of modern IT companies thrive, and the Tamil-language film industry rivals Bollywood.

DAY 2 • Monday 5th January

Mamallapuram: This morning you will have the opportunity to meet your host, Nicky Court, and fellow guests, as we begin our South India adventure.

Our first stop is Mamallapuram (also known as Mahabalipuram) (20 mins drive). A major seaport in the 7th and 8th centuries, Mamallapuram is now a tranquil spot on the Coromandel Coast. This UNESCO World Heritage site offers a fascinating glimpse into the artistic and technical brilliance of the Pallava artisans, who carved intricate temples directly from the natural landscape. The world's largest bas-relief, the Descent of the Ganges, is one of the extraordinary works of Indian art that you will see here.

Another highlight is the Shore Temple, which is said to be one of seven temples that once stood here. It is carved from a single, massive rock. Local legend says that the god Indra submerged the others during a mighty storm, leaving only the Shore Temple above the waves. This myth persisted until the 2004 Boxing Day tsunami, when the sea receded by 500 metres. To the amazement of local fishermen and tourists, a long row of large rocks emerged from the water, possibly remnants of the submerged temples.

Mamallapuram – Puducherry: After exploring Mamallapuram, we will drive to Puducherry (2 hrs). Once a French colony, Puducherry is now one of India's most picturesque towns, with its French colonial architecture and relaxed, coastal vibe.

Accommodation: Palais de Mahe, Puducherry (Palais Chambre Deluxe) | Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch

Palais de Mahe

Palais de Mahé is located in Puducherry's charming French Quarter. Just steps away from the seafront promenade, this elegant hotel features spacious rooms that blend colonial architecture with modern comforts.

The hotel has a polished, old-world vibe. The centrepiece is a sleek pool with sun lounges accessorised with nautical-striped towels. On the rooftop terrace, the hotel's restaurant offers lovely views over the rooftops of the French Quarter to the sea.

PUDUCHERRY

Until 1954, Puducherry (formerly known as Pondicherry) was a French colony, and it has preserved much of its colonial charm, including its French street names. The streets are lined with villas painted in vibrant colours with bougainvillea-clad doorways. The town is home to cafes, restaurants, boutiques, and galleries, many showcasing local artisanal products, while the police force still sports the distinctive red French *képis*.

Pondy (as it is fondly called by its residents) is regularly featured in the top ten cleanest cities in India, with its streets kept spick and span by its ever-present teams of lady sweepers (providing employment for underprivileged women).

Pondicherry also draws spiritually minded visitors to the internationally renowned Sri Aurobindo Ashram and the nearby experimental community of Auroville. These places offer immersive experiences in expanding collective consciousness through yoga and meditation.

DAY 3 • Tuesday 6th January

Puducherry: We will visit busy Goubert Market this morning to get a glimpse of the daily life of Puducherry. There is a lively fish section, run by women. There are also merchants sitting behind mountains of dried chillies and aromatic spices; rows and rows of fresh local produce, banana leaves, and coconuts; butchers portioning chunks of beef and pork; and flower sellers threading garlands and selling flower petals by the kilo.

This afternoon we will walk the tree-lined streets of the French Quarter (called the White Town) with a local expert to learn more about Puducherry's architecture. There will also be time to shop in the upmarket boutiques or visit one of the lovely cafes. We will also take you see a beautiful church that has interiors that are a meditation on colour, with stained glass windows that open onto flower-filled gardens.



DAY 4 • Wednesday 7th January

Puducherry – Auroville – Puducherry: We will visit Auroville this morning (30 mins drive). Auroville is an experimental, non-denominational township dedicated to human unity and peace. Since its inception in 1968, Auroville has attracted people from all over India, and the world.

We will visit the Matrimandir, a golden globe at the heart of Auroville. The concept of "The

We will visit the Matrimandir, a golden globe at the heart of Auroville. The concept of "The Mother" represents the great evolutionary, conscious, and intelligent principle of Life – the

Universal Mother – which seeks to help humanity transcend its current limitations and enter the next phase of evolution, known as the supramental consciousness.

There are twelve gardens surrounding the Matrimandir. They serve as the spiritual foundation for the city. Each is designed to symbolise a different idea, such as Existence, Consciousness, Bliss, Light, Life, Power, Wealth, Utility, Progress, Youth, Harmony and Perfection.

The houses and buildings spiral around the centre, with green spaces interspersed throughout, and the industrial areas are located at the periphery. The vision for Auroville is for it to be an ideal place to raise children, where they can grow up in a natural environment while still benefiting from modern technology.

