INTRODUCTION

SRI LANKA IS AN ISLAND OF ART, NATURE AND ANCIENT CIVILISATIONS, a land of temple murals, forest monasteries, Dutch forts, tea planter's bungalows, jungle shrines, and hidden gardens. Here, every moment feels layered – women in colourful saris carry flowers to shrines, monks chant beneath ancient bodhi trees, cinnamon perfumes the breeze, and colonial mansions sit quietly beneath banyan trees.

You are invited to join us in June 2026 for an Art, Architecture & Design Tour to Sri Lanka, an intimate and curated journey led by design expert, Nicole Court. Together, we will uncover the island's most exquisite cultural expressions: from traditional crafts and Kandyan palaces to Geoffrey Bawa's visionary tropical modernism. This journey is immersive and personal – offering behind-the-scenes access to private homes, galleries, gardens, artists, temples and archaeological sites.

Over 14 days, we will wind through Sri Lanka's highlands, lowlands, and coasts, encountering heritage in both grand and everyday forms. The ancient city of Anuradhapura, with its colossal Buddhas and moonstone steps offers awe-inspiring moments for lovers of early Asian architecture. At Sigiriya, 5th-century frescoes still shimmer on a sheer rock face, while in Kandy, we will meet spice growers, tea planters and Buddhist monks who keep age-old traditions alive. Nicole will guide us through some of the island's most beautiful private homes and studios, and share insights into Sinhalese symbolism, Indo-colonial design, and decorative arts that fuse Indian, Dutch, and British influences.

Expect moments straight out of an artist's sketchbook: floating lotus pools at dawn; the scent of wet sandalwood after temple prayers; a weaver's nimble hands at work; hornbills swooping overhead as the sun sets over the water; seeing the sunrise from a 5th-century sky palace; rolling hills carpeted in vibrant green tea bushes arranged in neat, ordered grids; and the stillness of Lunuganga's lake reflecting the sky. The accommodations are just as transportive. Imagine a private stay at Geoffrey Bawa's country estate – home to one of Asia's most famous gardens; swimming in an infinity pool as elephants swim in the lake below; staying in a 200-year-old aristocratic home surrounded by lush tropical gardens; waking up to the sound of the ocean in Colombo's grandest colonial-era hotel, or having your afternoon tea served on the veranda of a 19th-century tea planter's bungalow. In Galle, you will sleep in a 17th-century spice merchant's house and walk cobbled lanes that have not changed in centuries. Each property offers its own rhythm – always deeply rooted in its setting and in harmony with local culture.

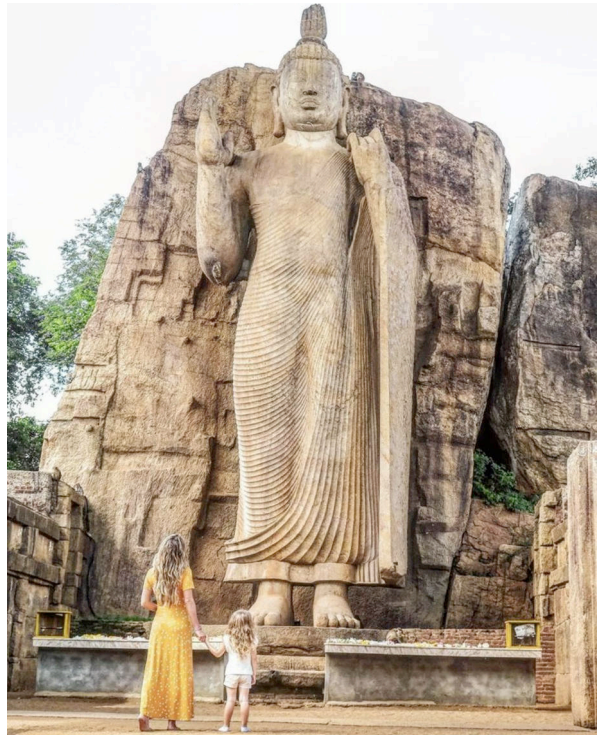

A 14-day Insider Journey with Nicole Court

Day 1 • Arrival in Colombo

- VIP airport meet and greet with private transfer to Wallawwa, a 200-year-old aristocrat's manor house surrounded by lush tropical gardens.
- Welcome afternoon tea in the garden to meet your host, Nicole Court, and fellow travellers.

DAY 1 • Arrival in Colombo

A VIP experience awaits you on arrival at Colombo's Bandaranaike International Airport. You will be met at the gate by our representative and escorted through passport control and customs and then whisked off to Wallawwa in an air-conditioned car (20 mins drive). Check in from 2 pm onwards.

Welcome afternoon tea in the garden to meet your fellow travellers and your host, Nicole Court.

