



Wooden Pallets

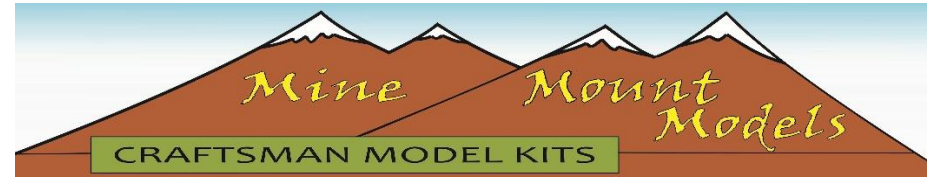
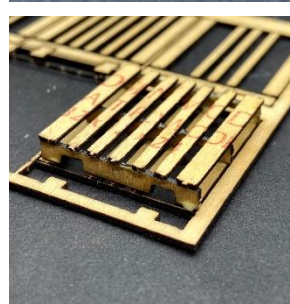
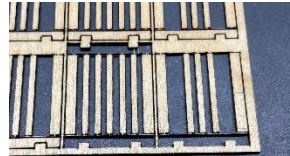
Wood pallets like this can be used in a variety of scenes, warehouses, supply yards, around house yards, behind almost every business, or even in stacks for sale at a lumberyard. This is a nicely detailed kit that is easy to make in an evening.

1. Start by cutting out the 3 vertical support boards. Clean up the ends that were attached to the sprue with a file.
2. Glue them to the seven top deck boards of the pallet. Place a board centered in the pallet, perpendicular to the main boards. The other two vertical supports are glued along the outside edges of the top decking boards. Allow the glue to dry.
3. Carefully cutting the top decking boards out of the sprue. This assembly is flipped over and glued to the five bottom decking boards. Allow the glue to dry.
4. Now you can cut out the completed pallet from the sprue.

You can leave the natural wood color to resemble a new pallet... but we all know that most pallets don't look new for very long. We suggest using your favorite wood stains to achieve a variety of color ranges. Gray and medium browns look good for old pallets. You can even break some of the boards or leave some completely missing for well used pallets and junk piles. Use markers or paint to color the side boards on some. We have seen red, blue, green, and yellow on pallets.

Add your new/old pallets to your favorite scene... or pretty much anywhere on your layout or diorama. Pallets are universal!

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