Afterwards, we will return to Puducherry (30 mins drive). This afternoon is free for you to relax and explore at your own pace.

DAY 5 • Thursday 8th January

Puducherry – Kumbakonam – Thanjavur: This morning we will drive to the River Cauvery (2hr 15min), where we will visit one of the last remaining artists practicing Karuppur Kalamkari. This centuries-old art form involves drawing intricate designs on fabric, using plant-based dyes derived from flowers, bark, roots and seeds. The dyes are applied to cotton using brushes and pens made from coconut stems and bamboo. Once completed, the artwork is washed and dried along the riverbank, with the river water playing a key role in giving the fabric its distinct texture.

Kalamkari traces its origins to the Maratha period in Thanjavur, where it was often commissioned by the royal family. In Tamil Nadu, Karuppur Kalamkari holds deep cultural significance and is widely used in temple decorations, such as hangings, canopies, and door frames, particularly during the Panguni Uthiram festival. The art is revered as sacred and is an integral part of the local community's traditions and beliefs.

After our visit, we will go to a lovely restaurant nearby for a thali lunch, a tasting plate featuring some delicious traditional recipes that have been passed down from generation to generation. You will also have the chance to try the famed "degree coffee" – Kumbakonam's signature filter coffee, made from the finest local beans and fresh milk. South Indian coffee is delicious!

Afterwards, we will continue to Tanjore (50 mins drive).

Set amidst beautifully landscaped gardens, complete with a serene pool, Svatma has been thoughtfully designed and restored to celebrate the rich art and culture of Tamil Nadu.


THANJAVUR

Thanjavur (formerly known as Tanjore) boasts a rich and fascinating history that is expressed through its architecture, art, and cultural heritage. Founded over a thousand years ago, the city has been a cornerstone not only of Tamil Nadu, but of South Indian civilisation. As the heart of the mighty Chola Empire, Thanjavur's influence stretched well beyond the Tamil region, shaping the cultural landscape of much of the Indian subcontinent, as well as Southeast Asia. The Cholas left behind an enduring legacy of grand temples, intricate sculptures and a distinctive artistic style that continues to be celebrated today.

THANJAVUR'S ROYAL PALACE

DAY 6 • Friday 9th January

Thanjavur: The Brihadeeswarar Temple stands as the pinnacle of Tamil temple architecture. It is one of the largest and most awe-inspiring temples in India. A UNESCO World Heritage site, it was built in the 11th century, and it showcases the Chola dynasty's artistic legacy. The temple features an enormous central dome (which was the largest of its kind in the world when it was built) as well as intricate sculptures, frescoes and towering gateways. We will visit the temple twice to see it in different lights – at dawn, for its serene, spiritual atmosphere. And in the late afternoon, the intricately carved granite façade comes alive with the warm glow of sunset. During these times, the temple often hosts special pujas (acts of worship), offering a deeper connection to the spiritual and cultural pulse of Thanjavur.

We will visit a local atelier to learn about the school of Tanjore painting and see the artists at work. These highly collectible artworks are usually adorned with gold and depict Hindu deities, goddesses, and mythological scenes (Nicole's favourites are the glass-painted ones).

We will finish with a glimpse into Thanjavur's literary heritage at the Saraswathi Mahal Library. It is one of the oldest libraries in India and is renowned for its rare collection of ancient manuscripts and books.

DAY 7 • Saturday 10th January

Thanjavur: We will visit the Thanjavur Maratha Palace, Art Gallery and the Chola Museum this morning and see a remarkable collection of bronze sculptures, murals and paintings.

Thanjavur – Chettinad: This afternoon we will drive to Chettinad (1hr 30min). The rest of the afternoon is free for lounging by the pool or exploring the beautiful heritage property that will be our home for the next three nights.

Accommodation: Visalam (Chettinad Suite) | Meals included: Breakfast


This 1930s Art Deco mansion is decorated with the original owners' furniture and paintings. Each of the guest rooms is decorated with antiques, vintage photographs and local textiles, and has large windows overlooking the gardens. There is also a lovely pool.

CHETTINAD

Chettinad is the homeland of the Chettiars. It is dotted with grand yet faded mansions, remnants of a bygone era when the community amassed enormous wealth across Asia during the days of the British Empire. These sprawling homes, often occupying entire city blocks, boast interiors with egg-plaster walls, crystal chandeliers, Burmese teak columns, Italian marble, patterned tiled floors, and intricate wood carvings. They are a living museum of Chettinad's glorious past and many of them are on the tentative list for UNESCO World Heritage recognition.