Wallawwa

Luscious tropical gardens, large rooms, good food and a lovely little spa warmly await the travel weary at this historic manor house-turned-boutique hotel. The beautiful 200-year-old gardens, home to birdlife, wide-canopied trees and luscious plants add to the hotel's tranquillity. The setting of the pool feels more like a rainforest than a garden, elegantly hidden beneath mature trees. There is also a croquet lawn, a library with traditional games and a chic boutique that supports local charities.

DAY 2 • Dambulla Cave Temples

This morning we will visit the UNESCO World Heritage-listed Dambulla Cave Temples to see the 18th century masterpieces of the Kandy school of painting. Inhabited by forest-dwelling Buddhist monks since the 3rd century BC, these natural caves are one of the largest Buddhist complexes in south and southeast Asia.

Lakeside sundowners

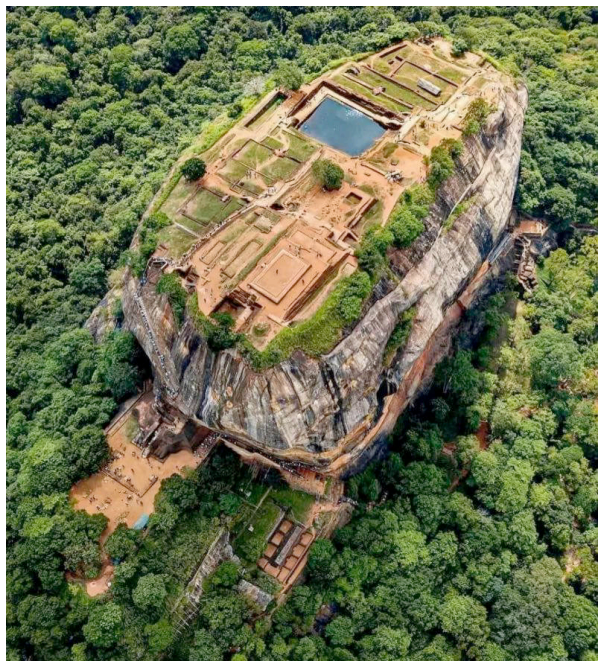
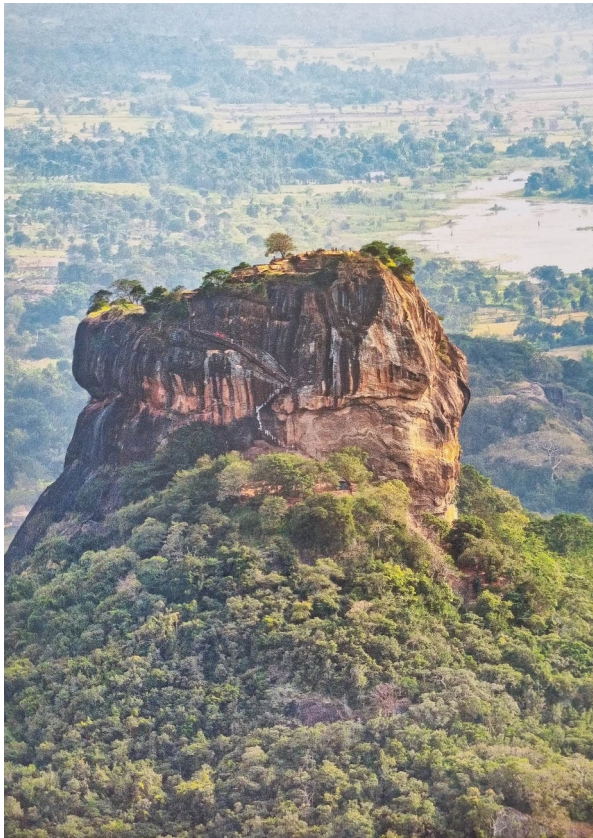
This afternoon we have organized a drive through the countryside. We will travel in jeeps through rural villages, emerald rice paddies and pristine forest pockets with a local naturalist. Water is a key element of the landscape here on Sri Lanka's central plains. The intricate network of tanks, canals, and reservoirs – some dating back more than 2,000 years – transformed a dry landscape into a thriving agrarian civilisation. Designed and built by the ancient Sinhalese with remarkable ingenuity, these interlinked water systems capture and distribute rainwater, sustaining rice fields and villages through long dry seasons.

As the sun sets over Nachchaduwa Lake, we will enjoy sundowners as hornbills call and glide above, settling into the trees that line the lake as evening falls. It is a magical setting that captures the quiet beauty of rural Sri Lanka.

Uga Ulugalla

This 150-year-old Dutch colonial mansion is set among 58 acres of lush tropical gardens and wildlife-rich private grounds – home to more than 100 bird species. The property features 25 private villas, each with its own plunge pool, and combines modern luxury with a focus on nature and conservation.



