

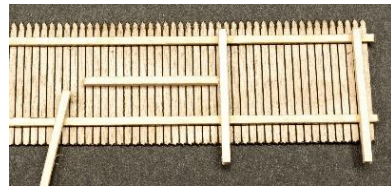
Stockade Fence HO Scale

Stockade Fence like this can be used in a variety of scenes like warehouses, supply yards, around house yards, or even in stacks for sale at a lumberyard. This is a nicely detailed kit that is easy to make in an evening.

Start by deciding if you need a straight section of fence, a gate, or a combo of both. It is IMPORTANT to leave the sections of fence still attached to the top and bottom spews until the cross pieces are glued in place. We find it easier and neater to stain or paint all the pieces prior to assembly.

Each 6" section of fence has 2 pairs of parallel lines engraved on 1 side which are used to indicate where the 1/32" x 1/16" stripwood. Glue these 2 pieces of stripwood along these lines. Be sure that glue adheres to every vertical board, or they may come loose once they are cut from the spews.

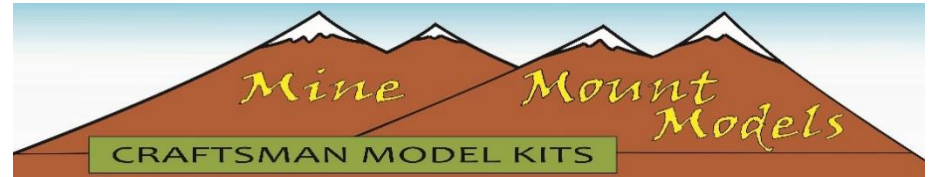
Cut enough 1-1/8" long pieces of 1/16" x 1/16" stripwood to create the vertical posts that will hold up the fence sections. These are glued 8 HO scale feet apart, approximately 1-1/8". Which happens to be the same length as the posts, so use them as spacers in between.



To create gates, you cut a short section of the fence with the 1/32" x 1/16" stripwood glued on, prior to adding vertical posts. Usually gates are 4 HO scale feet wide, approximately 9/16". Add pieces of 1/32" x 1/16" vertically between the 2 horizontal boards. Then add a diagonal piece of 1/32" x 1/16" between the vertical boards.

Add your new stockade fence to your favorite scene by poking holes in the scenery base that are aligned with the vertical posts, and glue in place.

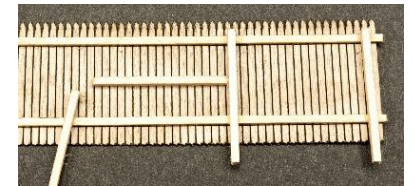
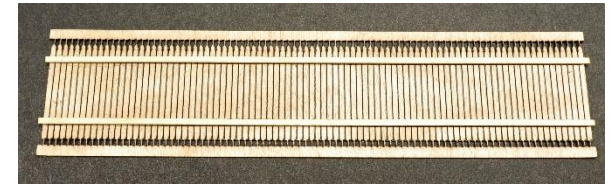
Stockade Fence HO Scale

To create gates, you cut a short section of the fence with the 1/32" x 1/16" stripwood glued on, prior to adding vertical posts. Usually gates are 4 HO scale feet wide, approximately 9/16". Add pieces of 1/32" x 1/16" vertically between the 2 horizontal boards. Then add a diagonal piece of 1/32" x 1/16" between the vertical boards.

Add your new stockade fence to your favorite scene by poking holes in the scenery base that are aligned with the vertical posts, and glue in place.