The name "Chettiar" is derived from the Sanskrit word *Shreshti*, meaning "wealth" – a fitting title for this prosperous merchant community. While the Chettiars have existed since at least the Chola period, it was during the 19th century, at the height of the British Empire, that they rose from traders to powerful moneylenders in nearly every British colony in Asia, from Burma to Singapore. They became the single most important financiers in the whole of Southeast Asia, with a client list that included royalty and the British East India Company.

By 1920, Chettiar loans underwrote 80% of Burma's agrarian and trading economy. But in the 1920s, crisis struck. The Great Depression meant that millions of people defaulted on their debts at the same time. Between 1931-8, the Tamil Chettiar community suddenly found themselves in

possession of a quarter of all Burmese land. This incited a devastating backlash against the Tamil community. There were anti-Indian riots and in 1937 Burma was administratively separated from British India. As a result, many Chettiars started repatriating their assets back to Madras (now known as Chennai) in the late 1930s. But it was the Japanese invasion of Burma in 1942 that prompted the tragic re-migration of a more substantial majority of Indian communities by sea, air or through the jungles of north-western Burma. Nearly half a million fled between January and June 1942.

After the war, the Burmese *Land Nationalisation Act 1948*, effectively stopped Indian communities (often born in Burma) from repatriating back to independent Burma (and recovering their properties). As a result, much of the community would migrate to India between the 1940s and 1960s, effectively becoming displaced persons in their Indian homeland. By the 1980s, increasingly anti-Indian measures enacted by an openly xenophobic Burmese military rule resulted in most of the remaining Burmese Indian community migrating to Thailand, Singapore, Bangladesh and Pakistan, and beyond, to the West.

Seeing glimpses of the former glory of these once-stunning mansions, built in Art Deco, Victorian, Tudor and Neoclassical styles, with a distinctly Indian sensibility, will be a highlight of our India Design Tour.

DAY 8 • Sunday 11th January

Chettinad: We will immerse ourselves in the history, architecture, and culture of this fascinating region by visiting the Chettinad Palace as well as some of the other grand mansions.

Antique and vintage shopping is a must here. There are shops filled with an incredible array of items, from enamel ware, trays, porcelain, cutlery, spice boxes, kitchen utensils and teapots, to radios, beautiful mirrors and lamps – the list goes on – treasures from the community's former glory days. We will also visit the artisans who still make beautiful handmade tiles in the traditional way.

Accommodation: Visalam (Chettinad Suite) | Meals included: Breakfast

DAY 9 • Monday 12th January

Chettinad: The 73 villages of Chettinad are dotted with traditional Chola-style temples, many of which are centuries old. Each temple features its own sacred tank which serves as the focal point for village life. We will visit one of the temples that is 1,800 years old.

Known for its bold, aromatic flavours, Chettinad cuisine is among the spiciest and most celebrated in India. To give you an authentic taste of the region, we have arranged a cooking class to learn how to prepare traditional Chettinad dishes.

Chettinad is also famous for its saris. We will visit a nearby handloom unit, where we will watch artisans weave these beautifully coloured textiles.

Accommodation: Visalam (Chettinad Suite) | Meals included: Breakfast

DAY 10 • Tuesday 13th January

Chettinad – Madurai: This morning we will drive to holy city of Madurai (2 hours). Meenakshi Amman Temple is the iconic heart of Madurai and one of the most important Hindu temples in India. This magnificent 17th-century temple, dedicated to Goddess Meenakshi and Lord Shiva, is a masterpiece of Dravidian architecture, with towering gateways and grand pillared halls. In the evening, we will stay for the *aarti*, a nightly ceremony in which Shiva's reunion with Meenakshi is enacted. The sacred rituals – flaming torches, chanting priests, and the sounds of the *nadaswaram* and *mellam* – bring the temple to life in a truly spiritual experience.









MADURAI

Madurai is also home to South India's most fragrant flower, a species of jasmine called *kundu malli*. Women sit in rows selling strings of flowers from wicker baskets to pilgrims who leave tens of thousands of blooms each day as offerings to the goddess at the temple. The scent of jasmine, tuberose, marjoram, myrrh, champak magnolia, and rose infuses the air like a fragrant blessing. **Accommodation:** Heritage Madurai (Luxury Plunge Pool Villa) | Meals included: Breakfast

Heritage Madurai

This serene retreat was once home to the old Madurai Club, designed by renowned Sri Lankan architect Geoffrey Bawa, famous for his Tropical Modernism style. The space has since been beautifully transformed into a boutique hotel, featuring intricate Kerala-style woodwork, a charming sunken pool inspired by traditional temple-style ponds, and 17 acres of lush gardens.