SIGIRIYA

SRI LANKA'S CULTURAL TRIANGLE

Sri Lanka's Cultural triangle is situated in the centre of the island and was the crucible of early Sinhalese civilization. We will explore the UNESCO World Heritage sites of Anuradhapura, Sigiriya Rock Fortress, Dambulla and Kandy and see many of the key motifs referenced in Sri Lankan architecture – from moonstones, to boulder and water gardens, and more.

DAY 3 • Secrets of an Ancient City: Exploring Anuradhapura with an archaeologist

Founded in the 4th century BC, Anuradhapura was the greatest monastic city of the ancient world. It was once home to over two million people and was the heart of Sri Lankan civilisation for 1,500 years. During this long period of stability, there was a great flowering of the arts, producing magnificent palaces, intricate sculptures, ornate pleasure gardens and vast stupas built to protect the most sacred relics of Buddhism. The three main stupas are the largest buildings ever attempted in the ancient world, surpassed in size only by the pyramids at Giza.

After the city was abandoned in 11th century, it was enveloped by the jungle – the British explorers who first surveyed these ruins in the 19th century felt they were rediscovering a “lost” city. We will explore Anuradhapura with an archaeologist, starting with a visit to the ancient bodhi tree (*Ficus religiosa*). It is the oldest living human-planted tree in the world and has been tended by an uninterrupted succession of guardians for over 2,000 years.

Candlelit dinner under the stars

Cooked using traditional methods over an open cinnamon wood fire, the ingredients for tonight's dinner are sourced directly from the estate's organic farm. Each dish will showcase the aromatic spices that define Sri Lankan cooking.

DAY 4 • Cycling tour through Sri Lanka's countryside

This morning is an immersion in everyday rural life. We will be welcomed into village houses where local crafts like brick, coir broom and ayurvedic oil making take place. We will finish with a traditional dance lesson and an alfresco lunch. (Note: Tuk-tuks are available as an alternative to e-bikes.)

Geoffrey Bawa's most iconic hotel

We are staying at Heritance Kandalama, which took the design world by storm when it opened in 1994. The afternoon is at leisure.

Heritance Kandalama

Designed by Sri Lanka's most celebrated architect Geoffrey Bawa, Heritance Kandalama is one of his most dramatic designs. Described by Lonely Planet as ‘resembling a multi storey carpark after the zombie apocalypse’, the hotel stands as an embodiment of Bawa's signature Tropical Modernism style, showcasing his commitment to integrating architecture with the environment. Vines and greenery creep over the building's facade, blending with its lush jungle surroundings and softening its contemporary lines. Overlooking Kandalama Tank (look out for elephants swimming in the lake), it has panoramic views that stretch all the way to Sigiriya (Lion's Rock).

DAY 5 • Lion's Rock and 5th century frescoes

We will begin the day with an early ascent of Sigiriya, the fabled Lion Rock fortress that rises from the jungle plain. From the summit, the landscape stretches endlessly: mist drifting through

the forests, the distant shimmer of lakes, and the first rays of sunlight illuminating the surrounding plains. It is an unforgettable moment of quiet wonder – standing where a 5th century king once built his sky palace, whilst watching the island awaken below.

Below the rock lies one of the oldest surviving landscaped gardens in the world. The royal pleasure gardens combine moats, pools, and fountains fed by ingenious underground channels, revealing the sophistication of early Sinhalese design and their deep understanding of water and engineering.

Elephant safari at Minneriya National Park

In the late afternoon, as the light softens, herds of elephants emerge from the forest to graze and bathe along the shores of the Minneriya Tank. From the comfort of our private jeeps, we will watch as hundreds of elephants gather, set against the sweeping grasslands, ancient reservoirs, and forested hills of Minneriya National Park.

DAY 6 • Spice trails in the central highlands

From the misty highlands come intensely aromatic cardamom; rich, oil-laden cloves; smooth, buttery nutmeg; and mace. And the island's black pepper stands apart for its bright, complex heat. This morning, we will drive into the green rolling hills of Sri Lanka's tea and spice country to visit a passionate farmer in his forest garden to see how spices are grown and processed. We will learn which common spices double as medicine before seeing how they are used to make the perfect curry – which we will have for our lunch! Our visit will also help support the work of the Forest Healing Foundation Program.

Kandy's Temple of the Tooth – Sri Lanka's most sacred Buddhist site

After lunch we will visit Sri Lanka's most sacred Buddhist site, the Temple of the Tooth, which houses the left canine tooth of Buddha, in UNESCO World Heritage-listed Kandy. The temple is a major pilgrimage site and was historically linked to the political power of the Sinhalese kings, who believed possessing the relic granted them the authority to govern the country.

