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
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A Note from the Editor


Registration is open for NNLM's **Social Determinants of Environmental Health Webinar Series**, March 5 - April 2, 2024!

Webinar Recap

Generative AI in Health Sciences Libraries: What to Do Now

On February 7th, 2024, the Network of the National Library of Medicine (NNLM) Region 3 hosted the "Generative AI in Health Sciences Libraries: What to Do Now" webinar. Lauren Hays Ph.D., an associate professor of instructional technology at the University of Central Missouri, led the session, providing an overview of generative AI (Artificial Intelligence) and the ways that Health Science Librarians can leverage it to serve patrons. With over 350 attendees, the webinar was an

enormous success and provided attendees with the basic knowledge and skills needed to effectively leverage generative AI as a resource in their institutions.

The session began with an overview of generative AI and gave examples of open-source platforms most commonly utilized for inquiries of all disciplines. Subsequently, Dr. Hays then broke it down to the most popularly used platforms for medical information. Once participants were able to garner a comprehensive overview of the generative AI resources available and the capabilities of each resource, Dr. Hays then discussed the ways that Health Science Librarians can utilize the resources to assist patrons in their search for accurate health topic information.

After providing a comprehensive overview of the capabilities and currently used platforms for generative AI, Dr. Hays dove into the unique challenges posed by the use of the technology. Open-source generative AI has been created with censorship capabilities to promote ethical results. While this can be beneficial to protect



users and prevent the dispersion of harmful information, it can limit the breadth of information provided to users which could contribute to the larger issue of bias and difficultly determining the source of generated information. Dr. Hays further explored this concern and gave guidance on creating guides for patrons utilizing generative AI platforms to account for the challenges outlined to find reliable health related information.