MADURAI

While Chennai may be the capital of Tamil Nadu, Madurai is undeniably its soul. A city with a history dating back 2,500 years, Madurai is one of India's oldest continuously inhabited urban centres, steeped in tradition and antiquity. Once a bustling trading hub with ancient Rome, Madurai is dominated by the majestic Meenakshi Amman Temple and is renowned for its vibrant culture, classical dance and music, and rich weaving heritage.

DAY 11 • Wednesday 14th January

Madurai: Indian culture is suffused with perfume. From water scented with holy basil, known locally as *tulsi*, to sandalwood paste and garlands of jasmine and roses, Hindu rituals use an array of fragrances to bathe, decorate, and feed their gods. And here in the south, women wear strings of jasmine blooms called *gajra* in their hair. Perfumers from all over the world come to Madurai because the most beautifully fragranced jasmine is grown here (it's all about the terroir).

We will visit the flower market this morning to see 15-30 tons of jasmine being bought and sold. If there is interest, and enough time, we might be able to organise a visit this afternoon to see flower extracts being made at a factory that supplies international fragrance brands such as Guerlain, Dior and Chanel. An entire field of jasmine will go into just one bottle of perfume – 350kg of flowers produces just 250g of concentrated extract.

We will also visit a beautiful Indo-Saracenic architectural gem this morning, the Thirumalai Nayakkar Palace, which was built in the 17th century.

This afternoon is at leisure – take a dip in your private pool, explore the lush gardens, or unwind with an Ayurvedic massage at the spa (at an additional cost). This evening, we have organised a dinner at The Banyan, one of Madurai's finest restaurants, conveniently located within our hotel. **Accommodation:** Heritage Madurai (Luxury Plunge Pool Villa) | Meals included: Breakfast, Dinner

DAY 12 • Thursday 15th January

Madurai – Thekkady: This morning we will drive from Madurai, up into the hills of the Western Ghats (3hrs), to Thekkady, located in the neighbouring state of Kerala.

After settling into our lovely hotel, we will enjoy a botanical walk with a naturalist, who will guide us through the local flora and fauna, offering insights into the region's unique ecosystem **Accommodation:** Spice Village (Spice Garden Cottage), Thekkady | Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch

Spice Village is designed as a traditional village, set in a spice garden in the cool highlands of Periyar in Thekkady. It is focused on sustainability and local traditions and offers a unique blend of nature, culture, and comfort.

WESTERN GHATS

Older than the Himalaya mountains, the mountain chain of the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Western Ghats represents geomorphic features of immense importance with unique biophysical and ecological processes. The site's high montane forest ecosystems influence the Indian monsoon weather pattern. Moderating the tropical climate of the region, the site presents one of the best examples of the monsoon system on the planet. It also has an exceptionally high level of biological diversity and endemism and is recognized as one of the world's eight 'hottest hotspots' of biological diversity. The forests of the site include some of the best representatives of non-equatorial tropical evergreen forests anywhere and are home to at least 325 globally threatened flora, fauna, bird, amphibian, reptile and fish species.

KERALA

Known as 'God's Own Country', this slender coastal strip is defined by its layered landscape: almost 600km of Arabian Sea coast; a languid network of glistening backwaters; and the spice and tea-covered hills of the Western Ghats, dotted with protected wildlife reserves and cool hill stations. Kerala is a world away from the hectic pace of the rest of India.

Traders have been drawn to Kerala's spices for more than 3,000 years. The coast was known to the Phoenicians, the Romans, the Arabs and the Chinese, and was a transit point for the spices from the Moluccas (eastern Indonesia).

Vasco da Gama's arrival in 1498 opened the floodgates to European colonialism as Portuguese, Dutch and English interests fought Arab traders, and then each other, for control of the lucrative spice trade. You can still see the history of the spice trade in Kochi (formerly Cochin), where the peppery whiff of the past is easy to find in the backstreets and busy wharves.

Kerala's long links with maritime trade have resulted in a multicultural society unlike anywhere else in India. As well as the majority Hindu population, almost 20% of the population are Christian, followers of a faith that has had a presence here far longer than in Western Europe – St Thomas the Apostle is said to have landed in Kerala in 52 AD, bringing Christianity to the subcontinent. The local Muslim community (25%) has its roots in trade across the Indian Ocean, and there is even a deep-rooted, though tiny, Keralan Jewish community. A tradition of valuing the arts and education resulted in a post-Independence state that is one of the most progressive in India, with the nation's highest literacy rate.