Tea country

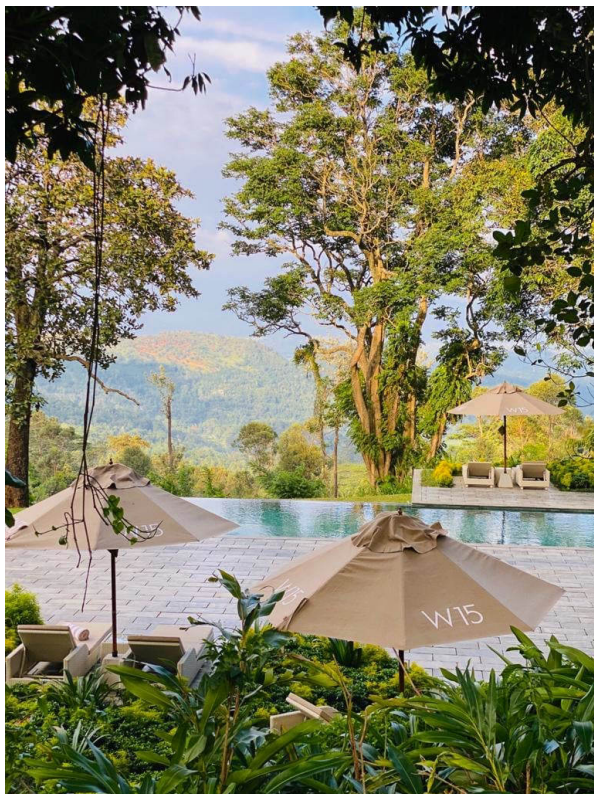
Then we will climb higher into the mountains to stay at a beautifully restored planter's bungalow surrounded by tea plantations. The property offers uninterrupted vistas of Kandy's jagged mountains, including the Knuckles Mountain Range, a UNESCO World Heritage site recognised for its exceptional biodiversity, diverse ecosystems, and striking landscapes.

We have reserved the entire hotel exclusively for our stay so please make yourself at home. High tea will be served on the lawn, and there will be time for a few games of croquet before pre-dinner cocktails.

W15 Hanthana Estate

We have exclusively booked W15 Hanthana Estate for our stay. This 19th century colonial-era tea planter's bungalow has been transformed into a luxury boutique hotel – think high ceilings, grand piano, plush sofas, and butler service – and there is a colonnaded veranda with lush croquet lawn, swimming pool and tennis court to complete the picture. It was recently awarded a coveted key by the Michelin guide – all Michelin Guide hotels excel in design, architecture, service and personality – and the Michelin Key denotes the most outstanding experiences in their selection. Although the bungalow is just a 15-minute drive from Kandy, its location in the Hanthana Hills offers both a sense of seclusion and fabulous views.

KANDY

Nestled among misty hills and lush forests, Kandy was the final stronghold of the Sinhalese monarchy, who ruled for more than 2,300 years – a place of refuge when the island's lowland capitals fell to Portuguese, Dutch, and British invaders. As the last royal city, it preserved the spirit of Sinhalese culture, art, and religion through centuries of change. Today, Kandy remains the island's cultural heart. It was declared a World Heritage site by UNESCO in 1988.

DAY 7 • Tea & empire, a cooking class, scenic jeep ride, or . . . just rest and relax

Today we will learn about the history of tea and the ergonomics of plantations, finishing with a tea tasting. There will also be a Sri Lankan cooking class with the head chef and a scenic jeep ride in the hills with a naturalist to spot fishing cats, civets, wild boars, hares, a wide range of monkeys, the elusive leopard and a diverse range of birds. Or you may decide to skip all of these activities and, instead, have a bath, go for a walk, swim in the beautiful pool, take in the mountain views, get your watercolours out or curl up with a book.

DAY 8 • Colombo's colonial and Indo-Saracenic architecture

Today we drive down to the coast to the capital, Colombo. There will be free time to enjoy lunch, sea views, the pool and the colonial-era charm of our hotel, the Galle Face Hotel.

In the late afternoon we will explore Pettah, one of Colombo's oldest quarters. Tucked behind the city's modern skyline, Pettah remains a labyrinth of narrow streets, century-old buildings and bustling markets. Nestled in its heart is the 1908 Jami Ul-Alfar Mosque, with its candy-striped red-and-white brickwork – every detail reflects the pomegranate's essence. This iconic landmark is a masterpiece of Indo-Saracenic architecture, and a symbol of Colombo's rich multicultural heritage in an area where mosques, temples and churches sit side-by-side.

Galle Face Hotel

This 19th century *grande-dame* brings a nostalgic colonial feel to Colombo's seafront. It has a pool overlooking the ocean and is the city's best spot to watch the sunset.

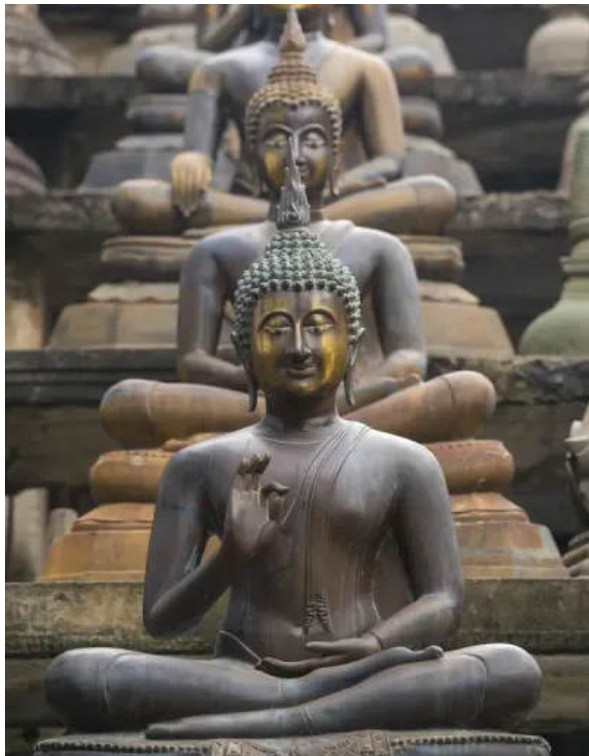
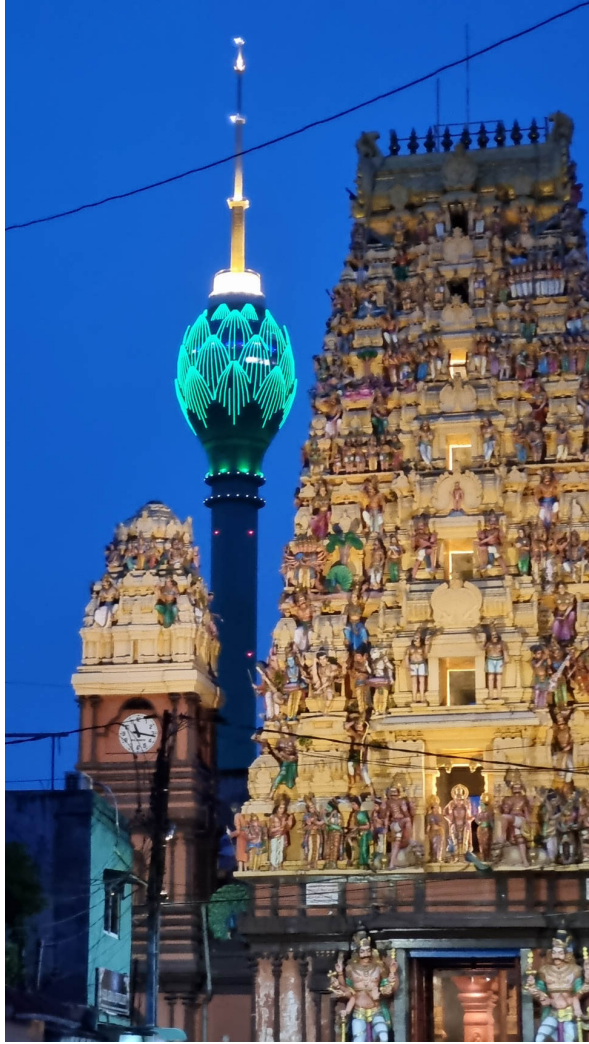