DAY 13 • Friday 16th January

Thekaddy: Bison, sambar, wild boar, langur, around 2,000 elephants and 35 to 40 tigers wander the lushly green hills of Periyar Tiger Reserve in the Western Ghats, where we have organised a lake cruise. Herds of elephants and sambar deer are common sights, and we may also spot gaur (large wild ox) and wild boars in the grasslands. A variety of avian fauna such as darters, egrets and kingfishers are usually spotted. Hopefully we will also see the Smooth Indian otter.

This afternoon we will visit a local spice plantation to learn about the cultivation, harvesting techniques, and health benefits, of the aromatic herbs and spices that are grown here, such as cardamom, pepper, vanilla and cinnamon.

THE BACKWATERS, KERALA

DAY 14 • Saturday 17th January

Thekkaddy – Alleppey – Kumarakom: This morning we will drive towards the coast to Alleppey (4 hours), arriving in time for lunch on the lush, greenery-fringed backwaters. This tranquil water world is dotted with villages, punted canoes, toddy shops, and houseboats. As we float along, we will take in the sight of vibrant green paddy fields, watch traditional rice barges glide by, and observe the peaceful rhythms of village life along the banks. Afterward, our boat will cross Vembanad Lake, bringing us to our hotel, Coconut Lagoon.

Accommodation: Coconut Lagoon (Heritage Bungalow), Kumarakom | Meals included: Breakfast, Lunch

Coconut Lagoon

Coconut Lagoon is located on a sheltered cove on Vembanad Lake. This backwater destination is nestled amidst canals, paddy fields and lush natural life. The villas of the resort are beautiful old Kerala homes called *tharavads*, that were rescued from demolition and carefully reconstructed in this beautiful setting. The lake is home to a plethora of natural life, with rare species of plants, butterflies, birds and sea creatures. A tranquil haven.

DAY 15 • Sunday 18th January

Kumarakom – Kochi: This morning is at leisure. You might choose to relax by the pool, indulge in an Ayurvedic treatment at the hotel's spa (at an additional cost), go birdwatching, or explore the butterfly garden – home to over 54 species of dragonflies and damselflies, a testament to the thriving local ecosystem. Keep an eye out for the floating tea shop, where you can meet the local tea lady from the nearby village.

This afternoon we will drive to Kochi (2 hrs). After settling into our hotel, you might enjoy a stroll to Fort Kochi beach to watch locals fly kites and young boys playing football. The iconic Chinese fishing nets are nearby, and the area also has charming cafes and shops to explore.

Later, we will experience Kathakali, a centuries-old Keralan form of classical dance that narrates mythological tales through expressive facial gestures, hand movements, and rhythmic dance. Known for its complexity, Kathakali is accompanied by live singers who narrate the story in melodic verses. The grand costumes and intricate makeup transform performers into larger-thanlife characters. UNESCO has recognized Kathakali as a Masterpiece of the Oral and Intangible Heritage of Humanity. Tonight, we will attend a performance and have the opportunity to witness the artists applying their elaborate makeup before the show.

Accommodation: Eighth Bastion (Bastion Room), Kochi | Meals included: Breakfast

Eighth Bastion

The contemporary design of this boutique hotel was inspired by the elegance of colonial architecture. It is located in a tranquil spot at the heart of historic Fort Kochi, just a stone's throw from the iconic Chinese fishing nets.

Косні

One of the most atmospheric places in the south of India, Kochi (formerly known as Cochin) is a city of peninsulas and islands, on a large natural harbour. Old Kochi, where we are staying, is the peninsula comprising of Fort Kochi and Mattancherry. Some of the most interesting buildings in India are to be found here, including old Portuguese, Dutch and British architecture. Today it is a laid-back neighbourhood where murals adorn the streets, Chinese fishing nets dot the water, and heritage building have been reborn as cool cafes, chic boutiques and contemporary art galleries.

KOCHI-MUZIRIS BIENNALE

DAY 16 • Monday 19th January

Kochi: We are excited that the Kochi-Muziris Biennale (Cochin Biennale) will be taking place during our stay, and we will immerse ourselves in the city's vibrant art scene. We will explore the exhibitions and site-specific installations scattered across various venues in Fort Kochi, including colonial buildings, decaying warehouses, and historical landmarks like the Mattancherry Palace, which is tentatively listed for UNESCO World Heritage status. This international contemporary art exhibition is renowned for its unique fusion of art, culture, and history. It is the largest art event in India and the biggest contemporary art festival in Asia.

We will also make sure we have time for some antiques shopping in Jew Town and Fort Kochi before we gather for a special farewell dinner to celebrate our journey and reflect on the experiences we have shared.

DAY 17 • Tuesday 20th January