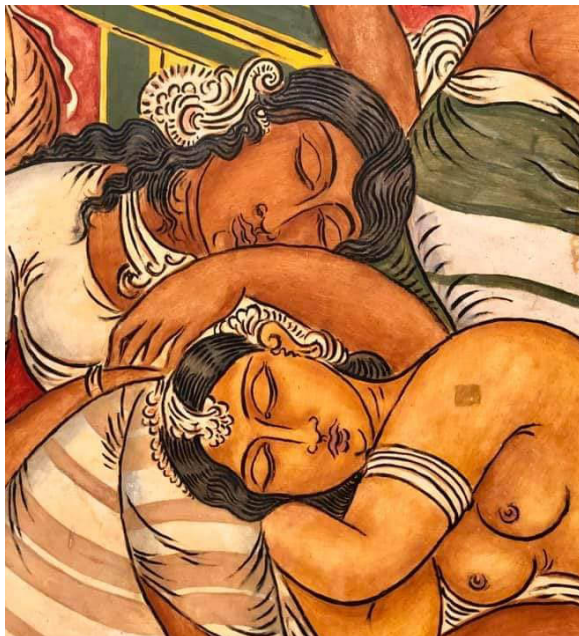
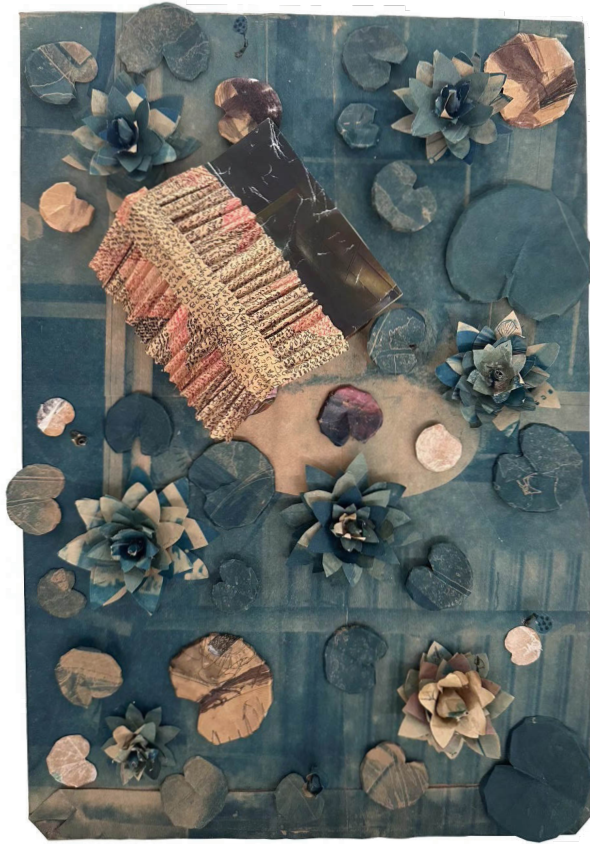
DAY 9 • Colombo's hidden artistic layers

As well as visits to a Tropical Modernist architectural masterpiece, we will see extraordinary murals, visit a contemporary gallery to see what is happening on the art scene right now and visit a private 20th century art collection.

COLOMBO: MODERNIST AND CONTEMPORARY ART; GEOFFREY BAWA'S TOWNHOUSE

DAY 10 • Geoffrey Bawa's townhouse

This morning we will visit the home of Sri Lanka's most influential architect, Geoffrey Bawa. The design reflects Bawa's mastery of space and light, with narrow courtyards, open terraces, and strategically placed windows that create intimate yet airy spaces, offering a glimpse into Bawa's design process and personal life.

Barefoot – the textiles of artist Barbara Sansoni

Barefoot was founded by Barbara Sansoni (1928-2022) – artist, designer, and design collaborator and friend to Geoffrey Bawa – to revive traditional weaving with bold contemporary colour. Today, the Barefoot Gallery brings together art, design, and community, in a serene courtyard space filled with textiles, books, and paintings, with a lovely cafe and a shop selling her iconic textile designs. There will be free time for lunch, browsing in the book shop and people watching whilst listening to live jazz.

This afternoon we drive to Lunuganga, for one of the highlights of the Design Tour – our private stay at Geoffrey Bawa's country estate. We will arrive in time for afternoon tea and sundowners before dinner on the terrace. We have the run of the house so please make yourself at home.

Lunuganga – Geoffrey Bawa's country estate

We have exclusively booked Lunuganga for our stay. Featured on Conde Nast's Gold List of the Best Hotels in the World in 2024 and recently awarded one key in the 2025 Michelin Guide, Lunuganga is Geoffrey Bawa's iconic country house and garden. Bawa spent 50 years curating this wonderland, creating indoor-outdoor spaces, and furnishing them with his interesting collections of furniture, art, and antiques. His home on an abandoned rubber estate served as a testbed for his emerging ideas. The result is a series of outdoor rooms with an exquisite sense of theatre, conceived as a civilized wilderness in the greater garden of Sri Lanka.

GEOFFREY BAWA

When Sri Lanka regained its independence in 1948 after four centuries of colonial rule, it released a wave of creativity across many branches of the arts, including architecture, as the country explored ideas of national identity through visual mediums. One pioneer was the architect Geoffrey Bawa (1919-2003), son of a Muslim lawyer and his Dutch Burgher wife.

Bawa studied English at the University of Cambridge and Law in London before embarking on a legal career back in Colombo. In 1948, he bought Lunuganga, an abandoned rubber estate a few miles inland from Bentota on the south-west coast, intending to transform it into a tropical iteration of an Italian garden. But the project laid bare his lack of knowledge and, in 1954, he enrolled to study architecture at the Architectural Association in London. In 1957, he qualified at the age of 38 and returned to Colombo.

Bawa's early projects were executed in the modernist style using white sculpted forms, exposed concrete frames and patterned ventilation blocks, as prescribed by Maxwell Fry at the Architectural Association. But Bawa quickly realised that this approach was unsuited to the island's hot and humid climate. Influenced by the work of Sri Lankan architect, Minnette de Silva (1918-1998), he began to experiment with traditional forms – verandas, courtyards, overhanging roofs - and materials including clay tile, stone and timber.

Bawa's house for the batik artist Ena de Silva, built in the early 1960s, typified this new approach. Taking inspiration from traditional Kandyan architecture, he turned the structure inside out, organising the accommodation around a large central courtyard. This was a time of

restricted imports and the house was built without glass, concrete or air conditioning. The verandas around the courtyard were supported by polished satinwood columns and the roofs were clad in half-round clay tiles, but the open-plan style was wholly modern in spirit. Originally the house was located in the heart of Colombo, but when it was threatened with demolition, it was dismantled and carefully rebuilt on the edge of Lunuganga by the Geoffrey Bawa Trust.

Bawa was seeking a new but authentic architecture that would reconcile the needs of the present with memories of the past. Working like a scenographer, he conceived a building as a series of tableaux to be experienced sequentially, breaking down the barriers between inside and out. Over the next 35 years, he completed over 200 projects, establishing himself as one of the most important Asian architects of his generation.

Throughout his career, Bawa continued to fashion his own garden at Lunuganga, using it and his Colombo townhouse as space laboratories in which to conduct various architectural experiments. In 2001, Bawa was given lifetime-achievement recognition as one of the recipients of an Aga Khan Award for Architecture. At the time of his death in 2003, the garden was still a work in progress. An intriguing sequence of spaces and vistas created through the interaction between landscape and topography, it had come to be recognised as one of the most important Asian gardens of the 20th century.

Bawa's interest in the architectural heritage of Sri Lanka can be traced back to early excursions in the family motor car to the ancient cities during the 1930s and to journeys with his brother, Bevis, during the early 1950s. However, a serious interest developed only after he qualified as an architect in 1957. It was then that he came under the influence of Australian painter, Donald Friend, who stayed for five years on his brother, Bevis' estate at Brief. Friend and Bevis Bawa travelled around the island together, searching for what were then little known and remote ruins that Friend recorded in his drawings and paintings. It was Friend who encouraged Geoffrey Bawa to look at his native Sri Lanka and its architecture with new eyes. Bawa began to incorporate indigenous elements into his evolving regionalist style, gathering together a group of young architects and artists to join him in his search for a new approach to Sri Lankan architecture – one that was sensitive to the environment and local traditions.

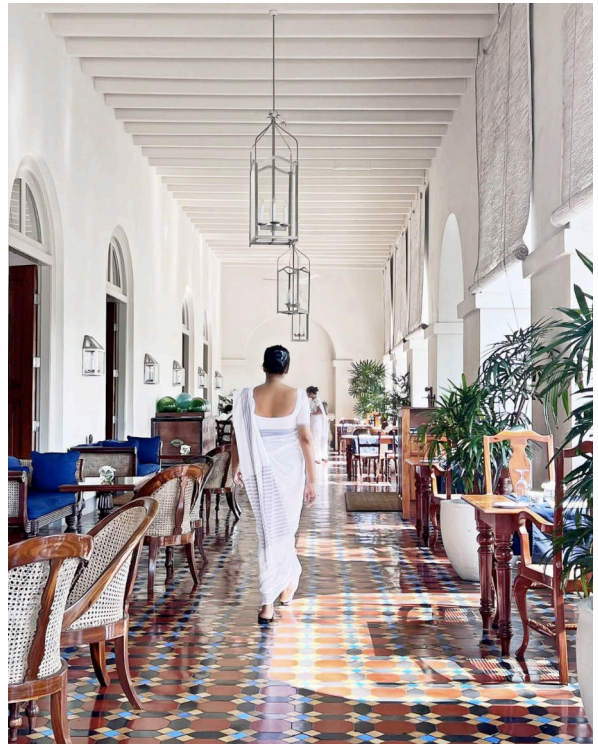
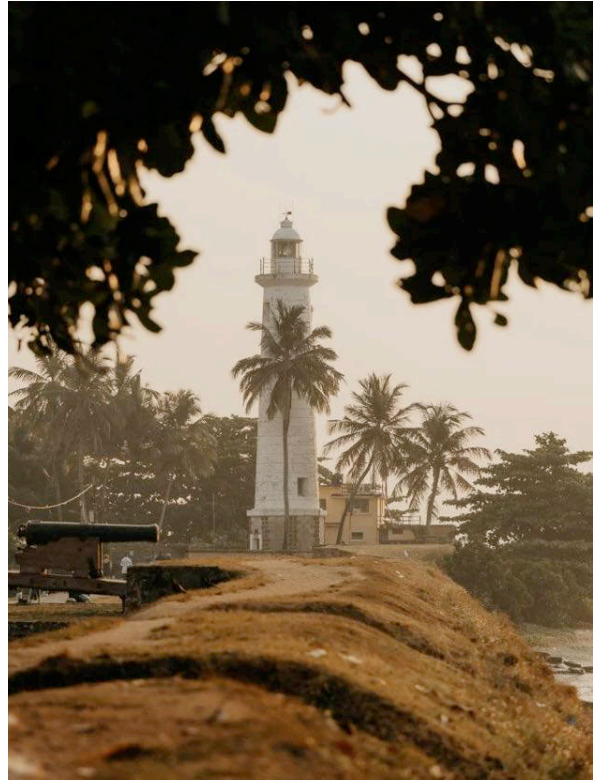
In the late 1960s, his design for the Bentota Beach Hotel broke the mould of generic hotel design that was applied around the world by being modern yet still looking recognisably Sri Lankan. Other resort hotels followed, including perhaps the most influential of them all – a complex of holiday villas in Bali called Batujimbar. Its pavilions, courtyards and pools became the familiar shorthand for Bali hotels today, shaping the scale and style of similar resort developments in Bali and beyond.

These villas in the Batujimbar estate housed influential Australian architects Peter Muller and Kerry Hill, as well as legendary hoteliers Adrian Zecha (who went on to found Aman), Ong Beng Seng (Four Seasons Resorts in Bali) and his wife Christina Ong (who went on to found Como Hotels & Resorts). Was the conception of Aman and Como due to the influence of Bawa's design – perhaps born out of this interaction between visionaries at Batujimbar in Bali?

Bawa's influence escalated following the publication of his work in *The White Book* in 1986 (*Geoffrey Bawa: Architect in Sri Lanka*) which saw a flurry of copycat designs across the region. Suddenly everyone saw the sense of open-sided buildings with shading roofs, and the beauty of cool courtyards and lavish plantings. It became the new Asian style, which we see today in everything from Singaporean hotels to Byron Bay beach houses.

DAY 11 • Lunaganga and Brief – two influential 20th century Asian gardens

This morning is an immersion in the glorious gardens of Lunuganga. And in the afternoon, we will visit Brief, the garden created by Geoffrey Bawa's older brother, Bevis (1909-1992).



GALLE

Bevis was a bon vivant, renowned for his sharp wit and quick mind. A photograph in the house shows a celebration in the gardens, with Bawa entertaining Laurence Olivier and Vivien Leigh. Other famous names to have also gossiped over a gin and tonic at one of Bawa's garden parties include Gregory Peck, Aldous Huxley and Agatha Christie.

Bevis met the Australian painter, Donald Friend (1915-1989), in 1949 on a ship sailing from Colombo to Italy and invited him to come and stay at Brief when he was next in Ceylon. Friend took up this invitation in 1957 and stayed for five years. This was a prolific period for Friend, as he experimented with a number of different media: bas relief tiles, aluminium sculptures, painted doors, murals, gold leaf paintings.

A number of the artist's works, given as thanks for Bevis Bawa's hospitality, are on display in the house, the highlight being the giant *Brief Mural* (1958), Friend's colourful interpretation of Sri Lanka, depicting Hindu goddesses, elephants, jungles and peacocks. An original painting by Russell Drysdale – who was another visitor to Brief – hangs in the dining room.

DAY 12 • The world's best cinnamon

Sri Lanka's fertile soils and tropical climate produce some of the world's finest spices. Fragrant Ceylon cinnamon – the island's most famous export – exudes a delicate sweetness found nowhere else. We will stop at a home garden enroute to Galle to see how cinnamon is grown and harvested. Another highlight will be seeing how the delicious sap of the Kitul Palm (*Caryota urens*) is collected and learning about its medicinal properties. We will taste two Sri Lankan delicacies – treacle and toddy – and have a light lunch of cinnamon tea and traditional local snacks.

Historic Galle

Afterwards, we continue to Galle. This afternoon is at leisure with time for a swim. Later, we will meet for afternoon tea and then explore historic old town of Galle with a local storyteller, finishing with sunset drinks.

Fort Bazaar

Formerly a spice merchant's home, this boutique hotel and spa was lovingly restored to honour the Fort's rich history and vibrant culture, resulting in a blend of modern luxury and heritage charm. There is a stylish in-house restaurant, peaceful courtyard and gorgeous pool. Galle's heritage sites, chic cafes and sandy beaches are just steps away.

GALLE

Built by the Portuguese in 16th century and then fortified by the Dutch in the 17th century, UNESCO World Heritage-listed Galle is a melting pot of cultures and communities. Once a busy port that served as a meeting point for Greek, Arab and Roman traders, it is home to Moor (Muslim), Sinhalese, Burgher and Tamil ethnic groups. This architectural and archaeological fortress has a colourful history and is one of the best-preserved forts in South Asia.

DAY 13 • A weaving workshop

This morning we will visit a family-run workshop preserving Sri Lanka's handloom traditions. We will learn about natural dyes and weaving techniques from the artisans whose craftsmanship continues to shape Sri Lanka's contemporary design story.
